CITY OF GARDEN GROVE DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY SERVICES EXECUTIVE ORDER

March 26, 2020

Whereas, on February 26, 2020 the County of Orange declared a local emergency and a local health emergency due to the spread of the novel coronavirus, COVID-19. On March 4, 2020, California Governor Gavin Newsom declared a State of Emergency in California due to COVID-19. On March 13, 2020, United State President Donald J. Trump declared a national emergency due to COVID-19; and

Whereas, on March 16, 2020 effective at 12:01 a.m. on March 17, 2020 the Garden Grove Director of Emergency Services did proclaim the existence of a local emergency due to COVID-19; and

Whereas, on March 24, 2020 the Garden Grove City Council ratified the proclamation of the local emergency in the City due to COVID-19 and confirmed the imposition of the various local orders applicable in the City during the existence of the local emergency, including the activation of the Emergency Operation Center, closure of various City facilities and cancellation of programs thereon, suspension of street sweeping citation, suspension of water shut-offs, suspension of the limitations in the Garden Grove Municipal Code on the hours of operation of, and deliveries to, businesses and establishments engaged in essential activities.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Scott C. Stiles, City Manager of the City of Garden Grove, acting as the Director of Emergency Services do hereby issue the following orders to become effective immediately:

- 1. The orders issued pursuant to the proclamation of the local emergency scheduled to expire on March 31, 2020 are hereby extended through Friday, April 17, 2020.
- Late payments for water bills will be accepted without penalty if paid by May 1, 2020.


Monthly Water Usage Data, Tier 2 Projection & Water Supply Information

The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Imported Water Sales for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply in January.
 OCWD Groundwater was the main supply in January.
- OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years
 Water usage in
 January 2020 was above average compared to the last 5 years. We are projecting a slight increase in overall water usage compared to FY 2018-19. It has been 34 months since all mandatory water restrictions were lifted by the California State Water Resources Control Board.
- Historical OC Water Consumption Orange County M & I water consumption is estimated to be 527,000 AF in FY 2019-20 (this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 11,000 AF more than FY 2018-19 and is about 14,000 AF less than FY 2017-18. Water usage per person is projected to be slightly higher in FY 2019-20 for Orange County at 144 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts. O.C. Water Usage for the last four Fiscal Years is the lowest since the 1982-83 Fiscal Year (FY 1982-83 was the third wettest year on record).

<u>Water Supply Information</u> Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.


- Orange County's accumulated precipitation through early March was average for this period. Water year to date rainfall in Orange County is 6.75 inches, which is 70% of normal.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation through early March was 50% of normal for this period. Water Year 2019 was 137% of normal while water year 2018 was 82% of normal. The Northern California snowpack was 48% of normal as of March 2nd. As of late February, 23.34% of California is experiencing moderate drought conditions while 69.74% of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation was increased to 15% in January 2020.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through late February was 92% of normal for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 109% of normal as of February 24th. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 68% of their average storage volume for this time of year and are at 46.8% of their total capacity. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. As of early March, Lake Mead levels were 21.38' above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the start of 2020 will not hit the "trigger" level but there is a 4% chance that the trigger level will be hit in 2021 and a 24% chance in 2022.



Treasurer-Tax Collector Freidenrich Will Grant Penalty Relief for Taxpayers As Allowed by Existing State Law

SANTA ANA – Treasurer-Tax Collector Freidenrich announces her full support for waiver of penalties, costs or other charges as allowed by existing state law for taxpayers that fail to make a timely payment. The impact of the COVID-19 has been financially devastating for many Orange County taxpayers.

The last timely payment date remains at April 10, as neither the County nor the Treasurer-Tax Collector has the legal authority under the statute to change or extend this date. The April 10 date is set by state law, which can only be amended by the legislature.

We understand that the Federal and State governments have granted extensions for both the Federal and State Income Tax deadlines and as noted above, the County has no authority to change state law. If the State were to extend the deadline, it would have a significantly impact on local governments and K-12 School and Community College Districts (Schools) revenues, who have only received just over half of the annual property tax for this year.

In many local governments, property taxes represent one of the largest single annual revenue sources and pay for the public safety and other local government services you receive daily during the year. In addition, Schools are the largest recipient of property taxes here in Orange County (Where Your Property Tax Goes). For Secured property taxes, the bills are mailed in September and have a due date of November 1 and February 1 (with grace periods to December 10 and April 10, respectively), just two payments in a year. These local agencies would bear the brunt of any delay in the receipt of these vitally important property taxes that they need to provide local services.

"COVID-19, and the State's order for all non-essential businesses to close, has had a significant impact on our taxpayers" Treasurer Freidenrich said. "I plan to grant waivers on penalties to taxpayers as allowed by existing law to assist them during these challenging times."

