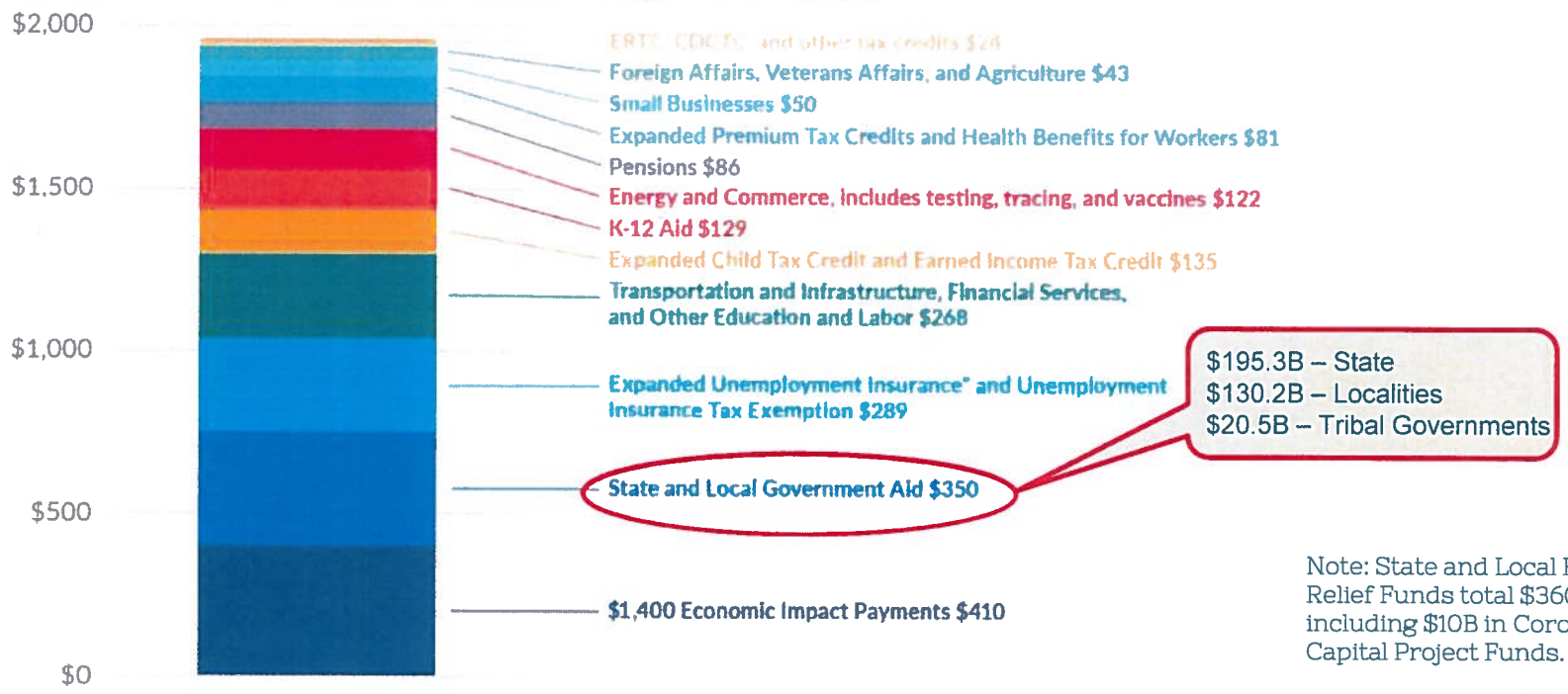

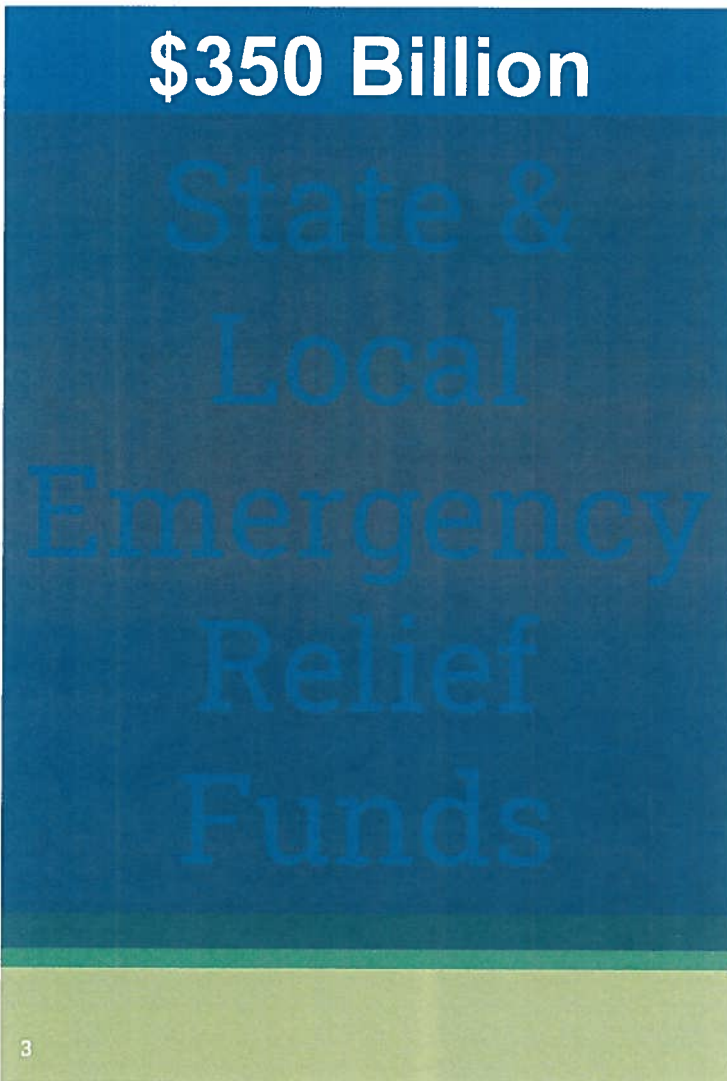
# Components in the \$1.9 Trillion American Rescue Plan Act

## Allocation to Cities – \$65 Billion

### Allowable Uses

- Respond to COVID-19 emergency and address its economic effects
- Provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue due to COVID-19
- Invest in water, sewer or broadband infrastructure
- Provide premium pay for eligible workers performing essential work during the pandemic

### Disallowed Uses

- Deposit into pension funds
- Directly or indirectly offset tax cut



## Allocation to Cities - \$65 Billion

- Estimated amount allocated to **Garden Grove - \$50.6M**
- First half to be distributed within 60 days of submitting a Certification of Need, the remainder 12 months later
- Allocation is based on FY2020 CDBG Entitlement Awards distributed, subject to change

