OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide the City Council and Housing Authority Commission the Housing Authority Annual Report as Housing Authority and Housing Successor for Fiscal Year 2015-2016.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

In 2014, the Governor signed into law SB 341 requiring Housing Successors to conduct an annual report of their housing activities associated with the assumed assets and functions of the Former Agency. The required report is attached and includes all of the sections required by the statute. Additionally, the report will be formally placed on the City Council and Housing Authority agenda to receive and file at the January 24, 2017 meeting. Furthermore, as required, this report and its attachments are being provided to the Housing Successor and will be posted on the City's website by December 31, 2016.

GARDEN GROVE HOUSING AUTHORITY ANNUAL REPORT AS HOUSING AUTHORITY AND AS HOUSING SUCCESSOR FOR FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016 UNDER CALIFORNIA HEALTH & SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 34176.1 AND 34328

This Annual Report of the Garden Grove Housing Authority (GGHA) is prepared under California Health and Safety Code (HSC), Section 34176.1 as the housing successor, and Section 34328 as a housing authority (together, Report). In particular, Division 24 of the HSC sets forth the Dissolution Law in Parts 1.8 and 1.85 and the Housing Authorities Law in Part 2, which respectively require preparation of an annual report on the housing successor and the housing authority's activities for the prior fiscal year. This Report details the GGHA's activities during Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-2016 and is intended to satisfy the requirements under both HSC Sections 34328 and 34176.1. In particular, this Report details the GGHA's activities for FY 2015-2016, including the information required about the Low and Moderate Income Housing Asset Fund (LMIHAF) and on other information under Section 34176.1(f). After receipt of the complete, final CAFR (term defined below) that is expected by the end of December 2016, then this Report will be finalized using data in the CAFR and will be provided to, and will be presented for joint consideration and action by the City Council and Housing Authority Board in January 2017.

This Report includes information prepared by City staff on behalf of the GGHA and data from the independent financial audit of the Low and Moderate Income Housing Asset Fund Financial Report for FY 2015-2016 (CAFR) as prepared by Davis Farr LLP, which audit is separate from this Report; further, this Report conforms with and is organized into sections I. through XIV., inclusive, under Section 34176.1(f) of the Dissolution Law:

- I. Amounts Received and Deposited Under 34191.4(b)(3)(A). This section provides the total amount of funds paid to the City and the amount deposited into the LMIHAF allocable to 20% of the repayments on the reinstated City/Agency loan(s), if any, per Section 34191.4.
- II. Amount Deposited into LMIHAF. This section provides the total amount of funds deposited into the LMIHAF in FY 15-16 and itemized by amounts deposited in FY 15-16 for items listed on Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS), amounts allocable to Section 34191.4 deposits, and other amounts deposited into the LMIHAF.
- III. Ending Balance of LMIHAF. This section provides a statement of the balance in the LMIHAF as of the close of FY 15-16. Any amounts deposited for items listed on the ROPS, and amounts allocable to Section 34191.4 deposits, must be distinguished from the other amounts deposited.
- IV. Description of Expenditures from LMIHAF. This section provides a description of expenditures made from the LMIHAF during FY 15-16. The expenditures are to be categorized among (A) administration for monitoring, preserving covenanted housing units, (B) homeless prevention and rapid rehousing services and (C) development of housing.

- V. Statutory Value of Assets Owned by Housing Successor. This section provides the statutory value of real property owned by the Housing Successor, the value of loans and grants receivables, and the sum of these two amounts.
- VI. Description of Transfers. This section describes transfers, if any, to another housing successor made in previous fiscal year(s), including whether the funds are unencumbered and the status of projects, if any, for which the transferred LMIHAF will be used. The sole purpose of the transfers must be for development of transit priority projects, permanent supportive housing, housing for agricultural employees or special needs housing.
- VII. Project Descriptions. This section describes any project for which the Housing Successor receives or holds property tax revenue under the ROPS and the status of that project.
- VIII. Status of Compliance with Section 33334.16. As and if applicable, this section provides a status update on compliance with Section 33334.16 for interests in real property acquired by the former redevelopment agency prior to February 1, 2012. For interests in real property acquired on or after February 1, 2012, provide a status update on the project.
- IX. Description of Outstanding Obligations under Section 33413. This section describes outstanding inclusionary and replacement housing obligations, if any, under Section 33413 that remained outstanding prior to dissolution of the former redevelopment agency as of February 1, 2012, along with the Housing Successor's progress in meeting those prior obligations, if any, of the former redevelopment agency and how the Housing Successor's plans to meet unmet obligations, if any.
- X. Income Test. This section provides information required by Section 34176.1(a)(3)(B), or a description of expenditures by income category and restriction for the applicable five-year period, with the time period beginning January 1, 2014 and whether the statutory thresholds have been met. However, reporting of the Income Test is not required until 2019.
- XI. Senior Housing Test. This section provides the percentage of deed-restricted rental housing units restricted to seniors and assisted individually or jointly by the Housing Successor, its former redevelopment agency, and its host jurisdiction within the previous 10 years in relation to the aggregate number of units of deed-restricted rental housing assisted individually or jointly by the Housing Successor, its former redevelopment agency and its host jurisdiction within the same 10-year time period.
- XII. Excess Surplus Test: This section provides the amount of excess surplus in the LMIHAF, if any, and the length of time that the Housing Successor has had excess surplus, and the Housing Successor's plan for eliminating the excess surplus.
- XIII. Inventory of Homeownership Units: This section provides a summary of covenanted homeownership units assisted by the former redevelopment agency or the housing successor that include equity sharing and repayment provisions, including: (A) number of units; (B) number of units lost to the portfolio in the last

fiscal year and the reason for those losses, and (C) any funds returned to the housing successor due to losses or repayments.

XIV. Additional Information: GGHA's Activities for the Preceding Year FY 15-16 under HSC Section 34328.

This Report is to be provided to the Housing Successor's governing body by December 31, 2016. In addition, this Report and the former redevelopment agency's pre-dissolution Implementation Plans are to be made available to the public on the City's website: http://www.ci.garden-grove.ca.us/finance/econdev/RedevelopmentAgencyDissolution.

A total of \$219,904 was deposited into the LMIHAF during the Fiscal Year. Of the total funds deposited into the LMIHAF, a total of \$0 was held for items listed on the ROPS, [or received pursuant to Health and Safety Code Section 34191.4(b)(3)(B) or (C).]

III. ENDING BALANCE OF LMIHAF

At the close of the Fiscal Year, the ending balance in the LMIHAF was \$459,145 (2015-16 CAFR), of which \$0 is held for items listed on the ROPS.

The administrative expenditures total less than five percent of the statutory value of real property owned by the Housing Successor and of loans and grants receivable held by the Housing Successor.

