SUBJECT: 4th OF JULY, 2018- CITY OF GARDEN GROVE PUBLIC SAFETY ACTIONS UPDATE

As the 4th of July rapidly approaches, and our citizens are making plans to celebrate our great country's founding, City public safety officials are working hard to make sure the holiday is as safe and enjoyable as possible. In an effort to continue to provide the best public safety with the limited resources available, the City of Garden Grove will be taking the following proactive actions to keep the citizens of Garden Grove as safe as possible, while celebrating the 4th of July with family and friends.

Illegal Firework Sales

Fire Department arson team members have been monitoring local illegal firework sales activity and will work with Garden Grove Police to enforce all appropriate laws.

Fireworks Stands

All 45 approved Safe & Sane Fireworks Stands will be inspected by the Fire Prevention Bureau and Building & Safety Department. Fire Suppression companies will also be checking each stand daily, to assure that everything remains safe.

Block Parties

Community Relations, Police, and the Fire Department have worked together collaboratively to update the block party permit process, as well as update the public education information provided to citizens requesting a permit. Fire Department Prevention and Police Staff will be inspecting each block party site to assure that emergency access and safety issues are in compliance. The goal of this inspection is to provide public education, while ensuring compliance to keep everyone safe.

Arson Team Patrols

On the 4th of July, Fire Department arson team members and GGPD will be patrolling the City to enforce the illegal firework laws. In addition, arson team members will be rapidly available to investigate any fire that may break out.

Staffing

Both the Police and Fire Department will be supplementing normal staffing levels to respond to the potential increased threat of fires during the 4th. The goal is to be able to rapidly get adequate resources to fires early, before they can grow into a major incident.

Department Operation Center

The Fire Department will be prepared to activate the Department Operation Center (or City EOC) in the event of a major incident or fire occurring. Key department personnel will be available on call, to respond back into the City as required.

The above actions will reduce the likelihood of a significant event or fire occurring on our nation's birthday. Public Safety will continue to monitor all information related to the potential hazards and will take the appropriate action to mitigate them.

OBJECTIVE

To provide information on the status of the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funded street outreach to address homelessness.

BACKGROUND

On April 10, 2018, City Council approved the 2018 Action Plan for the Use of HUD Funds. The approval included the allocation of ESG funds for CityNet (\$15,000) and Illumination Foundation (\$10,000) to carry out Street Outreach activities to address homelessness.

DISCUSSION

Staff was recently contacted by a representative of Illumination Foundation who indicated that Illumination Foundation elected not to enter into a contract to provide street outreach service for PY 2018. Illumination Foundation determined the amount of work associated with managing a contract for \$10,000 is not cost effective.

Staff has reallocated the ESG funds previously awarded to Illumination Foundation to CityNet. For PY 2018, CityNet will receive an award of \$25,000 in ESG funding. In exchange for this funding, CityNet will assist 120 unduplicated Garden Grove homeless individuals with eligible services. Please see the attached "Scope of Services and Budget" for further details.

ATTACHMENT A SCOPE OF SERVICES AND BUDGET CITY OF GARDEN GROVE & CITY NET

A. SCOPE OF SERVICES

This project is designed to provide a variety of programs serving homeless and at-risk residents. **City Net** shall provide services that assists homeless and at-risk residents by providing **street outreach services** to individuals living in Garden Grove.

Furthermore, this project furthers Priority #5 in the City of Garden Grove's adopted Housing and Community and Economic Development Consolidated Plan (HUD 5-year plan), which is to address the needs of homeless individuals and those at risk of homelessness.

Between **July 1, 2018 and June 30, 2019,** City Net will assist **120** Garden Grove residents through independent effort and by way of referrals from the Garden Grove Police Department by providing the following HUD eligible services:

1. Engagement-

- a. Locate, identify, and build relationships with unsheltered homeless people and engage them for the purpose of providing immediate support, intervention, and connections with homeless assistance programs and/or mainstream social services and housing programs. These activities consist of:
 - i. Making an initial assessment of needs and eligibility;
 - ii. Providing crisis counseling;
 - iii. Addressing urgent physical needs, such as providing meals, blankets, clothes, or toiletries; and
 - iv. Actively connecting and providing information and referrals to programs targeted to homeless people and mainstream social services and housing programs, including emergency shelter, transitional housing, community-based services, permanent supportive housing, and rapid re-housing programs.

