A PROCLAMATION OF THE CITY MANAGER OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE, CALIFORNIA, ACTING AS THE DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY SERVICES, DECLARING THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY EFFECTIVE 12:01 A.M. PACIFIC DAYLIGHT TIME ON MARCH 17, 2020

WHEREAS, Garden Grove Municipal Code Section 6.08.070(A)(1) empowers the City Manager, as the Director of Emergency Services, to declare the existence or threatened existence of a local emergency when the City is affected or likely to be affected by a public calamity and the City Council is not in session; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 8550 et seq., including Section 8558(c), authorize the City Manager to proclaim a local emergency when the City is threatened by conditions of disaster or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the City that are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the City; and

WHEREAS, a novel coronavirus, COVID-19, causes infectious disease and was first detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China in December 2019. Symptoms of COVID-19 include fever, cough, and shortness of breath; outcomes have ranged from mild to severe illness, and, in some cases, death. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has indicated the virus is a tremendous public health threat; and

WHEREAS, Chinese health officials have reported tens of thousands of cases of COVID-19 in China, with the virus reportedly spreading from person-to-person. COVID-19 illnesses, most of them associated with travel from Wuhan, are also being reported in 117 countries, with over 44,000 cases, including the United States; and

WHEREAS, on January 30, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared the outbreak a "public health emergency of international concern" and on March 11, 2020, the WHO elevated the public health emergency to the status of a pandemic. On January 31, 2020, United States Health and Human Services Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared a public health emergency for the United States to aid the nation's healthcare community in responding to COVID-19. On February 26, 2020, the County of Orange declared a local emergency and a local health emergency. On March 4, 2020, California Governor Gavin Newsom declared a State of Emergency in California; and

WHEREAS, on February 2, 2020, the federal government initiated the suspension of entry of foreign nationals who were in China during the 14-day period preceding their entry or attempted entry into the United States; and

WHEREAS, as of March 10, 2020, the WHO reported that, to date, 125,048 confirmed cases of COVID-19, 4,613 of which resulted in death, across 117 countries; and

WHEREAS, in declaring a State of Emergency, Governor Newsome indicated that, as of March 4, 2020, there were 129 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the United States, including 53 in California, and more than 9,400 Californians across 49 counties in home

monitoring based on possible travel-based exposure to the virus, with officials expecting the number of cases in California, the United States, and worldwide to increase; and

WHEREAS, Governor Newsom and the California Department of Health on March 11, 2020, issued a statement entitled "California Public Health Experts: Mass Gatherings Should be Postponed or Canceled Statewide to Slow the Spread of COVID-19," determining that gatherings should be postponed or canceled across the state until at least the end of March. Non-essential gatherings must be limited to no more than 250 people, while smaller events can proceed only if the organizers can implement social distancing of 6 feet per person. Gatherings of individuals who are at higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19 should be limited to no more than 10 people, while also following social distancing guidelines. Furthermore, essential gatherings should only be conducted if the essential activity could not be postponed or achieved without gathering, meaning that some other means of communication could not be used to conduct the essential function; and

WHEREAS, Governor Newsom on March 12, 2020 issued Executive Order N-25-20, ordering, inter alia, that all residents are to heed the orders and guidance of state and local public health officials; and

WHEREAS, the President Donald J. Trump on March 13, 2020 declared a national emergency to provide disaster funding, speed up the United States response to the crisis created by COVID-19, and to offer maximum flexibility to attack the problem; and

WHEREAS, the City of Garden Grove has the power to impose measures to promote social distancing including but not limited to limitations on public events; and

WHEREAS, Garden Grove is a densely populated city within Orange County, which is the sixth largest county in the United States, with one of the highest population densities; and

WHEREAS, conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property have arisen due to the potential introduction of COVID-19 to Garden Grove and Orange County; and

WHEREAS, such conditions are beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the City and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative to prepare for and respond to suspected or confirmed COVID-19 cases, to implement measures to mitigate the spread of COVID-19, and to prepare to respond to an increasing number of individuals requiring medical care and hospitalization; and

WHEREAS, if COVID-19 spreads in California at a rate comparable to the rate of spread in other countries, the number of persons requiring medical care may exceed locally available resources, and controlling outbreaks minimizes the risk to the public, maintains the health and safety of the community, and limits the spread of infection in the community and within the healthcare delivery system; and

WHEREAS, the mobilization of local resources, ability to coordinate interagency response, accelerate procurement of vital supplies, use mutual aid, and allow for future reimbursement by the state and federal governments will be critical to successfully responding to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager, as the City's Director of Emergency Services, has the power to declare a local emergency as authorized by Government Code section 8630 and Garden Grove Municipal Code section 6.08.070(A)(1).

