### **OBJECTIVE**

To provide information on ballot boxes and vote centers in Garden Grove.

### BACKGROUND

The California Voter's Choice Act was signed into law in 2016 with the purpose of providing a more robust voter outreach and modernizing the election process. In February 2019, the Orange County Board of Supervisors approved the transition to the vote center model, which allows for a wider range of opportunities for voting that includes the expansion of in-person early voting and for casting ballots at any vote center within a voter's county, as well as mail ballots for every voter. The Orange County Registrar's Office (ROV) developed an Election Administration Plan that was approved by the Secretary of State that includes a vote center model and ballot drop boxes. Criteria for the placement of vote centers and ballot boxes includes ADA compliance and access to public transportation routes.

### DISCUSSION

City staff has collaborated with the ROV and identified three locations for ballot boxes at:

- West Grove Park, 5372 Cerulean Drive;
- Magnolia Park Family Resource Center, 11402 Magnolia Street; and
- Chapman Library, 9182 Chapman Avenue.

The ROV has also worked with the Garden Grove Unified School District and two additional ballot boxes are slated for installation at the Garden Grove Unified School District Main Office, 10331 Stanford Avenue; and the Clinton Corner Family Resource Center, 13581 Clinton Street.

The ballot boxes are made of durable military grade with a slick permanent wrap that is graffiti resistant, and the ROV is fully responsible for installation and maintenance. The number of ballot boxes is based on the number of registered voters in each voting jurisdiction with five required in Garden Grove distributed throughout the city.

As part of the vote center model, the ROV will no longer provide a "polling place." In-person voting will take place at vote centers with either an eleven day or four day timeframe for voting. The upcoming March Primary will introduce Garden Grove's vote centers as follows:

Voters will be able to register and vote on the same day at any vote center in Orange County, and voters registered to vote in Orange County will be able to vote at any vote center in the county.

### **OBJECTIVE**

The purpose of this memorandum is to update the City Manager on the status of the County's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice.

### BACKGROUND

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires HUD grant recipients to develop an Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) and evaluate its fair housing issues as an individual jurisdiction and within the context of a larger region. The AI examines policies, procedures, and practices within a community that may limit a person's ability to choose their residence free from discrimination. In addition, the AI provides an overview of laws, regulations, conditions or other possible obstacles that may affect an individual or a household's access to housing in a community. It also presents local and regional demographic profiles, assesses the extent of housing needs among specific groups, identifies existing barriers or impediments that may limit housing choice, and proposes actions to overcome those barriers.

In Orange County, 30 cities have elected to prepare a regional AI, to fulfill their HUD requirement to remove barriers to fair housing choice for all their residents. To make it easy and convenient for residents to attend community meetings, the County has organized four different community meetings across the county. Re: Notification to Potentially Affected Governmental Agencies Regarding
Application of Pesticides by the Orange County Vector Control District (January 1, 2020– December 31, 2020)

The Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District (District) is hereby notifying potentially affected governmental agencies of our continued application of mosquito control pesticides within Orange County pursuant to the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit (Order No. 2016-0039-DWQ) [General Permit No. CAG 990004]. This permit is for discharges of biological and residual pesticides to waters of the United States, per those pesticide active ingredients approved for application within the provisions of the approved Pesticide Application Plan and the Notice of Applicability, as adopted by the State Water Resources Control Board on March 1, 2016, effective July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2021. This notification is for applications made from January 1, 2020 – December 31, 2020 for the suppression of vector populations and arbovirus transmission when non-chemical strategies are not feasible or effective. Each year the District will update interested agencies regarding the control products being used within the District's boundaries (see enclosed service area map).

The District is a public health agency charged with protecting the citizens of Orange County under Division 3 of the California Health and Safety Code (CAL. HSC. §2000-2910). The District carries out its mission with a balanced approach focused on protecting public health and the environment through an effective, county-wide Integrated Vector Management (IVM) Program. As part of the IVM Program the District applies mosquito control pesticides that primarily target aquatic, immature (larval) stages of mosquitoes to prevent the emergence of adult mosquitoes, which inflict painful bites and may transmit diseases such as West Nile virus. District personnel conduct larval mosquito control year-round in a variety of urban and natural habitats, such as unmaintained swimming pools, ornamental ponds, small containers, stormwater treatment systems, riparian corridors, tidal marshes, and seasonal and permanent wetlands. Adult mosquito control, if necessary, occurs typically in the warmer months near mosquito producing habitats, like seasonal and permanent wetlands, tidal marshes, and urban areas.

