Another uphill battle for Bao Nguyen

The No. 2 primary vote-getter faces longtime politico Lou Correa.

Bao Nguyen beat the odds just to make it onto the November ballot as a congressional candidate.

And if he beats fellow Democrat Lou Correa next month, it will be an upset of upsets even for the Vietnamese American community, an ethnic enclave that has pushed several underdogs to victory over the years.

"Bao Nguyen's a new-generation, millennial Vietnamese candidate who did really well to come in se-



cond in the primary," said Jodi Balma, a political scientist at Fullerton College.
"But he's far behind Lou Correa."
In the eight-

candidate primary, Correa won 44 percent of the primary vote while Nguyen received 15 percent.

The two are vying to replace Rep. Loretta Sanchez, D-Orange, who is stepping down to run for U.S. Senate. While both are Democrats running in the heavily Democratic central county district, there are clear differences in policy, fundraising, endorsements, experience and personality.

Correa, 58, is a political veteran who served continuously in the state Legislature and on the county

Board of Supervisors from 1998 to 2014. He was among the most moderate Democrats during his 14 years in the Legislature – particularly on social and environmental issues – and has touted his ability to work across the aisle.

"This is a Democratic district, but people don't care if you're a Republican or Democrat," he said, noting that he's supporting a Republican candidate for Anaheim City School District and that the county supervisor and state senator representing the district are both Republicans. "The people want somebody who can get the job done."

As of the most recent filing period, Correa had raised \$591,000 to Nguyen's \$197,000. While Correa's bipartisan attitude has occasionally attracted the scorn of Democratic leaders, he won the endorsement of

the California Democratic Party.

Nguyen, 36, holds that endorsement against both him and the party, portraying Correa as a career politican who's part of the establishment machine at a time when an overhaul of the political system is needed. Correa has backed Hillary Clinton for president from the outset. Nguyen – mayor of Garden Grove since 2014 – was a Bernie Sanders supporter and has been endorsed by Progressive Democrats of America, whose agenda closely mirrors Sanders'.

"I represent the change voters want to see – holding government accountable to serving the interest of the people, not that of big corporate interests," said Nguyen, who served on the Garden Grove Unified

School District before being elected Garden Grove mayor in 2014. "And I hope they'll support the underdog."

History of upsets

In his young political career, Nguyen has gotten accustomed to running from behind.

On Election Night in 2014, he trailed incumbent Garden Grove Mayor Bruce Broadwater by some 400 votes, but prevailed by 15 votes after late mail-in ballots were tallied.

In June's top-two open primary, Nguyen was in third place on election night, trailing by about 1,300 votes. He ended up qualifying for the fall ballot by more than 1,800 votes. In both the 2014 and June races, he was the underdog.


Nguyen faces an even steeper climb in next month's election, as reflected by Correa's 29 percentage point advantage in the primary.

"Lou just has a huge advantage," Balma said.

But Vietnamese candidates have produced their share of election surprises, starting with Tony Lam's 1992 landmark election to the Westminster City Council and Van Tran's 2004 victory that made him the first Vietnamese in the state Legislature.

Some of the most dramatic wins have come against Democrats and Latinos.

In the 2007 race for the county supervisor spot vacated when Correa was elected to the state Senate, two Vietnamese Republicans made the runoff over a better-known Democrat and a Latino favored by many GOP leaders. The eventual winner by seven votes, Janet Nguyen, was elected in 2014 to the state Senate over Latino Assem-

blyman Jose Solorio, a Democrat.

In the 2015 special election to fill Nguyen's supervisor's seat, the better-known Correa faced former Garden Grove Councilman Andrew Do and lost by 43 votes.

The Correa-Do race followed the pattern of Vietnamese voters turning out in large numbers when one of their own was on the ballot. While Latino voters accounted for 36 percent of the district's registered voters and Vietnamese made up 25 percent, Vietnamese cast 44 percent of the ballots and Latinos just 19 percent, according to the voter research firm Political Data Inc.

But Bao Nguyen is not the typical Vietnamese candidate.

Unlike Lam, Tran, Do and Janet Nguyen, Bao Nguyen is a Democrat. Vietnamese under 37 in the county are more likely to be Democrats than Republicans, but those over 45 are more staunchly Republican – and are traditionally more likely to vote

than their younger counterparts.