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED by the City Manager of the City of Garden Grove as follows:

- A. As contemplated in the Emergency Services Act contained in Government Code Section 8550 et seq., including Section 8558(c), and Chapter 6.08 of Title 6 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code, as of 12:01 a.m. on March 17, 2020 a local emergency exists based on the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by an epidemic, as detailed in the recitals set forth above.
- B. The area of the City which is endangered/imperiled is the entire City.
- C. During the existence of this local emergency, the powers, functions, and duties of the emergency organization of this City shall be those prescribed by state law and by ordinances, resolutions, and orders of this City, including but not limited to the City of Garden Grove Emergency Operations Plan.
- D. The City Council shall review and ratify this proclamation within 7 days of its effective date as required by state law, and if ratified, shall continue to exist until the City Council proclaims the termination of this local emergency. The City Council shall review the need for continuing the local emergency as required by state law until it terminates the local emergency, and shall terminate the local emergency at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant.
- E. That the City of Garden Grove orders that, within the boundaries of the City of Garden Grove, the Public Health Experts' recommendations shall be deemed mandatory.

F. That a copy of this proclamation be forwarded to the Director of California Governor's Office of Emergency Services requesting that the Director find it acceptable in accordance with State Law; that the Governor of California, pursuant to the Emergency Services Act, issue a proclamation declaring an emergency in the City of Garden Grove; that the Governor waive regulations that may hinder response and recovery efforts; that recovery assistance be made available under the California Disaster Assistance Act; and that the State expedite access to State and Federal resources and any other appropriate federal disaster relief programs.

Executed this 16th day of March 2020 to take effect at 12:01 a.m. Pacific Daylight Time on the 17th day of March 2020.

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UPDATE: City Activates Emergency Operations, Close Facilities

In Response to State's Stronger Guidelines on Coronavirus

March 15, 2020

UPDATE (3/18/20; 5:20 p.m.)

The City of Garden Grove has activated its Emergency Operation Centers to respond to issues pertaining to COVID-19. The City has also undertaken immediate health and safety measures in accordance with state guidelines for all City facilities, programs, and events that will be in effect through March 31, 2020. This is in response to an updated policy on gatherings, recently issued by the California Department of Public Health and Governor Gavin Newsom, intended to protect public health and slow the spread of COVID-19.

"It goes without saying that the City's first priority, in any situation, is always the health and wellbeing of its residents, visitors, students, businesses, and employees. We're facing some of the most challenging times we've ever seen, but it's extremely important that we continue to work together to support, respect, and help each other, and assess our own personal situations with logical thought and calmness," said Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones.

The Garden Grove Police Department will be on a heightened alert to public safety issues regarding COVID-19. In order to limit any unnecessary contact or exposure to COVID-19, the Garden Grove Police Department's front lobby will be closed to all walk-in visitors. All nonemergency police business will be conducted by appointment only. Appointments can be made by calling the police department's non-emergency number at (714) 741-5704.

Important Information About SCE'S Requested Rate Increase

Why am I receiving this Notice?

On February 20, 2020 Southern California Edison (SCE) submitted an additional request in its 2021 "General Rate Case" (GRC) application to recover additional necessary revenue related to expenditures it made during 2018 and 2019 for wildfire mitigation activities and programs. This is known as "Track 2" of the GRC. The California Public Utilities Commission requires SCE to send notices to customers when it requests a rate increase.

Why is SCE requesting this rate increase?

SCE delivers your electricity. Every four years, SCE must file what is known as a GRC application with the CPUC. GRCs set rates that customers pay to fund SCE's day-to-day operations, including maintenance for its equipment and electricity grid upgrades.

