OBJECTIVE

To provide an update on the Wesley Village project by Jamboree Housing (Jamboree).

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Below is a brief construction review of the recent meeting held on July 15, 2016:

- <u>Building A</u> (31 units): Foundation and garage columns have been formed and poured; forms for columns have been stripped off; and backfilling is occurring around the perimeter concrete masonry unit walls in preparation for installing scaffolding to support future podium deck pour.
- <u>Buildings B and C</u> (16 units + Headstart building): Foundations are in and lines are snapped in preparation for the start of framing; and framing was resequenced to follow the installation of the internal street and parking lot.

City staff has received concerns regarding construction start times, road access, debris from construction, and private property notification from residents in the surrounding neighborhood. Jamboree respects their neighbors and immediately started to address the concerns. In an effort to do so, they will be attending the Homeowners Association (HOA) meeting scheduled for August 10, 2016. The development team will follow up, and report to City staff, on the resolution of this issue.

City staff is in the process of updating the contact information on the Limon litigation plaintiffs. Staff will work with Jamboree to ensure that the units in the Wesley Village project are offered to the plaintiffs first.

SUMMARY

Jamboree remains on track for their March 2017 completion date on the Wesley Village project. A detailed Schedule of Performance is also provided.

OBJECTIVE

To provide information on anticipated motorists', residents' and local business owners' frustration and objections to the traffic impacts resulting from the simultaneous construction of subject projects.

BACKGROUND

- ❖ The pavement condition index identifies that both Knott Street and Valley View Street are in a failed condition and have the lowest ratings in the city, therefore having the greatest need for reconstruction.
- ❖ Valley View Street from Tiffany Avenue to Chapman Avenue was recently reconstructed in 2014. This new and very short segment near the freeway was not included as part of that project since it is located within Caltrans right-of-way. However, this short segment was later found to be the City's responsibility per Caltrans' Freeway Maintenance Agreement.
- ❖ Both Knott Street and Valley View Street are Major Arterial Highways with three travel lanes in each direction.
- Both streets are lined with businesses that will be impacted by the project.
- The Knott Street project length is about 0.6 mile and the Valley View Street project length is about 250 feet.
- Staff has analyzed the street and supporting soils conditions and street reconstruction methods and determined that a process called full-depth reclamation (FDR) is the best method to rehabilitate the streets.
- ❖ The project was advertised on May 6 and was awarded on June 14, 2016. The awarded amount is \$2,061,972.50.
- ❖ Knott Street construction is scheduled to begin on July 27th. The approximate start for Valley View Street is August/September. We anticipate all work to be complete in mid-November.

DISCUSSION

- Work on Knott Street will be prioritized ahead of Valley View. However, construction on both streets, to a certain extent, will occur simultaneously (i.e. once concrete work has been completed on one street, then concrete work will begin on the next street). The proximity of the projects will minimize the overall cost and construction time.
- During pavement reconstruction, traffic on either Knott Street or Valley View Street will be limited to one lane in each direction – a severe constriction from the normal three lanes in each direction. Both streets will not be down to one lane simultaneously. At least one of the streets shall have a minimum of two travel lanes open in both directions. All forms of pavement resurfacing or reconstruction including the FDR process necessitate this lane reduction.
 - Staff will work with the contractor to devise a construction phasing plan to minimize the traffic impacts.
- The pavement reconstruction will take a little bit longer to complete than traditional methods due the curing time required for the cement treated base materials.
- ❖ Pacifica High School on Knott Street starts September 1. These projects will be in full construction mode at that time. With ongoing construction operations, we anticipate that this will frustrate some parents who have not considered the construction project in the transport of their children to school.
- Advanced notice of the construction project will be delivered to all properties fronting Knott Street and Valley View Street in a letter from the contractor in advance of construction start.
- Pacifica High School will disseminate the advanced notice to all parents and students via email.
- Advanced warning of the construction project will be communicated to motorists with electronic changeable message signs on the street in advance of construction start.
- Weekly construction updates will be posted on multiple Citywide Facebook accounts.

GG police to hold DUI checkpoint on July 30

The Garden Grove Police Department Traffic Unit will be conducting a DUI/Driver License Checkpoint on July 30 at an undisclosed location within the city limits between the hours of 9 p.m. and 3 a.m.