2. Case Management-

- a. Assess housing and service needs, arranging, coordinating, and monitoring the delivery of individualized services to meet the needs of the program participant. Eligible services and activities are as follows:
 - Using the centralized or coordinated assessment system as required under § 576.400(d);
 - ii. Conducting the initial evaluation required under§ 576.401(a), including verifying and documenting eligibility;
 - iii. Counseling;
 - iv. Developing, securing and coordinating services;
 - v. Obtaining Federal, State, and local benefits;
 - vi. Monitoring and evaluating program participant progress;
 - vii. Providing information and referrals to other providers; and
 - viii. Developing an individualized housing and service plan, including planning a path to permanent housing stability.

3. Emergency Health Services-

a. Assess individual's health problems and develop a treatment plan; assist individuals to understand their health needs; and, assist individuals to obtain appropriate emergency medical treatment.

4. Emergency Mental Health Services-

a. N/A

5. Transportation-

- a. Transporting unsheltered people to emergency shelters or other service facilities. These activities include the following:
 - i. Financial assistance to individuals for public transportation;
 - ii. Accompany or assist individuals to use public transportation; and
 - iii. Visit individuals to provide one of the above eligible services (Sections 1 through 4).

6. Services to Special Populations-

a. Provide services for homeless youth, victim services (domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking), and services for people living with HIV/AIDS.

B. PERFORMANCE MEASURES

City Net will submit to the City of Garden Grove Neighborhood Improvement Division quarterly reports on the form attached hereto by October 15, January 15, April 15, and July 15 over the duration of this agreement. In addition, as outlined in section 5.5 of the agreement, City Net shall input client data pertinent to ESG eligibility into Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and Client Management Information System (CMIS), if applicable. City Net also acknowledges that the City of Garden Grove will have access to the aforementioned data for monitoring purposes to ensure HUD compliance.


Russell Launches New Programs, Celebrates Student Success at Open House

Equipping GGUSD's Future Teachers



Last year, GGUSD received a grant through the California Teaching Commission which allowed the district to create a pathway for classified employees to earn their teaching credential. The grant awarded up to \$4,000 dollars per academic year for 40 GGUSD classified employees to earn their teaching credential in special education, math, and science. Interested employees submitted an application that met the criteria needed to be accepted at a university level and demonstrated a history of excellence in their current job classification, and completed a competitive interview process. GGUSD partnered with neighboring universities, including CSULB, which provided a co-hort for the candidate looking to be future special education teachers. The program is overseen through the office of Personnel Services and works in partnership with the Office of Special Education and 7-12 Educational Services to provide ongoing support to our future teachers.

Free Summer Meals

GGUSD will once again offer a free Summer Meal program to serve families in need and help ensure that children do not go hungry when school is not in session. Last year, this program served more than 64,000 free meals. "For some of our students, school lunch is their primary source of food during the school year," said Bob Harden, Board of Education president. The department also sent a qualified public information officer to coordinate information when the Orange County Incident Management Team was activated.

The crews were assigned to surrounding neighborhoods to prepare for structure defense. Due to firefighting efforts on the ground and air, no structures were damaged. All crews have returned to Garden Grove.

Our engine companies are prepared to respond anywhere in the state for any emergency. Anytime they are launched, off-duty personnel are recalled to ensure uninterrupted fire and paramedic services to the City.

Garden Grove Fire Department TWO PEOPLE BURNED WHEN CLEANING PRODUCTS IGNITED

Fire fighters responded to a home in the area of Washington Avenue and Bushard Street for two adults that were burned when a cleaning product and gasoline were used to clean, ignited. Fire crews were alerted to the incident shortly after 12:00 p.m. A male in his 50's was cleaning near a stove when the vapors made contact with the pilot light of the stove and ignited. The male sustained critical burns to the majority of his body, and was extinguished prior to fire department arrival. The fire did not spread to the structure. The second person was a female in her 30's. She sustained moderate burns to about 10% of her body. Both patients were treated by fire fighter paramedics, and transported to a local burn center. Assistance was provided by the Fountain Valley Fire Department.

"Using flammable liquids near ignition sources should never be done," according to Chief Tom Schultz. When using cleaning products, the fire department encourages everyone to read the manufacturer's use instructions.

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Disney, Wincome consider nixing new hotels if Anaheim ballot measure forces employee pay hike

If forced to raise worker wages in exchange for accepting tax subsidies, officials with the Walt Disney Co. and the Wincome Group said Thursday they may nix plans for luxury hotels within the Disneyland Resort district.

A proposed ballot measure, backed by a coalition of unions that represent resort workers, would raise hospitality or theme park employees' pay to \$18 an hour by 2022 at businesses that have received city subsidies. The measure would appear on the November ballot if the Orange County Registrar of Voters deems later this month it qualifies.