The purpose of SCE's recent "Track 2" submission in its current GRC is for SCE to cover its costs for wildfire mitigation programs and activities from 2018 and 2019 that are not already reflected in customer rates. This includes costs for its employees to inspect and repair poles and distribution lines and for vegetation management activities intended to reduce wildfire risk. These costs are recorded in three CPUC-approved regulatory memorandum accounts.

How does the rest of the process work?

This application has been assigned to a Judge, who will consider all proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The Judge will issue a proposed decision which may adopt SCE's application, modify it or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners.

The California Public Advocates Office (CalPA) has reviewed this application. CalPA is the independent consumer advocate within the CPUC with a legislative mandate to represent investor-owned utility customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. CalPA has a multidisciplinary staff with expertise in economics, finance, accounting and engineering. How could this affect my monthly bill?

If SCE's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill would increase by approximately \$5.36 in 2021. The impacts will be less for lower-income residential customers enrolled in the California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE) program: \$3.62 in 2021.

The rates and percentages shown to the right are averages and are not the exact changes you may see in your bill. Changes in individual bills depends on how much energy each customer uses.

INTRODUCTION

This Comprehensive Quarterly Report provides an update on projects and activities, a summary of the outreach efforts and an overview of the agency's current budget and investment portfolio performance for the months of November 2019 through February 2020.

FY 2019-20 WORK PLAN PROJECTS

During the second quarter, OC LAFCO staff participated in meetings and discussions involving an anticipated project application, initiated the South Orange County Unincorporated Communities project, and participated in a number of CALAFCO activities. The following sections provide updates on the progress of the Commission's FY 2019-20 Work Plan achieved during this quarter.

ACTIVE AND ANTICIPATED PROJECT APPLICATIONS

Santa Margarita Water District Annexation of the City of San Juan Capistrano Water and Wastewater Utilities

In January, the governing boards of the Santa Margarita Water District (SMWD) and the City of San Juan Capistrano both approved an Annexation Agreement related to transfer of the water, recycled water and wastewater systems from the City to the District. In February, the SMWD Board approved a resolution to submit a formal application to OC LAFCO for the annexation of the utility systems. This application will represent a multi-year effort that involved coordination and ongoing discussions between the District, City and OC LAFCO. Once the application is received, OC LAFCO staff will prepare the analysis and process the application in conformance with the statutory requirements. It is anticipated that the proposal will be considered by the Commission in early Summer.



FOURTH CYCLE OF SPHERE OF INFLUENCE UPDATES AND MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEWS.

During this quarter, staff has focused on the review of data and other documents provided by Orange County Sanitation District and Municipal Water District of Orange County, the two regional agencies identified for MSRs in the 2019-20 work plan. Additional meetings and ongoing dialogue with the agencies will be required as part of the MSR preparation process. The remaining MSRs included in this year's project, which include the County service areas and the Southwest and Southeast MSR regions, have been delayed due to other Commission projects, such as the San Juan Capistrano utilities annexation to the Santa Margarita Water District. It is expected that activity related to these MSRs will be resumed during the third and fourth quarters.

Additionally, during this quarter significant progress was made in developing the MSR Dashboard, a dynamic and interactive web-based tool displaying demographic and other data on special districts, cities and other service providers in Orange County. The program is designed to provide a profile of each agency and incorporate an on-line tool that will allow the updating of demographic information regularly. The Dashboard and another technology tool, the Shared Services Program, are scheduled to be presented to the Commission in the Spring.

The purpose of revising a third web-based program, the Fiscal Trends Program, is to present a general depiction of the financial health of local agencies. This quarter, staff began an effort of updating the content and structure of the program, with completion anticipated this Summer.

SOUTH ORANGE COUNTY UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES

One of the strategic areas identified by the Commission for the FY 2019-20 Work Plan was to engage the South Orange County Unincorporated Communities (SOCUC) to assist with identifying a pathway to future governance. During this quarter, OC LAFCO staff began meeting with the communities to encourage participation in this effort and to receive preliminary feedback on

potential areas of mutual interest or challenges for the unincorporated communities in the region. The communities of Coto de Caza, Ladera Ranch, Las Flores, Stonecliffe and Wagon Wheel will be invited to participate in a joint meeting to be held this Spring.

