Subject: Emergency Drought Resolution & Notification Procedure

Ladies & Gentlemen,

The MWDOC Board of Directors passed a resolution this morning which does three things:

- Calls for an end to the EMERGENCY drought conditions and encourages the Governor & State Water Board to remove the EMERGENCY declaration and EMERGENCY regulations;
- 2. Calls for the continuation of efficient water use and the voluntary water use efficiency measures; and,
- 3. Moves MWDOC from a Condition 2 (Met Allocation) to Condition1 (Water Supply Watch with voluntary use reductions) status.

The vote was 7-0 and the resolution is attached.

The MWDOC Board feels that we are clearly out of a drought emergency but not out of the drought. To maintain we are in an emergency is disingenuous given this winter's precipitation and storage conditions for both Northern California and the Colorado River Basin. They felt strongly that continuing the emergency status undermines our credibility with the public and the trust relationship we will need for ongoing conservation efforts and when we inevitably enter another future emergency.

This resolution was on a fast-track here and has lead me to review our notification procedures. The resolution and approval process was discussed at last Wednesday's Board Workshop (MWDOC & MET Directors Workshop). The request was made by the MWDOC Directors to prepare the resolution and have it agendized for today's Planning & Operations Committee Meeting for a full Board vote. The email notification of the P&O meeting and the web posting of the agenda items, including the resolution, occurred Thursday morning. The resolution was also discussed at last Thursday's monthly WUE meeting. However, I have heard from a few of you that you do not feel that this notification was adequate. I agree with you.

It is rare that an item goes to the MWDOC Board for approval without prior consideration in the committee process. In this case the Board felt that it was important to pass this resolution prior to the State Board meeting this Wednesday. While public discussions were held in the Board Workshop and WUE monthly meeting and the public posting and email notifications were made, no additional actions were taken to highlight this fast-track item with the Member Agencies. I have instructed staff to verify that each GM is getting these emails directly. More importantly, I have implemented a process whereby each GM will receive a direct email whenever we have one of these rare occurrences whereby a Board approval is fast-tracked for a vote.

I cannot promise you that these rare, fast-track items will not occur. I can promise you that you will be notified.

RESOLUTION NO. 2042

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT OF ORANGE COUNTY DECLARING "WATER SUPPLY WATCH - END OF EMERGENCY DROUGHT"

Whereas, following five years of below average precipitation, Orange County is no longer listed as suffering exceptional or extreme drought conditions and while some element of drought may still exist in the state, the "emergency" is clearly over; and

Whereas, precipitation for the first four months of water year 2016-2017 has been 255 percent of normal in Orange County, 198 percent of normal for Northern California, and 137 percent of normal for the Upper Basin of the Colorado River; and

Whereas, on January 18, 2017, the California Department of Water Resources officially reported the State Water Project's "Table A" Allocation is at 60 percent of contract amounts for 2017 in comparison to 35 percent, 5 percent and 20 percent for 2013, 2014, and 2015, respectively; and

Whereas, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (Metropolitan) water storage ended calendar year 2016 at 1.3 million acre-feet and is likely to increase by an additional 400,000 to 600,000 acre-feet this year; and

Whereas, the residents, cities and water agencies serving Orange County's population of 3.1 million have achieved an extraordinary accomplishment by saving nearly 19 percent (more than 59,500 acre-feet) over the past 6 reporting months, exceeding the countywide voluntary reduction of 10 percent; and

Whereas, key State reservoirs including Oroville and San Luis are at or near capacity; and

Whereas, Orange County residents are aware that efficient water use is critical to help ensure Orange County has enough water to maintain our quality of life and thriving economy; and

Whereas, regional and local water agencies have placed great emphasis on developing long-term local water-supply and storage projects; and

Whereas, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) on Wednesday, February 8, 2017 will consider whether to readopt Drought Related Emergency Regulations; and

Whereas, Public trust in local water agencies will be irreparably damaged if the SWRCB on February 8, 2017 votes to continue the "emergency" declaration; and

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Municipal Water District of Orange County Board of Directors call for an end to emergency drought conditions; and encourages Governor Brown and the SWRCB to end the statewide drought emergency and withdraw drought emergency water use regulations; and

Be it further resolved, the Municipal Water District of Orange County continues to support the efficient use of water and declares a "Condition 1 – Water Supply Watch" within the District's service area, which encourages every Orange County water agency to continue voluntary water use efficiency measures.


Monthly Water Usage Data, Tier 2 Projection & Water Supply Information

The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Tier 2 volume for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- Fig. 1 OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply OCWD Groundwater water was the main supply in December.
- Fig. 2 OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years Water usage in December 2016 was above below average compared to the last 5 years. Higher usage is primarily due to the end of mandatory water restrictions set by the State Water Resources Control Board. In June 2016, all water conservation became voluntary for MWDOC agencies.
- Fig. 3 Historical OC Water Consumption OC water consumption is projected to be 527,500 AF in FY 2016-17 (this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 28,000 AF more than FY 2015-16 and is about 45,000 AF less than FY 2014-15. Water usage per person is projected to be slightly higher than in FY 2016-17 for Orange County at 147 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts.
- Fig. 4 MWDOC "Firm" Water Purchases, 2016 "Firm" water above the Tier 1 limit will be charged at the higher Tier 2 rate. Tier 2 purchases are zero in 2016.