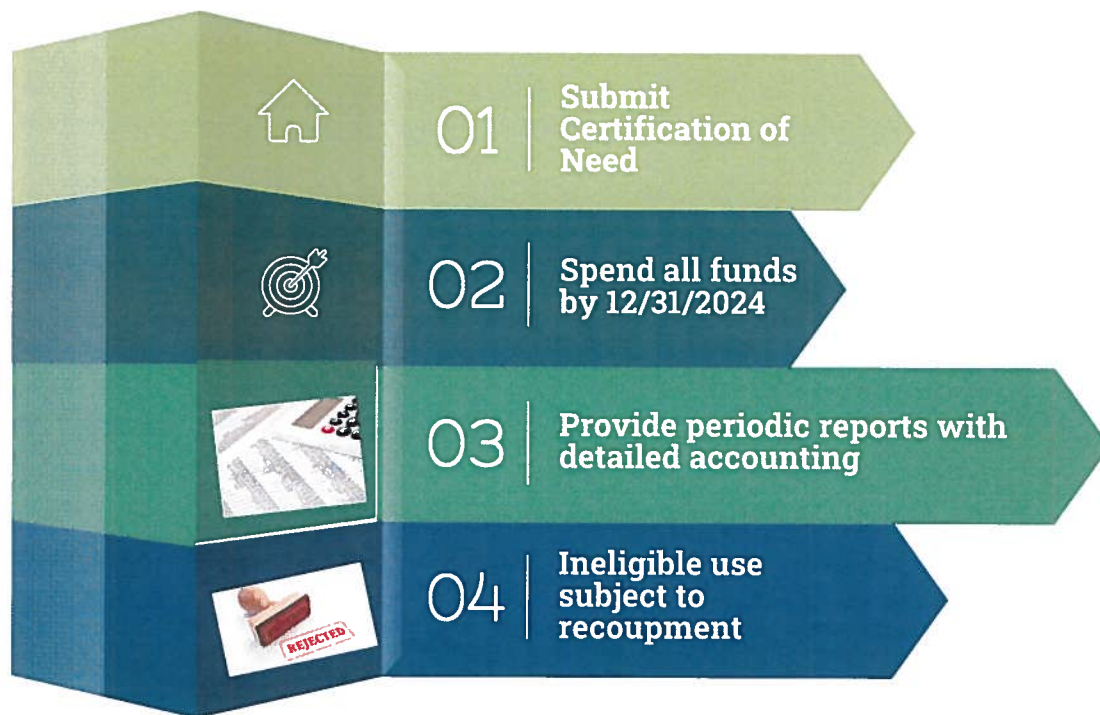
## Proposed Uses

## AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN

### The American Rescue Plan

The COVID-19 pandemic and the corresponding economic crisis have undermined the health and economic wellbeing of American workers. Millions of Americans, many of whom are people of color, immigrants, and low-wage workers, continue to put their lives on the line every day to keep the country functioning through the pandemic. And more than 9.5 million workers have lost their jobs in the wake of COVID-19, with 4 million out of work for half a year or longer. Without additional government assistance, the economic and public health crises could drag on and our national vaccination program will be hobbled at a critical moment.

The American Rescue Plan will change the course of the pandemic and deliver immediate relief for American workers. The plan will build a bridge to an equitable economic recovery and immediately reduce child poverty. In fact, a Columbia University study found that passing the plan will lift more than 5 million children out of poverty this year, cutting the poverty rate by 50%. The bill is one of the most progressive pieces of legislation in history, with more than two thirds of its tax cuts and direct payments going to families making less than \$90,000 per year. It will:

**Mount a national vaccination program, contain COVID-19, and safely reopen schools.** American workers should not have to lie awake at night wondering if they'll make it home from work safely the next day, or if they'll bring home the virus to their loved ones and communities. President Biden has a comprehensive plan to address the pandemic that will:

- Invest about \$160 billion to provide the supplies, emergency response, testing, and public health workforce to stop the spread of COVID-19, while distributing vaccines as quickly as possible and addressing racial disparities in COVID-19 outcomes. These emergency measures will help combat the heavy toll this virus is exacting, and will deliver community-based and culturally competent care.
- Provide \$130 billion to help schools serve all students, no matter where they are learning, and help achieve President Biden's goal to safely open the majority of K-8 schools within the first 100 days of his Administration. These investments include set asides at the local and state level to ensure states and districts address the learning loss and social and emotional needs of students disproportionately impacted by COVID-19, including students of color, English learners, and students with disabilities.

**Deliver immediate relief to American families bearing the brunt of this crisis.** The American Rescue Plan devotes about \$1 trillion towards building a bridge to economic recovery for working families. All told, a single parent with one young child making the minimum wage could see her income increase from the equivalent of \$7.25 to around \$11 per hour. The plan will:

- Give working families a \$1,400 per-person check, bringing their total relief payment from this and the December down payment to \$2,000. More than 85% of households will receive a check and checks in this bill are bigger than the checks in the CARES Act or in the December bill. And, for the first time, adult dependents are entitled to a check as well. This means a lower or middle-income family of four will see an additional \$5,600 in their pockets.
- Extend current unemployment insurance benefits and eligibility to September 6 (saving 11 million Americans from losing benefits starting in about a week), provide a \$300 per week supplement, and help protect Americans from surprise tax bills on unemployment insurance they received last year.

## AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN

### The American Rescue Plan: Impacts on California

#### The Need for Action in California

*The pandemic and the associated economic crisis have had a severe impact on California. The need for action is clear:*

- Since the pandemic began, more than 3.5 million people have been infected with COVID-19 and more than 54,000 people have died.
- The unemployment rate is 9.3%, up from 4.3% before the pandemic.
- Since February 2020, more than 1.6 million fewer people are employed.
- 3.2 million adults – 13% of all adults in the state – report not having enough food to eat. This includes 1.8 million adults living with children, or 17% of all adults living with children, who report that the children in their household do not have enough to eat.
- An estimated 1.9 million renters or 16% of renters are not caught up on rent.
- An estimated 11.4 million adults or 41% of all adults statewide report having difficulty covering normal household expenses.