V. STATUTORY VALUE OF HOUSING ASSETS OWNED BY HOUSING SUCCESSOR IN LMIHAF

Under the Dissolution Law and for purposes of this Report, the "statutory value of real property" means the value of properties formerly held by the former redevelopment agency as listed on the housing asset transfer schedule (HAT) approved by the Department of Finance (DOF) as listed in HAT under Section 34176(a)(2), the value of the properties transferred to the Housing Successor pursuant to Section 34181(f), and the purchase price of property(ies) purchased by the Housing Successor. Further, the value of loans and grants receivable is included in these reported assets held in the LMIHAF.

VI. DESCRIPTION OF TRANSFERS

The Housing Successor did not make any LMIHAF transfers to other Housing Successor(s) under Section 34176.1(c)(2) during the Fiscal Year.

VII. PROJECT DESCRIPTIONS

The Housing Successor does not receive or hold property tax revenue pursuant to the ROPS.

VIII. STATUS OF COMPLIANCE WITH SECTION 33334.16

Section 34176.1 provides that Section 33334.16 does not apply to interests in real property acquired by the Housing Successor on or after February 1, 2012; nevertheless, this Report presents a status update on the project related to such real property.

With respect to interests in real property acquired by the former redevelopment agency *prior* to February 1, 2012, the time periods described in Section 33334.16 shall be deemed to have commenced on the date that the Department of Finance approved the property as a housing asset

in the LMIHAF; thus, as to real property acquired by the former redevelopment agency now held by the Housing Successor in the LMIHAF, the Housing Successor must initiate activities consistent with the development of the real property for the purpose for which it was acquired within five years of the date the DOF approved such property as a housing asset on the HAT.

The Successor Agency, Housing Successor, and City are pursuing affordable housing development opportunities to meet the requirements set forth in the Settlement Agreement.

X. EXTREMELY-LOW INCOME TEST

Section 34176.1(a)(3)(A) requires that the Housing Successor must require at least 30% of the LMIHAF to be expended for development of rental housing affordable to and occupied by households earning 30% or less of the AMI. Pursuant to Section 34176.1(a)(3)(B), if the Housing Successor fails to comply with the Extremely-Low Income requirement in any five-year report, then the Housing Successor must ensure that at least 50% of the funds remaining in the LMIHAF be expended in each fiscal year following the latest fiscal year following the report on households earning 30% or less of the AMI until the Housing Successor demonstrates compliance with the Extremely-Low Income requirement. This information is not required to be reported until 2019 for the 2014 – 2019 period, which is the first of the five-year periods added by Section 34176.1.

XI. SENIOR HOUSING TEST

The Housing Successor is to calculate the percentage of units of deed-restricted rental housing restricted to seniors and assisted by the Housing Successor, the former redevelopment agency and/or the City within the previous 10 years in relation to the aggregate number of units of deed-restricted rental housing assisted by the Housing Successor, the former redevelopment agency and/or City within the same time period. If this percentage exceeds 50%, then the Housing Successor cannot expend future funds in the LMIHAF to assist additional senior housing units until the Housing Successor or City assists and construction has commenced on a number of restricted rental units that is equal to 50% of the total amount of deed-restricted rental units.

XII. EXCESS SURPLUS TEST

Excess Surplus is defined in Section 34176.1(d) as an unencumbered amount in the account that exceeds the greater of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) or the aggregate amount deposited into the account during the Housing Successor's preceding four Fiscal Years, whichever is greater.

The City's Neighborhood Improvement Division administered a majority of the former Agency's Single Family Rehabilitation Program and First Time Homebuyer Program. The Neighborhood Improvement Division does have an existing agreement with Amerinational Community Services, Inc., a Minnesota Corporation relating to certain, but not all, aspects of administration of the former Agency's Single Family Rehabilitation loans and First Time Homebuyer loans that provided second lien mortgages for homeownership units. These consulting services include assistance with oversight and administration of amortized loan payments, if any, due; with tracking and calculation of loan balances in the event of payoff; and, other administrative activities for these outstanding Single Family Rehab and Fist Time Homebuyer loans. Additionally, the City has contracted with AIM Asset Property Management for property management services.

XIV. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ABOUT GARDEN GROVE HOUSING AUTHORITY'S ACTIVITIES FOR THE PRECEDING YEAR FY 15-16 PER HSC SECTION 34328

The Housing Authority can provide rental assistance to 2,337 households per month through Section 8 vouchers. The lease up rate by month for FY 2015-16 was as follows:

Development ("Successor Agency"), the Garden Grove Housing Authority as Successor Agency to the Garden Grove Agency for Community Development ("Housing Successor") and the Garden Grove City Council (collectively, "Defendants"), hereby enter into this stipulation to substitute party and for entry of judgment ("Judgment"). Plaintiffs and Defendants (collectively, "Parties") settled the above-captioned matter through Voluntary Settlement Conferences before Judge Gail Andler, Department CX-101, on September 20, 2013 and February 28, 2014. The Parties stipulate as follows:

- 1. On September 20, 2013, the Parties entered into a settlement on the record in open court in Department CX-101 that resolved the above captioned matter conditioned upon the settlement of the issue of attorneys' fees. On February 28, 2014, the Parties reached agreement on attorneys' fees. The terms of the settlement are as follows:
- The term "Low Income Households" shall have the meaning set forth in Health and Safety Code section 50079.5.
- 3. The term "Very Low Income Households" shall have the meaning set forth in. Health and Safety Code section 50105.
- 4. The term "Low Income Rent" shall be rent affordable to lower income households as set forth in Health and Safety Code section 50053(b)(3).
- 5. The term "Very Low Income Rent" shall be rent affordable to very low income households as set forth in Health and Safety Code section 50053(b)(2).
- 6. Within the timeframe described in Paragraph 9, below, the Successor Agency or, at its discretion, the Housing Successor (hereinafter "Successors"), shall develop replacement housing. City of Garden Grove Resolution Nos. 9072-11 (July 12, 2011) and 9089-12 (Jan 17, 2012). As prescribed by the Dissolution Act. the amounts the Successor Agency is obligated to pay pursuant to the terms of this Judgment shall be included as an enforceable obligation of the Successor Agency on each applicable Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule ("ROPS"), as defined in California Health and Safety Code section 34171(h) and in accordance with Health and Safety Code section 34177(l), (m), and as set forth below.

15. The Successor Agency shall include in the ROPS due to be completed and approved by the oversight board of the Successor Agency no later than October 3, 2014, the entire amount of relocation assistance due pursuant to Paragraph 13.

16. The Successor Agency shall include in the ROPS due to be completed and approved by the oversight board of the Successor Agency no later than October 3, 2015 (ROPS 2015-16B), amounts for Replacement Units that will be expended during the January 1, 2016 through June 30, 2016 period. The amounts to be expended during this ROPS 2015-16B period

shall be appropriate to complete development of the Replacement Units for occupancy within four years from entry of the Jüdgment.

