INTRODUCTION

This Comprehensive Quarterly Report presents an overview of the Commission's activities during the months of July, August, and September 2017. This report provides an update on projects and activities, a summary of the outreach efforts and an assessment of the agency's current budget and investment portfolio performance for the first quarter.


MANDATED PROJECTS

The Commission's 2017-18 Work Plan identified 11 mandated projects; three of those projects are currently active applications, three reflect anticipated applications and the balance are mandated administrative projects. During the first quarter, OC LAFCO staff participated in meetings and discussions involving a number of these active and anticipated routine and complex changes of organization. The filed and potential applications include an annexation to city boundaries and the potential transfer of water and sewer systems. The mandated administrative projects include an update to the OC LAFCO policies and procedures and the implementation of the Stakeholder Input Process for the fourth round of Municipal Services Reviews. The following section provides an update on project related activities that occurred in the first quarter.

Lewis Street Reorganization Project

In June 2017, LAFCO received a reorganization application from the City of Garden Grove requesting the detachment of .901 acres from the City of Orange and the annexation of that property into the City of Garden Grove. The purpose of the reorganization is to place the entire property owned by the Christ Catholic Cathedral Facilities Corporation under one jurisdiction, the City of Garden Grove, to allow for the efficient delivery of municipal services to a 70 single-family development by Shea Homes., The subject acreage includes .018 acres of residentially zoned property and .721 of the Lewis Street public right-of-way.


During the first quarter, LAFCO staff worked collaboratively with the stakeholders on several documents that are required to process the annexation. It is anticipated that the application will be completed by November and the action will be considered by the Commission at its meeting in December.



Stakeholder Outreach Process for Fourth Round of Municipal Service Reviews

One of the key projects identified in the Commission's 2017-18 Work Plan is the Stakeholder Input Process for the next round of Municipal Service Reviews (MSRs). LAFCOs are required by State law to prepare MSRs in conjunction with a sphere of influence review or update at least once every five years, or whenever an agency's sphere of influence is updated. The fourth round of MSRs and sphere reviews for the 34 cities and 35 dependent and independent special districts under OC LAFCO's purview runs from 2018 to 2022.

In May 2017, the Commission approved an agreement with Management Partners, firm selected through a competitive process, to serve as the consultant for designing and implementing the Stakeholder Input Process that will be used to assist the Commission in developing the scope and timeline for the preparation of the fourth round of MSRs. During the first auarter, staff worked with Management Partners the development of an input process that includes facilitating a series of regional stakeholder meetings, employing electronic surveys to solicit input from the agencies and the public, and producing outreach materials. The implementation of the Stakeholder Input Process begun; the County has been divided into six regions: North, West,

Coastal, Central, Southwest and Southeast, with the regional workshops being held during the months of October through December. There will also be meetings to gather input from stakeholders from the regional agencies, such as Vector Control, Orange County Sanitation District, and Metropolitan Water District of Orange County.

Additionally, during the first quarter, the Executive Officer made formal presentations to the Orange County City Managers' Association, the local chapter of the California Society of Municipal Finance Officers, the Municipal Water District of Orange County managers' meeting, and the North Orange County City Managers' Association to provide information on the purpose, background, input process, for the Municipal Service Reviews. The Stakeholder Input process will culminate with a report on the proposed work program for the 2018-2022 MSR process which is anticipated to be discussed by the Commission at its meeting in February.

Focused Municipal Service Review of the Potential Transfer of Water and Wastewater Systems for the City of San Juan Capistrano