Relatedly, staff continued to conduct quarterly meetings with the representatives of Rancho Mission Viejo to discuss the timeline for the development of its properties.



ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES

Election of OC LAFCO Officers for 2020

Each year, the Commission elects the officers of the Board. At the January meeting, the Commission re-elected Cheryl Brothers as Chair and Douglass Davert as Vice Chair. Chair Brothers is currently the Mayor of the City of Fountain Valley and has served as a LAFCO City Member since 2013. Vice Chair Davert is currently the Board President of East Orange County Water District and has served as a LAFCO Special District Member since 2018. Chair Brothers and Vice Chair Davert, together with Immediate Past Chair, Derek McGregor, will serve as the members of the agency's Executive Committee for 2020.

CALAFCO Activities and Awards

The CALAFCO Annual Conference was held in Sacramento on October 30 through November 1, 2019. The OC LAFCO staff participated in the planning process for the conference and served as coordinators and panelists for several sessions. The conference featured sessions on LAFCO's role involving facilitatina responses to local catastrophes and issues related to the lack housina. and the independence of LAFCO.



A session on "Preparing Complex MSRs"

Each year, during the annual conference, CALAFCO recognizes outstanding achievements by LAFCOs and individuals throughout the state. This year, OC LAFCO was awarded the Project of the Year which recognizes an organization for a project-specific program that involved complex analysis, community involvement, outstanding solution. The award recognized the leadership and effort of the Commission and staff for the City of San Juan Capistrano Water and Wastewater Utilities Municipal Service Review. In announcing the award, CALAFCO noted that this MSR resulted in a solution that ultimately will improve the efficient delivery of water and wastewater, two vital and regulated municipal services, to the communities. The award presenter also emphasized that the outcome of this project serves as a model of the importance of MSRs, which is a key mandate for all LAFCOs.

During the second quarter, staff also actively participated in the planning for the CALAFCO 2020 Staff Workshop. This

year, the workshop will be co-hosted by Orange and Imperial LAFCOs and held in Newport Beach, March 24 – 26, 2020. OC LAFCO staff has worked collaboratively with the City of Newport Beach on the development of a mobile workshop that will highlight projects within the Newport Harbor. The workshop will also include panel consisting of representatives from the County, City, and South Coast Water District who will share their experiences on delivering services to coastal residents and activities that require multi-agency collaboration.

EXTERNAL RELATIONS AND OUTREACH EFFORTS

External relations efforts conducted during this quarter provided the opportunity for staff to make educational presentations and to work with representatives from the County, cities, and special districts, and other OC LAFCO stakeholders on key Commission projects. A listing of those efforts is provided in the chart below.

In February, Executive Officer Carolyn Emery made a presentation to approximately 150 people attending the Property Tax Managers' Sub-Committee of the California State Association of County Auditors conference in Orange County. Ms. Emery provided background on LAFCO's legislative mission and highlighted the relationships between LAFCOs and the County Auditors. The session was very interactive, with the audience seeking additional information on LAFCO processes, statutory requirements and the Revenue and Taxation Code.

FY 2019-20 BUDGET OVERVIEW

This report provides a budget update for the period of November 2019 through February 2020. During this reporting period, the agency continued its efforts to provide services and programs effectively and efficiently. The following budget review details the bank account balances and provides a comprehensive overview of OC LAFCO revenues and expenditures for the period ending February 29, 2020 (see page 9). The total budget approved by the Commission for FY 2019-20 is \$1,258,650.

Revenues

By the first of November, the agency had received all of the apportionments from the funding agencies for a total of \$1,124,500. OC LAFCO also earns interest from its investment portfolio. To date, OC LAFCO has earned a total of \$19,507 in interest which is 108.4% of the amount anticipated for the year.

Another source of OC LAFCO revenue is the application filing fees. These filing fees are not used for budgeting purposes and are shown in the quarterly overview as revenue within the Special Fund column. The Special Fund column in the chart on page 9 includes an accounting of application revenues and expenses incurred during this fiscal year.

All financial statements contained in the CQ report are on an accrual accounting basis.

