Dear Assembly Member Wood,

The City of Garden Grove would like to express its support for Assembly Bill 572 (Quirk-Silva), a measure that would create a voluntary pilot program for the County of Orange to fund and house a Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) Complaint Analyst within the County. This bill will increase the oversight of noncompliant drug and alcohol residences, which will ultimately result in better quality care for patients. At a time when California cities are struggling with an overwhelming number of unmonitored sober living facilities, this bill will create an important regulatory tool and a welcome resource for cities.

In recent years, Orange County has seen a massive increase in sober living homes and facilities. Facilities must be licensed through the DHCS when at least one of the following services is provided: detoxification, group sessions, individual sessions, educational sessions, or alcoholism or drug abuse recovery or treatment planning. Sober living homes are considered single family homes and are treated as such, as long as they maintain a group living situation of six people or under and do not offer any treatment to patients through any of the listed methodologies. Overall, California has nearly 2,000 licensed facilities and countless unlicensed homes – an alarming 15% of which are saturated in Orange County.

Currently, DHCS is the only entity that has the authority to enforce sober living facility regulations and inspect noncompliant homes in response to a complaint. Therefore, when issues arise, a city's only recourse is often to file a complaint with DHCS. According to DHCS, there are only 16 Investigative Complaint Analysts handling the entirety of the State's noncompliant sober living home and facility investigations — all of whom are located in Sacramento. This has caused a backlog in complaint processes, investigation response, and general monitoring. AB 572 would work to alleviate the backlog and increase local control by creating a voluntary pilot program for Orange County to fund and house a DHCS Complaint Analyst within the County. This would provide cities with a much-needed, local resource for handling noncompliant treatment facilities.

## 800 MHz CCCS Financial Update

By John Pietig, Chair 800 MHz CCCS Governance Committee

On behalf of the Governance Committee responsible for oversight of your investment and participation in this service, I wanted to update you regarding the financial close-out of FY 2015/16 and the cost-sharing allocations for FY 2017/18. These matters were addressed by the 800 MHz Countywide Coordinated Communications System (CCCS) Governance Committee at its meeting on March 2, 2017. As you are aware, all Orange County municipalities, the County of Orange, the Orange County Fire Authority and other Participating Agencies, jointly govern and finance the 800 MHz CCCS. This partnership is now over 20 years old, supporting one of the nation's largest, fully interoperable communications networks for law enforcement, fire services, lifeguard, public works, and numerous other local government and public service agencies.

FY 2015/16 Financial Close-Out - The Governance Committee reviewed the actual expenditures and budget for FY 2015/16 and there was a savings of \$276,428. The reconciliation was approved by the Committee and, as was the case last year, the Committee allocated the savings to the Sustainability Fund.

FY 2017/18 Backbone Cost-Sharing Allocation - The most recent radio count inventory combined with updated cost history, salary, employee benefit, and services and supplies calculations were used to calculate the backbone cost-sharing allocations for FY 2017/18. These FY 2017/18 allocations were then approved by the Governance Committee. The budget is 3.26% higher than FY 2016/17. This is primarily due to: an increase in Motorola professional services and increased software costs; a negotiated increase in salary rates approved by the County of Orange Board of Supervisors; and the adjustment in assignment of duties resulting in an increase of staff time and costs to the program. As the Governance Committee deliberated the budget and backbone cost-sharing obligations for the coming fiscal year, our focus was to ensure that the appropriate resources are provided to operate and maintain the system while minimizing the cost to the partners.

I would also like to note that Robert Stoffel, Director of OCSD/Communications & Technology Division, retired in March of last year and Dave Fontneau took over in June. If you have any questions please contact Director Dave Fontneau at (714) 704-7919. I am honored to have the opportunity to serve as the Chair of this committee and I look forward to working with everyone during this continued exciting time for our radio system. The event was held in conjunction with National Telecommunicators Week where all across America, we celebrate telecommunicators who coordinate communications with law enforcement, fire and emergency medical services, lifeguard and marine safety ... and other first responders ... 24-hours a day, 7-days a week, 365-days a year. The banquet is one way to say "Thank you" to all dedicated call takers, dispatchers, trainers, supervisors, and managers that provide for public and first responder safety. This was the 30th consecutive year that CPRA has honored dispatchers, and the 29th banquet (the first year award was simply presented at the monthly CPRA meeting).