- 17. The Successor Agency shall pay \$7.95,000 in attorneys' fees to Public Counsel. This amount shall bear interest at the rate of 7 percent per annum, from the date of entry of this Judgment, pursuant to Article XV, Section 1, of the California Constitution. The entire amount of attorneys' fees shall be placed on the ROPS due to be completed by the oversight board of the Successor Agency no later than October 3, 2014 (ROPS 2014-15B).
- 18. Parties agree that the obligations contained herein are obligations of the Garden Grove Agency for Community Development ("Redevelopment Agency"), now dissolved, prior to enactment of the Dissolution Act. Consistent with Health and Safety Code § 34173(e), Successor Agency's liability for amounts owing pursuant to this Judgment shall be limited to the extent of the total sum of property tax revenues the Successor Agency and the Housing Successor receive pursuant to the ROPS process and the value of the assets received by the Successor Agency and the Housing Successor. The Successor Agency shall continue to list the obligations of this Judgment on each ROPS until all obligations required by the Judgment are satisfied.
- 19. Jackqulyn Bodenstedt as executor of the Estate of Randolph Maynor is substituted as a plaintiff in this action in place of plaintiff Randolph Maynor, by reason of his death.
- 20. The Parties agree that the Court shall have continuing jurisdiction to enforce the terms of this settlement and Judgment pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure section 654.6.
- 21. This Stipulation may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed an original and all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same agreement.

OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide a summary of the International Council of Shopping Centers (ICSC) New York National Deal-Making Conference held at the Jacob K. Javits Convention Center on December 5th - 6th and an update of meetings held with the Investel team.

BACKGROUND

Founded in 1957, ICSC is the premier global trade association for the shopping center industry. ICSC has more than 73,000 members from over 100 countries, which include shopping center owners, developers, managers, specialists, investors, retailers and brokers, as well as academics and public officials. ICSC New York is the second largest conference of retail real estate professionals in the world. More than 10,000 retail brokers, landlords and tenants met at the Jacob K. Jarvis Convention Center.

At this conference, Garden Grove exhibited a booth in the Public Private Partnership Pavilion, which provided an affordable platform for effectively marketing the City of Garden Grove to potential development partners and investors. At the conference, new emerging retailers presented at the Retail Runway include:

Sweetgreen

Sweetgreen is an American fast casual restaurant chain that serves "simple, seasonal, healthy food". As of October 2016, it had 64 stores operating in California, Illinois, Massachusetts, New York, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and the District of Columbia. The company has over 1,700 employees. In addition to food, sweetgreen has key initiatives in the philanthropy, music (sweetlife festival), technology (sweetgreen app) and lifestyle space.

Starbucks Reserve

Starbucks revealed the launch of its high-end coffee concept, Reserve Roastery and Tasting Room, on a global scale. In case you missed it, Starbucks opened its first Reserve Roastery and Tasting Room in Seattle back in 2014. The next Roastery will debut in Shanghai in 2017, followed by locations in Tokyo and New York City in

2018. The company also expects to announce a fifth location in Europe early next year.

Five Below Retail

Founded by owners of Zany Brainy, Five Below sells products from multiple categories: some items carried by the store include trading cards, sports related items, games, fashion accessories, bath and body related items, candy, beverages, room decorations, school supplies and stationery, books, accessories for electronics, DVDs, computer software, novelty items and gag items, as well as seasonal items. As of August 2016, Five Below has over 490 stores in 22 states, and two distribution centers. It began its outward expansion away from the Philadelphia Metro area by entering the Illinois and Michigan markets.

Le Pain Quotidien

A bakery-restaurant group founded in Brussels in 1990 by Alain Coumont, Le Pain Quotidien currently operates more than 220 bakery-restaurant locations worldwide in 17 countries, including Belgium, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, France, India, Switzerland, Brazil, Mexico, Turkey, Spain, United Arab Emirates, Kuwait, Russia, Argentina, Japan, Hong Kong and the United States. The United States, United Kingdom, Belgium, Paris and Australia restaurants are fully company-owned and operated, while all other international Le Pain Quotidien restaurants are franchised. Le Pain Quotidien is currently exploring multiple franchises across the U.S.

Economic development staff will be reaching out to these new retailers and restaurants to solicit their interest in establishing a location in Garden Grove.

Staff conducted additional meetings in New York:

Investel Development Team - Land & Design (L&D) is the original developer for the development of Site C. L&D had the rights under an approved Resort Agreement to assign a portion of their interest to a financially qualified party. The City Council approved the assignment to Investel in June 2016, a partnership between L&D and SCG America. Going forward, Investel has assembled a high caliber development team led by Matt Reid of L&D alongside world-renowned architects Friedmutter Group, based in Newport Beach, and Archilier Architecture, based in New York. While at ICSC New York, Garden Grove City staff met with Investel and discussed key projects that are planned in the Grove Resort area, and continued to forge relationships with Investel team and held the following meetings and property tours:

1. Archilier Architecture - City Staff meet with Kia Sheng, CEO/Managing Partner at the offices of Archilier. Archilier is a dynamic architectural design firm serving a wide range of clients worldwide. Since 2010, they have assisted clients to realize their vision for hotels & resorts, residential & retail projects, mixed-use developments and large-scale master plans. Archilier designs respect the distinctive cultural, social, and architectural traditions of the communities they

work in while reflecting their clients' unique vision and looking to the future. Archilier is the primary architect for Site C and is partnering with Friedmutter Architects in Los Angeles.

2. SCG America/MiMA - Staff toured the Middle of Manhattan project known as MiMA developed by SCG America. MiMA is a mixed-use building located at 450 West 42nd Street in the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood of Manhattan. SCG America broke ground in 2007 and topping out occurred in early August 2010. It was designed by SCG's architecture firm of Arquitectonica, and has 43 floors of luxury rental units on floors 7 to 50, and twelve floors of condominiums on floors 51 to 63 which were purchased and are being leased and sold by SCG America. Prices range from \$1.2 Million for 500 square feet studio unit to upwards of \$6 Million for large ultra-luxury penthouse suites.



3. Fulton Square I and II to be renamed SCG Plaza I and II – Staff toured the mixed-use complex occupying nearly two entire blocks in downtown Flushing. This transformative development by SCG America has elevated and energized the entire Flushing area. The Fulton Square I development is complete with medical office condos, retail and restaurants, and is anchored by Hyatt Place Hotel. Under construction, Fulton Square II will be developed with approximately 1.4 million gross square feet of mixed-use. At project completion, it will comprise of retail space, an underground parking garage for more than 1,100 vehicles, two residential towers, an office tower and a boutique hotel. Construction started in the 3rd quarter of 2015. The project is being constructed

in multiple phases through 2020. The value of this project is \$1.4 Billion.



Discussions with Investel revolved around the Site C development and the Hyatt Regency Orange County expansion into the adjacent Hyatt parking lot, Investel Orange County Headquarters and further advancement of redeveloping their property.