The companies' comments, ahead of a Saturday rally for Disney workers with Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders, are the latest salvo in a public fight that's been raging for months between the workers' unions and the city's largest employer and other business leaders.

In February, the unions released a study they commissioned that said some Disney workers struggle to pay for housing, food and other necessities, and they proposed a ballot measure that would increase the minimum wage at subsidized companies by \$1 each year until 2022, with subsequent increases tied to inflation.

The biggest affected projects are two hotels planned by Wincome and one by Disney. The City Council agreed to reimburse 70 percent of future hotel taxes collected on night stays for 20 years in return for building hotels that would meet AAA's criteria for four diamond ratings. The tax sharing deals are worth an estimated \$550 million.

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Disneyland Resort spokeswoman Lisa Haines said Thursday that Anaheim's "increasingly hostile business environment" could lead the company to look outside the city limits for a host of future projects such as new spaces for back-of-house operations that support the resort, administrative operations and the planned luxury hotel.

The company has met with Garden Grove officials about potential development in that city, Haines said. Garden Grove City Manager Scott Stiles confirmed the city has talked with Disney, but said no specific projects are under consideration.

Wincome Group CEO Paul Sanford said work has begun on one of the company's two planned hotels, but the second one is "definitely under review." He broke the news at a Bisnow commercial real estate conference in Anaheim on Thursday.

A mandated wage increase is less of an issue for Wincome because most of its staff are paid more than the initiative would require, Sanford said, "But I do worry about how it's going to reset the benchmark of what the starting wage is."

Sanford said vague language in the measure makes it unclear which businesses it would affect, and the prospect of forced increases could scare away not just hotels, but other businesses that serve resort visitors.

Unite Here Local 11 spokesman Austin Lynch disputed that the ballot language is unclear and scoffed at the companies' assertions that they'll back out of hotel projects.

The comments are intended "to confuse people about the benefits of living wages," he said. "With all due respect, I think it's an empty threat and it's a little ridiculous."

With work under way on Wincome's 613-room Westin Anaheim Resort, "clearly the idea of a living wage is not stopping them from building a four-star hotel," Lynch said. The company had already said it might reconsider the second hotel for other reasons, he added.

Sanford said besides the ballot issue, uncertainty about Disneyland's plans for the park's eastern entrance and the future of the GardenWalk mall, which went up for sale in December, could influence a decision on the second hotel.

Disney has called the union's pay study inaccurate, but has typically avoided public discussion of its wages. However, the company on Thursday released details of an offer it made in April to many of its park workers, though not the hotel staffs, that would boost the minimum pay in its two largest contracts from \$11 an hour to \$15 an hour in 2020 – two years ahead of a state requirement, but a year behind when the ballot issue would push the minimum to that level.

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Involved unions could not be reached for comment.

The news about the hotels raised concerns for Anaheim Councilwoman Kris Murray, who has joined a business-led campaign against the ballot measure.

Regardless of whether the planned hotels are built in Anaheim, millions in bond debt – approved in 1996 – remains to be paid for resort district infrastructure and a parking garage for Disneyland, Murray said.

If voters approve the ballot issue and the hotel projects are built a city over, she said, "This measure will become the Garden Grove economic development act."

But Mayor Tom Tait said a recent deal in which the city sold land at its appraised value to a developer planning a high-end Radisson hotel belies the argument that luxury hotels wouldn't get built without tax subsidies.

If companies are worried about the impact of the ballot measure if voters approve it, they could turn down future city subsidies and then it wouldn't apply to them, he said.

"It's because the luxury hotel developers asked the city for a massive subsidy in the first place," he said, "that workers now are asking the voters of Anaheim to have those companies pay a living wage."

The Orange County Registrar of Voters has until June 15 to verify ballot proponents' petitions.

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

Local employers are looking for workers

As unemployment reaches new low, "Now hiring" signs are popping up in OC

Looking for a job? There are opportunities.

All over Westminster, Garden Grove and Orange County, "Now hiring" signs can be seen in the windows of businesses. Businesses are also seeking workers by advertising in newspapers and on websites. Positions range from minimum wage jobs to those paying \$20-30 an hour.

A quick glance at the job site indeed.com shows the following openings in Westminster: a kennel attendant, a veterinary assistant, an administrative assistant at Southern California Edison, an office clerk, a victim advocate at West Justice Center, a videographer and more.

Tracey Lym, 24, of Westminster, is encouraged by the news; he's been looking for a job for six months. He said he prefers to work in media arts but he's also applying for customer service positions.