Expenditures

The total General Fund expenditures as of the period ending February 29, 2020 are \$683,776 or approximately 54 percent of the total budget. The following table provides the comparison of the percentage of actual funds used and the target levels for the current fiscal year.



Virus may foil best housing market in a decade

The U.S. housing market, which was headed for a hot spring-selling season, may not be so healthy after all.

As the expanding coronavirus outbreak slows economic activity, roiling markets around the world, there's a 60% chance of the U.S. economy going into a recession this year, said Mark Zandi, chief economist at Moody's Analytics Inc. That economic disruption would batter the housing market, despite record-low mortgage rates.

"Housing is being buffeted by two gale forces moving in opposite directions," Zandi said, referring to low rates and virus-fueled economic turmoil. "The question is, what's the end result of all that? In all likelihood, the recession will trump the lower rates."

The virus arrived just in time for the housing market's key season, which was shaping up to be one of the strongest in years. An unusually warm winter brought buyers out early to take advantage of the low rates, and they've had to battle for listings that are more scarce than ever.

Though stocks recovered somewhat Tuesday, markets have plunged in recent days, with down payments for some buyers evaporating. The rapid decline in oil prices last week likely will harm Texas and other states that depend on the energy sector. And as Americans hunker down at home, forgoing vacations and movie dates, service and retail workers may lose their jobs.







HANDY TIPS

Not all hand sanitizers are the same. The CDC says sanitizers with at least 60% alcohol can help you avoid getting sick and spreading germs to others.

A study published in the Journal of Hospital Infection suggested that coronaviruses could be "efficiently inactivated" with disinfectants that contain "62-71% ethanol, 0.5% hydrogen peroxide or 0.1% sodium hypochlorite within 1 minute," They also said agents that contain "0.05-0.2%" benzalkonium chloride or 0.02 percent chlorhexidine digluconate are less effective."



GG ranked low in sleep study

Video showing girls harassing Asian students at school draws reprimand

Called 'profane, disruptive, disrespectful and hostile' by Garden Grove Unified, mockery included shouts of 'coronavirus'

Two Garden Grove high school students videotaped themselves mocking Asian American students by shouting "coronavirus" during a school cultural assembly and harassing Vietnamese American classmates.

After one of the students posted the video on YouTube, where it went viral, they were blasted by other students and educators. Officials with Garden Grove Unified School District termed the actions depicted on the video as "unacceptable." Others described them as insensitive and racist.

The district, in an unsigned statement issued March 8,said it has opened an investigation into what officials termed "profane, disruptive, disrespectful and hostile words and actions" of the two teenage girls at Bolsa Grand High School, where 60% of the students are of Vietnamese descent. The district has not publicly identified the students by name.

Short video clips from the original account, which since has been shut down, have circulated on social media, garnering thousands of comments in English and Vietnamese.

The girls, who have been described as Latinas, are seen and heard laughing as one screams out "coronavirus" while students wearing Vietnamese outfits appear during an International Week assembly staged on campus March 6. In another clip, one of the girls picks up a traditional large Asianstyle hat, puts it on, dances while laughing, then throws it on the ground.

drew the attention of Garden Grove police, one of the girls briefly touches or hits the face of an Asian student wearing a face mask after telling her "Hey, b-." Both girls erupt in laughter as the Asian student turns her face away, saying, "No, thank you."

Garden Grove Unified officials said they received numerous reports and copies of the video that shows the two Bolsa Grande students "mocking and harassing many students and adults and specifically mocking/ harassing Vietnamese students in an assembly and on the campus."

The behaviors shown in the video are unacceptable and will not be tolerated by Bolsa Grande or (Garden Grove Unified)," district officials wrote. "Disruptive and bias/hate speech and actions have no place in our schools."

One Bolsa Grande High alumna, Teriann Nguyen, reposted the video clips in a widely shared Facebook post, saying she was angry to see the girls "mock and disrespect my culture and harassing another student because she was wearing a face mask."

The district also said Bolsa Grande Principal Tracy Conway sent a message to students, parents and staff over the weekend, assuring them that the video "does not portray the values of the diverse school and that the imaging presented is inappropriate and unacceptable and will not be tolerated. We deeply apologize for the pain this has caused our community."