<u>Water Supply Information</u> Includes data on: Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data has implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.


- Orange County's accumulated rainfall through January was well above average for this period. Orange County has had below average rainfall for the past 5 hydrologic years. La Nina conditions are diminishing and will continue to decline throughout the 2017 spring (La Nina is generally associated with cool dry winters in Southern California). It has been reported that the large ridge of High pressure, which has been blocking storms for the past few years, has dissipated and we are seeing very wet weather this winter in California.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation through January was around 198% of normal for this period. January 2017 rainfall well was above the historical average for that month. The Northern California snowpack is 148% of normal as of January 30th. The State of California has been in a declared Drought Emergency since January 2014. As of late January drought conditions have improved significantly and only 26% of California is still suffering from severe or extreme drought. The State Water Project Contractors initial Table A Allocation is at 60% as of the end of January.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through January was 137% average for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 161% of normal as of January 30th. This follows five below-average hydrologic years; the Colorado River Basin is in the recovery of a long-term drought. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 61% of their average storage volume for this time of year. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries for the Lower Basin states. As of late January Lake Mead levels were above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the "trigger" level will not be hit by the end of 2017.


Accumulated Precipitation



County projects granted \$1.5M

Garden Grove's Safe Routes to Schools phase one plan is among them.

The Southern California Association of Governments on Thursday approved more than \$1.5 million for seven active-transportation and sustainability projects across Orange County.

Three awards amounting to \$731,000 are for active transportation – or nonmotorized projects such as walking or biking paths – and four, totaling \$820,000, are for integrated land use and the Green Regions Initiative, both of which promote sustainability.

The Orange County projects were among 54 approved throughout the organization's six-county area.

"I have been advocating for equity across the region," Michele Martinez, president of the association and mayor pro tem of Santa Ana, said Thursday in a text message. "So yes, Orange County did very well like the rest of the region." The largest grant award in Orange County – \$471,054 – was approved for Santa Ana's safety campaign to educate pedestrians and bicyclists. Other active-transportation awards included \$160,000 for Garden Grove's Safe Routes to Schools phase one plan and \$100,000 to the Orange County Transportation Authority for partnerships with police.

Santa Ana also received a \$325,000 award in the integrated land use and Green Regions Initiative category toward a vision for sustainability. Anaheim's Central City Corridors Plan was granted \$225,000, Placentia received \$150,000 for a green open-space project.

More funding than ever for active transportation and integrated land use "shows how big a priority this has become," Hasan Ikhrata, the association's executive director, said.

The SCAG-approved funds, which move to the California Transportation Commission and the Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee for final approval, will finance or help finance the projects.

MAYOR ON STATE OF THE CITY.

Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones delivered his first State of the City speech last week and it was everything you'd want from a guy who loves his city even more than his Facebook page used to suggest he loved his selfie stick.

By which, Brainiac means, he really, really loves Garden Grove.

It would be weird if he didn't, though, right? Mayor of a city that you don't love? Regardless, in his speech on Feb. 2 Jones offered up a few jokes, a bit about himself and a whole lot about what's great in Garden Grove and what's about to get even better.

"Wow! I mean just wow!" Jones began according to a transcript of his speech. "If you're anything like me, I bet you sit around all year waiting for this day to finally come around. And here it is... Groundhog Day!

"So, just the mere fact that you guys are skipping all those wild parties to be here with me today ... on actual Groundhog's Day just really touches my heart!"

And OK, it's a little corny, but we're corny ourselves a lot of the time, and, goodness, any attempt to bring humor into city business is a welcome effort, yes?

After talking about the way an old boss once inspired him by noting the best sales people at the firm where Jones worked seemed to have a bit of insecurity that drove them to try hard every day, he compared that trait to one the entire city sometimes experiences, and now can exploit for the betterment of all.

"Garden Grove has had its own insecurities," Jones said. "Up until recent years, we have been somewhat of a Rodney Dangerfield city: no matter what we did, we just couldn't seem to get any respect around the county. But that is changing. Fast."

Must of the rest of his speech focused on the ways in which the city is making changes, from the recent election that ushered in city council districts to the ongoing plans to "re-imagine" what Garden Grove is and can be.

"Looking forward, we're going to choose our own way and not attempt to mimic what any other cities are doing," Jones said to an audience of 500 or so at the Great Wolf Lodge. "Among our most sacred core values are: We are authentic; we are compassionate; we are welcoming; and we are planning to keep things very, very 'real' in The GG."


The GG? Is that what we're calling it now?