The deterrent effect of DUI checkpoints is a proven resource in reducing the number of persons killed and injured in alcohol or drug involved crashes. Research shows that crashes involving an impaired driver can be reduced by up to 20 percent when well-publicized DUI checkpoints and proactive DUI patrols are conducted routinely.

DUI checkpoints are placed in locations based on collision statistics and frequency of DUI arrests, affording the greatest opportunity for achieving drunk and drugged driving deterrence. Locations are chosen with safety considerations for the officers and the public.

In California, this deadly crime led to 867 deaths and over 23,000 serious injuries in 2013 because someone failed to designate a sober

driver. Nationally, the latest data shows over 10,000 were killed by an impaired driver.

Over the course of the past three years, officers have investigated 693 DUI collisions which have claimed nine lives and resulted in another 225 injuries.

Officers will be looking for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment with officers checking drivers for proper licensing delaying motorists only momentarily. When possible, specially trained officers will be available to evaluate those suspected of drug-impaired driving, which now accounts for a growing number of impaired driving crashes.

Recent statistics reveal that 30. percent of drivers in fatal crashes had one or more drugs in their systems. A study of active drivers showed more tested positive for drugs that may impair driving (14 percent) than did for alcohol (7.3) percent). Of the drugs, marijuana was most prevalent, at 7.4 percent, slightly more than alcohol. Everyone should be mindful that if you're taking medication - whether prescription or over-the-counter drinking even small amounts of alcohol can greatly intensify the impairment affects.

Law enforcement emphasizes the preventable nature of drunk driving

reminding everyone that all it takes is a little planning ahead. Designate a sober driver or call a cab. But whatever you do, don't drink and drive.

The California Office of Traffic Safety DDVIP mobile app is now available for free download on iOS and Android devices. Launched last year, the DDVIP app offers enhanced features, allowing users to "Map a Spot" with their current location to find DDVIP partnering establishments in their area or a "List of Spots" to search all participating bars and restaurants throughout California.

Users will be offered free incentives at each bar to celebrate their life saving role. They can stay up to date with the latest from DDVIP and see what other users are saying via its social tab. Also through the app, for those who want to imbibe but also make it a point to plan ahead, users can easily order a sober ride from Uber, Lyft or Curb – all from one screen.

Drivers caught driving impaired can expect the impact of a DUI arrest to include jail time, fines, fees, DUI classes, other expenses that can exceed \$10,000 not to mention the embarrassment when friends and family find out.

Funding for this checkpoint is provided to Garden Grove Police Department by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Traffic accident

The Garden Grove Police
Department was dispatched to a
traffic accident that occurred on
Euclid Street just north of Garden Grove Boulevard last week.

The calling party reported there had been an injury traffic accident involving a vehicle and a pedestrian.

Officers and members of the Garden Grove Fire Department arrived at the accident scene and found the collision had occurred in the No. 3 lane of north-bound Euclid Street just north of Garden Grove Boulevard.

The investigation found that a 53-year-old female was crossing eastbound across Euclid Street in an area not marked as a crosswalk. The female was struck by a black 2007 Scion two door, driven by a 21-year old male. The female suffered what appeared to be possible life threatening injuries and was provided medical aid by the Garden Grove Fire Department prior to being taken to UCI Medical center for further medical treatment.

The driver of the Scion remained at the scene and cooperated with traffic investigators. It does not appear at this time that alcohol or drugs were involved with the driver of the Scion. The investigation is ongoing.

City plans street upgrades on Knott, Valley View

Traffic on both streets will be reduced to one lane starting in August

Knott Street, from Garden Grove Boulevard to Lampson Avenue, is set to undergo street improvements beginning this week through October. Also, a small segment on Valley View Street, from the 22 Freeway westbound off-ramp to Tiffany Avenue, is tentatively set to undergo improvements from August through December.

Updates and construction dates will be posted weekly on the city's Facebook and Twitter pages.

Motorists are advised that traffic on Knott and Valley View streets will be reduced to one lane to facilitate construction work. Work hours are 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. There will be no parking allowed in the construction zone. Access to businesses and residences along the construction area will be maintained at all times.

