The City Garden Grove is pleased to support SB 1, which represents a comprehensive transportation proposal inclusive of sensible reforms, modest increases to existing revenue sources, and robust infrastructure investment. The proposal presents an opportunity for the new legislature to advance a comprehensive framework to address the overwhelming backlog of repair and deferred maintenance as well as other transportation needs in the early part of 2017.

It would be an understatement to say the time to act is now to address the \$73 billion unmet funding need for local streets and roads and \$72 billion backlog to the State's Highway System. For local streets and roads alone, the funding need grows by an additional \$20 billion in just ten years. With the expressed commitment of Legislative Leadership and this Administration to getting this done in the early parts of 2017, we urge this legislature's immediate attention to this proposal as the vehicle to deliver this victory for California.

When fully phased in, SB 1 would generate an additional \$6 billion annually to provide desperately needed funding for the state and local transportation network. To repair and maintain existing transportation infrastructure, the proposal would generate up to \$2.4 billion and \$2.2 billion annually for the state's highway system and local streets and roads, respectively. The bill also provides nearly \$600 million for freight and the state's trade corridors, over a half billion for transit and intercity rail, and up to \$150 million to support active transportation programs throughout the state.

The proposal takes the approach of raising revenue over a variety of sources, such as a 12 cent increase to the gas tax to restore some of its purchasing power phased in over three years, ending the Board of Equalization's "true up" process on the price based excise tax on gas, a \$38 increase to the vehicle registration fee, a \$100 vehicle registration fee on zero emission vehicles, a 20 cent increase to the diesel excise tax, \$300 million from existing cap and trade funds, and returning \$500 million in vehicle weight fees phased in over five years.

In addition to raising revenue, the proposal includes a series of reforms to improve efficiency, transparency, and accountability, such as restoring independence to the California Transportation Commission, creating the Office of the Transportation Inspection General with audit and investigation authority over the state's transportation spending, and establishing local reporting requirements on local transportation spending. To streamline roadwork, the bill permanently extends and expands on the limited

exemptions to California's Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) for repair, maintenance, and minor alteration projects on existing roadways to cities and counties with populations greater than 100,000. The proposal also creates an advanced mitigation program which authorizes the Natural Resources Agency to establish state and regional transportation mitigation plans and mitigation banks to allow transportation projects to fulfill their environmental requirements in advance.

Overall, this proposal provides a comprehensive transportation reform and funding package that picks up where we left off at the end of the special session, while giving this legislature an opportunity for early action. While the legislature has had success in recent years in balancing the state budget, we can no longer afford to ignore our most basic repair and maintenance needs if we wish to avoid systematic failure of the state's entire transportation infrastructure. There may be no better way to put Californians back to work and stimulate our economy than making the roads we and our children rely on everyday safe again.

For these reasons, the City of Garden Grove Supports SB 1 (Beall).

Walkers and bicyclists to rule the day on April 1

On Saturday, April 1, from 3 to a sneak peek into long-term active 6 p.m., a 2.5-mile route, planned for the third annual Open Streets event, will be closed to cars, and open to all forms of non-motorized transportation.

The Open Streets route spans from Garden Grove Boulevard at West Street, to Acacia Parkway and Historic Main Street, A relaxing, fully marked, shared bike route, or neighborhood greenway, will allow bicyclists to connect from West Street to 9th Street by way of College Avenue. Dorada Avenue, and Morgan Lane.

Along with an afternoon of bike riding, other highlights include:

-Garden Grove Boulevard, 8th Street, and Acacia Parkway: Open Streets route, filled with numerous activities, displays, and demonstrations including zip lines, a sports zone, rock wall, skate park, food truck court, the Anaheim Ducks Street Team, wine tasting, and live music:

--West Street: Two-way protected bike lane on the west side of the street (bike lane will be physically separated from vehicle traffic);

-Historic Main Street: After party from 6 to 10 p.m.

Event pop-up projects, co-sponsored by Go Human, will provide

transportation improvements, highlighting concepts from the city's Active Streets Plan (Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan), as well as projects already planned for construction. Projects, such as the new buffered bike lanes. on West Street, funded by a grant from OCTA, will be completed by June 2019.

Bicycle and Pedicab rental stations will also be available.


The catalyst for the Open Streets event is the City's Re:Imagine Garden Grove campaign.

The idea behind Re:Imagine Garden Grove is to create unique spaces for people to personally identify and connect with." says Community and Economic Development Director Lisa Kim. "The Open Streets event encourages the community to experience Garden Grove streets in a different and fun way."