#### The Effect of the American Rescue Plan on California

*President Biden's American Rescue Plan will provide California with:*

- \$27 billion in state fiscal relief
- \$18.5 billion in local fiscal relief
- More than \$15 billion in relief for K-12 schools
- Economic impact payments of up to \$1,400 per person (above the \$600 per person provided in December) for more than 22 million adults and 9 million children. This is 80% of all adults in the state and 81% of all children in the state.
- Additional relief of up to \$1,600 per child through the Child Tax Credit to the families of 7.8 million children, lifting 553,000 children out of poverty
- Additional relief of up to nearly \$1,000 through the Earned Income Tax Credit to 1.8 million childless workers, including many in frontline jobs
- Marketplace health insurance premiums that are \$1,270 lower per month for a 60-year old couple earning \$75,000 per year

# HEALTH EQUITY METRICS

- ▶ **For a county with a population of greater than 106,000, the county must:**
  - ▶ **Equity Metric.** Ensure that the test positivity rates in its most disadvantaged neighborhoods, referred to as the Health Equity Quartile of the Healthy Places Index census tracts, do not significantly lag behind its overall county test positivity rate.
- ▶ **The California Healthy Places Index measures 25 indicators:**
  - ▶ Economic
  - ▶ Social
  - ▶ Education
  - ▶ Transportation
  - ▶ Housing
  - ▶ Environment
  - ▶ Neighborhood