The improvements at both locations consist of full depth roadway reclamation and cement treatment, full depth asphalt replacement, replacement of curb and gutter, bus pad and handicap ramps, installation of video detection system, traffic signal detectors and installation of irrigation and landscaping.

Valley View Street, from Tiffany Avenue to Chapman Avenue, was reconstructed in 2014. This small Orange County News July 27, 2016

segment was not included in the 2014 project, due to its location within the Caltrans right-of-way. The segment was later determined to be the city's responsibility per a maintenance agreement with Caltrans.

The Garden Grove City Council awarded the \$2 million project to RJ Noble Company of Orange on June 14. The street rehabilitation project is included in the 2015-16 Capital Improvement Budget and is funded by federal Regional Surface Transportation Program, Measure M2 and local and gas tax funds.

Rotarians donated device to GG schools; one was used after student suffered cardiac arrest

Do you know your Rotary Club?

If you don't, maybe it's time to update you. Especially since the club recently helped saved a high school student's life.

More on that later.

The Garden Grove Rotary Club meets weekly on Wednesdays at noon in the Marriott Hotel at the southwest corner of Harbor Boulevard and Chapman Avenue.

Speaker for July 20 was Tom Moon, with Pacific Moon Real Estate, addressing current real estate issues and detailing how club members can avoid the myriad of scams threatening the community.

Moon was informative, interesting and entertaining, holding the audience's attention for the length of his talk, with much laughter; his father was a Rotarian before him. Each week, the club invites different professionals to speak.

What is a Rotarian? Do they act or look different? Would you know one if you saw him or her?

Rotarians have a motto and a "Four Way Test."

The Rotary motto is, "Service Above Self" and the Four-way Test is the cornerstone of the group's work.

During each meeting, Rotarians remember and repeat: Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it build good will and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Rotarians are ordinary business

and professional leaders throughout the world who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards and help to build goodwill and peace in the world.

It's in that vein that the Garden Grove Rotary reported its distribution of Automated External Defibrillators (AED) recently with a very successful outcome, according to member Scott Weimer.

Recently, on the athletic field of Bolsa Grande High School, a 16-year-old student experienced sudden cardiac arrest.

"In speaking with the Garden Grove Fire Station following the emergency call to the high school, we were able to confirm the student had been in full cardiac arrest and that the AED was deployed twice by the coach, along with CPR, helping the student regain a heartbeat and pulse before being taken to the hospital," said Weimer.

"AEDs do save lives."

The student is now back home with a new Implanted Cardioverter Defibrillator and is doing well.

Weimer said studies reveal that each day in the United States, more than a 1,000 citizens experience sudden cardiac arrest, with

more than 50 percent never having heart problems.


"Please keep your skills up and always be ready for the unexpected," he tells other

Mosquitoes in 3 more O.C. cities test positive for West Nile virus

SANTA ANA • Samples of mosquitoes collected in Santa Ana, Costa Mesa and Dana Point tested positive Tuesday for West Nile.

The three cities join a growing list topped by La Habra, which has recorded 15 samples testing positive for the virus, according to Jared Dever of the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District.

Two years ago, Santa Ana was "more or less the epicenter of West Nile virus activity," Dever said. This year, the city had not had any positive samples until Tuesday, he said.

Anaheim has recorded five positive samples, and Orange has had three, Dever said. The other cities that have seen signs of the virus this year are Garden Grove, Irvine, La Palma, Mission Viejo, Seal Beach, Tustin, Stanton and Yorba Linda.

There have been no reports of the virus being transmitted to people.

Officials say the highest activity of mosquitoes feeding is at dawn and dusk. They recommend repellents such as DEET, picaridin or lemon-oil eucalyptus.

Funding plan for OC Streetcar climbs \$9 million

orange County Transportation officials on Monday tation Authority. They inapproved an increased capital funding plan for the OC North Ross Street between Streetcar project ahead of a West Santa Ana Boulevard deadline to secure a federal and West Fourth Street for grant.

With 30 percent of the design completed, the OC Streetcar, with 10 stops in Santa Ana and east Garden Grove, has seen a 3 percent – \$9 million – cost increase, to \$297.9 million.

The increase is owed to elements that will enhance system operations and

maintenance, said Mary Shavalier, OC Streetcar project manager for the Orange County Transportation Authority. They include additional track on North Ross Street between West Santa Ana Boulevard and West Fourth Street for a shortened route, improving a maintenance facility and adding a "truing" machine, to correct imperfections in wheels that occur over time.