This multi-year project began in August 2016 when the City of San Juan Capistrano submitted an application for a review of the options for divesting itself of the utility systems. In May, LAFCO released a Request for Proposals for qualified consultants to perform an operations, facilities and financial analysis for this MSR and distributed it directly to 33 consulting firms as well as posting it on both the OC LAFCO and CALAFCO websites; however, no proposals were submitted. After conducting an

analysis of the factors that may have contributed to the lack of responses from the consulting community, staff restructured the process and developed two separate RFPs – one for the infrastructure assessment of the City's current system, and one for the fiscal analysis of the alternative service options. The direct outreach to the consultants was expanded to approximately 60 firms and the documents were again posted on the OC LAFCO and CALAFCO websites. Additionally, the consultants were invited to participate in a pre-proposal conference during which LAFCO and City staff discussed the scope of work and answered questions related to the project. As a result, in October, LAFCO received three proposals for the infrastructure assessment and four for the fiscal analysis. The responses will be reviewed by LAFCO and City staff and it is expected that the recommendation for the award of the contracts will be considered by the Commission in December. The current project schedule anticipates that the final report will be presented to the Commission in the summer of 2018.

Amendments to the LAFCO Policies, Procedures and Guidelines

State law requires the Commission to adopt policies and procedures to perform its legislative authority and enhance internal processes. Annually, in its Work Plan, the Commission selects a number of policies and procedures to review and update. In the FY 2017-18 Work Plan, the following policy areas were identified:



- Commission Bylaws;
- Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities;
- Standards for Evaluating Service Plans and Preparing Municipal Service Reviews;
- Spheres of Influence Policy and Guidelines for Preserving Community Identity; and
- Policies and Procedures for the Review and/or Processing of Out-of-Area Agreements by the Executive Officer.

An Ad-Hoc committee of the Commission has been formed to work with staff and legal counsel to review and, if necessary, revise those policies identified in the Work Plan. In the first quarter, the Committee reviewed and developed recommendations regarding amendments to the Commission Bylaws and establishing a new policy on addressing Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities (DUCs). The proposed new DUCs policy will comply with the provisions of SB 244, which were designed to ensure that the disadvantaged unincorporated communities are properly identified, mapped, and

included in LAFCO actions regarding changes of organization, sphere of influence updates or amendments, and municipal service reviews. The recommendations regarding updating the Commission Bylaws are non-substantial and designed to reflect current operations. The proposed DUCs policy and amendments to the Bylaws will be considered by the Commission at its meeting in November. The Ad Hoc Committee's schedule anticipates that the remaining policies will be reviewed during the second and third quarters with recommendations being considered by the full Commission in February and May.

COMMISSION INITIATED PROJECTS

Update on Unincorporated Islands Program

The County Unincorporated Areas Program is identified as a "high priority" project in the Commission's 2017-18 Work Plan. Currently, the inventory of County unincorporated areas includes a total of 33 islands: 23 that meet the small island criteria of under 150 acres and 10 larger islands.

During the first quarter, the Executive Officer made a presentation to the Stanton City Council on the Islands Program, highlighting information on the three remaining islands within that City's sphere. During that presentation, the City Councilmembers raised many *questions* and concerns regarding the condition and maintenance of the infrastructure and the additional costs associated with providing services to the islands. LAFCO staff is currently working with City and County staffs on these issues and on identifying the annexation challenges for these unincorporated islands.

Additionally, during the first quarter, staff participated in several meetings with the stakeholders involved in a proposed development within the 17th Street and Tustin Island within Santa Ana's sphere of influence. Staff continued to provide the City, County and the representatives of the property owner, information regarding the annexation process and participated in discussions regarding the provision of municipal water and wastewater services through out-of-area agreements.

Further, during this quarter, staff continued its efforts in supporting the City of La Habra in its consideration of the potential annexation of the six remaining small islands within its sphere of influence. It is anticipated that the City will submit an application for the annexation of these islands in January 2018 and the action is expected to be considered by the Commission in February.

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES

CALAFCO Committees

OC LAFCO staff participates in discussions that shape legislation of interest to the agency and to LAFCOs in general through its membership on the CALAFCO Legislative Committee. During the first quarter, the



Legislature returned from summer recess in mid-August and continued to review and consider legislation through the conclusion of the session on September 15. During this period of high activity, the CALAFCO Legislative Committee continued to monitor legislation and engage in discussions with key stakeholders, legislative staff and legislators regarding several bills. Key bills of LAFCO interest included those proposing to modify portions of the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000. The Legislative Quarterly Report, which includes an overview of 2018 LAFCO-related legislation, will be reviewed by the Commission at its meeting in December.