We are happy to report that three Orange County agencies received awards at the ceremony:

- Anaheim Police dispatcher Catherine Cowhey received the runner up award in the outstanding performance by an individual category for the way she handled a kidnapping and domestic violence call that spanned three jurisdictions.
- Newport Beach Police dispatcher Anne Donnelly received the runner up award in the telecommunicator of the year category recognizing her 35 years of service and dedication to the profession.
- Orange County Sheriff dispatchers Jena Nalee and Wendy Vanover received the Honorable Mention award in the category of outstanding performance by a team for the way they handled a 9-1-1 call from a distraught female reporting her suicidal husband who opened fire on deputies upon arrival.

Other awards were presented to Cal Fire San Bernardino, CONFIRE, Glendale Police, Huntington Park Police, Los Angeles County Fire, Los Angeles Police, Murrieta Police & Fire, Ontario Fire, Riverside County Sheriff, San Bernardino County Sheriff, San Bernardino National Forest Federal Inter-Agency Communications center, San Fernando Police, and Simi Valley Police.







## JOHN WAYNE AIRPORT PERSONNEL AND MUTUAL-AID PARTNERS CONDUCT SUCCESSFUL MASS-CASUALTY INCIDENT EXERCISE

On April 14, John Wayne Airport (JWA) conducted a full-scale, mass-casualty exercise involving more than 500 volunteers, observers, support staff and emergency responders. Staged on the west side of the airfield, the drill allowed Airport officials and emergency responders to test and practice operational capabilities in response to a simulated aircraft accident involving a 90-passenger, commercial service airplane and a four-seat helicopter. The exercise was coordinated on the 800 MHz CCCS Tan 3 and Tan 6 talkgroups, enabling every Orange County discipline involved to communicate seamlessly with each other.

"While it is our hope that we never experience any of the emergencies we train for, we are committed to providing the very best response to our passengers, tenants and our community," said Airport Director Barry A. Rondinella. "Exercises like this are a key component of emergency response planning and preparedness. We are proud to work in concert with our partner agencies to ensure the Airport is ready in the event of an emergency."

The airplane fuselage and helicopter were positioned on the airfield for purposes of staging "victim" passengers for the drill.

During the drill, Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA) arrived on the scene and extinguished a virtual fire associated with the crash. Emergency responders then evacuated and triaged volunteer "victims" who were taken to a simulated hospital by ambulance or helicopter, or to an on-site Passenger Reception Area. Volunteers, evaluators and observers in these locations were briefed by the airline, Airport staff, American Red Cross, Orange



County Health Care Agency and other mutual aid responders on hospital operations and the support and assistance provided to passengers, crew and family/friends.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) requires that commercial service airports conduct a full-scale, mass-casualty exercise every three years to maintain Title 14, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 139 Airport Certification. In intervening years, JWA conducts tabletop exercises to review emergency response plans with its mutual-aid partners in a classroom setting.

In addition to John Wayne Airport, the following agencies participated in the drill:

Orange County Sheriff's Department, Airport Police Services were first on scene with 30 Deputies and Sheriff's Special Officers, nine Sheriff vehicles and one helicopter, providing law enforcement support. Alaska Airlines represented the airline involved in the incident and simulated their response to volunteer passengers, families and friends.

More than 40 ambulances, coordinated by Care Ambulance, responded and transported victims to a simulated hospital, as well as the Orange County Fire Authority, Orange County Sheriff's Department and Mercy Air with airlift operations.

Representatives from Long Beach Fire, Newport Beach Fire, Costa Mesa Fire, Huntington Beach Fire, City of Orange Fire and Garden Grove Fire took part as evaluators and participants, enabling them to provide informed, unbiased feedback.


George Shearer of Garden Grove is the master-mind of the annual event for Cub Scouts, all Wolves, Bears and Webelos.

Shearer was the Cub master for Garden Grove Pack No. 548 from 2003 to 2014 and now is the ad hoc Pinewood Derby go-to-person.



the money, we were able to purchase the \$500 aluminum race track we use, that's 32-feet long," he said.

Some big name suppliers who helped the Garden Grove Derby look top-notch professional include Federal Mogul Performance & Racing Parts, Goodyear tires, Nascar (National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing), Wagner Brake Components, Valvoline Oil and several smaller speed-shop suppliers.

No detail was overlooked by Shearer.

The track has an electronic finish-line controlled by a computer, so there's no guessing as to who wins each heat. Each Cub Scout gets to race his hand-made car three times, once on each of the three tracks on the raceway, then points are tallied to find the top three winners overall, with a final race to determine the one top winner and then trophies are awarded. "

Twenty-one Cub Scouts partici-

pated.