"At this point, I just need to pay my bills and my student loans," he said. "I'm hopeful."

Nationally, the unemployment rate is 3.9 percent, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. In Orange County, that number is 2.8.

California created payroll jobs at a healthy 2.3 percent rate over the year, with the fastest growth in health services and construction.

Santiago High grad Long Hinh serving on elite Navy team

A 2011 Santiago High School graduate and Garden Grove native is serving with a U.S. Navy strike fighter squadron in Lemoor, California; the squadron flies one of the world's most advanced warplanes.

Airman Long Hinh is an aviation electrician's mate with the Flying Eagles of VFA 122, which operates out of Naval Air Station Lemoore. A Navy aviation electrician's mate is responsible for all the electrical components on the aircraft and troubleshooting.

"I have learned discipline and attention to detail," Hinh said. "You have to get yourself out of your comfort zone so you can grow."

Members of VFA 122 work with the F/A 18 Super Hornet, one of the most advanced aircraft in the world. The Super Hornet takes off from and lands on Navy aircraft

carriers at sea and is capable of conducting air-to-air combat as well as striking targets on land. It is approximately 61 feet long, has a loaded weight of 51,000 pounds, and a max speed of 1,190 miles per hour.

Operating from sea aboard aircraft carriers, the Super Hornet gives the Navy the power to protect America's interests anywhere, at any time. The versatile jet has the ability to destroy targets located hundreds of miles inland, without the need to get another country's permission to operate within its borders.

"Strike Fighter Wing, U. S. Pacific Fleet, based at Naval Air Station Lemoore, California, is the heart of Naval Aviation," said Capt. James S. Bates, deputy commodore, Strike Fighter Wing, U.S. Pacific. "The sailors assigned to SFWP always exceed expectations and produce amazing results through teamwork and dedication to their department, squadron, the U.S. Navy and their family. Naval Aviation is a challenging occupation, but our sailors work day in and day out to provide fully mission capable aircraft and fully qualified aircrew to ensure leadership is able to answer national level tasking. I am humbled to be able to lead the sailors of SFWP and I am proud to call Lemoore

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my home."

"I am the first in my family to join," said Hinh. "I felt I was not growing. I wanted to be able to accomplish something so I could go back and do what I want to do. I fought for the freedom that my family has."

Hinh is also proud of his command's unique mission.

"My command is very different because we train new pilots and a lot of new personnel," said Hinh. "We are training all the pilots that go-on to the fleet. Without this training they would not be able to do their job in the fleet."

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy's most relied-upon assets, Hinh and other sailors know they are part of a legacy that will last beyond their lifetimes providing the Navy the nation needs.

"Serving in the Navy means always doing the right thing and giving everything I've got," Hinh said. "Otherwise, there is no point. Mistakes can be made, but when I make one it can mean someone's life." Officials offer insights at backyard meet

In some places and some times, politics and civics take place mostly in backrooms. In Garden Grove it can sometimes take place in a backyard.

The 15th annual Garden Grove Neighborhood Association meeting was held Saturday at a home on Meade Street in the central part of the town, continuing a tradition of bringing city, school and county leaders into contact with local citizens.

That's the home of Maureen Blackmun, president of the GGNA.

Under a canopy and flanked by tables laden with informational material, food and cookies, the audience heard remarks from Mayor Steve Jones, City Manager Scott Stiles and Orange County First District Supervisor Andrew Do, among others.

"We've been working very proactively on what we call rebranding our city or our 'Re-Imagine' campaign," said Jones. "I'm proud to say it's working."

He credited collaboration among city departments with downtown-civic center projects such as the Cottage Industries and SteelCraft developments on the way.

"So, cool things are happening in town. It's just a matter of time," said Jones. He added, "To me it's painfully slow. I can envision where we will be in a few years. It always feels like it takes longer and there's more steps and hurdles to go over, but things are breaking ground and underway."

He further pledged to preserve Garden Grove's "Mayberry-like town" but also make the "city attractive to millennials to come in and take advantage of the value proposition we have relative to the rest of the county."

Stiles echoed that. "We have a lot of challenges, but we have a lot of good things going on," said the city manager. He cited a new fire station under construction, improvements in code enforcement and progress in economic development.

He also spoke of the city's "Join the Conversation" program to solicit input from the citizens. "I'm a big believer in getting input from the community."

Do gave an extensive presentation about the county's efforts to deal with the homelessness problem and outlined a new effort which he believes will make a major impact on providing services for homeless people and getting them off the street.

