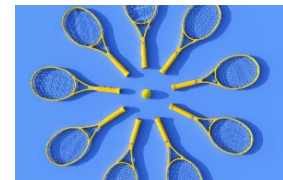

Highlights of Retreat Results

As a result of the Council's discussion, two governance principles were modified, and priorities were established for FY 2023-24.

Updated Governance Principles:

1. We maintain a citywide perspective/vision but pursue a balance between citywide and district efforts. *(modified)*
2. We seek to be informed of interests and issues within each district, highlight district activities, and have a good flow of information between Council about district activities.
3. We maintain professionalism, which includes decorum and respect in all interactions, quality through continuous improvement, service delivery based on needs, data-based decisions, and customer focus. *(modified)*
4. We utilize long-range plans to provide big picture context that is realistic and achievable.
5. We educate and engage the public about city services and needs and are continually transparent with information.
6. We honor the roles of the council-manager form of government.

Priorities:

The Council established four Tier 1 and two Tier 2 priorities. The Tier 1 items are those that will receive focused attention. Tier 2 items will be addressed as resources permit.

Tier 1:

- Homelessness
- Public safety
- Economic development and support of local businesses
- Infrastructure

Tier 2:

- Code enforcement
- Celebrate Garden Grove's cultural diversity

Welcome and Opening Comments

The workshop began with a welcome and call to order from Mayor Steve Jones. City Manager Lisa Kim then offered opening comments about the importance of the day for staff.



Governance Principles

Following the icebreaker exercise, the group discussed what makes a Council work well. The following slide was presented.

The Council also discussed the key attributes of exceptional Councils, which are identified in the Institute for Local Government (ILG) article, *Attributes of Exceptional Councils*. The six attributes are listed below.

Exceptional City Councils

Attributes of Exceptional Councils

Leading public organizations and governing with colleagues on a council is a challenging art of community service. The Institute recognizes that many aspects of leadership and governance are not intuitive. This piece is intended to provide councilmembers and city managers insight into the attributes of exceptional councils as well as provide practical tips to help them become exceptional.

1. Exceptional councils develop a sense of team – a partnership with the city manager to govern and manage the city

The mayor, councilmembers and city manager see themselves and work as a team as they undertake a series of tasks to further their common purpose. The individual team members work in a coordinated and collaborative manner with a high degree of respect, trust and openness. The team values diversity in style and

Jan asked Council what resonated with them from the article. Each of the six attributes were cited as relevant and important. A summary of discussion points is provided below.

Modification of Governance Principles

As noted earlier in this report under "Highlights of Retreat Results" the Council agreed to modify Principles 1 and 3. The new language is shown in that report section.

Communications and Assistance from the City Manager's Office

City Manager Lisa Kim expressed an interest in hearing Councilmembers' perspectives about communications and services received from the City Manager's Office. The facilitators asked the Council to share their opinions about what is working well now and what improvements would be helpful. A summary of this discussion is below.

What's working well now?

- Current communications from the City Manager are frequent and informative.
- Specific emails about what is happening from the City Manager.
- Accessibility and responsiveness of the City Manager.
- Notifications on urgent issues (e.g., emergency situations).

- Use of existing city protocols and systems to respond to constituents and to inform and educate constituents about how to get their concerns handled.

What would be helpful?

- Quarterly updates on claims settlements.
- Annual litigation update
- Include district-specific communications.
- Periodic district drive-throughs with City Manager and appropriate department heads.
- More frequent distribution of existing information to inform the public.
- More use of social media, including promoting the availability of the Garden Grove mobile app and education about City resources.
- More staff resources for Council (e.g., assistance with emails, attention to details regarding community events that Council attends, help with annual reporting, letter writing, travel arrangements and scheduling).
- Sensitivity to demands on Councilmembers' time in scheduling.



Community Survey

Following a brief stretch break, the department heads joined for the rest of the day. Assistant City Manager Maria Stipe briefly presented highlights and results of a community survey recently conducted by Zencity. She noted that 74% of residents are satisfied with their life in Garden Grove. Word clouds created from the survey showing what residents love and want changed are shown below.

Priority Setting

The Council then began the discussion of priorities. Context was set through a few slides which included accomplishments, challenges, and financial outlook.

Sound Financial Management

Finance Director Patricia Song reviewed the City’s financial management principles, including maximizing return on spending and City assets, using resources efficiently, focusing on long-term strategies, identifying new funding sources, and mobilizing private investment. Patricia also provided an update on budget performance in the current year.

Council Priorities

The Council discussed a series of priorities which were identified during the individual Councilmember interviews conducted by the facilitators. Following the discussion, the Council went through a dot voting exercise to establish its priorities for FY 2023-24.

Dot Voting on Priorities for FY 2023-24

Councilmembers used dot voting to select Tier 1 and Tier 2 priorities. Each Councilmember was given 4 dot stickers and asked to place the dots on their top priorities. The results of the dot voting exercise are shown below.