<u>SUMMARY</u>

The City had a productive ICSC NY conference and held meetings with developers and retailers as well as dynamic tours and meetings with Investel and their architects.

Boosting morale

Community rallies around Muslim students after hate mail.

GARDEN GROVE • When Mohamed El-Askary read a copy of the letter that was sent to his school calling its students "children of Satan," he wasn't afraid.

"I was surprised," said the eighth-grader at Orange Crescent School, affiliated with the Islamic Society of Orange County mosque in Garden Grove. "I know some people don't like Muslims. But the vulgar language in the letter, the hate ... it surprised me."

About 275 pupils gathered under overcast skies for a special assembly Dec. 15 to rally the com-

munity together to boost the children's morale.

The girls, dressed in khaki pants, long burgundy tunics and white headscarves, and the boys, sporting khakis, long-sleeved white shirts, ties and navy blue vests, said the Pledge of Allegiance to the American flag.

During the assembly, the children heard non-Muslim members of the community – rabbis, priests, public officials and police – assure them that they are loved and cherished.

The letter in question was sent to mosques and affiliated schools nationwide, including several in Southern California, around Thanksgiving. It

states that President-elect Donald Trump – who during his campaign proposed making Muslims register and blocking people of the Islamic faith from entering the country – is going to "cleanse America."

"He's going to do to you Muslims what Hitler did to the Jews," the letter said. "You Muslims would be wise to pack your bags and get out of Dodge." The letter is signed "Americans for a Better Way."

The sentence about ethnic cleansing shocked him at first, Mohamed said.

"But I know that would never happen here," he said. "This is a democracy, and we've already seen how much people care about us."

Over the past month, more than 30 hate incidents and at least six hate crimes have been reported in Orange County, said Rusty Kennedy, executive director of the Orange County Human Relations Commission, who also spoke at the school's assembly.

"We've had reports of hijabs being pulled off women's heads," he said. "We got a report of a Latino janitor being harassed by students chanting 'Build that wall.' It's disturbing."

Principal Maisa Youssef said she had a tough time comforting students soon after the election and most recently after they received the hate mail.

"It's tough to see our kids scared and worried," she said. "They know they are safe. But they did have questions. Are we protected? Are we loved? Are we welcome here?"

Vice Principal Leila Dakelbab read a compilation of writings from students about how they felt when they read the letter.

"We like mac and cheese," she said. "We like to skate and ride bikes. We like to go to the movies. But most of all we like our freedom. ... We're not the children of Satan. We're the children of Adam."

The letter ended with an invitation to Trump to visit their school so he could learn about them and work with them "to make America truly greater."

Gina Gore, associate priest at St. Wilfrid's Episcopal Church in Huntington Beach, brought cards that students at the church's school made in support of the Muslim students.

"Our students want to let you all know that you're welcome and wanted here," she said.

When we fight for the rights of others, we fight for our own rights, said Rabbi Peter Levi, regional director for the Anti-DefaFountain Valley View

mation League.

"We're all part of one, big extended family," he said.

Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones praised the school for "taking something as horrific as this and turning it into a teachable moment."

Eighth-grader Danny Nachawati said he was touched by the speakers' statements, particularly what Levi said about the students not being the future but the present.

"Today's program showed me that all these people care about us," he said. "We are the present. What we say and do now will change the future."





Muslim students in Garden Grove respond to hate mail

n their pressed uniforms, the students squirmed as their principal addressed the letter that landed in the mailbox of Orange Crescent School one late November day.

"Dear children of Satan," it read, speaking to Muslim boys and girls whose campus is located on the grounds of the Islamic Society of Orange County in Garden Grove. Rather than deal with it privately, school officials decided to share the letter with the students, presenting the kids on Thursday, Principal Maisa Youssef said, to let people "see what an American Muslim child looks like."

"There's nothing different about our school," she added. "We're like every other school in America."

Leila Dakelbab, vice principal of the school that serves children from preschool to eighth grade, called members of the student government to join her at the podium.

She spoke of the 230 letters the children wrote in response to the hate mail and sent to the administration. She said the students enjoy the same things that any other American children do and are "proud to live in the best country in the world and practice our religion."

"People are enemies of those who they do not know," said Muzammil Siddiqi, director of the Islamic Society of Orange County, whose grandson attends the school. He called its environment as a "community of peace," adding that "we are totally against violence."

The Orange County Human Relations Commission has documented a total of 33 hate-related incidents and six hate crimes since the November election, according to Rusty Kennedy, the group's executive director.

The election capped off one of the most racially polarizing presidential races in memory, with President-elect Donald Trump vowing to restrict Muslim immigration, suggesting the creation of a Muslim registry and asserting that Islam "hates" Americans.

The Rev. Gina Gore of St. Wilfrid of York brought cards of peace created by members of the youth group at her Huntington Beach church who wanted to show the students at Orange Crescent "that we stand by you."

"I pray for the people who wrote this — that their hearts soften," said Bishop Diane Jardine Bruce of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles.

Rabbi Peter Levi, regional director for the Anti-Defamation League in Orange County and Long Beach, said that "when we fight for the right of others, we fight for ourselves."

Rep.-elect Lou Correa (D-Santa Ana), told the students about a time he received hate mail from a citizen who disagreed with one of his legislative votes.

"Let's put evil, hate and fear aside," Correa urged the crowd. "Let's all unite and show the world what America's all about."

Steve Jones, the mayor-elect of Garden Grove, commended the school for taking "something hurtful and turning it into a teachable moment."

"I didn't think anybody could write anything that hateful to anyone else," said Danny Nachawati, 12, an eighthgrader at Orange Crescent.

Nachawati said he wasn't caught off guard by the school lesson. "We are taught to respect everyone," he said. "And we do."

TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURES FOR STAR WARS HALF MARATHON

 Street and Century Boulevard.







SUMMARY

On December 1, 2016, Southern California Edison Company (SCE) and San Diego Gas & Electric Company (SDG&E) filed a joint application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting approval to increase rates for the recovery of costs associated with the Wheeler North Reef (WNR) Expansion Project. This application seeks to recover costs associated with the WNR expansion project directed by the California Coastal Commission (CCC). The WNR Expansion Project was not included in SCE's 2018 General Rate Case (GRC) Application (described below). If approved, this application would result in SCE customers experiencing an overall increase of \$28.072 million between 2018 and 2020.

ABOUT THE APPLICATION

SCE is the licensed operator of San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station (SONGS) and majority owner. As such, SCE is responsible for 78.21% of any costs incurred in relation to SONGS and maintaining compliance with various regulatory agencies regarding SONGS. SCE is also responsible for filing SONGS related costs in its GRC. In Decision D.15-11-021 the CPUC determined that costs related to SCE's compliance with marine mitigation projects related to SONGS should be recorded as cost of service and recovered through customer rates. This decision also allowed SCE and SDG&E to submit a separate application to recover costs for any additional marine mitigation projects not included in SCE's GRC requests.