Additionally, during the first quarter, OC LAFCO staff played key roles in the design and development of the program for the 2017 CALAFCO Annual Conference that was held on October 25-27 in San Diego. Executive Officer Emery served as the Program Chair for the Conference Planning Committee, providing leadership to the team of Board Members and staff volunteers. OC LAFCO staff members, Debra Kurita and Gavin Centeno served as committee team leader and sub group member respectively for conference sessions, responsible for securing panel speakers and moderators and providing feedback on session content and other details.

The Conference also featured general sessions on ethics, branding your LAFCO and the results of a statewide poll on LAFCOs.

FY 2017-18 BUDGET OVERVIEW

This CQ report includes the first quarterly budget update for fiscal year 2017-18. The following budget review provides the Commission with the first quarter bank account balances and a comprehensive overview of OC LAFCO revenues and expenditures from July 1, 2017 through September 30, 2017 (see page 11). The total budget approved by the Commission for 2017-18 is \$1,138,040.

Revenues

The majority of OC LAFCO's first quarter revenues is from the \$1,019,772 collected in apportionments from the funding agencies. The remaining balance of \$50,628 in apportionments is expected to be collected in the second quarter. In addition to the apportionments, OC LAFCO also earns interest from its investment portfolio. In the first quarter, the agency earned approximately \$3,836 in interest which is 45% of the interest revenues anticipated for the fiscal year.

Further, OC LAFCO receives some miscellaneous revenues during the year. In July, the County informed the agency that the last two repayments to OC LAFCO accounts for the outstanding balance from the funds owed through the Orange County bankruptcy settlement "Plan B" will be \$251 and \$37 to be paid in FY 2017-18 and FY 2018-19 respectively. The original claim balance for OC LAFCO in the bankruptcy settlement of 1997 was \$3,181. When received, these two payments, which reflect the end of the County's bankruptcy obligations, will be accounted for in the miscellaneous revenues.

Another source of OC LAFCO revenue is the application filing fees. These filing fees are not used for budgeting purposes, and are shown in the quarterly overview as revenue within the Special Fund column. Additionally, during the current fiscal year, CALAFCO provides a stipend to cover a portion of the costs associated with the Executive Officer serving as a Deputy Executive Officer for the association. The Special Fund column in the quarterly report includes a year-to-date accounting of application and CALAFCO stipend-related revenues and expenses incurred during the first quarter.

Expenditures

The total General Fund expenditures at the end of the first quarter are approximately 22 percent or \$250,359 of the total budget of \$1,138,040. The following table provides the comparison of the percentage of actual funds used and the target levels for the current fiscal year.

There are two projects, the Organizational Assessment and the development of the Municipal Service Review Stakeholders Input Process that were approved and budgeted in the 2016-17 fiscal year; however, the work was not completed during that fiscal year and the projects carried over into FY 2017-18. The combined outstanding balance for these contracts at the end of the 2016-17 fiscal year was \$40,350. As these funds were appropriated but not expended during FY 2016-17, the \$40,350 approved and budgeted for these projects is now reflected in the unreserved equity account for the current fiscal year. The following table provides the detail of the expenditures on these two projects. Including this information in this report allows the Commission and staff to monitor the impact of the expenditures associated with these two continuing projects in order to determine if a budget adjustment will be necessary during the year.

Who is running the Tet Festival?

Foundation whose application for nonprofit status is pending has not filed documents describing itself.

A little-known organization based out of a family-owned pharmacy in Westminster, the CEAVA Foundation, will run one of the most important community events of the year for the local Vietnamese community, the annual Lunar New Year celebration or Tet Festival.

The CEAVA foundation is relatively new. It registered with the state May 3, about a week before the county Board of Supervisors voted to approve a contract on May 9 for the group to run another three-day event, the Summer Freedom Festival.