Other highlights of his talk included:

- Business openings or expansions: Jones mentioned the likes of Leaves Café, which was started by brothers Sonny, Vinh, Quang, and Ha Nguyen, which hopes to become "the Asian Starbucks," and currently has nine outlets including two in Garden Grove. Others singled out ranged from the new fast-casual dining spots at the Walmart at the Promenade center to West Grove Fitness.
- New residential projects: Jones pointed to a few including Brookhurst Place apartments at Garden Grove Boulevard and Brookhurst Street, which will open with 180 apartments in July (and eventually be followed by 400 condos and 200,000 square feet of restaurant and retail

Mayor upbeat about city's future

Steve Jones looks forward to a bevy of business, civic projects

"The state of our city is strong and vibrant."

So spoke Mayor Steve Jones during his State of the City address last week before a crowd of about 500 at the Great Wolf Lodge in Garden Grove.

Mostly, though, Jones looked to the future of Garden Grove.

And the Garden Grove native and graduate of Rancho Alamitos High School is optimistic.

Dozens of business and civic projects are in the works; some are expected to be completed as early as this year or 2018.

The biggest one of all is a \$450 million project on Harbor Boulevard, south of Target, consisting of three hotels with 769 rooms. Jones called it, "The single largest, and hands-down most exciting development project Garden

Grove has ever seen."

Jones, 48, noted the difference between old ways of thinking about the local economy, and new ways.

Old ways, he said, involve traffic, traffic mitigation and the idea that people follow jobs.

That's changing, he said. Nowadays, people – especially up-and-coming millenials – look for location first, then a job and career.

That's where the idea of "Placemaking" comes into play. The plan is to make Garden Grove a desirable place to live, work, raise a family, shop and participate in recreational activities.

"We need to stop being slaves to our automobiles," Jones said.

Toward that end, city staff are working to make Garden Grove friendly to walkers, bikers and



those who favor public transportation.

Jones also addressed the new, seven-member council that serves individual districts; there used to be five council members serving at large. A district-driven council will be more concentrated on the distinct needs of neighborhoods, and more accountable to districts, Jones said.

And he sprinkled in some good news from 2016: for the first time in the city's history, the city's Transient Occupancy Tax exceeded its sales tax (The

Great Wolf Lodge, erected fewer than two years ago at a \$275 million price tag, is a big reason for this).

Jones ended his speech by emphasizing that there is no secret ingredient to making Garden Grove a successful city.


"We don't need a secret ingredient," he said.

Instead, he hammered home a simple point: it's every single person who lives and/or works in the city who makes it special.

So everyone... get to work. And have fun.

"I don't care how... sexy you are..." he said, smiling. "Let's roll up our sleeves and get busy turning this city around."

Mayor Steve Jones gets into details

Notes that a slew of projects are in the works

In his State of the City address last week, Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones didn't waste much time getting into the nitty gritty.

Describing periods of highs and lows in the city, Jones pointed to "an exciting period of revitalization" involving a solid City Council, city manager, city department directors and city staff. Looking forward, he emphasized the importance of Garden Grove's self-identity.

"We're going to choose our own way and not attempt to mimic what any other cities are doing. Among our most sacred core values are: we are authentic; we are compassionate; we are welcoming; and we are planning to keep things very, very real in The GG."

High on the mayor's list of ways the city is re-imagining itself is the idea of placemaking, a process or philosophy by which public spaces promote personal health, happiness and well-being. He pointed to two placemaking pioneers who are bringing the concept to Garden Grove: Aaron Paley, co-founder and former executive producer of CicLAvia; and Shaheen Sadeghi, developer of The LAB and The Camp in Costa Mesa, and The Packing House in Anaheim, whom he refers to as the "Curator of Cool."

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Moving to economic development and projects in Garden Grove, Jones presented an extensive list of new businesses to join the city, including a number of new eateries at The Promenade. Upcoming additions to Garden Grove include UFC Gym, Gold's Gym and Aldi's market.

From premier housing de-

velopments like the mixed-use Brookhurst Place to the repurposing of craftsman homes in the Civic Center by Shaheen Sadeghi called "Cottage Industries," Jones referred to these as some of the "coolest" projects to come to the city.

For the first time in the city's history, Transient Occupancy Tax exceeded sales tax as the city's largest single revenue source, thanks in large part to the overwhelming success of Great Wolf Lodge Southern California.

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Other topics discussed by Jones included homelessness, public safety, the OC Streetcar, parks and recreation enhancements, technology, infrastructure and transportation.

Introduction of the city's new image campaign, "Garden Grove is Your Market," was accompanied by a video produced by the City's GGTV3 cable team, who produced all of the State of the City videos.

The program ended with the mayor's call to action for the community and leaders to work together for the betterment of the city.

"Garden Grove is in a unique position to accomplish great things in the years to come. Embrace that! Be part of it! And we will all share in the rewards of our collaborative efforts in due time."













City gets big grant for traffic improvement

recently awarded a \$613,000 grant from the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) for three separate improvement projects that address traffic and pedestrian safety needs throughout the city.