The CCC directed SCE to implement an expansion project for the WNR marine mitigation project located near SONGS to improve the performance of the reef. Due to timing these costs were unable to be included in the 2018 GRC. As a result, SCE and SDG&E are filing this separate application to recover those additional costs.

¹ SCE owns a 78.21% interest in SONGS Units 2&3. SDG&E owns a 20% interest in SONGS 2&3. The City of Riverside owns the remaining 1.79% interest in SONGS Units 2&3.

IMPACT ON RATES

If the CPUC approves this application, customer rates will not be affected until 2019, and will result in an estimated 0.12% system average rate <u>increase</u> relative to currently forecasted rates for 2019 and 2020.

The following table is representative of the estimated rate impact by customer group if this application is approved by the CPUC. Based on the revenue requirement forecasts for 2019 and 2020, this rate increase will remain in effect for 2019 and 2020 (*i.e.*, the rate increase in 2019 will remain in effect for two years, 2019 and 2020). If the CPUC approves this application, a typical non-CARE residential customer living in inland areas of Ventura and Los Angeles counties (baseline region 9) and using 500 kilowatt-hours per month could see a monthly bill increase of 0.005%, or \$0.00, from a typical current monthly bill of \$90.06 to \$90.06 for 2018, an increase of 0.12%, or \$0.10, from a typical current monthly bill of \$90.06 to \$90.16 for 2019 and, an increase of 0.13%, or \$0.12, from a typical current monthly bill of \$90.06 to \$90.18 for 2020.

'Transportation' Continued from Page 1...

These proposals present an opportunity in the new legislative session for all sides to negotiate on a comprehensive package to send to Gov. Jerry Brown. The League of California Cities supports these proposals as a starting place for negotiations, but also understands that there is still work needed to get the necessary two-thirds vote in each legislative chamber. The League will continue to help advance the discussion and will provide cities with the tools it needs to advocate when the legislature is closer to reaching a deal. While not yet introduced, the League will continue to advocate for constitutionally protecting the additional revenue for transportation purposes.

Below is a summary of the key provisions in each proposal as well as the differences between specific provisions.

Reforms

- Establishes local reporting requirements. Requires cities and counties to send the
 California Transportation Commission (CTC) a list of projects they propose to fund with
 Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA) funds, specifying the location,
 description, proposed schedule, and estimated useful life for each project each fiscal
 year.
- Requires cities and counties to maintain existing general fund levels for transportation funding. Requires cities and counties to maintain their general fund transportation levels at equal to or greater than their annual average expenditures during FY 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12, which is known as a maintenance of effort requirement. Authorizes the State Controller's Office to audit local governments for compliance and subject local governments to reimbursing the state for non-compliance.
- Makes permanent the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) delegation authority. Permanently extends the authority for Caltrans to participate in the federal NEPA delegation pilot program, which allows projects involving federal funds to be delivered faster.
- Promotes employment and training opportunities through pre-apprenticeship.
 Requires state and local agencies to create programs that promote employment in advanced construction through pre-apprenticeship as a condition of receiving RMRA funds.
- Incorporates "complete streets" design concept into the Highway Design Manual.
 Requires Caltrans to incorporate the "complete streets" design concept into the Highway Design Manual.
- Restores independence to the CTC. Moves the CTC from the California State
 Transportation Agency, establishing it as its own entity within state government to help it
 fulfill its oversight role.
- Creates the Office of Transportation Inspector General as an independent entity and office within state government. Its role will be to ensure that all other state agencies that receive state transportation funds are operating efficiently, effectively, and in compliance with federal and state laws. The Governor appoints the inspector general to a six-year term and the inspector general will be authorized to conduct audits and investigations involving state transportation funds with all affected state agencies.
- Permanently extends and expands the limited CEQA exemption for transportation repair, maintenance, and minor alteration projects to existing roadways. Deletes the Jan. 1, 2020 sunset of the existing law and expand the exemption to cities and counties with populations greater than 100,000 and apply the exemption to state roadways.
- Creates an Advanced Mitigation program for transportation projects. Authorizes the Natural Resources Agency to prepare, approve, and implement advance mitigation plans

for one or more planned transportation projects. An advanced mitigation plan is defined as a regional or statewide plan that estimates the potential future mitigation requirements for one or more transportation projects and identifies mitigation projects, sites, or credits that would fulfill some or all of those requirements. Authorizes the agency to administer the program, establish mitigation banks, secure areas for the purpose of providing mitigation, and allow transportation agencies to use mitigation credits to fulfill mitigation requirements. The program's intention is to supplant existing CEQA requirements, not substitute for them.

Additional Revenues (Approximate)

- \$1.8 billion from a 12 cent increase to the gasoline excise tax, adjusted every three years for inflation. The revenue generated from this particular increase will help restore the gas tax's lost purchasing power due to inflation. The funds attributable to the 12 cent increase would be transferred to the newly created RMRA for distribution.
 - Key Difference: SB 1 phases in the 12 cent increase over three years, while AB 1 does not include a phase-in period.
- \$1.1 billion from ending the Board of Equalization "true up" and resetting the rate to the historical average of 17.3 cents per gallon, adjusted every three years for inflation. This provision "resets" the price based excise tax on gasoline to its original rate of 17.3 cents. Funds would be distributed using current formulas.
- \$1.3 billion from a \$38 increase to the Vehicle Registration Fee, adjusted every three years for inflation. After the California Department of Motor Vehicles deducts its administrative costs from imposing and collecting the fee, the funds from the increase will be deposited into the RMRA for distribution.
- \$500 million from restoration of half the truck weight fees to transportation projects. Phase-in restoration of truck weight fee revenue over a five-year period and half will no longer be allowed to be transferred out of the state highway account (SHA) after FY 2020-21. The funds remain in the SHA, which prevents HUTA funds from the variable gas tax from having to offset the SHA weight fee transfer.
 - Key Difference: SB 1 phases-in a percentage of the truck weight fees back to transportation projects, while AB 1 phases-in specific weight fee amounts every year. SB 1 caps the weight fee transfer at 50 percent in FY 2020-21, while AB caps the weight fee transfer at \$500 million in FY 2020-21.
- \$600 million from a 20 cent per gallon increase to the diesel excise tax, adjusted
 every three years for inflation. The funds attributable to the 20 cent increase to the
 diesel excise tax would be transferred to the Trade Corridors Improvement Fund (TCIF).
 Federal FAST Act funds for freight will be deposited into the TCIF.
- \$300 million from unallocated Cap-and-Trade funds. This continuous appropriation of Cap-and-Trade funds is estimated to double the amount going towards the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program and the Low Carbon Transit Operations Program.
- \$263 million from 3.5 percent increase to the diesel sales tax. The funds generated through the additional 3.5 percent increase to the diesel sales tax are estimated to deposit \$263 million into the State Transportation Account for transit and intercity rail purposes.
 - Key Difference: SB 1 would impose an additional 0.5 percent to this sales tax which would generate a \$40 million set aside for intercity rail and commuter rail.
- \$60 million from miscellaneous transportation revenues. Deletes the transfer of miscellaneous revenues to the Transportation Debt Service Fund and instead redirect the funds to the RMRA.
- \$20 million from Vehicle Registration Fee on zero emission vehicles, starting in the second year of ownership, adjusted every three years for inflation. Per the authors,

this provision will help make up for the fact that owners of zero emission vehicles do not pay any gas tax to maintain the roads they drive on. Revenues would be deposited into the RMRA for distribution.