"I set the track up the same way each year and hang flags from the ceiling the same way also, for consistency," Shearer said. "And I like to keep the sign-in table in the same corner to keep it organized and to move the Scouts in and out of check-in quickly."

Shearer said the Pinewood Derby is yet another activity for Scouts that provides help with the development of boys.

"They learn good sportsmanship and it's a hands-on-building project with a family member, generally their father," he said. "The boys sand the wood and paint and decorate the car, which encompasses so much in the way of a hands-on activity."

Shearer said there are many different Cub Scout packs involved throughout the area and that he wanted to make sure the derby was a fun event for the whole family. That support was evident as not only parents, but grandparents and friends showed up to cheer the boys on.

### Educator honored

The First Time Homebuyer program assists low-income applicants purchasing their first home. In order to qualify for the program, an applicant cannot have owned a home in the past three years and must: purchase a manufactured home in Garden Grove; occupy the manufactured home throughout the life of the loan; attend a Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) approved Homebuyer Education Program; occupy the manufactured home throughout the life of the loan; and meet the program income requirements. The home purchase price cannot exceed \$120,000.

The city is also offering six free eight-hour, HUD approved, homebuyer workshops for anyone interested in the First Time Homebuyer program. Workshops will be held at the city's Courtyard Center, 12732 Main St., from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the following dates in 2017: July 29 and Sept. 9. You can register for the workshops at www.homeingardengrove.org.

The Home Improvement program assists low-income applicants to rehabilitate their manufactured homes. In order to qualify for the program, the home must be a manufactured home in Garden Grove. The applicant must occupy the manufactured home throughout the life of the loan, and meet current income requirements. All repair/rehabilitation work must meet Garden Grove Municipal Code and Uniform Building Code standards.



## Is change afoot in Little Saigon? Buzz is in the air

## Developer floats plan to modernize while paying homage to history

Keep an eye on Little Saigon. And remember this name: Bolsa

Earlier this year, a developer submitted a document to the City of Westminster, titled "The Bolsa Row Specific Plan."

The plan: A mixed-use designation for 6 acres on the southeast corner of Bolsa Avenue and Brookhurst Street, with a 150-room hotel and a 250-unit apartment complex, with retail space on the ground floor of both the hotel and apartment complex.

The plan also calls for a socalled Festival Row bisecting the development, a pedestrian-friendly strip that could host Southeast Asian summer market nights and similar events.

The architectural style would resemble colonial-era Vietnam, meaning Vietnam before the Vietnam War and the Fall of Saigon, and before the French recognition

The developer, Bac Pham, grew up in Garden Grove and owns the Hotel Ramada there. He envisions Bolsa Row as historic and contemporary all at once. In other words, it would pay homage to the history of Vietnam but also appeal to young Vietnamese-Americans. He's seeking broad arcades, storefront windows and sidewalk seating that will create street scenes reminiscent of those in the heart of Old Saigon.

It's an eye-opening proposition. Little Saigon is the unofficial capital of Vietnamese-Americans in the United States. It was built, in large part, by those who had fled their homeland after the capital city of South Vietnam fell to the

Communist government and its military to the north. It is very traditional, busy with jewelry stores, Pho restaurants, liquor stores and dry cleaning outlets. There are more than 50 Vietnamese-language newspapers in the area. And the older generation is perpetually on guard against any Communist elements in the area.

That might sound silly to some of us who were born here.

But to Vietnamese-Americans who were rousted from their homeland by a Communist government, it's a duty to safeguard their community's freedoms.

But how does all that appeal to young Americans of Vietnamese descent?

Probably not so much.

First, they're more educated than their parents and grandparents, by and large, and thus have different tastes in food, music, clothes, jewelry, you name it.

Secondly, they, like most young folks, enjoy nightlife.

Currently, Little Saigon pretty much shuts down at 8 p.m.

But more and more, business owners are trying to attract a younger clientele.

Take Frank Jao and his daughter Felicia Jao, who own and operate the Asian Garden Mall on Bolsa, which is sort of the anchor of Little Saigon. I mean, if you want to experience the next-best thing to Vietnam, go the Asian Garden Mall summer night market. It's really cool.

Now, though, the Jaos are working on another development they hope will infuse Little Saigon with new life: a 20,000 square-foot food hall, about 11 miles to the north. It's expected to be completed by 2018.