All mosquito control pesticides are applied only when necessary by licensed, District personnel according to product label instructions and in compliance with all local, state, and federal regulations. Proper applications maximize a product's effectiveness while avoiding or minimizing any adverse impacts to the public and environment. No special precautions need to be taken by your representative agencies as the District performs these ongoing activities. There are no known water use restrictions or precautions during treatment. Please refer to the District's website for all product labels and Safety Data Sheets.

The NPDES Permit requirements for listing of the Public Health Pesticides anticipated to be used specify that any pesticide product can be used that contain approved active ingredients, provided all pesticide label restrictions and instructions are followed. In addition, pesticides which fall under the "minimum" risk pesticides have been exempted from FIFRA requirements, and a list of these can be found at

http://www.epa.gov/minimum-risk-pesticides/inert-ingredients-approved-use-minimum-risk-pesticide-products. The following tables list the active ingredients approved for the FIFRA regulated pesticides.



### Construction News Week of January 6, 2020

### **Two-Hour Free Parking**

Since December 1, the first two hours of parking are free in parking structures in Downtown Santa Ana.

### **Sewer Installation**

Sewer installation work continues along the project route with activities including excavation, trenching, installation of sewer pipelines, and road work and restoration. Sewer installation work requires temporary parking and lane restrictions. Drivers traveling to downtown Santa Ana and to the Santa Ana Transportation Center from the 5 Freeway will encounter detours on Santa Ana Boulevard to accommodate the work activity. Please leave extra time.

### **Traffic Light/ Pole Replacement**

Crews will continue work to install replacement traffic signal foundations along the project route, with potholing activities in Segment 4 and Segment 5. Construction activities will require temporary lane closures and parking restrictions.

### **Water Pipeline Work**

Crews will also continue to perform water pipeline work and storm drain installation work along the project route, which requires temporary lane and sidewalk restrictions.

Access will be maintained for all residents and businesses.

For specific work activities in your area, see the segment overviews and maps below. All scheduled activities are weather permitting and are subject to change.

### **SEGMENT 1 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES**

Intersection of Harbor Blvd. and Westminster Ave. to Raitt St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 1 construction activities will include:

- Preliminary work at the site of the future Maintenance Storage Facility
- Work within Pacific Electric Right-of-Way (PEROW)
- Santa Ana River Bridge construction
- · Westminster Avenue Bridge construction



### **SEGMENT 2 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES**

Raitt St. to Parton St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 2 construction activities will include:

- Water pipeline installation on W. Santa Ana Boulevard, from Western Avenue to Bristol Street
- Water pipeline work and installation on W. Santa Ana Boulevard, from Shelton Street to Flower Street
- Storm drain installation and water pipeline work on Raitt Street, from 1st Street to W. Santa Ana Boulevard

Water pipeline work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures on W. Santa Ana Boulevard. If visiting residents or businesses in the work zone, please ask crews to assist you in accessing the driveways. They can pull plates over the work area to facilitate entering and exiting.

Storm drain installation will require a temporary closure of the northbound lane on Raitt Street from 1st Street to Santa Ana Boulevard. Both northbound and southbound traffic on Raitt Street will be shifted to the southbound lane. Temporary parking restrictions on Raitt Street will also be in place from 1st Street to Santa Ana Boulevard.



### **SEGMENT 3 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES**

Ross St. to Mortimer St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 3 construction activities will include:

- Water pipeline installation and testing in Sasscer Park
- Water pipeline work and installation at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Ross Street
- · Water pipeline installation and testing at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Broadway
- · Potholing for storm drain installation on Broadway, from 3rd Street to W. Santa Ana Boulevard
- Potholing for storm drain installation at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Ross Street
- Potholing for storm drain installation at the intersection of 6th Street and Mortimer Street


Water pipeline work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures on W. Santa Ana Boulevard.

Work to install replacement traffic signal foundations will require temporary lane closures and parking restrictions on 4th Street.





#### **OC** woman sentenced to prison for theft of benefits

A former employee at a Social Security Administration office in Orange County was sentenced Monday to more than year in prison after admitting to stealing more than \$176,000 in benefits from elderly and disabled peo-

Rowena Isabel Lokeni, 36, of Garden Grove was sentenced to 15 months in prison and ordered to pay \$176,015 in restitution after pleading guilty in October to a federal count of wire fraud, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Lokeni was hired by the Social Security Administration in 2007 and worked as a lead customer service representative in a field office in Fountain Valley. She was responsible for "providing direct services to the public," according to prosecutors, and had access to electronic records for Social Security beneficiaries.