But perhaps the biggest issue working ethnic against Nguven involves the boundaries of the current district. Much of Little Saigon including Nguyen's current home were in the district until the 2010 redistricting. Just 13 percent of the new district's registered voters are Asian – and just 7 percent are Vietnamese - while 47 percent are Latino, according to Political Data estimates.

Nguyen currently lives just outside the district. District residency is not required of congressional candidates.

Immigrant families

Since his successful campaign for state Assembly in 1998, Correa has emphasized his deep roots in the blue-collar community. He grew up in Anaheim, where his mother worked as a hotel maid and his father held a union job on an assembly line making boxes. Both emigrated from Mexico.

Correa was the first in his family to graduate from high school, going on to earn MBA and law degrees from UCLA. He's lived in the district nearly his entire life.

Nguyen, who's endorsed by the Sierrra Club, has attacked his opponent for a voting record that has landed him a 54 percent lifetime rating from the California League of Conservation Voters.

But Correa, who's endorsed by the Orange County Business Council, emphasizes a balance of business and jobs needs with environmental concerns.

"I was lucky I made it through high school and college," Correa said. "Many of my friends and neighbors that I grew up with are struggling to achieve the American dream. They're living paycheck to paycheck. People want good jobs. People want a good education for their kids so they can move up and achieve the American dream."

While both candidates

favor abortion rights, only Correa supports requiring parental notification before a minor gets an abortion. Unlike Nguyen, Correa has opposed expanding the state's definition of assault weapons.

Another difference is Nguyen's support for legalizing recreational marijuana. Correa has remained neutral. Both candidates support Medicare for all Americans and free public college tuition.

Nguyen, who was born in a Thai refugee camp after his parents escaped from Vietnam in the late 1970s, says his immigrant experience has been key to his world and political outlook.

After short stints in Nashville and San Jose, his family settled in Orange County, where his mother worked as a maid and cared for children while his father's odd jobs ranged from collecting recyclables to working as a teacher's aide.

When he was 12 and going through the citizenship process, Nguyen says an

immigration official asked him if he wanted "Bob" or another "American name" on his citizenship certificate.

"My name is American," he said he told the official.

Nguyen went on to get degrees in political science at UC Irvine and Indo-Tibetan Buddhist Studies at Colorado's Naropa University. Along the way, he became engrossed with the Latino experience and has been active in the Latino community.

He speaks Vietnamese and Spanish, and worked as a union organizer until the end of 2015, when he left to focus full-time on being mayor and running for Congress.

"The Vietnamese American experience is very similar to the Latino American experience," he said, pointing to challenges related to immigration and assimilation. "The issues I'm passionate about bridge different communities."

Looking at rethinking cities: transportation forum is afoot

rainiac likes to walk around town, though it's been a little bit now since e finished our treks back and forth through our cies on Westminster Avene and Garden Grove pulevard.

On those walks, which atured in past Brainiac dumns as we strolled one ile at a time, we often iped about how unappaling the old ways of uran design had left our reets and sidewalks. But two, there's a move afoot—in partly intended—to ad ways to reshape parts—our communities—to

make them more friendly for people walk or bike or simply hang out a bit.

It's billed as an Active Transportation Forum, which isn't the most exciting title, but the ideas to be discussed on Friday at the Garden Grove Community Meeting Center are actually pretty awesome.

Here's the basic idea: We in Orange County gave our streets over to motor vehicles decades ago as our communities grew, and now we're left with tons of pavement roadways and not a lot of inviting places to go. Our downtowns – with a few exceptions – aren't actually anywhere.

Garden Grove has a bit of what used to be common for downtowns on Main Street, but can you name the equivalent in Westminster? In Stanton?

Active transportation more or less means adding people-powered movement to our lives. Walkers and bikers can comfortably fit in with cars and trucks and buses. Downtowns can have street life. sidewalk cafes, cultural opportunities. The big boulevards can be retooled to provide a more vibrant sense of public space and civic life.

The forum hosted by Alliance for Healthy Orange

County runs from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Friday at the community center at II300 Stanford Ave. in Garden Grove.

The keynote speaker is Daniel lacofano, a planner and designer whose firm has 30 years or experience reworking downtowns, building transit-oriented projects and creating a neighborhood feel in urban centers such as Dallas, Washington D.C. and Anchorage.

Also featured during the forum is Orange County developer Shaheen Sadeghi, who came up with the concept of the "antimall" with the Lab shopping center in Costa Mesa, expanded on that with the Packing House and Center Street Promenade in Anaheim, and is next set to work on a project around the Garden Grove Civic Center.