And while details are scarce, we know this: the development will be geared to younger folks, meaning the Jaos want to attract younger, more ethnically diverse customers.

The food hall would replace a strip mall to the east of the Asian Garden Mall, currently occupied by restaurants and lounges, pharmacies and hair salons that cater primarily to Vietnamese-speaking locals

Another example is Lau Xanh Grill, which opened last year in the area; the grill combines Vietnamese and American culture, serving what's popularly known as Asian fusion-style dishes.

If all this comes to pass, Little Saigon will not be the same.

But I don't think Little Saigon will ever forget its roots, or morph into downtown Huntington Beach anytime soon.

Go there now and you'll see firstgeneration Vietnamese-Americans gathering at patio tables, smoking, chatting in Vietnamese and playing board games. You'll see second generation Vietnamese-Americans who, while being very American, carry on with certain Vietnamese customs.

Last month, the City Council appointed Mayor Tri Ta and newly elected Councilwoman Kimberly Ho to form an ad-hoc committee to figure out how to create a Little Saigon walk of fame. The early concept is to have the names of nominated community members go before a committee to judge whether they are worthy of getting their own star, and then having those selected foot the bill. The walk would run on the north side of Bolsa.

So there you have it.

Change is inevitable, but history has its place.



## Local student earns \$40,000 scholarship

It's a devastating loss. She's grateful that her pet dogs were unharmed, and grateful that neighbors held her back when she tried to charge in the house, which was engulfed in flames.

## CITY RAISING AWARENESS OF CITRUS GREENING DISEASE FOUND IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

The City is raising awareness of Huanglongbing, also known as HLB or citrus greening disease, which has been discovered in Los Angeles County. HLB kills citrus trees and has no cure.

HLB is not harmful to humans. The disease is spread by a pest called the Asian citrus psyllid. The Asian citrus psyllid is a small insect that feeds on citrus tree leaves, which causes a bacteria called Huanglongbing to spread. If a tree is infected, it can die in as little as five years. Cities confirmed with HLB are currently under a citrus quarantine.

To help prevent the spread of HLB to Garden Grove citrus, The Citrus Pest & Disease Prevention Program recommends the following actions:

- Inspect your citrus trees monthly.
- Do not move citrus plants, leaves or foliage in or out of your community.
- Talk to your local nursery about products that can protect your tree.
- If you suspect your tree has the disease, call the California Department of Food and Agriculture at (800) 491-1899.

# WHITTIER POLICE CHIEF, FATHER OF MURDERED PALM SPRINGS OFFICER SHARE REMEMBRANCES AT 30<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL POLICE MEMORIAL

Honoring Garden Grove's "Fallen Five" –the five Garden Grove Police Officers killed in the line of duty—takes a different perspective at this year's Police Memorial. The 30<sup>th</sup> Annual Memorial takes place on Thursday, May 18, 2017, at 5:00 p.m., in front of Garden Grove Police Headquarters, at 11301 Acacia Parkway.

This year, the program will highlight two guest speakers, Whittier Police Chief Jeff Piper, and David Kling, a retired officer and father of Palm Springs Officer Lesley Zerebny, who was murdered last year. Each will recount their individual experiences and memories that touch on the personal lives as well as professional roles of the law enforcement officers.

For three decades, the annual ceremony has brought community and law enforcement together in remembrance of Garden Grove's "Fallen Five," Sergeant Myron L. Trapp, Officer Andy Reese, Officer Donald F. Reed, Officer Michael Rainford, and Master Officer Howard Dallies, Jr.

"These brave men were husbands, fathers, brothers, sons, and friends with unique dreams and goals for their future. We should remember that first, before we remember them as officers. Their sacrifice goes far beyond what it says on a plaque," says Garden Grove Police Chief Todd Elgin.

#### HEAVY TRAFFIC AND ROAD CLOSURES DURING STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL

Beginning Friday, May 26 through Monday, May 29, the 59<sup>th</sup> annual Garden Grove Strawberry Festival will take place in downtown Garden Grove at Village Green Park, located at 12732 Main Street, where Euclid and Main Streets intersect. During the four-day festival, heavy traffic is anticipated in the immediate area. Motorists are asked to plan accordingly to avoid delays.

Main Street, north of Acacia Parkway, will be closed from Thursday, May 25 through Tuesday morning, May 30.