Other Items

In addition to the nine issues listed above, two others were briefly discussed, as summarized below.

- **Commissions and associations**
 - We could do more to help them understand their role as ambassadors for the City
 - Involve them more in City events
 - Interest in the future (not immediate) in creating a Public Arts Commission
 - Interest in supporting a local arts makers studio; encourage more community art; highlight local artists
 - Consider providing a small stipend for the Planning Commission
 - Encourage youth involvement in commissions (not set up a separate commission)
 - Use social media to attract commission applicants
- **Smart City**
 - Some interest in electric vehicles and more charging stations
 - Hydrogen electric may have fewer downsides

Other Major Issues Identified by Staff

An update on the following three additional issues currently being addressed by staff was also provided:

- City Flood Control Rehabilitation
- Pension Liability
- Cyber Security

Notes pertaining to these issues are included in the attached Retreat Handout (Priorities Worksheet) and related funding will be addressed through the budget development process.

Staying on Course with Priorities

After the priorities were established, there was a discussion about what would help the Council and staff team stay on track, given the limited staff and financial resources. Staff will continue to provide quarterly reports to the Council and will provide more detail about the progress that is being made on each priority. Councilmembers noted that the Council currently exercises discipline in not bringing up new items on a regular basis.



Wrap-up and Next Steps

Follow-up Steps

Jan explained that Baker Tilly would prepare this report. She also noted that the City Manager and her staff would prepare a work plan and budget to operationalize the Council’s priorities.

Bike Rack

The following items were added to the bike rack for future discussion.

- Discuss safety protocols at council meetings.
- Potential discussion of Airbnb and food truck regulations

Closing Reflections from Council and Staff

To conclude the workshop, the Mayor and Councilmembers, City Manager, Assistant City Manager and City Attorney shared comments about what was useful to them as a result of spending time together during the retreat. A summary is provided below.

- We have a lot of work ahead of us.
- I really appreciate the different style and focus of this retreat.
- It was great to hear from my colleagues.
- This retreat was productive and valuable.

- Electrons move together and we are moving together. I don't want to be the stray electron.
- We need to be sure to act on issues raised where we reached consensus.
- I am very pleased with the free flow format of this retreat.
- This retreat reaffirmed our mutual passion and dedication to Garden Grove.
- We were able to provide clear direction to staff.
- I appreciate all the hard work the Council put into this retreat; it is very helpful to staff.
- It is good to hear and understand what the Council's priorities are.
- This was a great retreat.
- Now that priorities are clear, we need to stick to them and remember that we have a great staff that is already overwhelmed. Let's not deviate from the direction we have set at this retreat.

OBJECTIVE

To update the City Council about the 2022-2023 Garden Grove Teen Action Collaborative (GGTAC).

BACKGROUND

The Garden Grove Teen Action Collaborative (GGTAC) was formed in 2021 in response to a City Council directive to better engage local teens with volunteer opportunities and offer a citywide youth leadership program. The mission of the GGTAC is to seek input from the participants as to what volunteer opportunities they want to participate in, and from what career fields guest speakers they want to hear from.

The inaugural year of GGTAC (2021-2022) had an average of 7-9 teens (ages 13-17) attending monthly meetings held during the school year, September through May. The teens heard from guest speakers on a quarterly basis, and volunteered at City events.

DISCUSSION

With the goal being to significantly increase teen participation for the 2022-2023 year of the GGTAC, a part-time coordinator job responsibilities were reassigned to; (1) expand marketing efforts at middle and high schools within the Garden Grove Unified School District (GGUSD), (2) improve partnerships with local and County-based service clubs and non-profit groups to offer more volunteer opportunities to the teen participants, and (3) secure monthly guest speakers with more varied career paths.

This effort resulted in a boosted average monthly attendance of 20-25 teens, more diverse career presentations from guest speakers like AltaMed, Santa Ana College, the City's Engineering division and Police Department, and further increased volunteer opportunities for GGTAC members at local non-profits.


SUMMARY

Community Services is pleased with the more than doubling of participants in the GGTAC program, as well as the additional partnerships established with non-profit organizations. As of this memo's date, over 450 volunteer hours have been logged by the GGTAC participants! The teens learned to prepare and package meals for those in need at Bracken's

Kitchen, assisted staff at City large-scale community events, and added support to community collaborations like the Jingle Jam Celebration.

GGTAC members also further explored their community by volunteering at, and attending gatherings like the Love Shouldn't Hurt event, the Be a Friend Conference, and the Flower Festival on Main Street.

Community Services Department's goal is to continue to expand the GGTAC program and collaborate with additional Garden Grove based organizations to build a larger youth leadership network for the city's teens to experience and grow.

CALOPTIMA HEALTH PARTNERS WITH HEALTHCARE IN ACTION TO LAUNCH FIRST STREET MEDICINE PROGRAM IN GARDEN GROVE

*Comprehensive Care for People Experiencing Homelessness
Available Through Expanded Medi-Cal Benefits*

ORANGE, Calif. (April 4, 2023) — CalOptima Health, in partnership with the City of Garden Grove and Healthcare in Action, launched Orange County’s first street medicine program on April 1 to deliver comprehensive health care to individuals experiencing homelessness.