Prosecutors allege that Lokeni, using a computer in her work cubicle, accessed the records of 10

> victims and changed the direct deposit bank account and routing numbers they had on file to her

According to prosecutors, eight of the viceims that Lokeni "evinced an eral court records.

Menchaca was first charged in connection to Hall's death in 1992, but the case was dropped because of lack of evidence. New technology helped Jesus Menchaca last revive the investigation in 2015, allowing prosecutors to build a case based on DNA evidence.

According to testimony Garden Grove police officers and investigators during a preliminary hearing in 2017, Hall and a friend went to the Buena Clinton neighborhood in Garden Grove to get cocaine.

According to court tran-

witnesses in the case had scripts, the man who was with Hall that night told police that Menchaca and a woman had agreed to accept a VCR for the drug.

The friend told investigators that he left Hall with the man and woman while he went to move his van, according to court transcripts. Minutes later, Hall ran up to his friend and was bleeding from a chest wound.

An officer spotted the friend driving Hall to a hospital, because the side doors on his van were swinging open as they traveled down the street. But Hall died.

## School district shows growth in many areas

### High school graduation rate is now at 93.1 percent

Garden Grove Unified School District (GGUSD) once again showed several areas of positive growth on the recently-released 2019 California School Dashboard, the state's school performance and accountability website.

The dashboard displays five color-coded performance levels with the district ranking green, a high-level ranking in five categories, including graduation rates, English Language Arts and Mathematics scores, suspension rates, and college and career readiness rates. District students demonstrated tremendous growth since last year, earning high green

rankings in five categories this year, compared to three green and three yellow rankings last year.

The Dashboard shows the district's graduation rate at 93.1 percent — a 2.5 percent increase from the previous year. Overall, it shows students' English Language Arts scores increased by 3.5 points, and math scores increased by 4.2 points. Additionally, the district's suspension rate is 2.8 percent, a 0.5 percent decline from the previous year. The district's col-

lege and career readiness ranking increased by 1.6 percent.

GGUSD also showed significant growth among student subgroups, including 12.4 points of growth in English Language Arts and 9.9 points of growth in Math among students with disabilities, as well as growth of 4 points in English Language Arts and 4.1 points in Math among Latinos. The graduation rate for English Learners also grew by 2.8 percent.

The district consistently outperforms the county and state average in ELA and Math, as well as chronic absenteeism. The district ranks among the General

Assistance districts, performing higher than districts listed as Differentiated Assistance for not making progress in one or more student groups or priority areas.

"We are proud of our continued growth because we know how hard our staff and teachers work to help all students succeed," said Bob Harden, Board of Education trustee. "The accountability metrics show that the superior instructional strategies in GGUSD are making a real difference for students."



The League developed a comprehensive summary of the 2019 Legislative year, along with descriptions, divided by issue area, of the hundreds of bills of interest to cities that passed the Legislature and were signed into law by Governor Gavin Newsom. Governor Newsom Previews \$1 Billion in Budget Proposal to Jump-Start New Homeless Fund and Provide Behavioral Health Services, Signs Order to Accelerate State Action to Fight Homelessness

Published: Jan 08, 2020

Governor announces the creation of new California Access to Housing and Services Fund in executive order, previews his 2020-21 Governor's Budget with more than \$1 billion to fight homelessness, including \$750 million for this new Fund, and a major new investment to reform Medi-Cal so that health providers transform health care to deliver integrated physical and behavioral health

Executive order requires state agencies to take urgent and immediate action by January 31, 2020 to make available state properties and facilities to rapidly increase housing and shelter options

Immediately makes available a supply of 100 camp trailers that can be used as temporary housing – coupled with mobile health and social services clinics – to be deployed across the state to communities in need, and makes available state crisis response teams to assist local communities in utilizing state resources to aid in local efforts

Executive order requires the state and local governments to develop accountability metrics and publicly release updates on progress toward measurable goals regarding moving people out of dangerous encampments and into more healthy, stable housing situations

Governor also announces that the state made the full \$650 million in emergency homelessness aid available to cities and counties from the 2019-20 State Budget

SACRAMENTO – As a national homelessness crisis spreads across the West Coast and cities across the country, Governor Gavin Newsom is continuing his Administration's comprehensive

response to the crisis through a combination of new accountability measures, unprecedented proposed new resources, and an executive order to significantly reduce and prevent street homelessness, connect people to services and build housing faster.