The following streets will be closed only on Saturday, May 27, from 6:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., for the annual Strawberry Stomp 5K and the Strawberry Festival Parade:

- Acacia Parkway, from Grove Street to Civic Center Drive
- 9<sup>th</sup> Street, between Jerry Lane and Orangewood Avenue
- Chapman Avenue, between West and Nelson Streets
- Euclid Street, between Orangewood Avenue and Garden Grove Boulevard

No vehicles will be allowed to drive or park on the closed streets until the 5K and parade have ended. Any vehicles found on the street after 4:00 a.m. on Saturday, May 27, will be towed and impounded. Affected streets will be posted with 'NO PARKING' signs and residents will be notified in advance.

Orange County Transit Authority bus routes will be affected by road closures.

Heavy Traffic and Road Closures During Strawberry Festival 2-2-2

Stanford Avenue and residential streets near Lampson Avenue and Euclid Street will be open to residents only. Identification will be required for vehicles traveling on those streets during festival hours.

Residential parking by permit only, will be enforced on Pine and Walnut Streets, south of Lampson Avenue, and College Avenue, between Euclid and Pine Streets.

Garden Grove police officers will be in the immediate area to provide directions for residents entering or leaving the area.

Suggested alternate routes during the 5K and parade hours are Katella Avenue or Garden Grove Boulevard for east and west traffic. For north and south traffic, alternate routes are Brookhurst or West Streets.

On Saturday, May 27, the Strawberry Stomp 5K walk/run race will officially begin at 8:00 a.m. on Main Street and travel north on Euclid Street, heading east on Chapman Avenue to 9<sup>th</sup> Street, before looping back onto Euclid Street. The 5K will finish on Main Street at 9:30 a.m.

Following the 5K, at 10:00 a.m., the parade will begin on Chapman Avenue, from 9<sup>th</sup> to Euclid Streets, then continue south towards Village Green Park where it concludes at Acacia Parkway.



Request:

A request by Shea Homes to develop a gated residential subdivision with 70 single-family detached residential units and related street and open space improvements on a 9.01-acre site located in the Cities of Garden Grove and Orange at Lewis Street and Garden Grove Boulevard, at 12901 Lewis Street (APN Nos. 231-041-26, 231-041-27, 231-041-28, and 231-255-01). The Project proposes two floor plans, each of which would feature four bedrooms and a two-car garage accessed from the front of each unit. All units would feature private outdoor areas to the sides and rear of the units. The Project also includes the development of a private recreation area that would be located near the entrance of the residential community. The recreation area features the following amenities: a playground, an open turf area, two covered barbeque dining areas, and a shade structure with bench seating. The project site currently contains a church and a school consisting of nine buildings, two play yards, and a parking lot. The project includes a proposed sphere of influence change and annexation of 0.901 acres from the City of Orange to the City of Garden Grove.

As part of the Project, the Planning Commission will consider a recommendation for City Council approval of amendments to the City's General Plan Land Use map and Zoning map in conjunction with the proposed annexation and to modify the General Plan Land Use designation of the project site from Civic Institution to Low Density Residential and to adopt Residential Plan Unit Development zoning with R-1 (Single-Family Residential) base zoning for the entire site. The Planning Commission will also consider contingent approval of a Site Plan and Tentative Tract Map to subdivide the property into 70 singlefamily lots and to facilitate development of the proposed 70-unit small lot single-family residential subdivision, along with a recommendation for City Council approval of a Development Agreement with the applicant. The Planning Commission will also consider recommendation that the City Council adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration for the project.

MATTERS FROM COMMISSIONERS: Commissioner Lazenby mentioned that Anaheim Convention Center parking was overflowing onto the south side of Orangewood, Bluebell, and Cliffwood Avenues, preventing residents from parking in their own neighborhood. Staff responded that Dai Vu, one of the City's Traffic Engineers, would look into the matter.

Vice Chair Brietigam commented that public safety was the primary responsibility of the City with both Police and Fire staff understaffed for many years; that service needs were even greater as the old needs were never met; and that the campaign was to increase the numbers to 200 sworn police officers and five sworn fire fighters by the year 2020. He challenged the City Council to make that come to fruition.

The day began Wednesday morning with a legislative briefing for city officials that featured League President and Lodi Council Member JoAnne Mounce and Gov. Jerry Brown. Highlighting the collective strength of the League, Mounce remarked, "This organization remains a powerful force because of the dedication of city officials throughout California. Thank you for your advocacy to improve the quality of life in your city and all of the cities of California." she said.