His projects fit nicely with the idea of liveable city spaces in that they've typically taken existing places and redesigned them for modern uses such as shopping and dining with an eye toward creating a sense of place that often got left out as our communities rapidly emerged from the farmlands of the past.

Aaron Paley, who has consulted with the city of Garden Grove on past Open Streets events – programs designed to get people out of their cars and into the streets in a broad sense – will also be part of the forum.

Time to prep for Big One

City to hold drills as part of Great California Shakeout

An earthquake is predicted for Oct. 20 at 10:20 a.m. At 10:20 on 10/20, a pretend earthquake will happen, and schools and government offices will participate in the Great California Shakeout, a drill to test our readiness for the Big One.

The San Andreas Fault line that runs through California is expected to be the location of a huge earthquake in Southern California. For most of our lives, residents have been warned that "The Big One is Coming." Most of us have pack supplies and try not to worry.

Employees from the City of Westminster at City Hall and the police and fire stations will participate in the annual disaster drill.

"Announcements will be made over the loudspeaker system, said Sgt. Jim Kingsmill. "Office workers will get under desks or other safe locations."

"We may do an evacuation drill after the earthquake drill," said Ellen Lopez, Westminster Police Department emergency management coordinator.

"We are waiting for confirmation that the evacuation drill will occur," said Kingsmill, "The 911 operators will stay at their desks: they will handle calls, as usual."

The drill, a statewide event called "Drop, Cover, and Hold On" is expected to be the state's largest earthquake drill ever. Homeowners and local residents are encouraged to participate with their families and coworkers, using the time after the drill concludes to discuss future emergency planning.

The Westminster Police Department has provided the following instructions for the drill: Register your neighborhood, business or organization at ShakeOut.org/ California/register; download a drill broadcast recording from the same location; have a drill at 10:20 a.m. on 10/20; discuss what you learned, then make improvements.

Police and fire departments recommend that residents and business owners perform a hazard hunt, looking for items that may fall during an earthquake cell phones with chargers, then secure them; create a personal and family disaster plan; organize or refresh your emergency supply kit; identify and fix

any structural issues; and perform other actions found at www. EarthquakeCountry.org.

FEMA, the Red Cross and ready.gov have created suggested lists of emergency supplies to have on hand. Review the list and get your kit ready before the Shake Out event so you can be prepared in the event of a real earthquake, fire or other serious disaster. Why? Because local police, fire, hospital and other resources can be overwhelmed saving lives and not immediately available to help with food, water and other supplies of daily living. Once your kit is ready, plan to resupply every October before the drill.

A combined list of supplies from the three organizations includes: one gallon of water per person, per day; a three-day supply of non-perishable food, battery-powered or hand-crank radio and NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both; flashlight and extra batteries; First Aid kit; whistle to signal for help; dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place; moist towelettes. garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation; wrench or pliers to turn off utilities; can opener for food; maps of Orange, Los Angeles and San Diego counties:

Recommended food supplies include: foods that will not make you thirsty, salt-free crackers, whole grain cereals and canned happens, you will be ready.

food with high liquid content, protein or fruit bars, peanut butter, dry cereal or granola, dried fruit, nuts, canned juices, non-perishable pasteurized milk, high energy foods, vitamins, food for infants, comfort/stress foods

and pet food.

Additional items: medications, multi-purpose tool, copies of personal documents (medication list, medical information, proof of address, deed or lease to home, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies), matches, rain gear, bleach, blankets and/or sleeping bags, tent, work gloves. latex or vinyl gloves, paper plates, cutlery and cups.

There are many other items you may want to include such as toys and games for the kids, a deck of cards, and printed information on how to sanitize items and purify water for drinking, a list of phone numbers for friends and relatives, and cash in small bills, since many businesses may not have change for larger bills. Check online for ideas, then decide what makes sense for your family.

Plan ahead for Oct. 20. Gather your emergency supplies and create a kit. Organize your neighborhood, family and co-workers to participate in the drill.

When possible, take a First Aid and CPR class in case you need to save your family or friends after a disaster. If you do each of these tasks, you will feel more empowered and when the real Big One

Underdog Nguyen seeking one more upset

Correa 'just has a huge advantage,' one expert says.

Bao Nguyen beat the odds just to make it onto the November ballot as a con-

gressional candidate.



And if he beats fellow Democrat Lou Correa next month, it will be an

upset of upsets even for the Vietnamese American community, an ethnic enclave that has pushed several underdogs to victory over the years.