The first project includes the installation of protected left-turn

The City of Garden Grove was signal phasing for east/west approaches on Garden Grove Boulevard at Nina/Ninth Street. This will allow left turning vehicles to make their turns safely instead of waiting for a gap in the oncoming traffic to make their left turn.

> The second project is the installation of a protected left-turn phasing at the intersection of Magnolia

Street and Orangewood Avenue.

The final project is the installation of 612 pedestrian countdown signal heads to 99 signalized intersections citywide. The pedestrian countdown heads show a pedestrian how much time they have left to cross the street at a signalized location before the solid "DON'T WALK" comes on.

The city applied for this grant in August 2016 as part of the Highway Safety Improvement Program through the California Department of Transportation. The project will begin in September 2017 and is expected to be completed in February 2018.

These improvements are part of a citywide effort to improve traffic and pedestrian safety and reduce the amount of traffic-related injuries and fatalities.

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

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

SUMMARY

On January 17, 2017, and January 20, 2017, respectively, Southern California Edison Company (SCE) filed **two** separate applications with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) for approval to change customer electric rates.

1. APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL OF DEMAND RESPONSE PROGRAMS FOR 2018 – 2022 (A.17-01-018)

On January 17, 2017, SCE filed an application with the CPUC requesting approval of SCE's demand response programs for program years 2018 through 2022. This application is requesting an overall <u>decrease</u> in revenues collected from SCE's customers related to demand response programs, when compared to current funding authorized for demand response programs in 2017.

SCE offers a variety of demand response programs to qualifying customers. Demand response programs increase electric reliability and can reduce SCE's total power purchase costs by incentivizing electric customers to reduce electric usage during periods of relatively high demand or high prices. Demand response programs also provide options for customers to control their energy bills.

In Application 17-01-018, SCE is requesting CPUC approval to continue its demand response programs over the 2018 – 2022 period, and to collect electric revenues of \$183 million, or approximately \$36.6 million per year, over this five-year period to fund these programs. If approved, SCE's request would result in a revenue requirement <u>decrease</u> of approximately \$13 million, or approximately 31%, in average annual funding for 2018 through 2022 compared to the funding currently authorized for SCE's 2017 demand response programs.

If the CPUC approves SCE's application as proposed, an average non-CARE residential customer using 550 kWh per month could see a monthly bill decrease of \$0.13, from a current monthly bill of \$107.30 to \$107.17. The following table compares SCE's current bundled average rates, by customer group, to proposed bundled average rates in 2018:

2. 2017 TRANSPORTATION ELECTRIFICATION PROPOSALS APPLICATION (A.17-01-021)

On January 20, 2017, SCE filed an application with the CPUC requesting approval to increase rates to fund projects and programs that will help increase the use of electric transportation.

This request was made after the CPUC issued a ruling directing SCE to file a transportation electrification application, as mandated by Senate Bill (SB) 350. SB 350 orders the CPUC to direct electrical corporations to file applications for programs and investments to accelerate widespread transportation electrification. These projects and programs will help California reduce dependence on petroleum, meet air quality standards, achieve the goals set forth in the Charge Ahead California Initiative, and reduce emissions of greenhouse gases.

SCE's transportation electrification portfolio includes three pilot projects aimed at accelerating light-duty electric vehicle (EV) adoption, two pilot projects to promote electrification at the Port of Long Beach, one pilot to accelerate electric bus adoption at transit agencies, one EV rate proposal to incentivize EV adoption, and one standard-review program providing charging infrastructure for non-light-duty EVs. The total costs of the proposed projects and programs are approximately \$573 million in today's dollars over the five-year program period. If the CPUC approves this application in its entirety in 2018, the following shows potential spending per year.

SCE's plan to advance transportation electrification as set forth in its application is a crucial step toward achieving high levels of electric vehicle adoption as quickly and affordably as possible to support California's environmental goals.

Customer rates will not be affected until the CPUC approves all or a portion of this application. If this application is fully approved in 2018, customer rates would not be affected until 2019.

This would result in an estimated average increase of 0.4% over the five-year program period from 2019 through 2023.

INTRODUCTION

This Comprehensive Quarterly Report presents an overview of the Commission's activities during the months of October, November and December 2016. This report provides an update on projects and activities, a summary of the outreach efforts and an assessment of the agency's current budget and investment portfolio performance for the second quarter.

MANDATED PROJECTS

During the second quarter, OC LAFCO participated in meetings and discussions regarding projects identified in the updated work plan. The filed and potential applications involved annexation of water services for a project that crosses two county boundaries, two potential reorganizations involving annexing territory currently within the City of Orange's boundaries to adjacent cities, and the potential transfer of water and sewer systems. The following section provides an update on project-related activities that occurred in the second quarter.