President Mounce welcomed Gov. Brown to the podium and thanked him for his leadership on SB 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, the \$52 billion transportation funding package the Assembly and Senate passed on April 6 and his focus on repaying debt, prudently building reserves and making progress on the growing costs of pensions and unfunded liabilities.

In thanking legislators for their support of the transportation funding package, Mounce acknowledged the challenge it presented. "We know that passing SB 1 was not an easy vote for legislators and not everyone agreed with the result. However, for the League, the effort to fix our roads has always been practical; not partisan," she said.

Governor Brown, a former mayor of Oakland, reminisced about his own experiences in local government that he said began when he helped Mother Teresa and the Sisters of Charity open a center in San Francisco to help those affected with AIDs. He commented on what often separates local governments from the state and federal governments. "Local government is where you actually have democracy working," He continued, "You (city officials) are the custodians of democracy in America."

In reference to the passage of SB 1, the Governor thanked the League and city officials for their advocacy. "You were crucial in getting the bill passed. The League plays a big role," said Governor Brown.

Following a briefing by the League's advocacy team on the <u>League's strategic goals</u>, city officials heard from two members of the Assembly both former mayors and city council members.

Assembly Member Cecilia Aguiar-Curry, the former mayor of Winters, shared how her experience as a member of a League policy committee, as well as the League board of directors, was instrumental in preparing her for serving in the Assembly and as chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee.

Assembly Member Jim Frazier, the former mayor of Oakley, worked closely with Sen. Jim Beall (D-San Jose) on the transportation funding package and is the lead sponsor on ACA 5, SB 1's accompanying accountability measure. In his remarks he recounted the efforts it took to pass the legislation and the positive impact the funding will have on the state and local transportation system.

#### Legislative Panel Discussion on California's Housing Challenges

City officials returned to the Sacramento Convention Center after their meetings with legislators in the Capitol for a panel discussion on California's housing challenges. Moderated by San Diego City Council Member David Alvarez, the event was sponsored by the League's five diversity caucuses: the African-American Caucus; Asian-Pacific Islander Caucus; Gay-Lesbian-Bisexual-Transgender Local Officials Caucus; Latino Caucus; and Women's Caucus.

The panelists who shared their perspectives on California's housing challenges included:

"It was a productive day, and the League appreciates the time the many city officials took out of their busy schedules to make the voice of cities heard in the Capitol," said League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman.

Oakland Council Member Dan Kalb and Menlo Park Mayor Kirstin Keith, both League board members, provided key testimony along with several other city officials from around the state. After many thoughtful questions and extensive vetting, SB 540 passed out of the committee on a 6-0 vote.

"Access to housing is a basic human need, and ensuring Californians have access to an affordable place to live is critical to every Californian's quality of life. That's why I am proud to have authored Senate Bill 540, which will incentivize and streamline housing construction to meet our state's dire housing shortage. I thank the Committee for recognizing the critical need for this measure, and look forward to sending this measure to the Governor for his signature," <a href="mailto:signature">said</a> Senator Roth.

#### **Next Steps**

SB 540 now heads to the Senate Committee on Appropriations where it will examine the state's ability to fund the new revolving loan program, established in SB 540, to assist cities with up-front planning and environmental review efforts. The measure must be acted on by the May 26 fiscal committee deadline.

#### Updated Local Streets and Roads Estimates FAQ Available

FAQ Includes HUTA and RMRA Allocations

The League's fiscal consultant, Michael Coleman, has updated and retitled a briefing sheet on local Highway Users Tax Account (Gas Tax) Funds to include details about the new Road Maintenance and Repair Account (RMRA) funds that will begin flowing to city and county gas tax funds next year, assuming Gov. Jerry Brown signs SB 1.

The new FAQ sheet, titled "Local Streets and Roads Estimates: 2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19 including Highway Users Tax Account (HUTA) and Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA)" provides descriptions of revenues, allocations and rules that locals need to know about these state transportation tax revenues that are allocated for local streets and roads needs. The RMRA imposes new reporting and minimum funding requirements of cities and counties in order to be eligible for RMRA funding.

This document will be updated as new information becomes available, including new revenue estimates. The FAQ contains attachments with the latest city-by-city and county-by-county revenue estimates for HUTA and the RMRA.