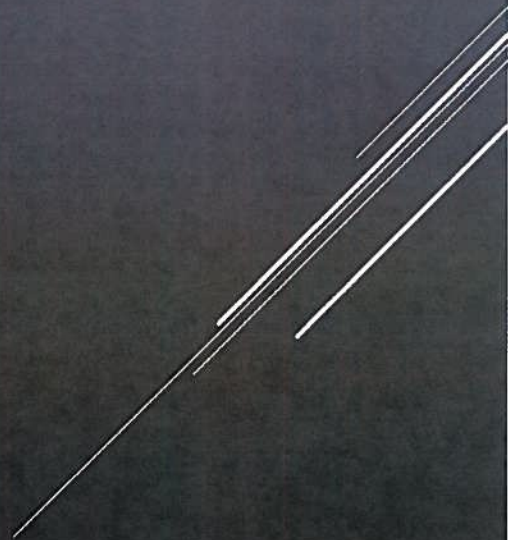

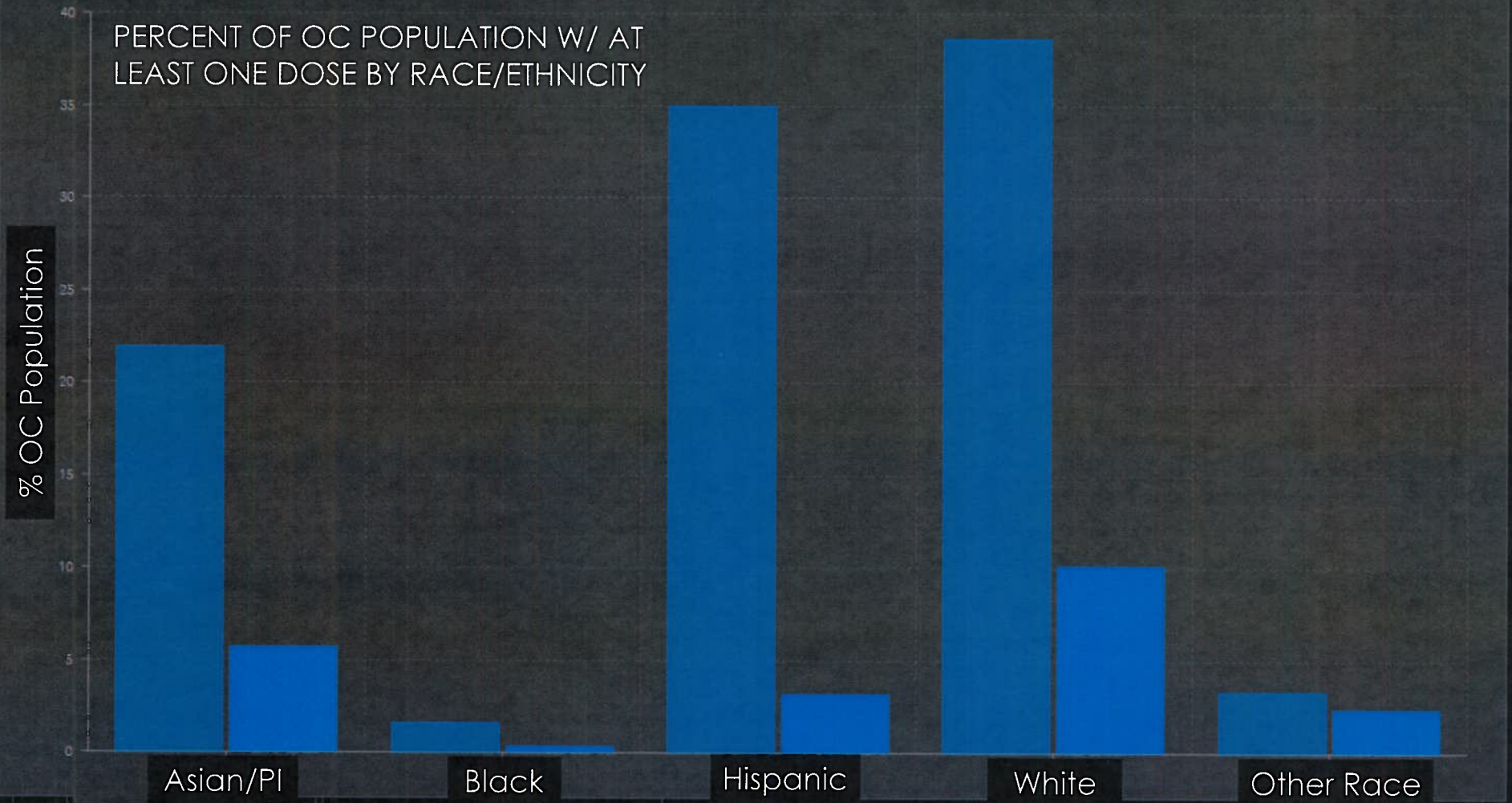






Percent with at Least One Dose to Percent Orange County Population

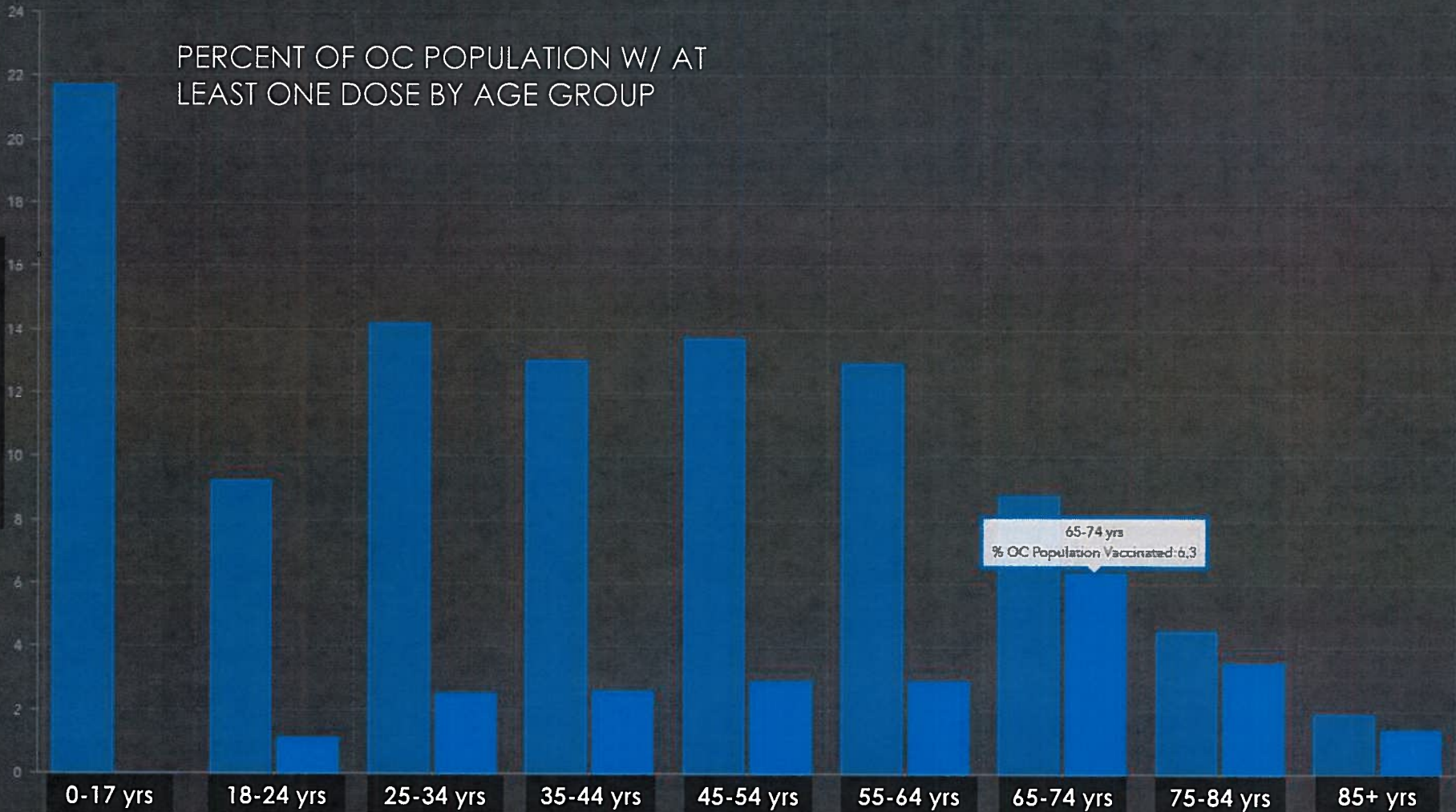
### PERCENT OF OC POPULATION W/ AT LEAST ONE DOSE BY RACE/ETHNICITY

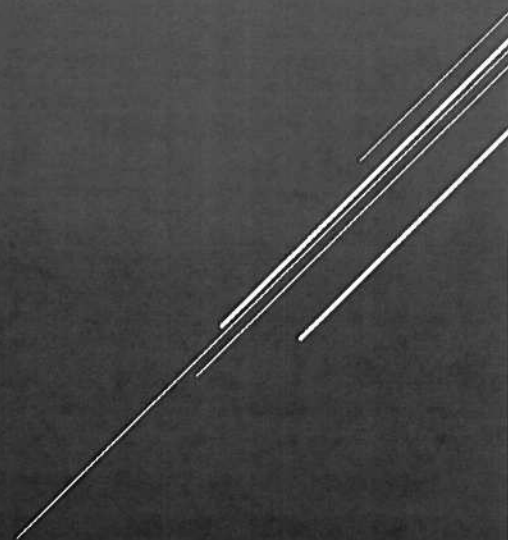

Fee increases made pursuant to Rule 320 are automatic unless the Governing Board decides to forego them. 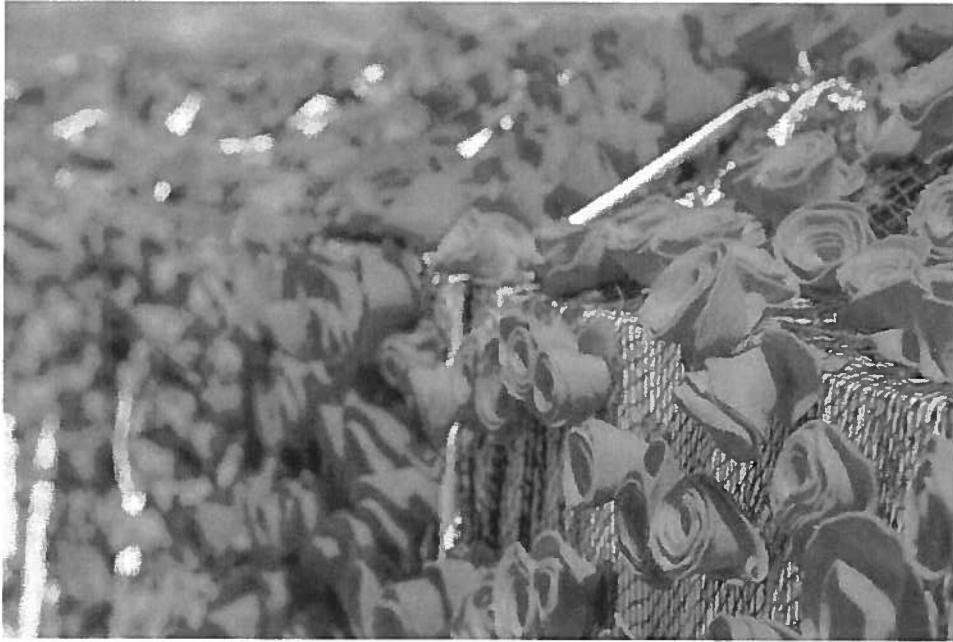

Standing in front of a display honoring those in Orange County who have died from the coronavirus, Bishop Kevin Vann blessed more than 4,600 handmade felt roses representing the lives lost.

The individual pieces make up the Rose River Memorial, which will be on display at the Christ Cathedral in Garden Grove through June 30. It was first displayed at the Orange County Museum of Art.

The roses blessed Tuesday, March 23, were made by members of the community with the creative guidance of Los Angeles artist Marcos Lutyens. The OC Autism Foundation is sponsoring the display at the Small Gallery near the cathedral's Arboretum. It will eventually travel to be part of a larger display planned in Washington, D.C., in 2022.

## Dozens attend rally against Asian hate Sunday in Garden Grove

Several dozen people attended a rally against Asian hate at Village Green Park in Garden Grove on Sunday afternoon, March 21, as multiple crimes against Asian Americans have gained notoriety recently throughout the nation.