Transportation authority staff plans to submit the revised capital funding plan, which only OCTA board member Todd Spitz-

er opposed, to the Federal Transportation Administration by the Sept, 2 deadline for the next round of New Starts program analysis. In February, President Barack Obama, under New Starts, included \$125 million for the streetcar in his proposed federal budget for the 2016-17 fiscal year. OCTA is seeking about \$148.5 million in New Starts money.

"It's a very small adjustment, I think, in the overall project to fit into the requirements of the FTA," Darrell Johnson, OCTA's CEO, said of the revised funding plan.

But Spitzer said he was "beyond frustrated" by the change and referred to the CenterLine light-rail project in central Orange County to John Wayne Airport that failed about a decade ago.

"Rail in general has had a very difficult history in this county," Spitzer said. "To see this kind of change at 30 percent (design completion) when the support of some (OCTA) directors is not that solid is very disconcerting."

OCTA applied for \$40 million from the state capand-trade program and expects a decision on the funding in mid-August.

The workshop will introduce potential Garden Grove homeowners to the basic steps of home buying, including how to qualify for a home mortgage, as well as information on financial assistance programs offered through the City.

The City currently offers a State of California Proposition 1C-funded CalHome loan. The loan is designed to assist qualified low- and very low-income families with covering the difference between a qualifying mortgage amount, and the actual price of a single-family mobile home. The CalHome loan is a 30-year deferred payment loan requiring no monthly payments, not exceeding \$60,000, and accruing three-percent simple annual interest for the life of the loan.

The next workshop dates are scheduled on August 13, September 24, and December 3.







Through the Illegal Disposal Site Abatement Grant program, CalRecycle allocates up \$1 million per year to public entities, with a maximum of \$500,000 per grant. Matching funds are not required. Additional information is available on the <u>CalRecycle website</u>.

Among recent recipients of the Illegal Disposal Site Abatement Grants were the cities of Santa Rosa and Petaluma, which used the funding as part of their larger efforts to address homelessness. Much of the CalRecycle funding was used to clean up encampments generating trash and waste that ended up in the creeks and other waterways in those communities.

In prioritizing sites to receive available funding, CalRecycle considers the following:

- Degree of risk to public health and safety and the environment;
- Ability of the owner to clean up the site without monetary assistance;
- CalRecycle's ability to adequately remediate the site with available funds;
- Amount of contributions of money and/or in-kind services from governments or responsible parties; and
- Ability to obtain site access.

Illegal Disposal Site Abatement Grants are one of four portions of CalRecycle's Solid Waste Site Cleanup Program.

Created in 1994, the Solid Waste Site Cleanup Program aims to address the cleanup of solid waste disposal sites for which the responsible party cannot be identified or is unable or unwilling to pay for timely cleanup needed to protect public health, public safety or the environment.

Three other types of funding are available:

- CalRecycle-Managed Cleanup: CalRecycle is authorized to spend funds directly to
 investigate and/or remediate sites where the responsible party (public and in some cases
 private) is unwilling or willing but does not have the necessary resources or expertise to
 implement the cleanup in a timely manner.
- Legacy Disposal Site Abatement Grant: Public entities may receive financial
 assistance in the form of reimbursement grants up to \$750,000 to assist with remediating
 old solid waste disposal sites and protecting public health and safety and the
 environment.
- Loans to Local Governments: Loans up to \$1,000,000 per site are available to local governments that demonstrate that site remediation is needed to protect public health and safety and the environment and that the local government has the ability to repay the loan.

Hemet's General Fund revenues dropped by 29 percent during the recession, which prompted service reductions as well as a 31 percent reduction in staffing. Despite those expenditure cuts, Hemet continues to operate with a structural budget deficit. In 2013, city leaders concluded that closing the deficit would require either further service reductions, taxpayer approval of additional revenues, or both. However, when input from the city's customers was most needed many departments had no customer feedback mechanism and the public had little data to evaluate their value of their services. This need prompted the city to launch what has become a successful effort to bring residents into the city's planning process.