Students who engage in such behaviors, "including hate/bias speech or activities" will face disciplinary action, said district spokeswoman Abby Broyles, who And in a video clip that added that any details of that we can do right now."

Many in the community remain outraged. As of March 11, an online petition calling for the girls' expulsion had been signed by 41,000 people.

Garden Grove police interviewed the girls March 9 and determined no crime was committed, said Lt. Richard Burillo. The face mask-wearing student who was touched by one of the girls told police she didn't believe she was deliberately hit and that she didn't want to press charges, Burillo added.

"It was more of a school conduct issue and should be handled internally by the school district," Burillo said.

In addition to contacting Garden Grove police, district officials also reached out to the nonprofit OC Human Relations agency and the Orange County Human Relations Commission.

The nonprofit agency, which works with the county, has been working with Garden Grove Unified in the wake of the 2019 release of various videos that showed ' members of the Pacifica High boys water polo team engaging in anti-Semitic activities. One video showed students singing a Nazi marching song while extending their arms in a Hitler salute.

Since that incident, OC Human Relations has offered training to student leaders across the district, and held community meetings, as part of a project to help promote a welcoming environment, said Alison Edwards, the agency's chief executive officer.

"We're living in contentious times," Edwards said. "The more we can all do to promote an Orange County where everyone feels safe, valued and included is some of the most important work

The League of California Cities Response to Coronavirus - A Message from Executive Director Carolyn Coleman

March 13, 2020

City Leaders,

As the situation around novel coronavirus (COVID-19) continues to rapidly evolve, we want you to know that the health and safety of the League community are top priorities. I'm grateful to the city officials who are working diligently with League staff to help all of us respond to the crisis.

We remain in direct communication with Governor Newsom's Office, the California Office of Emergency Services, the California Department of Public Health, as well as federal agencies and local health agencies, and based on their guidance, we are taking action to help city leaders protect their communities, and to protect our employees and maintain League operations.

As you may already know, we have created an <u>online COVID-19 resource</u> curated specifically for local officials, which is updated on a daily basis and includes yesterday's executive order by Governor Newsom to further enhance state and local government's ability to respond to COVID-19. Among other items, the order "Allows local or state legislative bodies to hold meetings via teleconference and to make meetings accessible electronically." The full executive order can be found <u>here</u>. Item #11 in the executive order also addresses suspension of certain Brown Act rules.

Status of League Events:

Based on current guidance from the <u>Governor's Office and state health officials</u>, and with the concurrence of President Dunbar, we have decided to cancel the Public Works Officers Institute & Expo scheduled March 18-20 in Monterey. In addition, the Policy Committees scheduled to meet in person April 2-3 in Anaheim will be rescheduled and conducted via webinar technology. We will be in touch with committee members next week with details on how we will proceed with these important meetings and regret any inconvenience these changes may cause you. Our goal in making these changes is to reduce the risk of inadvertently contributing to the spread of the coronavirus. We also understand the importance of city leaders being visible and present in their communities during a crisis.

Currently, all other scheduled League events and conferences are moving forward as planned but may be canceled, modified, or postponed depending on updated guidance and in consultation with local health officials. We will notify you if there are further changes. For the status of division meetings, please contact your <u>Regional Public Affairs Manager</u>.

We understand what a difficult time this is for local leaders throughout the state who are on the front lines of responding to the coronavirus pandemic and want you to know you can count on the League to support you. 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Cities rise to the challenge during coronavirus outbreak

March 18, 2020

Over the past week, Californians have been hit with increasing coronavirus (COVID-19) case numbers, unprecedented regulations, unparalleled closures of schools, restaurants, and stores, and cancelling of events.

As COVID-19 continues to spread through California communities, life is changing dramatically for cities and towns, seemingly by the minute.

While Gov. Gavin Newsom issues executive orders and recommendations in an attempt to minimize the spread of the virus and protect the health and wellbeing of people and businesses, city leaders have quickly moved to enact the state measures and guidance locally to protect people in their communities.

A number of cities such as <u>Culver City</u>, <u>Lynwood</u>, <u>San Jose</u>, and <u>San Francisco</u>, have moved to ban evictions if the inability for the tenant to pay rent is due to the financial impact of the pandemic.