"Bao Nguyen's a newgeneration, millennial Vietnamese candidate who did really well to come in second in the primary," said Jodi Balma, a political scientist at Fullerton College. "But he's far behind Lou Correa." In the eight-candidate primary, Correa won 44 percent of the primary vote while Nguyen received 15 percent.

The two are vying to replace Rep. Loretta Sanchez, D-Orange, who is stepping down to run for U.S. Senate. While both are Democrats running in the heavily Democratic central county district, there are clear differences in policy, fundraising, endorsements, experience and personality.

veteran who served continuously in the state Legislature and on the county Board of Supervisors from 1998 to 2014. He was among the most moderate Democrats during his 14 years in the Legislature – particularly on social and environmental issues – and has touted his ability to work across the aisle.

"This is a Democratic district but people don't care if you're a Republican or Democrat," he said, noting that he's supporting a Republican candidate for Anaheim City School District and that the county supervisor and state senator representing the district are both Republicans. "The people want somebody who can get the job done."

As of the most recent filing period, Correa had raised \$591,000 to Nguyen's \$197,000. While his bipartisan attitude has occasionalwattracted the scorn of Democratic leaders, he won The endorsement of the California Democratic Party. Nguyen, 36, holds that endorsement against both Mim and the party, portraying Correa as a career politican who's part of the establishment machine at a time when an overhaul of the political system is needed. Correa has backed Hil-Tary Clinton for president from the outset. Nguyen – mayor of Garden Grove since 2014 – was a Bernie Sanders supporter and has been endorsed by Progressive Democrats of America, whose agenda closely mirrors Sanders'.

"I represent the change voters want to see - holding government accountable to serving the interest of the people, not that of big corporate interests," said Nguyen, who served on the Garden Grove Unified School District before being elected Garden Grove mayor in 2014. "And I hope they'll support the underdog."

HISTORY OF UPSETS

In his young political career, Nguyen has gotten accustomed to running from behind.

On Election Night in 2014, he trailed incumbent Garden Grove Mayor Bruce Broadwater by some 400 votes, but prevailed by 15 votes after late mail ballots were tallied.

In June's top-two open primary, Nguyen was in third place on election night, trailing by about 1,300 votes. He ended up qualifying for the fall ballot by more than 1,800 votes. In both the 2014 and June races, he was the underdog.

Nguyen faces an even steeper climb in next month's election, as reflected by Correa's 29 percentage point advantage in the primary.

"Lou just has a huge advantage," Balma said.

But Vietnamese candidates have produced their share of election surprises, starting with Tony Lam's 1992 landmark election to the Westminster City Council and Van Tran's 2004 victory that made him the first Vietnamese in the state Legislature.

Some of the most dramatic wins have come against Democrats and Latinos.

In the 2007 race for the county supervisor spot va-


cated when Correa was elected to the state Senate, two Vietnamese Republicans made the runoff over a better-known Democrat and a Latino favored by many GOP leaders. The eventual winner by seven votes, Janet Nguyen, was elected in 2014 to the state Senate over Latino Assemblyman Jose Solorio, a Democrat.

In the 2015 special election to fill Nguyen's supervisor's seat, the better-known Correa faced former Garden Grove Councilman Andrew Do and lost by 43 votes.

The Correa-Do race followed the pattern of Vietnamese voters turning out in large numbers when one of their own was on the ballot. While Latino voters accounted for 36 percent of the district's registered voters and Vietnamese made up 25 percent, Vietnamese cast 44 percent of the ballots and Latinos just 19 percent, according to the voter research firm Political Data Inc.

Unlike Lam, Tran, Do and Janet Nguyen, Bao Nguyen is a Democrat. Vietnamese under 37 in the county are more likely to be Democrats than Republicans, but those over 45 are more staunchly Republican – and are traditionally more likely to vote than their younger counterparts.

But perhaps the biggest ethnic issue working against Nguyen involves the boundaries of the current district. Much of Little Saigon – including Nguyen's current home – were in the district until the 2010 redistricting. Just 13 percent of the new district's registered voters are Asian – and just 7 percent are Vietnamese – while 47 percent are Latino, according to Political Data estimates.

Nguyen currently lives just outside the district. District residency is not required of congressional candidates.

SANTA ANA • A Garden Grove man convicted of trying to bolster his gang reputation by randomly killing an innocent family man was sentenced Friday to 26 years to life in prison.