For the safety of bicyclists and pedestrians, several streets will be completely, or partially, closed to traffic on April 1:

 Garden Grove Boulevard (approximately noon to 7 p.m.): westbound closed between West and 7th Streets;

 8th Street (approximately noon to 7 p.m.); closed between Garden Grove Boulevard and





The committee meets three times each year with an additional two site visits per year. Both bond measures will be reviewed concurrently during the set meetings. All meetings will be open to the public. Membership is voluntary and without compensation. Employees, vendors, contractors, consultants and district officials are ineligible for appointment to the committee.

New committee members will be appointed to two-year terms, starting May 9 and ending May 8, 2019.

The committee will provide transparency and maintain public confidence in the use of Measure A and Measure P bond proceeds. California state law requires that a BOC be appointed by the Board of Education to monitor bond expenditures and ensure no bond revenues are appropriated for teacher or administrator salaries, or general district operating expenses.

Storm hits hard

More than 20 trees were felled and several areas flooded in Garden Grove during a heavy rainstorm last Friday.

The city activated an emergency operation at 4 p.m. Led by the fire chief, the city's department heads coordinated police, fire and public works officials to help shut down deluged streets distribute sandbags, clear channels of debris and remove trees from streets.

By 4:30 p.m., more than a dozen trees had been removed from Dover Shores and other areas in the city.

Rich Gosselin, supervisor for Garden Grove's tree-removal and flood-control teams, said that during a major storm, workers sometimes spend 18 hours on the clock.

The Garden Grove Elks Lodge No. 1952, 11551 Trask Ave., in Garden Grove, elected its firstever woman Exalted Ruler in April 2016.

Exalted Ruler Karen Lewin is finishing up her one-year term.

As chief executive officer of the lodge, an exalted ruler is responsible for the performance of lodge programs and making sure the lodge reaches its goals.

"My goal is to keep the lodge going by getting new and younger members and to get our Elks more community exposure," said Lewin.

Lewin said that in order to fund Elks projects, Elks need to bring in new members and said they're pretty excited that one recent new member is only 22 years old. "Members dues allow us to run the club and work on charitable projects," she said.

"Elks is a very social group where people get to meet a lot of other people and we are a very patriotic organization."

In California and Hawaii, Elks have speech therapists and eye screening for pre-school chil-

"Every Elk can find something they are passionate about and get involved in that program, or even start a new program that they are passionate about," said Lewin.

Elks has four core values: charity, brotherly love, justice and fidelity.

When an Elk member passes away, the lodge provides a memorial for that person and those in good standing and the Emblem ladies do food for that member's family on that day.

"You get out of anything what you put into it," Lewin said. "We pride ourselves on being a charitable organization in the community and having a hands-on approach, such as delivering Christmas food baskets and toys at Christmas time for less fortunate families, This includes one bike to a boy and a girl."

As part of the Garden Grove Elks charity, Lewin said they allow the Down Syndrome Association of Orange County to use their large park for a picnic and Halloween Trunk or Treat, free of cost.

said Lewin.

Tuesday Bingo nights make money to fund charitable causes.

"We budget \$10,000 for charities within Garden Grove," Lewin said. "We get requests from organizations and schools within the city."

Lewin said everyone in Elks is a volunteer.

"No one is paid for their services."

Elks, like all groups and organizations, have changed as society has evolved and changed to include a wider variety of people. In the 1990s, women began to be allowed to join Elks. Formerly, men were Elks and there was the Emblem Auxiliary for women. There is still the Emblem Club but now, both men and women can join Emblems and Elks.

How and why did Lewin become an Elk?

"My girlfriend and I joined a singles club after my husband passed away; it was Friday and Saturday night dancing that brought us to the Elks Lodge," she said. "I joined the Elks in 2006, starting with being a chairman. They needed a Lecturing Knight in 2012 so I became that and have gone through different chairs since then. When I got into it, it took my heart and this is my service to the lodge and community."

After Lewin completes her year as an Exalted Ruler, she plans to become a "Grants" chair.

One of many yearly Elks projects is the Purple Pig program, where people deposit money in the purple pigs (piggy banks) as part of a project to help the state fund occupational therapists for severely disabled veterans.

The Garden Grove Lodge started out holding meetings in a school in Garden Grove until members found their current location, which used to include a baseball field in the 1950s and 60s

Lewin is an Air Force veteran and says her lodge has more than

200 other veterans. "I served in the Air Force during the Vietnam War; training as a postal clerk, where I key-punched cards on early computers," she said.

Each exalted ruler has the opportunity to design his or her own pin, plus a motto. Lewin's is, "Experience timeless Wonders of Elkdom," and features the "11 O'Clock Toast" to those who have passed.