 Key Difference: SB 1 imposes a \$100 Vehicle Registration Fee on zero emission vehicles generating, while AB 1 imposes a \$165 Vehicle Registration Fee

The revenues generated from these proposals, would provide the following allocations:

From the \$3.2 billion in the RMRA:

- State Highway System \$1.45 billion annually for maintenance and rehabilitation of the state highway system.
- Local Streets and Roads \$1.45 billion annually for maintenance and rehabilitation of local streets and roads.
- Self-help counties \$200 million for existing and aspiring self-help counties.
- Active Transportation Programs \$80 million annually for Active Transportation and up to an additional \$70 million through Caltrans efficiencies.
- Advanced Mitigation \$120 million one-time funds for implementation of the Advanced Mitigation program over the first four years.
- California State University \$2 million for transportation research and workforce training.
 - Key Difference: University of California \$3 million under AB 1 for the Institute for Transportation Studies.

From restoration/returned revenue from the HUTA:

- State Transportation Improvement Program \$770 million annually for capital projects and improvements on the state's highway system.
- State Highway Operation and Protection Program \$210 million annually for maintenance and rehabilitation of the state highway system.
- Local Streets and Roads \$770 million annually for local streets and roads.

From Cap-and-Trade revenues and diesel tax increase:

Transit and Intercity Rail — \$563 million annually for transit and intercity rail capital
projects and operations, \$40 million additionally set aside for intercity and commuter rail
under SB 1.

From the TCIF:

 Freight, trade corridors, and goods movement — \$600 million annually for freight, trade corridors, and goods movement.

From loan Repayments:

• \$706 million one-time funds for transportation loan repayment.

Next Steps

The League has prepared <u>preliminary estimates</u> of the revenues each city could receive for transportation maintenance and repair under the proposal. The time for the Legislature and Gov. Jerry Brown to act is now and these proposals provide a solid framework to move the discussion forward.

This program provides a variety of public agencies and developers access to low-cost, tax-exempt financing and economic development tools. CSCDA recently issued \$6,850,000 in tax-exempt bonds for Discovery Charter Preparatory School (Discovery Prep) located in the Pacoima area of Los Angeles.

About Discovery Prep

Discovery Prep is an independent charter school, chartered in 2002 by the Los Angeles Unified School District. Discovery Prep has an anticipated enrollment of 280 students in grades 9-12 for the upcoming 2016-17 school year. WASC accredited, the school serves students from an economically challenged background. Many students entering Discovery Prep have academic skills below their grade level, however, the school's academic results and graduation rates far exceed their immediate competition. Of the 59 students in the 2015-16 graduating class, for example, 31 are expected to matriculate to four-year universities.

CSCDA partnered with the investment bank Ziegler to provide the \$6.85 million in tax-exempt bonds for Discovery Prep. The bonds will be used to acquire new educational facilities located on 3.8 acres and comprised of 28,000 square feet of classroom space in the nearby Los Angeles area of Sylmar.

Local governments can register and upload their business incentive and economic development offerings to the CBIG website. There is no cost for cities to create a profile and link their available resources and the tool is designed to help cities reach more business owners and improve the business climate and investments in their community.

While local governments provide numerous business services and incentives, there may be untapped outreach potential to attract interested business owners to utilize them through a single, easy-to-use website. Often, business owners must take on the complex task of visiting dozens of state and local agency websites to find available economic development opportunities. In this process, opportunities are missed and cities are overlooked.

The goal is that in the future, the CBIG will serve as the universal application to offer all incentives from the state of California and its 4,000 local governments.

The roll out of CBIG marks another step toward improving government accessibility and harnessing the power of technology to catalyze economic activity.

California City Solutions: Santa Barbara Develops One-Stop-Shop Web Portal for Small Businesses

This story is part of an ongoing series featuring Helen Putnam Award entries. The 2016 entries are available on the League's website as a resource for cities in a searchable database called <u>California City Solutions</u>. The Guide to Start and Grow Your Business in Santa Barbara was submitted in 2016 for the League Partners Award for Excellence in the City-Business Relations award category.

Working with local business organizations and entrepreneurs, the city of Santa Barbara developed a program to help small business owners navigate city regulations and services. This program comprises an instructional guide, online resources, videos and a quarterly newsletter to make it easier for entrepreneurs to find the resources they need to make informed decisions and spend wisely for their business.

Santa Barbara in recent years conducted roundtable discussions with the various business sectors quarterly to understand their challenges and to improve services. In 2013, the mayor met with local entrepreneurs who had experience launching their first business or growing their operations. Entrepreneurs shared stories about the difficulties of finding information by visiting multiple departments or being caught off guard by new information.

Common inquiries included:

- Understanding what activities might require approvals;
- How to plan tenant improvements and navigate the planning and permitting process;
- When to get a business license;
- · Best practices to conserve water; and
- Obtaining permits for events and special needs.

Leasing or purchasing a new space is a critical and expensive decision for entrepreneurs and many business owners voiced frustrations about learning of planning and permitting regulations after committing to a lease. City staff also realized the countless hours spent assisting first-time business owners who made decisions and commitments without key information in hand. If business owners researched a property, understood requirements, and planned accordingly, they could avoid significant expenses and later complication with the city when they needed to comply with building regulations.

Communicating with prospective business owners further adds to the challenge because entrepreneurs may not understand that there are regulations that need to be followed and may not visit a city counter or website until they are too far along in the process. Some businesses noted that they were hesitant to contact the city because they may be taking a risk in sharing plans that would later not be approved. Unfortunately, this mindset prevents business owners from getting the early advice that is essential for them to successfully implement their business plans.

Santa Barbara developed online resources and videos to help business owners navigate regulations and services that may affect their business. A guide on *Starting and Growing Your Business* is provided over the counter for every new business license. The city's website was also

reorganized with a <u>portal of business information</u> to connect entrepreneurs with advice on specific business needs that include creating a disaster plan, conserving water, placing tables on the sidewalk for outdoor dining, and installing any type of signage. The online resources include an interactive mapping tool to create custom-designed maps, library databases available for consumer research, advice to certify as a green business, and directions to list businesses on Google maps. An area for community resources was also developed on the website featuring organizations that provide start-up assistance, mentorship and networking organizations, incubators that offer low-cost work spaces and meeting areas, and trade and professional associations.