Pre-filing Meetings Summary

During the second quarter, OC LAFCO staff participated in a number of pre-filing meetings and discussions with developers of projects that will ultimately require Commission action. As part of the application process, applicants are required to participate in a pre-filing meeting to discuss LAFCO requirements. The following is a brief summary of three of those projects:

The Preserve at San Juan

In December, LAFCO staff held a preliminary filing meeting with a developer, together with staff from Riverside LAFCO, and Orange County Planning Department, to discuss an application for a project entitled "The Preserve at San Juan." The proposed gated residential community consists of 72 single family units on 650-acres in unincorporated Orange County. The proposed project will be situated on currently undeveloped private property in the Santa Ana Mountains, approximately 6.25 miles east of the City of Rancho Santa Margarita along the border between Orange and Riverside Counties.

The Preserve is remotely located and is not adjacent to an Orange County city or special district. However, its location is near the facilities and operations of the

Elsinore Valley Municipal Water District and Western Municipal Water District, two special districts in Riverside County. In order to receive water services, the project will need to be annexed to both districts. As there is no nearby wastewater infrastructure, the developer will be installing a septic system as a more feasible alternative. All other services, (police and fire protection, planning, and library) will be provided by Orange County. The developer is in the process of preparing the environmental documents for the project.

In 2014, the Commission approved a Memorandum of Understanding with Riverside LAFCO to address jurisdictional responsibilities for special district annexations that cross over the Orange/Riverside county line. Given the circumstances of this project, Riverside LAFCO is the appropriate agency to process the annexation and the sphere of influence amendment. At a future meeting, after a request from the applicant is received, the Commission will consider an action to delegate the authority to amend the spheres of influence to Riverside LAFCO.

The Garden Grove /Orange Project

Earlier this year, OC LAFCO staff received an inquiry regarding a possible reorganization involving a detachment of approximately .901 of-an -acre from the City of Orange to the City of Garden Grove. The purpose of the reorganization is to facilitate a future development involving the subject territory and an adjacent property located in the City of Garden Grove for a proposed gated residential community with 70 single-family detached homes. At the request of the City of Garden Grove, OC LAFCO staff held a pre-filing meeting in the first quarter of this fiscal year with representatives of the developer, Shea Homes, and the current property owner, the Diocese of Orange County, together with staff from both cities, to review the requirements for an application and the reorganization process. During the second quarter, staff continued to work with the staff of the City of Garden Grove, by providing feedback on the environmental documents and answering questions about the annexation process. It is anticipated that LAFCO will receive an application for this project sometime in the summer.

The Anaheim/Orange Project

During the second quarter, LAFCO staff received an inquiry from the City of Anaheim on a potential reorganization of a property located within the City of Orange's boundary line. The location of the property is adjacent to Orangewood Avenue and the North Net Training Facility located in the City of Anaheim. The purpose of the potential reorganization is to facilitate future improvements to portions of Orangewood Avenue. In November, LAFCO staff discussed the requirements and fees associated with the submittal of an application with the staff from the City of Anaheim. This discussion was to generate an estimate of costs for the City to consider to include in the City's 2017-18 budget. Therefore, it is anticipated that a pre-filing meeting would be scheduled in the next fiscal year.

City of San Juan Capistrano Focused Municipal Services Review on Potential Transfer of Water and Sewer Systems

During the second quarter, LAFCO staff started convening the San Juan Capistrano Municipal Services Review (MSR) Working Group to initiate a collaborative review of the potential transfer of the operations and facilities of the City's water, recycled water, and



wastewater systems to another public agency. Four public sector special districts: Irvine Ranch Water District, Moulton Niguel Water District, Santa Margarita Water District, and South Coast Water District, have been invited to participate in this process. The working group, comprised of executive and technical staff members from the City and the four special districts, have worked with LAFCO staff and a facilitator

to collaboratively develop a scope of work for this MSR process. It is anticipated that a Request for Proposals for qualified consultants to perform a condition, operations and financial analysis for this project will be released in February. This MSR process is expected to be completed by the end of the calendar year.

COMMISSION INITIATED PROJECTS


Small Unincorporated Islands

During the past, several annual strategic planning sessions, the Commission identified the annexation of unincorporated islands as a top priority. At its 2016-17 session, the Commission directed staff to work proactively with the County and the cities of Fountain Valley, La Habra and Santa Ana to explore annexation of the small unincorporated islands located in their respective spheres of influence.

During the second quarter, considerable progress was made toward the potential annexation of the remaining six small islands within the sphere of influence of the City of La Habra. The collaborative efforts between the staffs of LAFCO, the City of La Habra and the County, resulted in the consideration and direction by the La Habra City Council to



conduct a Community Workshop about the annexation process and benefits of joining the City. The workshop, which was held on January 24, provided a forum for the residential and commercial landowners to learn about the annexation process, to ask questions about what changes with an annexation, and to provide feedback. In addition to LAFCO Executive Officer Carolyn Emery and Policy Analyst Luis Tapia, the La Habra City Manager Jim Sadro and the County Chief Executive Officer Frank Kim served




as the panel providing information and answering questions from the audience approximately 200 people. Additionally, City staff from the Police, Public Works and Planning Departments were in attendance and responded to questions from the audience. anticipated that the La Habra City Council will consider formally filing an annexation application in March or April, would potentially result which consideration by the Commission in June.