Police Chief Todd Elgin and Fire Chief Tom Schultz spoke of how understaffing of those departments affects the ability of the officers and firemen to cope with issues in a growing community, and Chief Building Officer David Dent talked about his plans to re-organize efforts in code enforcement to deal with properties and businesses which don't meet city standards.

Bob Harden, president of the Garden Grove Unified School District's Board of Education, spoke of the many awards and honors won by the GGUSD which have given the local school systems statewide and even national recognition.

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

Is the Anaheim-Disney romance over?

COULD ANAHEIM'S BATTLE over minimum wages bring Disney development to Garden Grove?

Garden Grove's proximity to the Disneyland Resort area has been a major contributor to its ability to attract about a dozen new hotels to the Harbor Boulevard corridor.

But now an intriguing new wrinkle has been added to the situation, which could bring even more Disney influence still further south of Chapman Avenue.

According to articles posted and published at Bisnow.com and in the Orange County Register, the Walt Disney Co. and Wincome Group would rethink their plans to build more hotels and perhaps other attractions in Anaheim if a \$18 minimum wage proposal in that city for hotel workers and certain others is approved on the November ballot.

The likely beneficiary? Garden Grove.

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2018/06/anaheim-disney-quote.jpg) "Anaheim has become an increasingly hostile business environment, which is disappointing given our investments have created thousands of jobs and driven millions of tax dollars into the city," said Disney's Lisa Haines in a statement. "While Orange County will always be our home, the company has a choice on where it will invest and we are in active conversations about moving a wide range of investments elsewhere given the challenging dynamics."

Published reports have Disney officials and Garden Grove City Manager Scott Stiles confirming that discussions have occurred about that possibility. "Anaheim has become an increasingly hostile business environment, which is disappointing given our investments have created thousands of jobs and driven millions of tax dollars into the city."

The proposed minimum wage increase would require that businesses that get city tax subsidies – primarily hotels – pay workers at least \$15 an hour by 2019, going up to \$18 an hour by 2022. The current minimum wage in Anaheim is \$11 an hour.

One new hotel is already under construction in Anaheim, and two more are planned. It's possible that other, as-yet unannounced ventures are being considered, given the high demand for Disney's products and venues.

Unions representing hotel workers have gathered the 20,000 signatures needed to place the matter on the November ballot. If the Orange County Registrar of Voters verifies the signatures, the city council can enact the proposal or let voters decide.

It may not go that far. Disney is now offering a \$15 minimum wage for its local Orange County workers by 2020, although the union has been cool to that idea, arguing that amount is still not a living wage for full-time employees.

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

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

GGUSD STEAM teams leads the way

Garden Grove Unified School District led the way in innovation at the 2018 ocMaker Challenge with more teams that placed in the STEAM-based competition than any district in Orange County. The competition held last month challenges students to design and build or repurpose a product that will solve a problem, want, or need. Student teams from McGarvin Intermediate as well as La Quinta and Pacifica high schools saw their products place in four different divisions.

The team of La Quinta's Brandee Nguyen, Anh Nguyen, and Paul Phaminhung took second place for level 1 with their invention called the "Easy Lid." The "Easy Lid" attaches to the side of cooking pans, allowing for the lid to have a place to rest while including a reservoir for water vapor to collect while also keeping things cleaner and saving space. The team of Emily Vu and Brian Duong, also from La Quinta High School, placed second for level 2 with their creation, "Omni Plug," a device that allows for safe space saving functionality when plugging items into wall sockets.

Two are burned when fumes are ignited

Two persons suffered significant burn injuries Monday afternoon in Garden Grove when fumes from cleaning products and gasoline ignited.

According to Capt. Thanh Nugent of the Garden Grove Fire Department, the incident took place shortly after 12 p.m. at a home in the area of Washington Avenue and Bushard Street.

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2017/05/ggfd-logo.png)Burned were two adults – a man and a woman – when vapors from the cleaning products and gasoline were ignited by the pilot light of a nearby stove.

The man suffered critical burns over most of his body, although the flames were extinguished before firefighters arrived. The fire did not spread to the building.

The woman sustained moderate burns to about 10 percent of her body. Both victims were treated by firefighter-paramedics and taken to a local burn center.

Assisting was the Fountain Valley Fire Department.

"Using flammable liquids near ignition sources should never be done," said GGFD Chief Tom Schultz. He urges those using cleaning products to follow the use instructions on the product.

Pacifica, LQHS getting new gymnasiums

The Pacifica seismic mitigation grant is for \$5.25 million and the LQHS grant is for \$5.4 million. The new construction should be completed by 2021.