While other festivals have been hosted by established community groups, relatively little is known about the CEAVA Foundation. The organization is based out of Kim Pharmacy on Brookhurst Street in Westminster, and is headed by Nghia Xuan Nguyen, an economist and frequent commentator for Vietnamese-language media.

Nguyen did not return calls and emails seeking information about the organization. The foundation's application for nonprofit status is still pending with the state and the group has not filed any founding documents describing its board or purpose.

First District Supervisor Andrew Do's office, which is helping to organize the event, also did not return multiple calls for comment.

In an appearance on Little Saigon TV in June, Nguyen said the organization is aimed at preserving Vietnamese culture and arts for younger generations of Vietnamese Americans. The annual Tet celebration marks the beginning of the Vietnamese Lunar New Year.

It's unclear how much the 2018 Tet Festival, which will take place Feb. 16-18, will cost taxpayers, as the county has not provided an estimate of the event's cost.

The Summer Freedom Festival -

a three-day event hosted in August at the same venue, Mile Square Park – cost the Parks department about \$379,000.

The organization is not required to report its expenses to the county, so it's unclear how much it spent or recouped in sponsorships for the Summer Freedom Festival. It also won't be required to report expenses for the Tet Festival, according to OC Parks Director Stacy Blackwood.

While the county will pay for permits and staff salaries for the event, CEAVA is responsible for handling all the entertainment, including a firecracker show, lion dancing, music, food vendors, marketing and carnival rides, according to a staff report and county spokeswoman Carrie Braun.

The organization will pay for private security for the event, while all law enforcement costs — such as emergency services and traffic control — will be paid for by the county, Blackwood said.

The competition for visitors is seen by many in the local Vietnamese community as divisive during a holiday centered around family, tradition and goodwill.

FIERCE COMPETITION

Previous Tet Festivals — run by various community groups — have struggled with debt and political controversies.

For nearly three decades, the most prominent Tet Festival in Orange County was run by a student group,

the Union of Vietnamese Student Associations of Southern California, or UVSA SoCal.

But after the city of Garden Grove declined to allow student group to host the festival in 2013 — the City Council raised questions about the group's finances

and asked it to pay a new \$75,000 fee — the students moved the event to the OC Fairgrounds in Costa Mesa.

In 2015, two UVSA members were also ousted for allegedly embezzling over \$118,000 from the event.

Since then, other competing festivals have emerged in Little Saigon, including a 2016 festival hosted by the Vietnamese Community of Southern California, which also was sponsored by Do's office.

The competition for visitors is seen by many in the local Vietnamese community as divisive during a holiday centered around family, tradition and goodwill, and prompted criticism that the event sponsored by Do was trying to undercut the student group by hosting it on the same weekend.

The festival in Fountain Valley offered free admission, while the student festival has historically charged admission as a fundraiser for local non-profit groups.

In February the countysponsored Tet Festival will also be on the same weekend as the UVSA festival in Costa Mesa. The 2016 Fountain Valley festival organizers also were publicly criticized by several of the event's vendors for failing to pay them on time, resulting in a lawsuit by one vendor, who claims she still is owed \$9,285 by festival organizers.

Do and his then-chief of staff, Nick LeCong, are named in that lawsuit, although both are petitioning to be removed from

the lawsuit.

The Vietnamese Community of Southern California also still owes the Sheriff's Department \$10,360.98 for law enforcement costs related to the 2016 festival in Fountain Valley.

HOW MUCH WILL IT COST?

At a meeting of the Board of Supervisors on Aug. 22, when supervisors approved a contract for CEAVA Foundation to host the Tet Festival, supervisors raised questions about the cost of county-run events.

Supervisor Lisa Bartlettquestioned why there was no financial impact listed for the Tet Festival on a staff-

report.

"I'm really supportive of this great event but before anything comes to us on the agenda, we do need to have the financial impacts," Bartlett said. "It's something that should be done for all the events in all the districts."

Do said supervisors haven't questioned the budgets for other events in

the past.