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES

CALAFCO Awards and Appointments

OC LAFCO received two CALAFCO awards that were announced during the Annual Conference held in October in Santa Barbara. The Outstanding Clerk of the Year award was bestowed on the OC LAFCO Commission Clerk Cheryl Carter-Benjamin. This award recognizes a LAFCO Clerk for exemplary service. Cheryl has performed the duties as the Commission Clerk/Office Manager since March, 2011. This award is a recognition of the professionalism and outstanding public service she provides to the Commission, its staff, and Orange County residents.





Additionally, OC LAFCO, together with the other Southern California LAFCOs, received The Government Leadership Award. This award is presented to a decision-making body which has furthered good government efforts in California. Commissioner Brothers, who is the OC LAFCO representative to the Southern Region of CALAFCO, accepted the award on behalf of the Commission.

Further, at the Annual Conference, Commissioner Cheryl Brothers was re-elected to a seat on the CALAFCO Board and Executive Officer Carolyn Emery, was officially installed as a CALAFCO Deputy Executive Officer and will Chair the planning committee for the 2017 CALAFCO Annual Conference that will take place in San Diego..

Legislative Committee

The CALAFCO Legislative Committee provides LAFCOs the ability to participate in discussions that shape legislation of LAFCO interest. The Legislature reconvened from its winter recess on



January 4, 2017 for the 2017 legislative session. The beginning of the legislative session is off to a steady start as over 400 bills have been introduced.

CALAFCO's Legislative Committee has been working collaboratively with the CALAFCO Board of Directors to plan for the upcoming legislative year. Recognizing the constraints on resources, CALAFCO's Board approved a limited legislative program for the current session. The Board's approach is to concentrate on legislative requirements that, if unfulfilled, could potentially place LAFCOs and CALAFCO at risk, preparing responses to reports by the Legislature that affect LAFCOs or the funding agencies' operations, and assisting LAFCOs throughout the state to meet mandates set by previously passed legislation. Following the Board's direction, CALAFCO has decided to co-sponsor the annual Omnibus Bill in collaboration with the Assembly Local Government Committee to only make technical revisions to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000. Legislation that has been introduced thus far during this session does not pose a direct impact on LAFCOs. However, it is anticipated that legislation impacting LAFCOs will be introduced as the session continues.

OC LAFCO MEETINGS AND OUTREACH EFFORTS

FY 2016-17 BUDGET OVERVIEW

This CQ report includes the second quarterly budget update for fiscal year 2016-17. The following budget review provides the Commission with the second quarter bank account balances and a comprehensive overview of OC LAFCO revenues and expenditures from July 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016 (see page 11). The total budget approved by the Commission for 2016-17 is \$1,121,470.

Revenues

By the end of November, the agency had received all of the apportionments from the funding agencies for a total of \$1,019,425. In addition to the apportionments, LAFCO also earns interest from its investment portfolio. In the second quarter, OC LAFCO earned approximately \$1,724 in interest.

Another source of OC LAFCO revenue is the application filing fees. These filing fees are not used for budgeting purposes, but are shown in the quarterly overview as revenue. Further, the quarterly report includes a year-to-date accounting of application revenues and expenses incurred during the second quarter.

Expenditures

The total expenditures at the end of the second quarter are approximately 40.4 percent or \$452,803 of the total budget of \$1,121,470. The following table provides the comparison of the percentage of actual funds used and the target levels for the current fiscal year.

Two Park Bond Proposals Introduced, AB 18 Hearing Next Week

Two measures propose park bonds for the June 2018 ballot. Voters passed Proposition 40, the last true park bond, 15 years ago and since then parks have suffered through the Great Recession as cities struggled to shore up shrinking budgets. Many parks departments have not recovered and are still weighed down by deferred maintenance. Assembly Member Eduardo Garcia (D-Coachella) and Senate President pro Tempore Kevin de León (D-Los Angeles) proposed new funding for parks to address this need. Although there are differences between the measures, both authors have indicated their willingness to work together. For more, see Page 3.

<u>SB 2 (Atkins)</u> establishes a permanent source of funding. <u>SB 3 (Beall)</u> is a \$3 billon general obligation bond for affordable housing programs and infill infrastructure projects. The League has prepared sample letters on both measures that cities can use to tailor using their local examples.

Cities are eager to help spur the development of new affordable housing units but lack resources. Few sources remain to fund affordable housing in California with redevelopment eliminated and state housing bonds exhausted. Gov. Jerry Brown in his proposed FY 2017-18 budget did not include money for affordable housing. The Senate through these bills is looking to help fill the gap. While funds generated through SB 2 and SB 3 would not make up for the \$1 billion annually generated for affordable housing through redevelopment agencies, these bills do provide the first meaningful source of funding since the state ended redevelopment in 2011.