MATTERS FROM STAFF:

<u>PUBLIC HEARING FOR FISCAL YEAR 2018-19 ACTION PLAN:</u> The staff report dated March 5, 2018 was introduced.

Commissioner Blackmun asked staff to break down the CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) Administration allocation. Staff explained that the CDBG Administrative budget was 20 percent of the annual CDBG allocation and was used to cover uses such as staff salaries, attorney time, materials, printing, mailing, and anything related to the administration of the program.

Commissioner Blackmun then asked for an update on public infrastructure projects. Staff responded that projects in low-income areas were for street maintenance, sidewalks, and sewers, etc. and were typically funded by the General Fund, though some projects could be offset by CDBG funds to maximize City funds to use elsewhere.

Commissioner Blackmun then asked how much of the Action Plan was standardized year after year. Staff replied that the Action Plan was derived from the 5-year Consolidated Plan and each year the plan was similar.

Vice Chair McIntosh asked staff to explain the \$150,000 program for the creation of six jobs or six businesses. Staff explained that Garden Grove had a Small Business Assistance Loan Program that offered \$25,000 loans to Garden Grove businesses. In return, the business was required to ensure one, new job was created for a low-income Garden Grove resident. Though one job was the minimum requirement, new businesses taking advantage of the program may create more than one job. The \$25,000 loan, with interest, was repaid to the City, enabling the City to offer more loans. The loan information was disseminated through the Small Business Association, the SBCD, and various Chambers. Brochures were located at the Business License and Building & Safety counters. The businesses must be in Garden Grove and the person(s) hired must be from Garden Grove and qualify as low-income individuals.

Vice Chair McIntosh inquired about funds directed toward the Westhaven Park Fire Department. Staff responded that the Fire Department line item was a carryover from years ago for a proposed Fire Department on Harbor Boulevard. Of the five parcels required to build the Harbor station, the middle parcel could not be acquired, however, HUD funds were expended for one of the five parcels. The line item would remain in the Action Plan until a decision on the property could be reached. The City would retain the property and in the next Action Plan year, the

General Fund would repay the CDBG line of credit with the CDBG funds to be directed to the La Bonita storm drain.

Vice Chair McIntosh referred to the Home Improvement grants and commented that the 62 years of age or older requirement was discriminatory against low-income homeowners of all ages.

Chair Ramirez asked staff to explain the 80% of area median income. Staff responded that income varied with household size, for example, one person was about \$56,000 and two people were approximately \$63,000 and so on. For low-income areas, 51% of the households had income at or below 80% of the area median income. The 51% listed was HUD's requirement to use CDBG funds in a certain neighborhood. Almost 79% of the City of Garden Grove was low-income.

Commissioner Serrano referred to neighborhood infrastructures and asked how they were prioritized. Staff replied that staff worked with Public Works and relied on their expertise for the five-year capital improvement plan for updating and restructuring neighborhoods. Serrano then asked, if prior to finalizing the Action Plan, the Commission could view a list of the priorities to see what capital improvements were upcoming in their districts.

Vice Chair McIntosh agreed and suggested an on-line poll.

Chair Ramirez opened the public hearing and seeing no one present to comment, closed the public hearing.

It was moved by Commissioner Serrano and seconded by Vice Chair McIntosh, to accept staff's recommendation to transmit the Fiscal Year 2018-19 Action Plan and comments to City Council. The motion carried by a 6-0-1 vote as follows:

COMMENTS REGARDING 2017 ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT OF HOUSING ELEMENT: The staff report dated March 5, 2018 was introduced.

Commissioner Crawford asked for the definition of new housing units, if they included, for example, a new house constructed on the same lot where a house had been demolished. Staff replied yes, and referred to Table A.3, which indicated that second units, such as Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU's) were included. The State assumption was that if a second unit could be built, the income was 'moderate', and if a new house could be built, the income was 'above moderate'.

Vice Chair McIntosh asked if any of the Housing Element's 465 required low-income units would come from the Brookhurst Triangle.

Staff explained that the Housing Element Needs Assessment identified City areas for potential housing development as well as current housing stock and current

population, which determined the 747 number for the 8-year period. That number was then adjusted per income using percentages. 282 units had been made available over the last five years with 77 additional rehabilitated units, at 10632 Bolsa Avenue, to be added to next year's report, in addition to any ADU units. Also, the Brookhurst Triangle low-income rental units and the affordable senior housing development (formerly Galleria) had potential to be added, which would more than satisfy the 747 requirement. Staff then clarified that HUD units counted toward the Housing Element, however, all units were not HUD funded and that HUD oversees the Action Plan, while the Housing Element was governed by the State.