Orange County Superior Court Judge Patrick H. Donahue, at the Santa Ana courthouse, sentenced Daniel Perez-Munoz to 25 years to life for the unprovoked slaying of Phuong "Bob" Huynh, 52, as well as an extra year behind bars

for using a knife during the murder.

Huynh, a husband and father of a child and a step-

child, was stabbed several times and left to die on the pavement after he cut

through a dark lot in the 8100 block of Garden Grove Boulevard on his way home from a beer run on the evening of Jan. 11, 2014.

Perez-Munoz, a 23-yearold self-proclaimed member of an established Garden Grove street gang, was drinking with friends in the carport area of an adjacent Stanton apartment building when he spotted Huynh.

Witnesses told police that Perez-Munoz "hit up" Huynh by running up and demanding to know where he was from, a question that implied the older man had gang connections.

Before Huynh could respond, Perez-Munoz stabbed him several times,

Deputy District Attorney Mike Murray said.

Murray said Perez-Munoz wanted to show off for his gang associates.

"Bob Huynh did nothing but mind his own business and have the misfortune to take a shortcut across a vacant lot to get back to his fa-

mily," Murray told jurors this year during Perez-Munoz's weeklong trial.

During the trial, Perez-Munoz's attorney, Kelly Rozek, described the stabbing as an act of self-defense.

Rozek said Perez-Munoz believed that Huynh was "mad-dogging him," or staring him down, and that Huynh was reaching for a weapon.

Murray challenged both those assertions, contending that it was too dark and there was too much space between the two men for Perez-Munoz to have seen the expression on Huynh's face.

IMPORTANCE OF ALISO CANYON

The Aliso Canyon storage facility (Aliso Canyon) is critical to regional energy reliability during the summer and winter months. In addition to serving residential and commercial customers, it also fuels gas-fired power plants that are needed to meet regional electric demand during peak periods. Without Aliso Canyon, SoCalGas' ability to meet energy demand during peak periods is reduced, increasing the risk of natural gas curtailments for an entire region, potentially affecting electric generators, hospitals, large manufacturers, refineries, and other large users. In preparation for the winter, SoCalGas® is providing



technical support to a Joint Agency Team, similar to the summer technical assessment group, to determine potential issues in meeting winter gas demands.

SoCalGas is also working diligently to restore operations at Aliso Canyon, in compliance with the Division of Oil, Gas, and Geothermal Resources' (DOGGR) Order 1109 and as required by SB 380. In addition, we are using several operational enhancements and tools to monitor field operations, including, daily and weekly safety and equipment checks, daily infrared video scanning, and continuous pressure monitoring. In compliance with DOGGR regulations, gas will only flow through the inner tubing of the wells when operations resume, creating an additional layer of protection within the wells. Additionally, SoCalGas has implemented an Air Quality Notification Plan (PLAN) that allows members of the community to sign-up to receive real-time notifications in the event of a reportable release of air contaminants at Aliso Canyon.

ALISO CANYON WELL INSPECTIONS EFFORT

SoCalGas provides a well inspection report on the first and third Friday of every month to the Division of Oil, Gas, and Geothermal Resources (DOGGR).



In compliance with DOGGRs Order 1109, all 114 wells at the Aliso Canyon Storage Facility will undergo diagnostic tests during the inspection process. This is a two phased framework to safely bring the Aliso Canyon Storage Facility back online, DOGGR will review the phase one test results and approved wells will either move directly to phase two testing or be temporarily sealed and isolated from the reservoir until repaired or abandoned.



Wells that are temporarily idled in a safe condition will have a maximum of 12 months to complete the second phase of testing. This is a step required by DOGGR and does not mean the wells are unsafe or will not pass future inspections.



During phase two, each well will go through the series of enhanced testing to fully determine the safety and integrity of the well and whether it can be put back in service, repaired or abandoned.



If repairs are required, those will be made and the well will be retested under the phase two testing regime to determine that the well is safe to operate.



Only wells that pass the full battery of six DOGGR required tests will be considered for storage operations.

The well inspection process is divided into three distinct phases



All 114 wells at the Aliso Canyon Storage Facility are tested for:




A thermometer is lowered down the well on a weighted wire through the tubing to test for temperature variations. A temperature drop could indicate a leak.



The noise test is conducted as the wire is pulled back to the surface using a sensitive microphone to record and listen for sound frequency changes that might indicate a leak.