For taxpayers that do not make payment of property taxes due to COVID-19 by April 10, we expect them to submit a Penalty Cancellation Request Form and documentation to support the cancellation of penalties as allowed in limited circumstances under current state law. The existing state law, which Treasurer Freidenrich will follow, allows for waiver of penalties, costs and other charges when failure to make a timely payment is due to reasonable cause and circumstances beyond the taxpayer's control, and occurred notwithstanding the exercise of ordinary care in the absence of willful neglect.

In closing, we appreciate those taxpayers that can pay by the April 10 date as these dollars will be allocated in April to the local agencies that provide day-to-day services to taxpayers. 

She added: "In the midst of this, I am aware that a large number of Vietnamese seniors cannot afford to buy rice. Therefore, I have asked many places, with help from others, to buy some rice and distribute them free."





thoăn thoắt bỏ gạo vào sau xe cho từng xe.





RE: Retaining the April 10 Property Tax Deadline

Dear Governor Newsom,

California's local agencies are working diligently to maintain essential services and infrastructure during this unprecedented public health emergency related to the Coronavirus and the disease it causes, COVID-19. Our organizations, representing all levels of local government in the state, are urging you to retain the April 10 deadline for property tax payments and allow local officials to forgive penalties for property owners who are unable to pay by that date due to the pandemic, as authorized by law.

Local Agencies Rely on the Timing of Payments

Unlike nearly every other tax, including the income tax and sales tax, property tax revenues are not distributed throughout the fiscal year. Instead, nearly all funds—over \$140 billion—are received in the days before the two payment deadlines of December 10 and April 10. Extending the deadline by 60 or 90 days would have a dramatic impact on local funding, as almost all local agencies rely on the property tax for the majority of their general funds.

Local agencies are on the front lines responding to the pandemic. From county public health departments to public hospitals and health systems to the sharp pivot school districts are making to deliver food and distance learning to homebound students, the local agencies our organizations represent are in need of at least the usual level of funding. Delaying such a large infusion of general funds for two to three months would have a serious impact on their ability to provide these services.

Furthermore, because both the timing and amount of the property tax is highly predictable, schools, counties, cities, and special districts structure their borrowing for TRANs and bonds accordingly. Extending the deadline would put repayment of those debts at risk. As you know, even one agency defaulting could negatively impact bond ratings and interest rates for all agencies for years to come. With the municipal bond market in turmoil and many planned deals being postponed indefinitely, it is exactly the wrong time to roil the situation further.

Many Property Owners Have Already Paid Their Banks

For mortgagers whose property tax payments are escrowed as part of their monthly housing payment, extending the deadline would provide them no relief. Instead, it would simply benefit the handful of companies that hold this money until the last minute before the deadline.

While these companies provide a service that many mortgagers appreciate by breaking their property tax payments into manageable monthly amounts, there is no public benefit to allowing them to hold the money for an additional 60 or 90 days. While the amount varies by county, payments from these companies represent roughly half of all expected revenue.

Current Law Allows Local Officials to Waive Penalties

While we must retain the April 10 deadline for property tax payments, local officials are already authorized to waive penalties, costs, and other charges resulting from tax delinquency due to reasonable cause and circumstances related to this crisis. This includes scenarios where a taxpayer cannot physically pay their taxes on April 10 due to quarantine, illness, or closure of the tax collector's office as a result of COVID-19. In such cases, the tax collector will utilize their authority pursuant to Revenue and Taxation Code Sections 2619 and 4985.2 to waive interest or penalties that would otherwise be imposed or collected with respect to a delinquent second installment of property taxes levied for the 2019-2020 fiscal year on residential real property.

We appreciate the close partnership we have had with you and your Administration throughout this crisis. Together, for all Californians, we are meeting this moment to protect our communities.

Tips for Teleworking for City Employees Providing Services Virtually

March 25, 2020

Many local government employees are working remotely for the first time as safe at home orders have been placed across California during the COVID-19 outbreak.

Cities are establishing telework and modified work environments so they can continue to serve their communities effectively and stay strong as we all weather through this health pandemic together.

Some of the partial work from home models include the <u>City of El Monte's</u> virtual city hall and the <u>City of Lancaster's</u> virtual town hall meetings and modified hybrid schedule.

"To ensure that serving the businesses and residents of our community continues to be our top priority, we have created a modified hybrid schedule that allows half of our staff to telecommute while still keeping City Hall open to the public every day," said Lancaster City Manager Jason Caudle. "We have hired a nurse to routinely check all employee temperatures and have staffed our entrance to ensure social distancing requirements are adhered to in all public interactions. We have also transitioned our public meetings to be virtual. All are live streamed on the city's website, our local TV station, and Facebook Live to allow residents to watch them in real time and provide public comment as desired. Regular updates are provided to staff members via email and an all hands conference call daily. I am proud of our team's adaptability, increased desire to serve, and genuine hard work during this unprecedented time in our lives."