Communication materials were designed to translate difficult concepts and explain issues to a first-time business owner. Improved messaging and tone helps entrepreneurs build trust and develop a new mindset that the city values local businesses, understands their challenges, and appreciates their commitment to remain in Santa Barbara. Businesses are strongly encouraged to seek advice early and often because the city wants to be a partner in their success.

The city produced <u>videos</u> with examples of businesses complying with regulations and introduce key city staff who could explain their services. Video topics include police services, water conservation, obtaining a business license, how restaurants and automotive businesses can prevent water pollution, and the basics of planning and development. The video library continues to grow with new topics to address different business services.

The quarterly newsletter helps the city remain in regular contact with business owners. The brief communication includes short videos and key information to highlight new city policies affecting the business community. Roundtable meetings with community business organizations provide a forum to discuss outreach opportunities and brainstorm ideas for new content to help local businesses. Staff has also been trained in specific customer service protocols to help new and existing businesses.

The city has received positive feedback on this effort. Since the online resources were launched, the business site has received over 6,600 visits with 83 percent representing return visitors. A high level of return indicates that businesses are relying on the site for information. When someone visits the city's home page, the business area is one of the most frequently visited areas of the site.

Collaboration with business and entrepreneurial organizations has helped leverage the strengths of each organization to raise the level of community services provided to entrepreneurs.

Other cities can easily adopt similar practices and improve connections with the business community. While cities may not be in a position to solve many problems facing local businesses, they can make it easier to navigate the existing municipal services and regulations by taking steps to organize and improve their information so businesses avoid visiting every counter to help with each step.

Nominations for this prestigious award are due by Jan. 11. Winners will be announced in February and awards will be presented during the Public Works Officers Institute and County Engineers Association of Counties conference March 22–24 in San Diego. They will also be featured later in 2017 in *Western City*, the League's monthly magazine.

Projects nominated should address one of four categories that promote a comprehensive improvement of local streets:

- Efficient and Sustainable Road Maintenance, Construction and Reconstruction Projects;
- Complete Streets Projects;
- Safety or Intelligent Transportation System Project; or
- Efficient and Sustainable Bridge Maintenance, Construction and Reconstruction Projects.

State Water Board Releases New Sustainable Groundwater Management Act FAQ

The State Water Board released its new Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) frequently asked questions document providing guidance on questions asked about groundwater sustainability agencies (GSAs). The 2014 SGMA requires the formation of GSAs in high- and medium-priority groundwater basins and subbasins by June 30, 2017.

The new FAQ supplements additional frequently asked questions about GSAs that the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) has responded to, which are available on DWR's Sustainable Groundwater Management website. The FAQ will be updated as necessary.

Volkswagen to Invest \$1.2 Billion in California for Zero Emission Vehicle Programs

Proposal Submissions Accepted through Jan. 16, Funding Released over 10 Years

Volkswagen Group of America has entered into a partial settlement with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the California Air Resources Board. The outcome of this settlement has established a \$2 billion Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) investment program over the next 10 years. Volkswagen has named the program <u>Electrify America</u>. Proposals are due by Jan. 16 and the draft investment plan will be drafted by Feb. 22, 2017.

Through the consent decree, \$1.2 billion is mandated — \$381 million will be allocated for NOx mitigation through "the Mitigation Trust" and \$800 million will be invested in California. The consent decree only allows up to one-third to be paid out during the first year or up to two-thirds during the first two years.

The ZEV investment program is designed to increase ZEV adoption throughout the United States through charging infrastructure expansion, education and awareness programs, and other measures aimed at overcoming ZEV adoption barriers. Volkswagen Group of America will accomplish its mission in four 30-month investment cycles, with planning for the first cycle underway. Volkswagen wants input and proposals, but cautions that some submissions might not fit within the scope of our initiatives for the first 30-month investment cycle. Other promising ZEV initiatives, such as hydrogen fueling stations or national ZEV car-sharing or ZEV ride-sharing services, will be considered in later investment cycles.

Proposal Submissions

States, municipal governments, federally-recognized Indian tribes and federal agencies can submit proposals through Jan. 16.

Potential proposal categories include:

- Charging and hydrogen fuel cell infrastructure;
- Zero emission awareness; and
- The Green City initiative.

In addition, Volkswagen will be creating the Green City initiative to select a California city to host pilot projects that will develop sustainable mobility projects such as zero emission vehicle based shuttle services or car sharing programs (<u>Partial Consent Decree</u>).

Treasurer Convenes Cannabis Banking Working Group

California State Treasurer John Chiang invited League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman and Legislative Representative Cromartie to join the Cannabis Banking Working Group, which held its first meeting on Monday, Dec. 19 in Sacramento. The group comprises representatives from the banking and cannabis industries, local government and state agencies that are responsible for the regulation of the marijuana industry in California.

The Dec. 19 meeting was the first in a series of meetings that will focus solely on issues related to the cannabis industry and banking. Panels addressed the impact that the lack of banking access has had on the industry, financial institutions and public agencies. The Cannabis Banking Working Group is expected to complete its work and issue a set of recommendations by the middle of 2017.

Applications will be accepted on a first come basis over a two-year period that began Oct. 1. DOF will stop accepting applications when the \$25 million appropriation is fully awarded even if that occurs prior to Oct. 1, 2018. The <u>application</u> is available on DOF's website.

Cities and counties will be eligible for grants under the new Community-Based Transitional-Housing Program. Established by <u>SB 837</u>, a budget trailer bill approved in June 2016, the program provides \$25 million in grants for cities or counties that agree to site transitional housing connected with support services for recently released offenders. Individual grants can be up to \$2 million, depending on the size of the facility, and priorities will be provided for applications with local matching contributions.

Key features include:

- The applying city or county must agree to issue a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for a
 facility providing transitional housing and supportive services for ex-offenders released
 from county jail or state prison. While the measure is primarily directed at ex-offenders
 there is some additional flexibility on the types of individuals housed. The CUP must be
 for at least 10 years.
- · An experienced facility operator must be identified.
- As part of application process, the local agency must include a list of "all permitted facilities ... that in a residential setting, provide transitional housing services, psychological counseling, or cognitive behavioral therapy." This list must include the number of residents residing in each facility in their jurisdiction, including those on probation or parole. Presumably, state agencies must provide a local agency the information necessary to assemble this information.
- Sixty percent of the grant may be retained by the approving jurisdiction, and can be used for public safety enhancements, community outreach efforts, or any other communitybased activities that the local agency believes will improve community relations or concerns with the facility.
- Forty percent of the funding must be shared by the local agency with nonprofit facility operators to support start-up costs, service provision, security improvements, rehabilitative services and community outreach.
- Participating local agencies and facility operators must submit annual reports, as specified.