"În the past, we have approved how many events — we don't hold up those projects spending a specific outcome or expenditure plan," Do said. "As we know, things are kind of fluid when you plan for something that 'big ... those things don't come out about usually until the last month before the event."

"I just think that there is a precedent that we've been following

Kim, his office does not conduct financial analyses for every event on the county calendar.

"We could do that, but it's a massive lift," Kim said.

Supervisor Todd Spitzer also suggested that events that come on the agenda include information about fiscal impacts.

Spitzer said there is a discrepancy in funding from the Parks department for each district, with Bartlett's South County district having far more park space than Do's First District, which includes the cities of Garden Grove, Westminster, Santa Ana and Fountain

Valley.

"There's not a whole lot that OC Parks can do in my district other than to plan events," Do said in response.

Bartlett said that there should be a distinction between events based on their scale.

Do pointed to an event held by OC Public Works and Bartlett's office, a grand opening for the La Pata road extension in San Clemente, which cost the county \$171,749 for an event that lasted four hours. Bartlett's office raised \$65,065 in private sponsorships for the event.

"I don't remember getting analysis for any event. La Pata, when I saw the total it hit me hard," Do said. "Let's put things in perspective here." Los Angeles Times Times OC Nov. 5, 2017 2 of 2















Repealing the state and local deduction, known as SALT, means that millions of Americans will be taxed twice on the same income, once by the state and then again by the federal government. Rather than lowering taxes, a repeal would in effect shift the tax burden from the federal level to the local level.

Utilized by more than 6.1 million California taxpayers in 2015, the SALT deduction benefits taxpayers in all income levels and makes the high cost of living more affordable in states like California. In 2015, the average SALT deduction amounted to \$18,438.

Eliminating the deduction for state and local income taxes and capping the deduction for local property taxes at \$10,000 and for home mortgage interest for newly purchased homes at \$500,000 would eliminate a key incentive for homeownership in California and destabilize the housing market. Millions of California taxpayers would face thousands of dollars in higher taxes if this proposal becomes law. Ending these deductions would also impact the industries that depend on a strong housing market. In addition, the sales tax deduction incentivizes spending and economic growth; ending it could harm the economy.

The SALT deduction reflects a longstanding partnership between the federal, state and local governments. It ensures that local governments are able to provide essential public services and infrastructure to our residents, including police, fire, roads, and schools. A recent report from the Government Finance Officers Association notes, that if the SALT deduction is eliminated it would "...result in job losses, reduction in spending on capital equipment and decrease in infrastructure investment."

To ensure that taxpayers are not double taxed, local governments are able to maintain critical public services, and homeownership retains key incentives, the League of California Cities is continuing to urge Congress to maintain the full SALT deduction.

Next Steps

The House Ways and Means Committee will likely start taking up the proposal on Monday, Nov. 6. If the committee approves the bill, it would go to the full House a week later.

Also the week of Nov. 13, the Senate Finance Committee will likely consider its version of tax reform. If approved, the full Senate would take up the bill prior to Thanksgiving.

Both chambers hope to go to conference with the House and Senate versions of the bill and to have the conference report to the President for approval before Christmas.

The news conference featured a major Bay Area freeway project Caltrans accelerated due to SB 1 funding: a \$40.4 million traffic management systems project to improve traffic flow and ease congestion on Interstate 680 which is a major freeway bottleneck. The project includes installing ramp meters, ramp carpool bypass lanes and traffic operations systems along Interstate 680 from Scott Creek Road to Alcosta Boulevard near the cities of Fremont, Pleasanton and Dublin.

The highlighted East Bay project is just one of the many accelerated fix-it-first projects underway throughout California to improve roadways this year, before SB 1 even takes effect. Caltrans broke ground on 13 pavement projects this summer and is expediting the design of an additional 50 projects that will break ground over the next year. By late October, Caltrans and the California Transportation Commission had advanced more than \$5 billion in "fix-it-first" projects for earlier completion because of SB 1 funding.