Later this week, Governor Newsom will unveil his Administration's 2020-21 State Budget proposal. Chief among the new proposals will be a new, multi-pronged offensive to combat homelessness and address behavioral health needs across the state that in part fuel street homelessness, including \$750 million in a new California Access to Housing and Services Fund.

The Governor also announced signing an <u>executive order</u> today as part of a comprehensive state response to homelessness, including the creation of the California Access to Housing and Services Fund, availability of state land assets, and standing-up of a state crisis response team. The Governor is focused on prevention and early intervention; moving people off the streets and providing them services; and on creating new temporary housing to effectively reduce street homelessness. This comprehensive response requires shared responsibility and accountability by state and local government partners.

The state is leading with resources and technical assistance, all while acknowledging that local government leaders are critical to implementing homelessness solutions in their own communities. Metrics-based accountability is central to both the new California Access to Housing and Services Fund, as well as the assets made available through the executive order. In order to access the full spectrum of funding and facilities, local governments and service partners will need to demonstrate concrete progress toward measurable goals regarding moving people out of dangerous encampments and into more healthy, stable housing situations.

"The State of California is treating homelessness as a real emergency – because it is one. Californians are demanding that all levels of government – federal, state and local – do more to get people off the streets and into services – whether that's housing, mental health services, substance abuse treatment or all of the above," said Governor Newsom. "That's why we're using every tool in the toolbox – from proposing a massive new infusion of state dollars in the budget that goes directly to homeless individuals' emergency housing and treatment programs, to building short-term emergency housing on vacant state-owned land."

Many of the new proposals have been inspired by the work of Governor Newsom's Council of Regional Homeless Advisors, co-chaired by Sacramento Mayor Darrell Steinberg and Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas of Los Angeles County. The Governor appreciates the Council's commitment to proposing recommendations to address the homelessness crisis and looks forward to reviewing their full report in the coming weeks.

Today's steps augment previous actions by the Governor and implement a comprehensive crisis response strategy. In his first year in office, Governor Newsom fast-tracked shelter construction by removing regulatory barriers and streamlining Caltrans property availability, as well as securing passage of \$650 million of emergency homelessness aid to cities and counties, as part of a \$1 billion package to address homelessness and mental health. Today, cities, counties and continuums of care will receive their final allocations of this direct emergency aid. Full allocations can be found <a href="here">here</a>. This year, through the 2020-21 State Budget, his administration is proposing more than \$1 billion of new, direct initiatives that create housing opportunities for homeless individuals and provide treatment and other supportive services to people in need. Additionally, the Department of Social Services will be

awarding funding to eligible counties to reduce homelessness among families receiving child welfare services.

#### **2020-21 State Budget Proposal Investments to Tackle Homelessness**

Key elements of Governor Newsom's homelessness & mental health budget proposal:

- \$750 million fund to get individuals off streets and into supportive services quickly. More homeless infrastructure is being built, but the state still has a severe shortage of affordable and supportive housing units. The budget includes the creation of a California Access to Housing and Services Fund in the state Department of Social Services (DSS) to (a) pay rent for individuals facing homelessness; (b) support regions to bring on more dwelling units and (c) to help stabilize board and care facilities/homes. Unlike other state efforts, this money will go directly to service providers. The Governor proposes to seed this new fund with \$750 million in new one-time General fund, and calls on philanthropy and the private sector to step up as well.
- Transform Medi-Cal. The Budget includes \$695 million (including federal funds) growing to \$1.4 billion by 2022 for an effort to transform Medi-Cal to boost preventative health care that brings down the cost of health care all designed to pull down matching federal funds to do so. This expansion proposal formerly known as CalAIM and now called Medi-Cal Healthier California for All, would specifically address many challenges of chronically unsheltered populations providing funding for tenancy support services, housing navigation services, recuperative care, and could include targeted rental assistance if housing insecurity is tied to inappropriately high utilization of costly health care services. This reform will also change how counties operate behavioral health services, making them more closely integrated and act more like physical health services. Funding accounts for half of year one when the waiver begins plus a full year of funding in the next budget year.
- Community Care Collaborative Pilot (CCCP). The budget includes \$24.6 million in 2020-21 and \$364.2 million over 6-years for the Department of State Hospitals to implement efforts in three pilot counties to place individuals with mental health needs, specifically those designated Incompetent to Stand Trial, into stable placements in the community instead of state hospital placements.