The city decided to implement a two-pronged strategy in February 2014 to engage the community in evaluating city services and inform them of the how their tax dollars are being put to use. The city manager first directed all city departments to regularly solicit point-of-service customer feedback using a customer survey designed by the city's executive team. The <u>survey</u> can be completed as a hard copy or electronically, after the city services are rendered. The completed customer surveys are summarized quarterly, reviewed by the entire executive team, and posted on the city's website.

The second strategy focuses on a Strategic Management Program in which every city department established a mission statement, goals, measurable objectives, performance indicators, and performance targets. Performance data is reported quarterly, showing every performance objective and whether the city is meeting its performance targets or falling short. This

performance data is reviewed by the entire executive team and is also posted on the city's website.

Just 37 individuals responded to the survey initially, which was much less than staff had hoped would be submitted. However, as departments placed greater emphasis on requesting feedback and increased its response rate, the volume greatly increased. In the 13 months after customer surveying was implemented, 1,509 surveys were completed with 91 percent of the residents rating the quality of services as a "4" or "5" on a five-point scale, where "1" means poor and "5" means excellent. The customer ratings and additional comments have been very helpful to the city in identifying where it meets customer expectations and where it can improve.

The quarterly reporting of how the city is performing in relation to its performance targets has set a high standard for accountability and transparency. It has also given the city's executive team a performance dashboard it had not previously had to evaluate its service performance and identify where intervention is needed to improve outcomes. The performance objectives and targets also enhance the annual budget process by quantifying what the community can expect in terms of the services it provides for the resources invested in them.

CalPERS Names Marcie Frost as New Chief Executive Officer

The <u>California Public Employees' Retirement System</u> (CalPERS) Board of Administration announced last week that it has named Marcie Frost as the pension fund's new Chief Executive Officer (CEO).

Frost, 51, is a 16-year veteran of the pension industry, having most recently served as the executive director of the Washington State Department of Retirement Systems (DRS). She will start her new role with CalPERS on Oct. 3, replacing Anne Stausboll who retired at the end of June. Doug Hoffner will serve in the interim.

As CEO, Frost will oversee the system's operations, which include 2,870 employees, a budget of more than \$1.7 billion, and programs spanning retirement benefits administration, health care delivery, investments, finance and risk management, actuarial services, supplemental retirement programs, legislative affairs, stakeholder relations, and numerous support functions.

Frost's career spans executive level positions in public pension administration, human resources and information technology. She joined DRS in 2000 and held leadership roles in human resources, information services, and operations. She was deputy director for the retirement systems for four years before being appointed executive director in 2013. She also serves as an ex officio member of the Washington State Investment Board.

She began her public service career as a Benefits Administrator with the Washington State Department of Labor and Industries managing compensation and benefit programs for public employees across 26 locations. Frost is a native Washingtonian and is pursuing dual bachelors and master's degree in public administration from Evergreen State College.

Economic Development, Public Safety Top Issues for Nation's Mayors, According to National League of Cities Report

Economic Development Remains Most Critical Issue for Third Consecutive Year

For the third consecutive year, economic development remained the top issue for the nation's mayors, according to a comprehensive analysis of mayoral state of the city speeches released today by the National League of Cities (NLC). In the 2016 State of the Cities report, which examines state of the city speeches in 100 cities representing a diverse cross section of population sizes and geographic regions, public safety replaced infrastructure as the second most-discussed issue. The state of the city speech is a mayor's opportunity to reflect on their city's recent accomplishments, address current challenges and present a roadmap for the future.

As the biggest issue on mayors' agendas, economic development was mentioned in 75 percent of mayoral speeches. Following closely behind is public safety and city budgets at 70 percent and 52 percent, respectively. The full list of top issues for 2014, 2015 and 2016 are available in the report.

This year's State of the Cities report reveals the following trends:

- Mayors continue to focus on improving their local economies and encouraging entrepreneurship;
- Mayors are seeing improved revenue and are being judicious about how to spend it;
- Mayors are cautiously optimistic about the future and are leading in the development of sustainable communities where people want to live;
- Mayors are concerned about the uptick in the murder rate even though overall crime rates are historically low;
- Mayors are concerned about the increasing opioid epidemic; and
- Mayors are helping their cities see the value of using technology and date to drive decisions and make their city governments more efficient and effective.