Commissioner Serrano asked if the City would be fined if the housing numbers were not met. Staff replied that there were no repercussions and that the City only had to show that systems were in place to accommodate such numbers. Other factors may not allow the City to produce the affordable housing as it was market driven.

It was moved by Commissioner Crawford and seconded by Vice Chair McIntosh, to accept staff's recommendation to transmit the Housing Element Update to the Planning Commission. The motion carried by a 6-0-1 vote as follows:

MATTERS FROM COMMISSIONERS: Commissioner Blackmun asked if the NICC was a part of the Continuum of Care program for housing. Staff responded that NICC would not be involved, however, several staff were beginning to attend the coordination meetings.

In regard to the homeless issue, Commissioner Crawford asked if a representative from City Net could provide an update at the next meeting as the only difference she has seen in the last year was that the homeless were migrating to Main Street and other local areas. Staff added that the Illumination Foundation was also paid to do street outreach services and could update also.

It was moved by Commissioner Crawford and seconded by Commissioner Blackmun, to request that both City Net and Illumination Foundation report out at the next NICC meeting in regard to the needs of the homeless. The motion carried by a 6-0-1 vote as follows:

Cities Need Additional Funding to Address California's Homelessness Crisis

June 1, 2018

The Legislature is debating several proposals that would direct more money to the local level for homelessness.

Cities should advocate for new funding in the FY 2018–19 state budget to help local government efforts to address California's growing homelessness crisis. Cities are on the forefront of this crisis and without more resources, the crisis will only continue to grow. State funding for local homelessness programs is extremely important to ensure quality of life and economic viability for all Californians.

Between now and the June 15 budget deadline, the budget conference committee will convene to finalize the state budget, including allocating funding for homelessness. It is important that legislators hear from city officials and why cities need flexible funding for a range of purposes including emergency responses to homelessness that include shelters, navigation centers, bridge housing, and motel vouchers.

The conference committee will debate and come to a compromise on the following:

- Mayors from California's 11 largest cities are advocating for \$1.5 billion for emergency responses to homelessness that include funding for shelters, navigation centers and bridge housing.
- The Senate has introduced a \$5 billion proposal that allocates funds to homelessness and affordable housing programs over four years.
- Gov. Jerry Brown dedicated \$350 million in one-time spending in his May Revise Budget with \$250 million earmarked for Homelessness Emergency Aid block grants targeted at local governments. Unfortunately, with many factors contributing to the growing issue of homelessness, this funding is just not enough to address the complexities of the issue.

Take Action

Cities are encouraged to <u>contact their legislators</u> as well as <u>submit a letter</u> to the Governor, Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood) and the Senate President pro Tempore Toni Atkins (D-San Diego) stressing the immediate need for additional funding.

Annual Conference Resolutions Due by July 14

League General Assembly will be Held Sept. 14

June 6, 2018

Policy development is a key part of the League of California Cities® legislative effectiveness.

The League's annual conference resolutions process is one way that city officials can directly participate in the development of League policy. The deadline to submit resolutions is fast approaching on July 14.

Resolution Submission Process

Any elected or appointed city official, individual city, division, department, policy committee, or the board of directors may submit a resolution for consideration at the conference. Resolutions must be submitted to the League's Sacramento office no later than 60 days prior to the opening of the conference. Resolutions should focus on direct municipal issues of statewide importance.

Resolutions submitted to the General Assembly must be concurred in by five cities or by city officials from at least five or more cities. Those submitting resolutions must provide written documentation of concurrence by five cities or by city officials from at least five or more cities. This may be in the form of a letter from the city or the city official in support. For concurrence by a city official, the official's city and office held must be included in the letter. All concurrences must be submitted at the time the resolution is submitted by midnight on July 14.

Consideration at Annual Conference

The League president refers resolutions to the League policy committees for review and recommendation at the conference. Resolutions are next considered by the General Resolutions Committee (GRC), which consists of representatives from each division, department, policy committee and individuals appointed by the League president. Resolutions approved by the policy committee and/or GRC are next considered by General Assembly. Resolutions disapproved or referred by both the policy committee and GRC will not proceed to the General Assembly. Resolutions approved by the General Assembly become League policy. Other action on resolutions can be: referred back to a policy committee; amended; disapproved; or, no action.

Voting Delegates

The League membership considers and takes action on resolutions that establish League policy. In order to vote at the Annual Business Meeting, your city council must designate a voting delegate. Your city

may also appoint up to two alternate voting delegates, one of whom may vote in the event that the designated voting delegate is unable to serve in that capacity.