#### Other actions:

- Root Causes of California Homelessness Study. The California Health and Human Services
  Agency, alongside academic researchers at UCSF and CA Policy Lab, are conducting a
  comprehensive, data-driven study to better understand the root causes of homelessness and more
  fully understand the situation in California. This will be a first-in-the-state interview survey that
  will look to better understand the needs of individuals who are experiencing homelessness across
  the state.
- Enforcing mental health parity. The Administration will work with health plans, providers, patient representatives, and other parties to update and strengthen enforcement of mental health parity laws, focusing on timely access to treatment, network adequacy, benefit design and plan policies.
- Behavioral Health Task Force and Prop 63 review. The Administration is establishing a
  Behavioral Health Task Force that will bring together relevant state departments, counties,
  advocates, health plans, providers, and other stakeholders to review existing policies and
  programs and coordinate system changes to prevent and respond to the impacts of mental illness
  and substance abuse in California. The Administration will consider updates to the Mental
  Health Services Act (Prop. 63) to serve persons with mental illness who are experiencing

homeless, justice-involved populations and early intervention of children. The Administration will submit a proposal in Spring 2020 regarding Prop. 63's proposed reforms, which may include new metrics to track local governments' use of these resources, namely the number of people served and the efficacy of spending.

#### **Executive Action to Address the Homelessness Crisis**

- Immediately establish the California Access to Housing and Services Fund. The Fund will receive future state appropriations, as well as donations from philanthropy and the private sector, to provide much needed dollars for additional affordable housing units, providing rental and operating subsidies, and stabilizing board and care homes.
- Identify state-owned land to temporarily house the homeless. The Governor will task the Department of General Services with identifying properties from the digitized inventory of excess state lands created by EO N-06-19 that can be used by local partners, including counties, cities, or non-profit agencies, on a short-term emergency basis to house individuals who are homeless, so long as such usage does not delay affordable housing development.
  - Caltrans will be similarly tasked to share a model lease template to allow local partners to use Caltrans property adjacent to highways or state roads in those jurisdictions on a short-term emergency basis to house individuals who are homeless, building on recent partnerships with the cities of Los Angeles, San Jose and San Francisco.
  - The Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development will be directed to work with local jurisdictions and provide entities to conduct an initial assessment of vacant and decommissioned hospitals and health care facilities that can be used by local partners on a short-term emergency basis to house the homeless.
  - The California Department of Food and Agriculture, in consultation with the Department of Housing and Community Development, the Department of Social Services and the Office of Emergency Services, will be directed to conduct an initial assessment of fairgrounds near jurisdictions where a shelter crisis is in effect.
- Stand up temporary camp trailers from the state fleet. The Governor will direct the Department of General Services to supply 100 camp trailers from the state fleet, and the Emergency Medical Services Authority to deploy modular tent structures, to provide temporary housing and delivery of health and social services across the state. These trailers will be made available to local partners to operate where certain criteria are met.
- Establish a multi-agency state crisis response team. The Governor will create a state crisis response team to assist local governments in addressing street homelessness, comprised of the Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council, the Business, Consumer Services, and Housing Agency; the Government Operations Agency; the Health and Human Services Agency; the Labor and Workforce Development Agency; and the State Transportation Agency. The strike team shall provide technical assistance and targeted direct support to counties, cities, and public transit agencies seeking to bring individuals experiencing homelessness indoors, and support those entities in bringing those individuals indoors and connecting them with appropriate health, human, and social services and benefits.

In September of last year, the Governor <u>signed 13 bills</u> into law to help confront the homelessness crisis and others to fuel new housing development. That same month, Governor Newsom <u>called on</u> the Trump administration to increase federal investments in housing options for people experiencing homelessness and requested 50,000 additional Housing Choice Vouchers (HCVs) and Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) vouchers.

In July, Governor Newsom <u>announced</u> regional leaders and statewide experts who will advise his Administration on solutions to address the state's homelessness epidemic.

Governor Newsom has also released hundreds of millions of dollars in <u>State Emergency Homeless Aid</u> and <u>issued a challenge</u> for cities and counties to partner with the state on immediate impact solutions to tackle homelessness.