Tips to Stay on Track While Teleworking

There are many strategies that can be used to continue to provide residents with the essential services and maintain a strong presence to support their communities while working away from the office and fellow co-workers. The League has assembled a list of tips shared by sources such as <u>Governing</u> magazine, during this ever changing work environment.

If you are working from home here are some tips that might provide some assistance:

- Be positive!
- Create a morning routine.
- Don't hesitate to ask for what you need to get your work done.
- Claim your workspace find a workspace in your home that is clutter free.

- Set ground rules with the people in your space even posting a conference call sign to let those living with you know when to be extra quiet.
- Dress for the door don't wear PJs to work, although working at home means you may dress down, be sure to dress in attire that would acceptable to answer your front door.
- Schedule breaks and take them get up, move around, have a chat.
- Have a plan know what you need to get done and when.
- Show up to meetings virtually and be heard.
- Make sure to communicate more often than when you are in the office.
- Take sick days when you are not well, take the sick time you need (this applies to you or your child).
- Make sure you pay attention to your schedule and wrap up at your regular time.
- Socialize with colleagues virtually loneliness, disconnect, and isolation are common problems in remote work life, especially for extroverts.

Cities Continue to Serve Residents and League Continues to Serve Cities Through Coronavirus Pandemic

March 25, 2020

Throughout the month of March, the global health pandemic of COVID-19 has completely altered Californians' way of life, and has created unprecedented challenges for cities.

Despite these challenges, local leaders across the state continue to rise to the occasion, and are developing new, innovative ways to continue to provide residents with the vital services they need most, especially in this moment.

The City of El Monte launched a "<u>virtual city hall</u>" to continue to provide services to residents during the coronavirus pandemic. The virtual city hall provides real-time services to residents, and allows them to schedule meetings, access city services, and speak with city staff.

"During times of crisis, our government needs to retool itself to address community needs, perform with compassion, professionalism and excellence," El Monte Mayor Andre Quintero <u>said in a recent news story</u>. "Emergencies, like the crisis we are in, can bring out the best in human capacity and creativity."

In Riverside County, the City of <u>Calimesa</u> knew that their senior residents relied on the meals they received through the Senior Nutrition Program at the city's senior center. Due to health and safety recommendations, the city closed its senior center, but continues to provide weekly meal packages consisting of five frozen meals, milk, bread, and fruit to its senior population. The City of <u>Newport Beach</u> is also maintaining critical services for the city's senior community, including meal delivery and transportation services.

The City of Pismo Beach is posting <u>daily video updates</u> from city council and city staff on social media to help residents stay informed on new ordinances, public health recommendations, and ways to support the city's small businesses.

"We know that you may feel uneasy or scared, but know that your city government is prepared, and we're working for you," said Pismo Beach City Manager Jim Lewis.

The City of Sacramento has joined a broad coalition of public, private, nonprofit, labor and philanthropic partners to launch a fundraising effort to help those hurt economically by the COVID-19 pandemic. The campaign, called <u>Donate4Sacramento</u>, leverages and deepens support

for families, small businesses and their employees, unhoused residents, and nonprofits.

"Every donation helps, no matter how large or small. With this fund, we can demonstrate our commitment to leave nobody in Sacramento behind. We're strongest when we stand together," said Sacramento Mayor Darrell Steinberg.

Newport Beach, Pasadena, Santa Monica, San Francisco, San Jose, and Los Angeles are just a few of the cities implementing temporary modifications to their parking policies in an effort to reduce the financial burden on residents and local businesses.

City leaders are also grappling with how to protect those that are experiencing homelessness in their communities during the pandemic. This week, San Diego is converting its convention center to a homeless shelter.

"The San Diego Convention Center is a centerpiece of San Diego's economy, and during this pandemic, it will be a centerpiece in our fight against the coronavirus," Mayor Kevin Faulconer said at a Monday press conference.

This is just a brief snapshot of the countless actions taken throughout the state — and across the country — by local leaders in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The National League of Cities and Bloomberg Philanthropies have teamed up to collect and share these efforts, and has created a <u>Local Action Tracker</u>. Their goal is to ensure mayors, city leaders, and other local decision makers have the information they need to lead their communities through this crisis.

The League <u>coronavirus resource and response webpage</u> is a resource for city staff, with daily updates on COVID-19 news, resources, and guidance specifically geared toward local leaders to help navigate the current situation and is updated as new developments occur.