Third Round of Proposition 41 Funds Available for Veteran Housing and Homelessness

The Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), in collaboration with the California Housing Finance Agency and California Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet), recently announced the availability of approximately \$75 million in funding for veterans and their families under the Veterans Housing and Homeless Prevention Program (VHHP). This is the third round of funding available to communities throughout California through the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) pursuant to Chapter 727, Statutes of 2013 and Proposition 41 (2014).

Approximately \$65 million is available for the development of affordable multi-family rental housing containing permanent supportive housing units, transitional housing units or affordable housing units. Awards will be made to qualifying developers and nonprofit entities to construct, acquire, rehabilitate, or preserve affordable multi-family housing for veterans and their families.

As part of the funding, and in accordance with Chapter 44, Statutes of 2016, \$10 million is reserved for the construction or rehabilitation of transitional housing or shelter facilities that

provide services to homeless veterans. Funds will be awarded to programs or counties that demonstrate need, focus on long-term solutions, include mental health and addiction treatment services, and have proven long-term effectiveness.

California voters approved \$600 million in 2014 to build housing for homeless veterans. HCD, CalVet, and the California Housing Finance Agency were tasked with jointly managing and developing the guidelines for how the funds would be expended.

The objective of the VHHP is to develop housing for our veterans at risk of homelessness or experiencing temporary or chronic homelessness. To date, \$176 million has been awarded to 45 developments through the first two NOFA application cycles. When complete, these developments will provide more than 1,500 housing units for veterans, including 900-plus units for homeless veterans.

Additional funds will be released annually until all of the \$600 million is exhausted, with an objective of addressing the housing needs of low-income veterans and reducing veteran homelessness in California. Geographic distributions intend to focus on areas with the largest concentrations of veterans in need. For more information about VHHP and this NOFA, please visit www.hcd.ca.gov/fa/vets.

This program provides a variety of public agencies and developers access to low-cost, tax-exempt financing and economic development tools. CSCDA recently issued \$27,791,620 in tax-exempt multifamily affordable housing bonds for Parks at Fig Garden Apartments in Fresno.

About Parks at Fig Garden Apartments

Parks at Fig Garden Apartments is an acquisition and rehabilitation of 366 multifamily affordable housing apartments by Fruit Avenue Housing Associates, LP. The project sponsor is Community HousingWorks. Parks at Fig Garden will continue to be 100 percent affordable and provide 75 one-bedroom, 229 two-bedroom, and 57 three-bedroom apartments to low-income families in Fresno.

CSCDA and Community HousingWorks partnered with Jones Lang LaSalle Multifamily, LLC to provide tax-exempt multifamily affordable housing bonds for Parks at Fig Garden. The rehabilitation will include extensive exterior and interior renovations which include energy and water efficiency upgrades. The financing of Northwest Manors II will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.

Comments on Political Reform Act Revisions due Dec. 31

The <u>California Fair Political Practices Commission</u> (FPPC) is seeking comments on draft two of the revisions to the Political Reform Act (PRA) to help simplify, streamline and reform the law.

First enacted in 1974, an estimated 500,000 to 750,000 people in California are subject to the PRA. Rules on campaign spending and funding, conflicts of interest, and Form 700s are all part of the PRA.

The revision project will not change the substance of the law, but is designed to make the law less complex, with less "legalese" and more plain English. It is also aimed at putting the various laws and regulations into groupings that are more obvious, intuitive and understandable to the average person.

After initial drafts which included partners such as the California Constitution Center at Berkeley Law and UC Davis School of Law, the first draft was made public. Those public comments were incorporated, and another draft included the work of nationally-recognized legal author Professor Bryan Garner and his team at LawProse.

CalPERS Board Approves Significant Lowering of Discount Rate

Increased Employer and Employee Contributions Coming

The CalPERS board of directors on Wednesday morning approved a plan to lower its discount rate (the expected rate of return on portfolio investments) from the current 7.5 percent to 7 percent over the next three years with corresponding incremental increases in employer/employee payments over an eight-year smoothing period. The action comes less than a day after the CalPERS Finance and Administration Committee approved the change and sent its recommendation to the full board. Negotiated between representatives from CalPERS, labor and Gov. Jerry Brown's Administration, the approved plan differs from the original CalPERS recommendation that would have lowered the discount rate immediately to 7 percent.

The League and the League Pension Task Force were well represented on Tuesday during the committee hearing with League staff testifying, as well as two city managers/fiscal officer(s) and one elected city official. The League and city officials communicated a clear message to the committee and CalPERS board members — lowering of the discount rate is a necessary step but it is by no means the solution to ensure the sustainability of the pension system. To do that, all stakeholders and the CalPERS board must rise to the challenge of difficult but necessary actions to ensure the viability of defined benefits for public employees.

Lowering the discount rate will mean higher contributions from city employers and employees. This is not easy for any CalPERS participating agency, however, stabilizing the fund ensures that the defined benefit promised to employees will be fulfilled. Standing League policy supports prudent policies to address the shortfall that recognize the impacts on local government. City officials are seeking a balance that brings stability to the pension fund while reducing spikes in employer contributions.

The plan provides three steps to incrementally move the discount rate from 7.5 to 7 percent. With each step, the impact of the rate change to unfunded liability payments will be phased-in over five years. This will process will occur over eight years. The steps are as follows:

- FY 2018-19: rate reduced from 7.5 percent to 7,375 percent;
- FY 2019-20: rate reduced from 7.375 percent to 7.25 percent; and
- FY 2020-21: rate reduced from 7.25 percent to 7 percent.

This action is being precipitated by investment returns that are well below the CalPERS assumed rate of return. The nation's largest pension fund reported just a 0.61 percent of return on investments for the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2016, which is dramatically lower than the 7.5 percent assumed return. In addition, the overall CalPERS funded status has dropped from 73 percent funded to 68 percent in a short period of time. Absent any action, there is currently a 47 percent chance of the fund status dropping below 50 percent, which has been regarded as a point of no return since the grave negative cash flow will require assets to be liquidated and investments to stall.

League Cautions Optimism

The League has taken an active role in representing city governments in discussions with CalPERS and the Administration. The League <u>reported on Dec. 9</u> that 240 cities had responded to the League's survey on proposed CalPERS discount rate changes.

Although, CalPERS has proactively reached out to local governments to solicit feedback on proposed changes, this proposal does not reflect a fully prudent plan for cities to meet their pension obligations. The plan does not account for two critical pieces of necessary reform. It lacks a mechanism to address employer/employee benefit structures. In addition, the extended phase-in period will result in local governments paying more to meet their pension obligations because of the accrued interest on their unfunded liabilities. However, the longer phase-in will be beneficial for cities facing budget challenges because the increased contributions will occur over a slower timeframe.

Next Steps

The League will continue to be an active voice in pension system changes. In the coming months, CalPERS will be reviewing their risk mitigation protocols and investment priorities and decisions. In addition, League staff will work with CalPERS to deliver all the necessary information cities will need to plan for the expected contribution increases.