More than \$54 billion dollars will be invested in California's transportation system during the next 10 years with approximately half of these funds going to local cities and counties for improvements to local transportation infrastructure.

SB 1, passed in April by the state Legislature, provides approximately \$5 billion annually in new funding to make road safety improvements, fill potholes, and repair local streets, freeways, bridges and overpasses. Every single city and county in California will receive funding from SB 1. Every single driver in California will benefit from better commutes and driving on safer, smoother roads.

Earlier this year, the wireless industry pursued similar legislation, <u>SB 649 (Hueso)</u>, in California that sought to achieve many of the elements present in this draft bill. The bill failed because industry's effort met <u>overwhelming opposition from over 325 cities</u>. Opposition focused on concern about shifting authority away from our residents, businesses, and communities over to a for-profit industry whose shareholder returns potentially outweigh their considerations for the health, safety, aesthetic, and public benefits of the communities we serve.

Cities throughout California share the goal of ensuring that all residents have access to affordable, reliable high-speed broadband and eagerly welcome installation of wireless infrastructure in a way that is in collaboration with the industry. However, the wireless industry's <u>draft federal legislation</u> is similar to legislation in other state legislatures designed to gut the public's input:

- Imposing sharply reduced "shot clock" time limits for local governments to process potentially unlimited wireless facility applications for all sizes;
- "Deem granted" applications for facilities when local governments are unable to meet the stringent time limits;
- · Approving applications regardless of their safety, health or environmental impacts; and
- Interfering with local governments' management of the public's property and their ability to receive appropriate compensation for use of public infrastructure.

Elements, such as the complete elimination of lease agreements and reduced of "shot-clock" timelines for permit approval, in the federal draft legislation are worse than the failed SB 649.

The League encourages cities to <u>contact their U.S. senator and representatives</u> to urge a more balanced approach for any efforts to improve broadband deployment and to oppose introduction of the draft bill in its current form, which simply guts local government and its citizen input out of the process.

State Treasurer Releases Findings of Cannabis Banking Working Group

State Treasurer John Chiang held a press conference on Nov. 7 to discuss a <u>report</u> issued by his office's Cannabis Banking Working Group (CBWG).

The CBWG found that the real power to improve industry access to banking resides with the federal government. Actions by the State of California will be an interim solution, even if feasible. The League recommended that the CBWG conduct a legal analysis on the formation of a standalone state-backed financial institution as part of the proposed feasibility study called for in the Treasurer's report.

The legal analysis will examine two key issues:

- Can the State of California create a cannabis-related state bank or credit union without violating federal law?
- Would monies/tax revenues deposited in such an institution be subject to asset forfeiture under federal law?

In conjunction with its <u>report</u>, the CBWG also issued a <u>fact sheet</u> entitled "Opening the Baking System to the Cannabis Industry.

Application Deadline to Participate in New Local Government Drone Pilot Program is Nov. 28

The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) on Nov. 2 launched a three-year <u>Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS, or drone) Integration Pilot Program.</u>
Designed to test innovative small UAS operations safely, in partnership with state, local and tribal jurisdictions, the program will generate data for future UAS policy and rulemaking. The program's timeline is aggressive and applicants must submit their interest in participating by Nov. 28, 2017.

The FAA will award a minimum of five pilot program designations, although several senior DOT and FAA officials have expressed that it is their desire to award more than five designations. FAA's ability to do so is limited only by feasibility of the proposals submitted and available resources. The program allows FAA to approve applications on a rolling basis, which means that even if only five awards are initially made, FAA could approve a timely submitted application at any time within the three years.

Secretary of Transportation Elaine Chao touted the program as a step towards addressing the biggest technological challenge in aviation since the dawn of the jet age. Speakers during the Nov. 2 announcement event discussed existing local UAS operations, including the pivotal role played by drones in disaster relief following the recent devastating hurricanes, where FAA granted more than 300 authorizations for UAS operations on an expedited basis. They also focused on the need for a framework that allows governmental jurisdictions to participate in the safe integration of UAS into the national airspace.