A letter, along with the Voting Delegate form, asking for the designation of voting delegates and alternatives has been sent to all mayors, city managers, and city clerks. Additional information can be found on the League's <u>website</u>.

Late-Breaking Issues

Resolutions to address late-breaking issues may be introduced by petition at the annual conference. To qualify, a petitioned resolution must be signed by 10 percent of the voting delegates and submitted at least 24 hours before the beginning of the concluding General Assembly. The deadline is Sept. 13 by 12:30 p.m. All qualified petitioned resolutions are forwarded to the General Assembly for consideration, regardless of the action recommended by the GRC.

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Voters Overwhelmingly Approve Transportation Funding Protections; Support Parks and Water Infrastructure Investment, and Water Conservation Incentive

June 6, 2018

By passing Proposition 69 with 80.4 percent of the vote, Californians <u>unequivocally communicated</u> to the Legislature that they want their transportation funds protected and California's crumbling roads fixed.

<u>Voters in all of California's 58 counties</u> supported the passage of Prop. 69. The measure's strong accountability protections give voters and all California taxpayers' confidence that their money is only going to road repairs. On June 5, voters also passed two other League-supported measures, Prop. 68, the parks and water bond and Prop. 72, the rain water capture system investment incentive. Results on the <u>Secretary of State's website</u> show the powerful endorsement by California voters for the three League supported measures.

"Prop. 69 gives voters assurance that transportation funding will go directly toward improving their city streets and roads," said Rich Garbarino, president, League of California Cities and council member, South San Francisco. "That's what voters want and the overwhelming victory is a signal that fixing roads is a high priority for Californians."

However, the battle for transportation revenues is far from over. Voters will have another opportunity this year to protect transportation funds by rejecting a dangerous ballot measure, likely slated for November, which would repeal SB 1 and jeopardize thousands of projects underway to fix California's streets, roads, sidewalks, bridges and highways. Repealing SB 1 would halt road safety projects, worsening driving conditions, threatening public safety and increasing congestion. Ultimately, repealing SB 1 would cost taxpayers and every level of government more in the long-term.

Parks, Water Infrastructure Investments and Water Conservation Also Top Voters' Priorities

Prop. 68, the \$4 billion parks and water bond, passed with 56 percent of the vote. Voters endorsed more funding for cities to can invest in their parks. Each city will now receive at least \$200,000 for their parks and will also be eligible to apply for additional funding for local parks and water upgrades. Cities will be eligible to apply for other funding from the bond to fund parks, water improvements for safe drinking water, recycling and flood protection, and climate change adaption projects.

Prop. 72, which gives California property owners more incentive to invest in water conservation, passed with 83.3 percent of the vote. Starting on Jan. 1, 2019 property owners who install one of these systems will not see their property tax assessment value rise. With cycles of drought, water conservation is

imperative and this measure helps Californians conserve water by saving them money. California cities will also benefit from the sales tax revenues generated by the purchase of these systems.

Propositions 70 and 71, Mixed Results

The two measures on the June ballot that the League did not take a position on, had mixed results. Voters passed Prop. 71 (76.8 percent in support), which makes the effect date of ballot measures five days after results are certified. They rejected Prop. 70 (63.6 percent voting no), which would have required a one-time two-thirds vote to use revenues from the Cap-and-Trade auction.

Other Outcomes from Election Night

In addition to ballot measures, other closely tracked primary races begin to shape the November election:

- Democrat Lieutenant Governor Gavin Newsom will square off against Republican businessman John Cox for governor.
- U.S. Sen. Democrat Diane Feinstein will face a November challenge from state Sen. Kevin de León (D-Los Angeles).
- State Sen. Josh Newman (D-Fullerton) lost his effort to defend against a recall. It appears that former Republican Assembly Member Ling-Ling Chiang is likely to take this seat. This would reduce Democrat control of the state Senate to 26 votes, one below a two-thirds supermajority.
- Former Assembly Republican Leader Chad Mayes (R-Yucca Valley) held off several Republican primary challengers and appears likely to keep his seat in November, while Prop. 70, a measure he negotiated as part of last year's Cap-and-Trade agreement failed.

Education reformer Marshall Tuck has a slight edge over Democrat Assembly Member Democrat Tony Thurmond for Superintendent of Public Instruction, which will lead to a redo of this contest in November.

Additionally, the Legislature is working on the FY 2018-19 budget, which must be sent to Gov. Jerry Brown by June 15. The League will continue monitoring several bills affecting cities.