Phase 1 approved wells will either move directly to phase 2 testing or be temporarily sealed and isolated from the reservoir until phase 2 can take place. Phase 1 non-approved wells will be temporarily sealed and isolated from the reservoir and scheduled for repairs or permanent abandonment. This is a step required by DOGGR and does not mean the wells are unsafe or will not pass future inspections.




Wells that are temporarily sealed and isolated from the reservoir have a maximum of 12 months to complete phase 2 testing and be brought back in service or permanently abandoned.


The Division of Oil, Gas, and Geothermal Resources (DOGGR) must confirm in writing that all wells in the storage field have either completed and passed the full battery of tests required in the safety review, been taken out of service and isolated from the underground gas reservoir, or been permanently plugged and abandoned.

SPOTLIGHT ON SAFETY

New Infrared Methane Detection System

SoCalGas recently started work on an Infrared Methane Detection System that will soon be installed at the Aliso Canyon natural gas storage facility.

This new system includes eight pairs of infrared methane monitors, strategically placed near or at the facility's southern border, to detect methane as part of our overall effort to identify potential releases.

Once installed, SoCalGas will dedicate new staff in an operations center to provide around-the-clock monitoring of both the infrared methane monitors and the new well pressure monitoring devices.

We anticipate completion of the project in late October/early November.

Operational Enhancements at Aliso Canyon

Separately, additional daily patrols, and tools to monitor field operations are already providing added layers of protection and allowing for early detection of potential problems. These include daily and weekly patrols, safety and equipment checks, daily infrared video scanning, and continuous pressure monitoring.

Additionally, in compliance with new Division of Oil, Gas and Geothermal Resources (DOGGR) regulations, natural gas will only flow through the inner tubing of the wells when operations resume, creating an additional layer of protection within the wells.

Working Safely to Inspect and Resume Injection at Aliso Canyon

In an effort to support regional energy reliability and keep natural gas prices affordable for customers, SoCalGas continues to work with the DOGGR and the CPUC to complete a comprehensive safety review of the Aliso Canyon facility.

Well inspections are ongoing, in compliance with applicable regulations and state laws, and as of Friday, October 7, 2016:

- >> 114 (or 100 percent) of the active wells at Aliso Canyon have completed the first phase of required tests;
- 98 of those wells (or 86 percent) have moved on to the second phase of inspections;
- 29 wells have completed all of the required tests, and 27 wells have received final DOGGR approval.

The CPUC has directed SoCalGas to maintain a minimum withdrawal capacity at Aliso Canyon to reduce the risk of natural gas shortages.

Before SoCalGas can resume injections, DOGGR must certify that the conditions of its comprehensive safety review have been met. The CPUC must also determine the field is safe to operate.

At that point, DOGGR and the CPUC will begin the certification and review process, which will include a public meeting. Once that process is complete and is approved by DOGGR and the CPUC, SoCalGas will be authorized to resume natural gas injections into the reservoir, as outlined in DOGGR's Order 1109 and SB380.

KEEPING THE COMMUNITY INFORMED

Sign Up for Air Quality Notifications

Recently, SoCalGas launched a new Air Quality Notification system. The notification system allows members of the community to sign-up to receive notifications-via phone call, text message, and/or emailin the event of a reportable release of natural gas from SoCalGas equipment at Aliso Canyon.

Community notifications were issued for the first time on September 12, 2016, when a very minor leak was discovered in an 8-inch aboveground pipe at Aliso. The source was quickly isolated and the release stopped within three hours of detection. The line was taken out of service and will be kept out of service until repairs are made.

New Community Advisory Committee

In an effort to maintain transparency and open dialogue with residents, SoCalGas is currently reaching out to the community to form a new Aliso Canyon Community Advisory Committee (CAC).

The Committee will consist of residents, business owners, and community leaders from various constituencies throughout the Porter Ranch area, as well as representatives from faith-based organizations, community action groups, Los Angeles Police Department and Los Angeles Fire Department, local schools, and other stakeholders.

The Advisory Committee will be modeled after those that SoCalGas has already formed in other areas of the company's service territory.

The group will meet monthly throughout the remainder of 2016 and periodically thereafter to provide feedback to the company on issues of concern for the community - not only those related to Aliso Canyon, but also general initiatives throughout the company.

SoCalGas is focused on safety and is working diligently to regain the community's trust.

