
The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Imported Water Sales for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply OCWD Groundwater was the main supply in February.
- OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years
 Water usage in February 2018 was above average compared to the last 5 years. Higher usage was due to little precipitation and above normal temperatures for the month of February. We are seeing an increase in overall water usage compared to the previous Fiscal Year. In June 2016, all water conservation became voluntary for MWDOC agencies and the Great California Drought was declared over by the Governor in April 2017.
- Historical OC Water Consumption OC water consumption is projected to be 547,000 AF in FY 2017-18 (this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 28,000 AF more than FY 2016-17 and is about 56,000 AF more than FY 2015-16 (During the SWRCB mandatory water restrictions). Water usage per person is projected to be slightly higher than in FY 2017-18 for Orange County at 152 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts

<u>Water Supply Information</u> Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.

 Orange County's accumulated rainfall through early April was well below average for this period. Water year to date rainfall in Orange County is 3.62 inches which is 31% of normal.


- Northern California accumulated precipitation through early April was around 81% of normal for this period. Water Year 2017 was the wettest water year on record. The Northern California snowpack was 43% of normal as of April 1st. The State of California was in a declared Drought Emergency that started January 2014 and just recently ended in April of 2017. As of late March, 40.8% of California is experiencing moderate or severe drought conditions while 77.0% of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation was remains at 20% as of late March.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through early April was 69% average for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 71% of normal as of April 3. The Colorado River Basin saw above average conditions in WY 2017 but the region has been still trying to rebound from the previous long term drought. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 69% of their average storage volume for this time of year and are at 47.1% of their total capacity. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. As of late March, Lake Mead levels were 12.2' above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the end of 2018 will not hit the "trigger" level.





- 1. "Firm" includes Full Service (both Treated and Untreated) and Barrier water.
- 2. Basin Pumping Percentage (BPP) is the percentage of a retail water agency's total water demand that they are limited to pump from the OCWD-managed groundwater basin. BPP pertains to Basin agencies only. For example, if a Basin agency's total demand is 10,000 AF/yr and OCWD sets the BPP at 72%, then the agency is limited to 7,200 AF of groundwater that year. There may be certain exceptions and/or adjustments to that simple calculation. OCWD sets the BPP for the Basin agencies, usually as of July 1st.




Accumulated Precipitation

for the Oct.-Sep. water year, through early April 2018










Day camp

Fire in apartment-complex garages displaces 10 in Garden Grove

GARDEN GROVE – Ten residents were displaced from their homes after a fire spread through four attached garages in an apartment complex Monday night, April 16.

The residents at 13141 Casa Linda Lane were able to evacuate before firefighters arrived, said Capt. Thanh Nguyen of the Garden Grove Fire Department.

It took firefighters 20 minutes to extinguish the blaze reported just after 10:30 p.m.

No injuries were reported.

Two cars were damaged and there was also smoke damage to apartment units above the garages on a second floor, Nguyen said. A city inspector determined that the units could not be lived in for now.

Investigators are still trying to determine what started the blaze, which caused \$115,000 in damage to the building and its contents. The American Red Cross was on scene to help the displaced residents.

A fire at an apartment complex Monday night in Garden Grove displaced 10 people and caused an estimated \$115,000 in damage.

According to Capt. Thanh Nguyen, spokesman for the Garden Grove Fire Department, the fire in the 13000 block of Casa Linda Lane was reported at 10:37 p.m. Arriving firefighters found garages on fire below second story apartments.

They were able to confine the blaze to four garages, with smoke damage to one upstairs unit.

All residents had been evacuated before the fire department arrival and there were no reports of injuries. It took firefighters 20 minutes to knock down the fire.

Two vehicles parked in the garages were damaged and surrounding units were examined to see if they are habitable.

The cause of the fire is unknown. Damage to the building was estimated at \$50,000 to the structure and \$65,000 to contents.

Garden Grove Unified to open a second Spanish dual-language program in 2018-19

The Garden Grove Unified School District is gearing up for the launch of its second Spanish duallanguage program.

Coming out of summer break, <u>Russell Elementary School</u> at 600 S. Jackson St. in Santa Ana will reopen as the Russell Elementary Language Academy, presenting academic content in science, social studies, literacy and math in both English and Spanish.

Students in transitional kindergarten and kindergarten will be the first to participate in the biliteracy program, which will add a new grade level each year.

"We are so proud to open our district's second Spanish Dual Language Academy to give students at Russell Elementary School the advantage of becoming biliterate and bilingual at a young age," Garden Grove school board President Bob Harden said in a statement. "Our district is committed to expanding our language programs to help prepare students for a global society."

In Orange County, 14 districts and 35 schools have built language immersion programs, as have two charter schools. And those numbers are likely to increase. Proponents say biliteracy education boosts self-esteem and motivation while also preparing students for the global job market.

Citing a growing demand, Garden Grove Unified <u>opened its first Spanish Dual Language Immersion</u>

<u>Academy</u> in 2016, brining two-way instruction to Monroe Elementary School. That program now serves more than 275 students from transitional kindergarten through the second grade.

The following year, in 2017, the district <u>added a Vietnamese language program at Murdy Elementary School</u>, making Murdy the second Orange County campus to split instruction between English and Vietnamese.

"Our Spanish Dual Language Academy at Monroe has had a waiting list since it opened," said Teri Rocco, GGUSD Board of Education trustee, "and parents sing praises about the school and the education it provides to students. It is so exciting that we can now offer that same dual-language opportunity to students at Russell."

Along with the coming biliteracy program, Russell Elementary offers free after-school tutoring, a Boys & Girls Club, a college mentor program, the Latinos Unidos student leadership club and an AVID college readiness program.