The League remains in direct communication with the Governor's Office, the California Office of Emergency Services, as well as federal agencies, and updates are going out to city leaders regularly to provide them with the information needed to protect their communities and operations. The League is providing daily updates to city leaders, through electronic communication and phone calls.

The League has sent a <u>letter to the Governor</u>, requesting that he take immediate action to pause certain statutory requirements so cities can devote the resources necessary to protect the health and safety of all Californians. The League also signed on to a coalition letter urging the Governor to retain the April 10 deadline for property tax payments and allow local officials to forgive penalties for property owners who are unable to pay by that date due to the pandemic, as authorized by law. These dollars provide essential services to residents and a delay would harm

delivery of services to cities.

Additionally, as a member of the National League of Cities (NLC), <u>NLC has sent multiple letters</u> on behalf of its members to Congress asking for the consideration of a number of proposals to support local government intervention in the cascading set of social and economic challenges resulting from the coronavirus disease. The League will continue to advocate, at both the federal and state level, on behalf of California cities to ensure they have the resources needed and are in the best position to respond to this crisis.

How Some Cities are Providing Services Virtually and Tips for Teleworking

March 25, 2020

Many local government employees are experiencing remote work from home for the first time as safe at home orders have been placed across California during the COVID-19 outbreak.

Cities are establishing telework and modified work environments so they can continue to serve their communities effectively and stay strong as we all weather through this health pandemic together.

Despite the challenges we are facing during this public health epidemic, cities are persevering to provide residents with the essential services and still have a strong presence to support their communities. Some examples of how cities are going virtual include <u>City of El Monte's</u> virtual city hall, and <u>City of Lancaster's</u> virtual town hall meetings and modified hybrid schedule.

"To ensure that serving the businesses and residents of our community continues to be our top priority," Lancaster City Manager Jason Caudle stated, "we have created a modified hybrid schedule that allows half of our staff to telecommute while still keeping City Hall open to the public every day. We have hired a nurse to routinely check all employee temperatures and have staffed our entrance to ensure social distancing requirements are adhered to in all public interactions. We have also transitioned our public meetings to be virtual. All are live streamed on the city's website, our local TV station, and Facebook Live to allow residents to watch them in real time and provide public comment as desired. Regular updates are provided to staff members via email and an all hands conference call daily. I am proud of our team's adaptability, increased desire to serve, and genuine hard work during this unprecedented time in our lives."

Tips to Stay on Track While Teleworking

There are many strategies that can be implemented when working remotely away from the office and fellow co-workers. The League has assembled a list of tips shared by sources such as <u>Governing</u> magazine, during this ever changing work environment.

If you are working from home here are some tips that might provide some assistance:

- Be positive!
- Create a morning routine
- Don't hesitate to ask for what you need to get your work done
- Claim your workspace find a workspace in your home that is clutter free

- Set ground rules with the people in your space even posting a conference call sign to let those living with you know when to be extra quiet
- Dress for the door don't wear PJs to work, although working at home means you may dress down, be sure to dress in attire that would acceptable to answer your front door
- Schedule breaks and take them get up, move around, have a chat
- Have a plan know what you need to get done and when
- Show up to meetings virtually and be heard
- Overcommunicate
- Take sick days when you are not well, take the sick time you need (this applies to you or your child)
- Don't be too hard on yourself
- End at a regular time, and turn it off
- Socialize with colleagues virtually loneliness, disconnect, and isolation are common problems in remote work life, especially for extroverts

Message from League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman on Coronavirus Response

Dear California city leaders,

During this unprecedented public health crisis, I want to update you on actions the League is taking to support you and to help slow the spread of COVID-19.

The League is partnering with the Governor's Office, the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES), the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and other state and federal agencies and partners to get real time information to help you make decisions for your communities. Updates are being sent directly to mayors, council members, city managers, and division presidents for further dissemination. We also continue to advocate for resources for cities and executive action to ensure the continuity of local government operations during this crisis.

The League launched a <u>dedicated COVID-19 response webpage with resources for cities</u>. You will find updates on the latest news, resources, and guidance from public health officials, the state, and the federal government specifically curated to help local leaders navigate the current situation and serve their residents. The League has canceled, modified or postponed in-person events through the end of April and is assessing all others. Earlier this week, the League implemented teleworking organization-wide and closed the office building. We made this decision out of an abundance of caution for the health of our League family and to embrace social distancing. While the way we serve you may be different, you can be certain that we will continue to be a resource to you. Please continue to contact us by email or phone and we'll respond quickly.

More than ever, your residents, and state and federal governments, are looking to cities to lead in navigating through this crisis, and with your leadership, cities will get the job done. In the coming days, please be on the lookout for additional resources designed to support you in making informed decisions for your communities. Thank you for your leadership and for guiding our communities safely and responsibly. Please take good care of yourselves and each other.