Various advocacy groups for racial justice in minority communities aligned to decry anti-Asian sentiments and hate crimes against Asian Americans that have played out across the country since 2020, said rally contributor Koko Dodson with Minorities Make America.

Police in several major cities saw a sharp uptick in Asian-targeted hate crimes between 2019 and 2020, data from the Center for the Study of Hate & Extremism at California State University, San Bernardino shows.

On Tuesday, March 16, a gunman went to three Georgia massage parlors and killed eight people, six of them women of Asian descent. As concerns were raised throughout the nation that hate and race played obvious, inextricable roles in those shootings, the gunman, who is White, claimed that the attacks were not racially motivated and that he was acting out of a “sex addiction,” according to the Cherokee County Sheriff’s Office in Georgia.

Killed in the shootings were: Hyun Jung Grant, 51; Soon Chung Park 74; Suncha Kim, 69; Yong Ae Yue, 63; Delaina Ashley Yaun, 33; Paul Andre Michels, 54; Daoyou Feng, 44; and Xiaojie Tan, 49, who owned one of the massage businesses.

At the Garden Grove rally, signs displayed such messages as “racism is a virus,” “your fetish dehumanizes Asian women” and “protect our elders.” One speaker wondered if she would make it home alive while walking after dark.

At a similar rally and candlelight vigil in Alhambra on Saturday, someone showed a local TV reporter a video posted to social media that appeared to depict an Asian woman being berated at a gas station in Fullerton on the basis of her race. A woman could be heard in the video saying things such as, “Go back where you came from” and telling the woman to bow.

The Fullerton Police Department was not aware of the incident as of Monday afternoon, March 22, and said it does not have any documented incidents close to the one the video appears to depict, said Cpl. Billy Phu, a department spokesman.

## Cal Cities highlights top bills affecting cities this legislative session

March 24, 2021

The Cal Cities legislative team briefed more than 280 city leaders March 18 on the most important bills affecting cities this year.

The pandemic has presented many changes to the legislative process, but it certainly did not impact the amount bills that were introduced. Many measures stalled due to a compressed legislative timeline in 2020, and as a result legislators are eager to pass thousands of pandemic-related and non-pandemic-related bills. In total, 2,572 bills were introduced before the bill introduction deadline Feb. 19. Cal Cities is monitoring 1,885 of those bills.