#### Budget Trailer Bill SB 130 Contains Long-Sought Fix for Struggling Newly-Incorporated Cities

California's four most recently incorporated cities are on the cusp of receiving a long-needed permanent fix to their revenues with <u>SB 130</u>. Approved by the Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee on Monday, April 24, the measure was also the subject of an Assembly Budget Committee informational hearing that day. The League testified in support of SB 130 in both committees. This measure, which mirrors the contents of League-supported SB 37 (Roth), restores funding stability to four recently incorporated cities — Eastvale, Wildomar, Menifee and Jurupa Valley. These cities, all in Riverside County, have experienced severe financial hardship since 2011 when the state swept all remaining shares of city vehicle license fee (VLF) revenues.

While all city budgets were affected by the loss of city shares of VLF, these four cities were particularly hit hard in that they were much more reliant on the VLF than all of the state's other 478 cities due to prior legislative tinkering with local revenue sources.

#### History

Some history explains why.

Prior to 1998, cities had three main sources of general revenue: property tax; sales tax; and VLF revenue. (VLF originated as a local property tax levied on vehicles until 1933 when the state standardized collection.) Then in 1998, during a good budget year for the state, some legislators became enamored with the idea of "cutting the car tax" from 2 percent to 0.65 percent with promises to backfill local agencies for their losses with shares of property tax from schools. The League opposed that proposal because the promises to backfill created uncertainty for local revenues; however it was ultimately approved. This leads to more recent history.

As state budget difficulties returned in the early 2000s legislators began to question the backfill to local agencies and also balked at the notion of allowing the triggers to be pulled that would restore VLF collection at its previous level of 2 percent. An agreement was reached in 2004 and solidified in Proposition 1A — a revenue protection measure sponsored by the League — that allowed all cities and counties in existence on that date to swap the amounts owed to them as VLF backfill dollar-for-dollar for increased shares of local property tax. During the negotiations, the League had also advocated for the "swap" to address future incorporations and annexations, but the fix did not make it into the final package.

All cities in existence in 2004 were kept whole by the swap but the agreement did not resolve how to address future incorporations or annexations. VLF had been previously allocated to cities on a per-capita basis. That meant that as new cities incorporated or otherwise added population they received increased shares of this pool of funds. These allocations were also a smart-growth incentive: more people in your city meant more revenue.

The League worked with then Assembly Member John Laird (D-Santa Cruz) in 2006 to fashion a solution in AB 1602 by providing permanent increased shares of a small pool of remaining VLF to newly incorporated cities and cities that annexed inhabited areas.

In 2011, however, during another state budget crisis, the Legislature passed SB 89 — a quickly adopted bill with no public hearings — that swept all of these remaining VLF funds as part of a budget solution. Despite the bill being in print for only a matter of hours, the League still managed to issue an oppose letter and lobbied against it on the Senate floor. The League also filed a lawsuit challenging SB 89, which proved unsuccessful.

For the last six years, the League has drafted, sponsored and supported various measures to address the harmful impacts of SB 89 on the four recently incorporated cities as well as cities that lost funding over annexations. Regrettably, the Governor vetoed the measures that reached his desk.

#### SB 130 Becomes Vehicle to Restore Funding to Four Cities

A breakthrough finally occurred this legislative session with SB 130. The Governor in recent negotiations agreed to sign SB 130 when it reaches his desk. The measure provides the four cities with shares of property tax to offset the amount of vehicle license fee revenue they would have received. In future years, the amount will be adjusted according to the same rules applied in the swap to other cities. In short, these cities will be treated equally with all other cities.

Restoring needed funding and avoiding the potential disincorporation of these new cities also provides long-term policy benefits to the state. The four affected cities are located in one of the fastest growing regions of California. City land use patterns are urban and dense and their future growth is regulated by local agency formation commission (LAFCO) policies. In contrast, unincorporated development patterns are typically less dense and not regulated by LAFCO.

SB 130, is a long-overdue fix for the four recently incorporated cities that were unjustly and severely harmed by the passage of SB 89 in 2011; still outstanding, however, are the longer-term policy issues associated with future incorporations and annexations which the League will continue to work on.

The League thanks Sen. Richard Roth (D-Riverside) and Assembly Member Sabrina Cervantes (D-Corona) for their lobbying efforts with the Governor to ensure that the fiscal harm caused to the four cities will finally be addressed, and also appreciates the work of the representatives of the firm of Joe A. Gonsalves & Son who advocated on behalf of the affected cities.