The Elk antlers are for protection, the flag is for charity, scales are for justice, the star is for fidelity and the strawberry in the center is for, of course, the annual Garden Grove Strawberry Festival held each May.

Something new this yea, is the Elks Talent Show. Dress rehearsal, auditions and tryouts are set for Saturday, Feb. 25, from 5 to 7 p.m.

"We're looking for all types of talent and the performance is Sunday, March 12, from 2 to 6 p.m. It's a Family Fun Night; please join us."


Robbery suspects nabbed

Assemblywoman Quirk-Silva (D-Orange County), who represents Garden Grove and Stanton, has introduced Assembly Bill 363, which will waive the processing fee for homeless and low-income veterans who apply for a veteran designation on their California Driver's licenses and identification cards.

Current law requires the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to offer a driver's license or identification card printed with the word "veteran" on it, indicating that the possessor is a military veteran. However, all veterans are currently charged a processing fee for this service, a cost that homeless veterans may not be able to afford. Assembly Bill 363 will waive the fee for low-income, homeless veterans that do not have the extra resources readily available to pay for the veteran designation.

"Identification with a 'Veteran' designation will allow veterans to quickly and easily identify their status, without dealing with the

GARDEN GROVE, California (NV) – Nghị quyết "Garden Grove, thành phố Hài và An Toàn" ghi trong phần 9a của nghị trình, minh định thành phố Garden Grov một thành phố cổ võ sự hài hòa và an toàn, được thông qua với tỷ số 4-3 vào tố Ba, 24 Tháng Giêng, trong buổi họp thường lệ của hội đồng thành phố, với đông cư dân tham dự.

Nhiều cư dân đòi thông qua nghị quyết mục 9a và các nghị viên bàn thảo trong hai giờ đồng hồ.

"Chúng tôi không bao giờ hỏi bất cứ điều gì về tình trạng di trú, vì di trú không l được chúng tôi đặt thành vấn đề. Chúng tôi chỉ hỏi căn cước mà thôi!" vị cảnh sa trưởng giải thích.



Rony Berdugo, who testified in support on behalf of the League of California Cities, stressed to the committee that "we used to take pride in our infrastructure, but now our California roads consistently rank as some of the worst in the nation, costing drivers and consumers more than \$760 in annual repairs." Californians cannot afford to wait any longer for the passage of a meaningful transportation funding package. The system that California residents, businesses and visitors rely on is crumbling. It comes down to pave now or pay more later.

Sen. Beall reminded committee members that it is crucial that California steps away from the cliff of crumbling road conditions. State and local roads have a maintenance backlog of \$130 billion and California motorists are spending more than \$700 annually on car repairs due to pothole-filled roads. This backlog is divided between \$59 billion for state highways and \$73 billion for local streets, roads, and bridges. Without additional funding, this shortfall is projected to grow by \$20 billion in the next decade.

SB 1 now goes to the Senate Environmental Quality Committee where it will be heard on Tuesday, Feb. 22 at 9:30 a.m. Each committee hearing moves the Legislature closer to meeting Gov. Jerry Brown's April 6 deadline to pass comprehensive transportation package.

The panel will talk about how city staff went with this approach after learning that a partial cloverleaf configuration would exceed their available construction funding. Working with Caltrans, the city gained approval for the new interchange type that not only fits the budget, but allowed Manteca to develop a project that provides capacity and safety for all travel modes.

California City Solutions: American Canyon Partners with The Coca-Cola Company on Water Replenishment and Conservation Goal

This story is part of an ongoing series featuring Helen Putnam Award entries. The 2016 entries are available on the League's website as a resource for cities in a searchable database called <u>California City Solutions</u>. American Canyon's Pipe Bursting Project was submitted in 2016 for the Public Works, Infrastructure, and Transportation award category.

The city of American Canyon focuses on innovative solutions to manage its public works infrastructure while ensuring sustainability for future generations. Since 2007, the city has maintained a Zero Water Footprint (ZWF) policy to help achieve water conservation goals. Two events in 2015 prompted the city to create a partnership to complete its pipe bursting project. The Coca-Cola Company, the city's largest customer, had a contract up for renewal and Gov. Jerry Brown declared a State of Emergency (Executive Order B2915) related to the ongoing statewide drought. The partnership created between American Canyon's Public Works Department and Coca-Cola resulted in a renewed service agreement that provides the city with financial stability for years to come. In conjunction with the new agreement, the parties completed a "community water partnership project." The project included replacing the 7,000 feet of existing pipeline that had begun severely leaking in numerous locations (totaling upwards of 200 gallons per minute).