After Extensive Deliberations League Board of Directors Adopts Oppose Position on Proposition 57, Due to Public Safety Concerns

The League board of directors on Oct. 6 voted to oppose Proposition 57, the Public Safety Rehabilitation Act of 2016, (36–1) with two directors abstaining. The vote followed an extended deliberative process commencing with the League's Public Safety Policy Committee in April, and initial discussion by the board of directors in June and a board delegation attending a meeting requested by Gov. Jerry Brown to discuss the measure in July. Fundamental to the League's opposition to the measure are public safety concerns stemming from reducing sentences for specific crimes which –despite debates over legal definitions — are clearly violent. Attending this conference is an investment in your city," said Michael. "Thank you for being part of an organization dedicated to making our cities stronger! The Annual Conference is an opportunity to gather new information and resources that we can all put to use in our cities and celebrate the accomplishments of an organization that formed 118 years ago to protect local control and provide an educational forum for city officials. That mission is as strong today as it was in 1898 when a group of California city officials originally came together to work on common issues."

Attendees were also welcomed on Wednesday by city of Long Beach Mayor Robert Garcia.

Thursday National League of Cities President and Joplin, Mo. Council Member Melodee Colbert-Kean provided an update on NLC's efforts.

The lucky city of Loomis won the Grand Prize Drawing on Friday afternoon taking home a \$3,000 U.S. Communities voucher to use at any of the program's 40 vendors for the products and services they provide to help cities meet their residents' needs.

Helen Putnam Award for Excellence

The first general session included the prestigious Helen Putnam Award for Excellence, given to cities for their outstanding efforts to deliver services and engage residents. This year's winners are the cities of:

<u>The League produced a short video</u>, which was played during the session, highlighting each of these outstanding cities.

Chris McKenzie Delivers Final Annual Report before Retirement

League members had an opportunity to hear from their executive director for the last time in his 17 year tenure with the organization. Chris McKenzie, who retires later this month, reported on the League's accomplishments in the past 12 months, focusing on both legislative advocacy and the new Health Benefits Marketplace, which the League launched in August to provide cities with

a cost-saving option to provide health care and other benefits to their current and retired employees.

On the advocacy front, McKenzie discussed how the news for cities was largely positive in 2016, with Gov. Jerry Brown agreeing with the League 76 percent of the time. He highlighted several bills, such as AB 2220 (Cooper) and AB 350 (Alejo), which will help improve implementation and reduce legal costs associated with the California Voting Rights Act. The Governor, McKenzie reported, signed two helpful economic development bills — AB 2492 (Alejo and E. Garcia) and AB 806 (Dodd and Frazier). In addition, McKenzie reported that the Governor vetoed numerous bills that would have undermined local authority.

Attendees also heard McKenzie reflect on his career in public service, most specifically his service to the cities of California.

"Public service is a joy when you serve with people of integrity who believe passionately in democracy and their duty to nurture and protect it. I am so grateful for the experience I have had the last 17 years as the League's executive director because I have been graced with colleagues, officers and directors, committee chairs and members, division officers and members, department officers and members, and caucus officers and members who believe having strong local government institutions is the bedrock of democracy and the foundation of our relationship with those we are privileged to serve," said McKenzie. "It has been a joy to work day in and day out with you and our many, many colleagues over the years. Our 17 years together have included four successful ballot measure campaigns to protect city authority and revenues and more legislative campaigns than I can ever hope to count."

Special Recognition

Charlotte Dickson, who founded the HEAL Cities Campaign was honored on Thursday for founding this important effort that has led 185 cities throughout California to adopted policies and practices that will ensure healthy outcomes for California children and families.

To date, cities representing a combined 14 million residents have joined the campaign, pledging to build more bike lanes and sidewalks, create complete streets, bring farmers markets into underserved areas of town, start worksite wellness programs and include health policies and goals into General Plan updates.

Institute for Local Government Beacon Award

Thursday's general session also included the recognition of the four recipients of the Institute for Local Government's prestigious 2016 <u>Beacon Award</u>, which honors local governments that lead the way on climate, energy and sustainability through voluntary action. Seven received silver level recognition, the city of Colma received gold.

The eight winning cities are:

The Institute for Local Government, the nonprofit research affiliate of the League of California Cities, launched the Beacon Program in 2009 with support from the California Public Utilities Commission to mobilize voluntary local action to achieve energy savings and reduce GHG emissions.

Keynote Speakers

Annual conference featured two engaging keynote speakers whose presentations inspired and educated the assembled city officials.