- 1. Why is the League-sponsored Medical Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act being repealed in its entirety, given that it expressly empowered local governments to a) conduct their own enforcement, and b) enforce state health & safety and other standards, if they requested and were granted that authority from the relevant state agency? There is no comparable enforcement provision for locals in the trailer bill.
- 2. Why does the trailer bill fail to expressly empower locals to conduct audits and inspections, which will be necessary given that cannabis is an all-cash business, especially if there are local tax measures? Local audits will be necessary to assess total volume of traffic and the appropriate revenue yield from any local tax measures. Absent such authorization, locals can anticipate being sued in some jurisdictions.
- 3. Why are fire safety standards being repealed? Locals have an interest in seeing to it that businesses adhere to those standards. And if locals try to unilaterally enforce those standards absent express statutory authorization, they will have to deal with litigation.
- 4. Why is there no provision for enforcement of health and safety standards in regard to whether businesses are adhering to packaging and labelling standards? If there is to be state-only enforcement, how can local governments be certain it will be systematic and timely? The League and the police chiefs have asked to have this addressed by either an independent auditor-inspector, or by having this function delegated to local governments.
- 5. Why is the requirement for potency/concentration being repealed? This can and should remain in statute, and be enforced either by locals, either county health inspectors or municipal code enforcement offices. The latter are already performing compliance checks in communities like Rancho Cordova (Assembly Member Cooley's district).

#### **Board Composition**

The board of directors comprises the League's officers — president, first vice president, second vice president, immediate past president and executive director — a representative from each of the League's 16 divisions, and a representative from each of the League's 11 functional departments, the mayors or designees (alternates) of the mayors of the 10 largest cities by population, and 12 at-large positions, with one reserved for a representative of a small city (under 12,000 population).

City officials serving on the National League of Cities (NLC) board of directors also serve on the League of California Cities board of directors for the duration of their term on the NLC board (two-year term).

The League board typically meets on a quarterly basis at locations throughout the state. Nominees are expected to make a commitment to attend all meetings. All travel-related expenses to attend League board meetings are reimbursed by the League.

# League-Sponsored Bond Agency Issues \$30 Million in Tax-Exempt Bonds for Affordable Housing in Los Angeles, West Covina and Hemet

Some of the most significant benefits of League membership for cities since 1988 have flowed from the League's co-sponsorship of the <u>California Statewide Communities Development</u> Authority (CSCDA).

This program provides a variety of public agencies and developers access to low-cost, tax-exempt financing and economic development tools. CSCDA recently issued a total of \$30,067,415 in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the Hemet Vistas Apartments in Hemet, the Princess Apartments in Los Angeles and the Promenade Apartments in West Covina.

#### **About Hemet Vistas Apartments**

Hemet Vistas Apartments (Hemet Vistas) is an acquisition and rehabilitation of 143 multi-family affordable housing apartments by Hemet Vistas 1&2R Partners, LP. The project sponsor is Palm Communities. Hemet Vistas will continue to be 100 percent affordable and provide apartments to low-income residents in Hemet.

CSCDA and Palm Communities partnered with Chase Bank to provide \$10.8 million in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for Hemet Vistas. The project will undergo an extensive interior and exterior renovation ensuring that residents have an updated, safe, and affordable community to call home for years to come. The financing of Hemet Vistas will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.

#### **About Princess Apartments**

Princess Apartments are an acquisition and rehabilitation of 58 multi-family affordable housing apartments by Princess Affordable Apartments, LP. The project sponsor is Intercontinental Affordable Housing (IAHI). Princess Apartments will continue to be 100 percent affordable and provide apartments to low-income residents in Los Angeles.

CSCDA and IAHI partnered with Jones, Lang LaSalle Multifamily to provide tax-exempt multifamily affordable housing bonds for Princess Apartments. The project will undergo an extensive interior and exterior renovation ensuring that residents have an updated, safe, and affordable community to call home for years to come. The financing of Princess Apartments will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.

#### **About The Promenade Apartments**

The Promenade Apartments (Promenade) is an acquisition and rehabilitation of 124 multi-family affordable housing apartments by The Promenade Housing Partners, L.P. The project sponsor is National Community Renaissance of California (National CORE). Promenade will continue to be 100 percent affordable and provide apartments to low-income residents in West Covina.

CSCDA and National CORE partnered with Bank of the West and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide the \$10.7 million in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for Promenade. The project will undergo an extensive interior and exterior renovation ensuring that residents have an updated, safe, and affordable community to call home for years to come. The financing of Promenade will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.