SB 2

The Building Homes and Jobs Act establishes a permanent source of funding for affordable rental or ownership housing, supportive housing, emergency shelters, transitional housing and other housing needs through a \$75 recordation fee on real estate documents. The fee is estimated to generate hundreds of millions of dollars each year. Similar to Sen. Toni Atkins' (D-San Diego) 2015 bill, AB 1335, SB 2 adds two new uses for the fee-generated funds: local community plan updates and fiscal incentives for local governments to approve new housing for low-income families.

SB 2 allocates 50 percent of the proceeds from the fee to local governments to be used to address housing needs at the local level. It will also help leverage additional federal, local and private investment in affordable housing, including nontraditional funding sources such as tax increment and innovative preventive services.

SB 3

The Affordable Housing Bond Act of 2018 authorizes a \$3 billion general obligation bond to fund existing and highly successful affordable housing programs and infrastructure projects.

Sen. Jim Beall's (D-San Jose) measure is similar to Proposition 1C (2006) and allocates funds to the same programs as the now-exhausted housing bond did, including:

- The Multifamily Housing Program;
- Transit oriented development;
- Infill infrastructure financing;
- · Building Equity and Growth in Neighborhoods (BEGIN);
- · Local Housing Trust matching grant;
- · CalHome; and
- Joe Serna Farmworker Housing.

Bond proceeds will help with housing for the homeless and those at risk of becoming homeless, low-income workers and create homeownership opportunities for California's low- and moderate-income earners.

Next Steps

Neither SB 2 nor SB 3 have been given a hearing date yet, but both will go before the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee in early March. Cities are encouraged to submit support letters on both measures to members of the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee as well as their own legislators.

AB 18

AB 18 (E. Garcia), the California Clean Water, Climate, and Coastal Protection and Outdoor Access For All Act authorizes \$3.005 billion in General Obligation bonds to finance parks, water, climate adaptation, coastal protection and outdoor access programs. This League-supported bill is up for its first hearing next week on Feb. 7 in the Assembly Water, Parks, and Wildlife Committee.

Direct funding for local governments and grants for park-poor neighborhoods are among the funding allocations of interest to cities. AB 18 includes \$425 million for park rehabilitation and improvement grants to cities and counties, which would go out on a per capita basis. Cities are slated to directly receive 60 percent of the \$425 million, with each city receiving a minimum of \$200,000. In addition, it includes \$900 million for safe neighborhood parks in park-poor areas, as well as a range of additional grant programs through which cities may receive awards.

SB 5

SB 5 (de León), the California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018 proposes \$3 billion in General Obligation bonds to be directed to both parks and water projects.

Of the \$3 billion, \$1.5 would be dedicated to parks. Park-poor neighborhoods would be eligible for \$600 million for safe neighborhood parks. Local governments would also receive \$15 million for local park rehabilitation and improvement grants, which would be distributed on a per capita basis. An additional \$15 million would be reserved for grants for cities and parks districts in urbanized counties with populations of fewer than 200,000. The League has met with the Senate President pro Tem's staff and will continue discussions on this proposal.

The additional \$1.5 billion is designated for drinking water and drought preparedness. Priorities include improving drinking water quality, safe and reliable drinking water, improving regional water self-reliance security, water recycling and advanced treatment technology projects, and preventing or cleaning up contaminated groundwater.

This bill has been referred to the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee, as well as the Governance and Finance Committee.

Department of Toxic Substances Control Proposes Stricter Toxicity and Site Cleanup Regulations

League Submits Comments on Need for Site-Specific Flexibility for Environmental Remediation Projects

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) has issued a pre-draft of its proposed regulations to strengthen criteria for acceptable human health risk-based screening levels. DTSC is seeking to codify the authority to apply the strictest of three available criteria to determine the cleanup requirements for hazardous waste sites. The agency wants to have the discretion to ensure that it can apply the strictest environmental standards. However, these regulations may cause significant issues for cities that seek to rehabilitate and develop contaminated sites. The League has <u>submitted comments</u> outlining the concern that the proposed regulations will reduce the flexibility of cities to redevelop brownfield sites.

While DTSC certainly has the responsibility to ensure cleanup standards are sufficiently protective of human health and the environment, these proposed regulations would remove the ability for site-specific considerations. Higher toxicity standards would make an already strict regulatory standard even more difficult to meet and could have serious impacts on cities trying to redevelop brownfield sites. These could lead to increased costs, further delays, decreased property values for the site and surrounding area.

The League's position states that the level of cleanup for a project should be based on the specific proposal. For example, a parking garage project does not need the same level of environmental scrutiny as a residential development site. If standards are too stringent, it could stifle community revitalization efforts and economic development.

DTSC has solicited comments from the public and stakeholders and is now in the process of formally issuing a draft regulation. The League will continue to monitor this issue and provide feedback on proposed regulations.