In addition to the bills highlighted in the webinar, Cal Cities has already issued action alerts on two high priority bills, SB 9 (Atkins) and SB 278 (Leyva).

It is critical that the Legislature hears from California cities about how bills will affect communities, and we urge all cities to submit position letters on these important measures.

## Cal Cities embarks on governance evaluation to enhance engagement, effectiveness, and inclusivity

March 24, 2021

To enhance member engagement in leadership opportunities, increase overall effectiveness in fulfilling the organization's mission and vision, and ensure the pathway to leadership is transparent and inclusive, the League of California Cities is conducting an evaluation of its governance system, encompassing the organization's structure, bylaws, culture, policies, and practices.

In 2018, the League of California Cities board adopted a three-year strategic action plan that would build on the organization's current success, guide its growth, and take the impact and value delivered to California cities to even greater levels.

The governance evaluation aligns with one of the six key goals in the strategic action plan roadmap: Advocacy, Education and Training, Organizational Effectiveness, Membership, Visibility, and Governance. Cal Cities has made great strides achieving the goals in the plan, and the work towards success continues with the evaluation.

Cal Cities has engaged an association governance expert to carry out the evaluation and prepare findings and recommendations to present to the board at the 2021 summer meeting. Meaningful engagement in the governance evaluation process with key stakeholders – including members active in caucuses, departments, and divisions sharing their experiences, perceptions, and ideas – is important to achieving our goal. That's why the evaluation process includes gathering member input through a variety of strategies, including targeted surveys, focus groups, interviews, and forums.

Cal Cities President Cheryl Viegas Walker, mayor, El Centro, appointed members to a small advisory group with whom the governance expert will engage at different points in the process to bring an internal lens to the review, share personal experiences with the organization's governance, deepen the insight from research findings, and bring into focus a vision and set of qualities for ideal Cal Cities governance.

## Cal Cities-sponsored bond agency issues nearly \$11 million in tax-exempt bonds for affordable housing in Riverside

New affordable housing for low-income residents in the city of Riverside will be constructed with funding from the issuance of \$10,947,285 million in tax-exempt and taxable multi-family affordable housing bonds through the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA).

St. Michael's Apartments is the new construction of 50 housing units in Riverside, which provides the community with one- and two-bedroom apartments to low-income residents. The project will ensure that 100 percent of the rental housing units will be rent restricted for low-income tenants, and affordable units will be restricted to households earning 30-80 percent of the area median income.

CSCDA and the project sponsor, Community Development Partners, partnered with Citibank and Orrick Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP to provide \$10,947,285 million in affordable housing bonds to build the project. The financing for the project will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.

Cal Cities' co-sponsorship of CSCDA continues to be a significant benefit for cities. CSCDA has issued more than \$63 billion in tax-exempt bonds for projects that provide a public benefit by creating jobs, affordable housing, healthcare, infrastructure, schools, and other fundamental services.

CSCDA is a joint powers authority created in 1988 and is sponsored by the League of California Cities and the California State Association of Counties. More than 530 cities, counties, and special districts are program participants in CSCDA, which serves as their conduit issuer and provides access to efficiently finance locally-approved projects.

## Dozens of cities receive grant funding to mitigate utility-initiated power shutoffs

In an effort to protect local communities and vulnerable Californians from the impact of utility-initiated power shutoffs, the state announced on March 17 the distribution of \$50 million in Community Power Resiliency grants for cities, counties, tribes, and special districts.

The grants, awarded by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, include \$13 million distributed across 51 cities. Each city was allowed to apply for up to \$300,000 on a competitive basis.

The state is encouraging cities to allocate funds they received through the grant to designated priority areas, including schools, election offices, food storage reserves, and COVID-19 testing sites.

The funds were allocated through the 2020-21 State Budget, and are the second round of resiliency grants from the budget cycle.

In FY 2019-20, cities received an additional \$10 million in resiliency grants. The League of California Cities supported the inclusion of grants to protect vulnerable populations and improve resiliency of the state's critical infrastructure in response to utility-led public safety power shutdown actions in both budget cycles.