American Canyon's ZWF policy requires that any new or additional demands to the city's water system — whether residential, business, commercial or agricultural — offset their planned water usage on a 1:1 basis. The policy also includes addressing existing, deficient infrastructure (including leaking waterlines) that has surpassed its useful life.

The Coca-Cola Company has operated a 350,000 square foot facility in American Canyon since 1994. Its contract with the city came up for renewal for the first time in 2015. The American Canyon facility employs more than 500 people and produces more than 100,000,000 gallons of non-carbonated beverages each year (approximately 288 acre-feet in 2015).

Facing consecutive years of drought, American Canyon implemented numerous strategies to conserve water. Shortly after the Governor declared a drought emergency in April 2015, the American Canyon City Council adopted Emergency Regulations by the State Water Resources Control Board and local water use restrictions. At the outset of the agreement renewal process in spring 2015, city staff explained both the ZWF policy and the forthcoming local water use restrictions Coca-Cola representatives. Although renewal of the agreement was not subject to the ZWF policy (because no increase in demands were sought) the company expressed interest in helping the city improve the sustainability of its water supply, which is consistent with the company's corporate <u>water replenishment goal</u> to replenish supplies used at their facilities worldwide on a 1:1 basis by the year 2020.

American Canyon employs prudent water use restrictions, tiered water consumption rates and has expanded its recycled water infrastructure (to replace nonessential potable water uses wherever possible). The city also intensified its leak detection and repair program, and was facing the most ambitious and challenging project replacement of 7,000 feet of 14-inch steel transmission pipeline to stop major water leakage.

The project between American Canyon and Coca-Cola faced a number of challenges:

- · Funding was needed to complete the project;
- Planning logistics was important in order to insure drivers' safety;
- Scheduling and timelines were vital to completing the project efficiently; and
- Obtaining approvals from Caltrans and various resource agencies to ensure that construction could begin in late fall 2015.

The pipeline was located within the cavity of the old pipeline that serves both the facility and the city as a whole. The city had never previously used the "pipe bursting" method to repair leaking waterlines but decided to employ it to guickly and efficiently eliminate the leaks with minimal

impact to existing customers, motorists (on the adjacent roadway) and the environment. Pipe bursting is a state-of-the-art, trenchless construction method to replace pipelines. The process works by fracturing the old pipe from the inside while simultaneously pulling a new pipe inside the cavity that has been created. The city oversaw construction which started in late September 2015.

The city maintains an ongoing, open dialogue with its large customers, including Coca-Cola, about its water supply situation. The business community is engaged through biweekly city manager updates and lunchtime workshops held jointly with the Chamber of Commerce on a quarterly basis. This regular community engagement was critical to disseminating accurate information during the drought emergency. It also built trust and faith amongst these business leaders that city officials are proactively addressing the city's water supply situation and as a result, building a unique public-private partnership with Coca-Cola which provided financial resources to help the city replenish its water supply.

The city also obtained permits from Caltrans and the Army Corps of Engineers to complete the project. These permits often take months (or years) to obtain approval; however, due to the statewide drought emergency the city was able to fast track the permitting process. This was accomplished by engaging the agencies early in the planning process (June 2015) and working collaboratively with their representatives to identify a streamlined permitting process that would allow for construction to begin in October 2015. The city explained to the agencies that the most appropriate best practices would be utilized in order to mitigate any potential concerns, including hiring a biologist to monitor the site for potential biological resources throughout the duration of construction. In addition, the city placed advanced construction area warning signs and provided continuous onsite inspection and monitoring of traffic conditions. The financing allowed American Canyon to reserve its Water Fund reserves, ensuring that the city's General Fund does not need to subsidize the project.

Work was completed in mid-January 2016. On Feb. 2, 2016, the city approved the renewal agreement with Coca-Cola and Coca-Cola committed to fund 100 percent of the project at a cost of \$1,500,000.

The project resulted in a reduction of 200 to 300 acre-feet of water pumped by the State Water Project from the Delta to American Canyon with multifaceted environmental benefits. For example, the reduction in pumping will translate into an energy saving of approximately 60,000 kWh each year, thereby reducing greenhouse gas emissions associated with energy production. It also aligns with the conservation goals outlined in California's State Wildlife Action Plan to improve conservation and restoration of habitat for 22 endangered species, including the Salt Harvest Mouse and Delta Smelt by reducing water exports from the Delta. Allowing this water to remain in the Delta (instead being pumped to American Canyon, only to be lost as leak) maximizes the effort to protect and restore critical habitat.

American Canyon has successfully improved its public works infrastructure and water delivery by adapting a sustainable procedure to address a longstanding issue.