The <u>City of Fresno</u> issued a moratorium on shutting off people's water and stopping garbage services, postponed business license tax payments deadlines, and added an ordinance against price gouging. The city attorneys in <u>Los Angeles</u> and <u>San Diego</u> have also made it clear that taking advantage of the consumers with unfair prices during the coronavirus outbreak will not be tolerated.

Media reports out of <u>Los Angeles</u> and <u>Oakland</u> are documenting the work many cities are doing to try to ensure that those experiencing homelessness in their communities receive greater protection from coronavirus.

In <u>Long Beach</u>, the city council unanimously voted to direct city staff to develop an economic resiliency program which would assist Long Beach families, workers and small businesses affected by the COVID-19 outbreak.

"This public health emergency is also an economic emergency," said Mayor Robert Garcia. "We are taking decisive action to support families and small businesses that need support. No one should lose their home due to this crisis and this economics package is just the beginning."

The <u>Lakewood</u> City Council unanimously signed a statement expressing concern about the hoarding and buying of excessive quantities of toilet paper, bottled water, food, and supplies by some shoppers that result in shortages for other residents. City staff designed a poster to

discourage the hoarding, which will be offered to each of the city's grocery stores.

There are certainly more stories of proactive and protective measures by cities to respond to the outbreak that are still undocumented. However, a quick search online shows that nearly every city in California has published a webpage dedicated to coronavirus education and resources for residents and businesses. The state launched a <u>COVID-19 specific webpage</u> today.

The League <u>coronavirus resource</u> and <u>response webpage</u>, launched a week ago, has attracted 4,387 page visits in just seven days. The webpage curates COVID-19 news, resources, and guidance specifically geared toward local leaders to help navigate the current situation and is updated as new developments occur.

The League remains in direct communication with the Governor's Office, the California Office of Emergency Services, the California Department of Public Health, as well as federal agencies, and updates are going out to city leaders regularly to provide them with the information needed to protect their communities and operations.

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Cities Encouraged to Coordinate with Operators on Beverage Container Redemption Pilot Project Grants

March 18, 2020

The California Department of Resource Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) has modified its determination on who can be a grantee in relation to the funding allocated by AB 54 for the <u>Beverage Container Redemption Pilot Project Grant Program</u>.

This program will provide opportunities for California local governments and recycling center operators to improve redemption opportunities for eligible beverage containers and increase recycling rates in unserved convenience zones statewide. Cities are among the jurisdictions that are eligible to apply.

These modifications allow pilot project recyclers (PPR), which are certified to operate in those pilot projects, eligible for grants, and allow PPR operators that use and rely on the equipment and vehicles purchased with the grant funds to own that equipment.

While the jurisdictions and pilot project recyclers will have separate grant agreements under an approved pilot project, the combined amount of grant funds shall not exceed the total amount approved for that pilot project. CalRecycle strongly encourages jurisdictions and PPR operators to work together to determine how the funding will be split to cover the costs of the approved pilot project to ensure the maximum amount allowable does not exceed \$1,000,000.

A jurisdiction must apply for a beverage container recycling pilot project and be approved by CalRecycle before being considered for grant funding. Additionally, a PPR operator must be certified as a pilot project recycler for an approved pilot project to be eligible for funding consideration. Cities should review the <u>Pilot Project Requirements</u> to apply for a project and the <u>Beverage Container Redemption Pilot Project Grant Program</u> link for specific grant requirements.

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Deadline Extended: Wildfire Resiliency and Recovery Planning Grant Program

March 18, 2020

In consideration of the the evolving COVID-19 situation, the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) is working on a plan to extend the deadline to submit applications for the <u>Wildfire Resiliency and Recovery Planning Grants</u>.

These grants make a total of approximately \$720,000 available – up to three to five grants between \$150,000 and \$250,000 – to support recovery and resilience activities in California communities affected by wildfires.

Prop. 84, passed in 2006, directed funds to protect natural resources vital to public health, California's economy, and the environment. The California Strategic Growth Council (SGC) has awarded over \$66 million through Prop. 84 between 2010 and 2018.