California City Solutions: Palmdale Partners with Youth Build Students to Develop Community Housing

This story is part of an ongoing series featuring Helen Putnam Award entries. The 2016 entries are available on the League's website as a resource for cities in a searchable database called <u>California City Solutions</u>. Palmdale's Dream Center was submitted in 2016 for the Housing Programs and Innovations award category.

As part of the city of Palmdale's Strategic Plan, the Neighborhood Services Department works with various community partners to help the city's young adult homelessness population. Each year a number of local young adults "age out" of foster care and many become homeless, potential victims of human trafficking or wind up on a path of criminal activity or drug addiction. The city joined forces with Antelope Valley Youth Build to transform a property into housing for up to 16 young adult residents.

In 2007 the city of Palmdale partnered with Antelope Valley Youth Build Charter High School to provide its student body with onsite work experience through real-world community projects. AV Youth Build provides an opportunity for young adults, 16 to 24 years old, to complete their high school education and receive training and certification in a variety of careers such as construction, health care and firefighting. This ongoing partnership has helped create Focus Neighborhood Houses and affordable housing units as part of the city's commitment to revitalize its most economically challenged neighborhoods.

While working with AV Youth Build students, city staff learned about the impact of homelessness on local youth. Participating students explained that their biggest challenges included finding stable housing, education, work opportunities and career development. They shared the reality of having to move out of their homes on their 18th birthday, couch surfing and even sleeping in cars.

Although the city had formed a strong partnership with AV Youth Build to help young adults complete their high school education and develop a career path, staff wanted to expand the partnership to address the homeless population of uninhibited youth in the community. Palmdale

faced some large challenges in finding the right property/building, funding the cost of rehabilitation of the property and keeping the program sustainable.

AV Youth Build and the city's housing division in 2011 acquired an older abandoned senior care facility in the heart of a focus neighborhood. This neighborhood had already been adopted by AV Youth Build as a focus area for its service work and seemed like the right fit for the project. The city needed to develop a functional building that to house emancipated youth who were enrolled in AV Youth Build Charter High School or who were homeless but were on the path to completing or advancing their education.

The project construction began with a neighborhood community event where young adults were asked to participate and write on a large billboard located at the project site and complete a sentence that started with, "My Dream Is ..." in the spirit of Dr. Martin Luther King. By the end of the day the billboard was filled with many dreams, which inspired the project name, "The Dream Center."

The city was able to close escrow on the property just prior to the state's elimination of redevelopment agencies, but only had \$150,000 remaining for its rehabilitation. This was not enough to cover the entire cost of the project. AV Youth Build partnered with a local nonprofit entity that had originally helped sponsor the project and applied for and received Federal HOME funds to help finance the majority of the work and completion of the project.

The AV Youth Build students performed a larger portion of the demolition and rehabilitation, saving an estimated \$250,000 in labor costs. Along with the student body, many other volunteers came out to work on the project, including other Youth Build chapters from outside the area. Local vendors such as Home Depot, Sun Power, and local contractors donated materials, labor and funding to the project. Residents from the community stepped forward and donated furniture, bedding and kitchen items to help furnish the complex.

Bike and Build is one notable group that participated on this project from demolition to final completion. These cyclists ride from Boston to Santa Barbara every summer and participate in the construction of affordable housing projects across the nation. As many as 30 college students riding into Palmdale spent two days working on the project. For each year the cyclists participated in the rehabilitation, AV Youth Build received the "Riders Choice" awards, which included a grant for as much as \$10,000 that could be spent to help fund the completion.

The estimated total budget for project was \$1.2 million. By working with AV Youth Build and the many community and national partners, this project was completed for less than \$750,000. This project also assisted AV Youth Build in meeting specific requirements pertaining to their Department of Labor grant by creating jobs for its student body.

Completed in 2015, the Dream Center and can house up to 16 single young adults and three single moms. The single young adult housing portion of the project provides eight bedrooms with dormitory style accommodations with half bath amenities. Fully segregated bathrooms for the men and women along with a fully equipped laundry room, community family room/study area and kitchen area are available for the residents. The single mom area consists of three single bedrooms with full bathrooms; community living room, kitchen and fully equipped laundry area. A dorm mom area in between the single young adult and young adult moms exists with a single bedroom, living space and private bath.

Along with the housing component, the students constructed a detached 1,200 square foot community room and community garden. The community room serves as a meeting and center for neighborhood residents to participate in various activities and programs. Since its completion, the Dream Center community room has hosted press conferences for the city's Season of Service kick off, cultural and art events hosted by the AV Youth Build student body and other focus neighborhood events. The residents that surround the Dream Center know it as a "third place" in their neighborhood where they can come and be better engaged with their community.

The Dream Center gained the attention of Youth Build National and currently serves as a model to other Youth Build chapters across the nation, providing an example of how local government can partner with an organization comprised mainly of young adults to create affordable housing

and together help address a significant issue in our community that provides a life-changing solution for now and the future.