Jason Roberts, an arts activist and co-creator of the Better Block Project engaged League members on Wednesday with his philosophy on how to build a better block and make real change in communities today.

Thursday, League members heard from Dr. Christopher Thornberg, founding partner of Beacon Economics, who dived into the California economy and the forces at play in this state.

League Honors Senate President Pro Tem Kevin de León as Legislator of the Year

The League's Legislator of the Year Award is designed to recognize legislators who, over the course of the past legislative session, have done extraordinary work that will help California cities. President Dennis Michael announced that this year, the League officers selected Senate President pro Tem Kevin de León (D-Los Angeles) for his herculean efforts on homelessness.

Sen. De León was unable to attend the Closing General Session on Friday, and the award will be given him at a later date. The League selected him because he championed the passage of the No Place Like Home proposal that will fund housing and supportive services for California's mentally ill homeless men, women and children.

New League Officers and Board of Directors

Lodi Council Member JoAnne Mounce advanced into the role of League president, replacing Rancho Cucamonga Mayor L. Dennis Michael, who has held the position for the past year.

Palos Verdes Estates Council Member James Goodhart was elected first vice president.

South San Francisco Council Member Rich Garbarino joins the executive officers as second vice president.

Under the League's bylaws officers serve a one-year term with the outgoing president, Michael, becoming immediate past president and continuing as an active member of the League's executive committee. Mounce fills the role of her current position after serving the past year as the first vice president and Council Member Goodhart becomes first vice president after serving his past term of second vice president.

Resolution

The General Assembly approved one resolution on Vision Zero and Towards Zero, which addresses traffic safety. The final resolution is available on the League's website.

The provision generating the most concern is the change to parole rules for offenders defined as "non-violent" under current law. Under Prop. 57, many offenders would be eligible to seek parole after serving the full term of their primary offense, without factoring in any sentencing enhancements they received in addition to the base term.

Offences that could trigger earlier parole under the measure include:

- Assault with a deadly weapon;
- Throwing acid with the intent to disfigure;
- Rape of an unconscious person;
- Rape accomplished by the use of an intoxicating or controlled substance;
- · Discharging a firearm at a motor vehicle; and
- Discharging a firearm at an unoccupied dwelling; and the furnishing of a weapon used in a crime.

If Prop. 57 passes, offenders convicted of such crimes would be eligible for parole at an earlier date. While the Board of Parole Hearings would retain the discretion it has under current law to weigh for itself an inmate's progress toward meaningful rehabilitation, and deny parole to any offender, the possibility that this particular universe of offenders would potentially be released early has fueled concerns among city officials and the law enforcement community alike.

Compounding concerns of city officials have been the public safety impacts of two recent changes affecting sentencing of offenders which law enforcement officials allege have contributed to recent increases in crime: the 2011 prison realignment measure, that shifted many state offenders into county jails thereby reducing bed space for local offenders, and Prop. 47 in 2014, which further re-categorized many serious crimes as misdemeanors.

League Board Establishes Governance, Transparency & Labor Relations Policy Committee

On Oct. 6, the League board of directors took the formal step to establish a new league legislative policy committee — voting unanimously to establish the new Governance, Transparency & Labor Relations (GTL) policy committee. GTL will have a renewed focus on technology (open data), healthcare, elections and political reform. Additionally, the committee will oversee pension (OPEB) and workers compensation reform as well as other related issues.

The move comes after a subcommittee established by the board looked at consolidating both the Administrative Services (AS) and Employee Relations (ER) policy committees. The subcommittee held a series of meetings, reviewed past attendance records, committee action items and policy trends dating back nine years. Additionally, the subcommittee hosted an informational webinar for League division presidents as well as members of both AS and ER policy committees to solicit feedback and provide direction during the consolidation process.

Subcommittee members felt that a consolidation and a rebranding of the committees was the best way to drive attendance and engage our elected officials on these critical issues. As both a board member and co-chair of the consolidation subcommittee, Grass Valley Council Member Jan Arbuckle applauded the board for Thursday's action. "It's critical that we have active engagement from elected officials from across the state to weigh in on some of the most dynamic issues that affect our cities and towns. I was pleased to co-chair the subcommittee that oversaw this consolidation — and I commend the board for their swift action as we tackle these tough issues in the coming years."

Similar to the Leagues other policy committees, the GTL policy committee will use their collective knowledge and experience to recommend to the League board of directors preliminary positions on legislation.