Eligibility

Eligible applicants for the Wildfire Resiliency and Recovery Planning Grants include local and regional governments (cities, counties, tribes, and metropolitan planning organizations) representing California areas affected by wildfires between 2017 and 2019.

Application Timeline, Guideline and Resources

The program's timeline is currently being revised, based in part on continuing guidance regarding social interactions, as well as the SGC's public meeting schedule, since the council approves the program's grant awards. Although SGC and OPR have not yet confirmed the new submission deadline, they will provide a minimum three week extension beyond the original March 18 deadline.

Once SGC and OPR have established a revised submission deadline, they will send announcements to their email lists, and their staff will individually email all applicants who have started applications on the GRanTS application platform. The grant application and guidelines can be accessed through the <u>SGC website</u>.

In the meantime, OPR will continue to answer your questions and remain available to provide updates and information.

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California City Leaders attend NLC Congressional City Conference

Thousands of local officials, partners, and municipal staff left a resounding message of strength in our nation's capital last week for the 55th annual National League of Cities Congressional City Conference.

America's largest legislative conference for local leaders included important policy discussions, engaging general session speakers, collaborative networking opportunities, and a spotlight on the power of cities. League of California Cities President John F. Dunbar, First Vice President Cheryl Viegas Walker, Second Vice President Cindy Silva, Immediate Past President Jan Arbuckle, and League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman led the California delegation of more than a hundred local leaders, along with Joe Buscaino, the NLC president, League of California Cities board member, and Los Angeles city council member.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Spearheads Conversations at the Congressional City Conference With concerns increasing surrounding the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, NLC prioritized programming, resources, and precautionary measures on-site at this year's conference. NLC also provided real-time updates and resources for attendees to take back to their cities, towns, and villages.

"California's city leaders are working around the clock to ensure the safety and wellbeing of their residents," said Coleman. "Now, more than ever, a productive local-federal partnership is vital as we navigate this public healthy emergency."

On March 10, NLC hosted an important town hall moderated by Lindsey Horvath, mayor pro tem of West Hollywood and chair of NLC's Human Development Committee. Horvath's guest, Dr. Oscar Alleyne, chief of Programs and Services at the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) gave a detailed situational summary of COVID-19 and an overview of best practices in public safety and preparing your home, schools, and local communities. Dr. Alleyne's presentation is available online.

Chief Medical Officer at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Dr. Mitchell Wolfe provided a high-level breakdown to city leaders of coronavirus symptoms, preventions, and recommended responses.

"We have engaged with state and local partners on a very regular basis and we're always looking for opportunities to do more." Dr. Wolfe said. "I highly encourage everyone to work with their local

health department."

League Officers joined members of NLC's Board of Directors in a meeting with Vice President Mike Pence at the end of the conference to discuss the local-federal partnership needed to address the coronavirus pandemic.

"We discussed the critical coordination needed to respond to the coronavirus public health emergency and protect the health and well-being of our residents," said Buscaino. "There are a number of issues we can work on together to serve our cities, towns, and villages, and I look forward to productive communication and partnership in the coming weeks."

NLC Congressional City Conference Concluded Atop Capitol Hill with Advocacy Day

Capitol Hill Advocacy Day was the culmination of all the calls to action during NLC's conference and was a huge success, reaffirming that local and federal officials must lead together and with urgency during these unprecedented times.

California's delegation joined 363 participating local officials across 39 states to meet with congressional members and staff throughout the day. California League leaders discussed the League's 2020 Strategic Priorities and advocated for increased funding for critical grant programs for cities to support housing, transportation, and infrastructure investments. The League's leadership shared these priorities with House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, Sen. Dianne Feinstein, Rep. Anna Eshoo, Rep. Mark DeSaulnier, Rep. Mike Thompson, and Rep. Judy Chu.

"The recent global events show how important it is for collaboration and communication across all levels of government," said President Dunbar. "Advocacy Day is an important opportunity for local governments to share the ways in which we can partner with Congress on our shared goals for improving the quality of life for those who live, work, and raise families in California communities."

The local government temporary takeover of Capitol Hill was a success. Overall, 172 members of Congress across key committees listened to the concerns of their constituents and committed to working together.