Planners mull revived Village Center

THE VILLAGE CENTER at Beach and Garden Grove Boulevards in Stanton and Garden Grove is proposed for a facelift at the April 19 meeting of the Planning Commission (Frontier Real Estate).

The Village Center, a retail mall along Beach Boulevard that straddles the Stanton and Garden Grove city limits, may soon be awakening from a decade of slumber.

On Thursday (April 19) the Garden Grove Planning Commission will consider a proposal to revive the nearly vacant site as a mixed-use project with housing in the northern portion and retail and commercial uses in the south. The Village Center, which dates back to 1980, has 4.1 acres on the Garden Grove side (north of Garden Grove Boulevard, on the west of Beach Boulevard) out of the total of 21.87 acres.

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/gg-logo_lg-e1446082015536.jpg)Under the proposal for the entire site, the northern 11.89-acre portion (all within Stanton) will be devoted to residential development. The remaining part – 10.18 acres – will include 6.08 acres on the Stanton side.

Changes planned for the center include renovation of facades and interiors of the remaining retail and commercial spaces and the addition of two new pad buildings.

The Stanton Planning Commission has already approved the site plan, variance and tentative parcel map.



At its peak, the center hosted an Edwards movie complex, a Ralphs supermarket and a Sav-On drug store as well as Red Robin, Acapulco, Sizzler, Mimi's and Wendy's restaurants.

Also on Thursday night, planners will take up:

- a request for a conditional use permit to allow a new liquor license, live entertainment and more at the Pho Hoa An Restaurant, 14291 Euclid St. (at Forbes Avenue);
- the installation of 25 small wireless communications devices disguised as streetlights at various locations in the city. The existing streetlights would be replaced by the new street light-wireless combination. Verizon is making the request.

GARDEN GROVE TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK INITIATIVE

On Saturday, April 28, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., the Garden Grove

Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will participate
in the National Prescription Drug Take Back Initiative, giving the public its 15th
opportunity in eight years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of
potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring
your pills for disposal to the Garden Grove Police Department located at 11301

Acacia Pkwy, Garden Grove CA 92842. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or
needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no
questions asked.

Last fall, Americans turned in 456 tons (over 912,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at almost 5,300 sites operated by the DEA and more than 4,300 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 14 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in over 9 million pounds—about 4,500 tons—of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue.

Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion,

misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly

high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs.

Garden Grove Participates in National Prescription Drug Take Back Initiative 2-2-2

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows that, year after year, the majority of misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else's medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

Broad Coalition Forms to Oppose Dangerous Big Soda and Corporate Special Interest-Backed Ballot Initiative to Decimate Local Services from Fire to Parks to Roads

League Joints with SEIU California, AFSCME CA, California Professional Firefighters and PORAC to Lead Charge to Defeat Measure

April 18, 2018

The Committee to Protect Our Communities formed on April 18 to oppose the "Tax Fairness, Transparency and Accountability Act," a misleading named and dangerous initiative sponsored by the American Beverage Association (ABA) and the California Business Roundtable.

Proponents are currently gathering signatures to qualify the measure for the November 2018 ballot. The coalition opposing this measure comprises local governments, working families, labor groups, concerned individuals and business groups.

"Libraries, parks, medical emergency response, garbage and sewer, police, fire, streets and roads. These are the essential services that would be devastated by this proposed measure that puts corporate interests over the needs of local communities and our residents. Interfering with our cities' ability to raise revenues to pay for local services is a far overreach that will hurt California's quality of life for generations to come," said Carolyn Coleman, chair of the Committee to Protect our Communities and League executive director.

To date, the American Beverage Association has put <u>\$4.1 million dollars</u> into the committee in support of the initiative — well over 80 percent of the money raised so far by the proponents.

The ABA is accustomed to dropping big dollars to defeat local measures that would place a tax on sugary beverages. The ABA spent over \$25 million in 2016 alone, fighting local California soda tax measures that were designed to offset costs for local health care, help fight childhood obesity and diabetes, and fund other critical local services.

Joining the opposition coalition are a number of widely respected organizations, including the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, California (AFSCME), the California Professional Firefighters (CPF), and the Peace Officers Research Association of California (PORAC).

The "Tax Fairness, Transparency and Accountability Act" would drastically limit local revenue authority. In part, it eliminates local authority to impose a tax for general purposes by majority vote and instead requires all local proposed tax increases subject to a two-thirds vote. This proposal also requires two-

thirds approval of all members of the local legislative body before a tax can be placed on the ballot. It also requires that a tax contained in a regulation adopted by a state agency must be approved by two-third vote of the Legislature. For cities and other local agencies, it applies retroactively and may void some local measures approved by local voters on or after Jan. 1, 2018.

Proponents have until June 28 to qualify their initiative for the ballot.

May 1 Deadline Approaching to Submit SB 1 Project Lists to CTC for Upcoming Fiscal Year

April 19, 2018

Annually cities and counties must adopt, via resolution, a list of projects they intend to fund through SB 1 in order to be eligible for funding in the upcoming fiscal year.

Cities and counties can no longer adopt project lists through their budgets. Project lists can only be adopted by passing a resolution.

Cities must upload adopted project lists to the CTC via the <u>new online tool</u>. May 1 is the deadline to submit project lists for the upcoming fiscal year that begins on July 1.

CTC released a companion SB 1 <u>Program Intake Tool Guide</u> to help explain the uploading process. The League, the California State Association of Counties, and the CTC hosted a joint webinar walking through the project list upload process. A recording of this webinar can be found <u>here</u>.