This partnership with Healthcare in Action, a first-of-its-kind medical group that provides health care and other services to unhoused individuals through a street medicine model, demonstrates CalOptima Health’s ongoing commitment to providing access, improving health outcomes and building relationships that result in secure housing for unhoused Orange County residents.

As Orange County’s Medi-Cal plan serving low-income populations, CalOptima Health pursued the program based on the recognition that housing is health. Through a contract, Healthcare in Action will deliver primary care to up to 200 CalOptima Health members using a medical van to canvas the Garden Grove community and reach members living in parks, under freeways and other unsheltered spaces. Services will include primary care, behavioral health and case management but also the expanded whole-person care resources now available through CalAIM, a state initiative offering a new set of Medi-Cal benefits that includes housing services.

“As Supervisor for the Second District and a CalOptima Health Board member, I am happy to see the launch of the first-of-its-kind street medicine program in our county, offering personalized medical care to vulnerable and hard-to-reach community members,” said Supervisor Vicente Sarmiento. “This program stands out for its emphasis on a comprehensive patient-centered approach, which involves meeting individuals at their specific location, addressing all aspects of their well-being and enhancing their quality of life.”

“CalOptima Health street medicine is different than other programs,” said Kelly Bruno-Nelson, Executive Director, Medi-Cal/CalAIM. “Members are assigned to Healthcare in Action’s providers and can rely on them just like other patients do with their doctors in ‘brick-and-mortar’ locations. We want to foster long-term connections and trust that lead to ongoing medical care and expanded social support. This is not just urgent care on the streets — it’s so much more.”

In November 2022, CalOptima Health’s Board of Directors approved the selection of Healthcare in Action based on its experience, capacity, and ability to launch the street medicine program in the desired timeframe. Funding of \$4 million will support operations for two years, and the unique managed care model will then be sustained after the initial two years through State Medi-Cal reimbursement. The program is the latest in a longstanding effort by CalOptima Health’s Board to provide funding and innovations that address local homeless health needs. In March 2023, the Board awarded \$29.9 million in community grants to organizations serving the population, with \$21 million going toward 400 permanent supportive housing units. CalOptima Health’s overarching goal is to reduce health disparities across the county.

“Healthcare in Action is proud to partner with CalOptima Health and support their commitment to unhoused members,” said Michael Hochman, M.D., CEO of Healthcare in Action. “Since our inception in 2022, we have seen the success of approaching the homelessness crisis through the lens of health care. Through our unique ‘street based’ model, we are able to provide sustainable, primary care addressing the complex medical and social needs of this population, and we look forward to bringing that to individuals in the City of Garden Grove.”

The Garden Grove program will deploy two teams that do complementary work. A medical team with a physician assistant and registered nurse will provide primary care and clinical management, and a peer navigator team with two staff who have lived experience will offer supportive services and community resources.

“Garden Grove is proud to be the first Orange County city to provide this very unique medical outreach program to our homeless community, in partnership with CalOptima Health and Healthcare in Action,” said Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones. “Our street medicine program complements a number of other programs Garden Grove has proactively implemented, and will continue doing, to achieve beneficial solutions to homelessness.”

Additionally, in 2022 SCAN acquired The Residentialist Group, now known as HomeBase Medical, to support chronic disease management and palliative care for older adults in the home. SCAN Health Plan, which is part of SCAN Group, is one of the nation’s foremost not-for-profit Medicare Advantage plans, serving more than 285,000 members in California, Arizona, Nevada and Texas. GARDEN GROVE TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK DAY

On Saturday, April 22, 2023, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., the Garden Grove Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public an opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs by participating in the National Prescription Drug Take Back Day. Bring your pills for disposal to the Garden Grove Police Department located at 11301 Acacia Pkwy, 92842. (The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps, only pills or patches.) The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last October, Americans turned in 342 tons (over 647,163 pounds) of prescription drugs at over 4,900 sites operated by the DEA and its state and local law enforcement partners.


This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies have shown that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

Street medicine pilot launches in Garden Grove

The program brings medical care workers directly to folks experiencing homelessness

Health care providers are taking to the streets of Garden Grove armed with a “doctor’s office on wheels” to bring medical assistance to homeless people where they are at – including primary care, but also behavioral health services and case management.

The street medicine program is being organized by the county’s provider of publicly funded health coverage, [CalOptima Health](#), in partnership with the city of Garden Grove and Healthcare in Action, a medical group that provides health care and other services to unhoused individuals. Through a \$4 million, two-year contract, Healthcare in Action will deliver care to up to 200 CalOptima members using a medical van to reach those living in parks, under freeways and elsewhere on the streets.

“This program focused on bringing supportive health care and social services for our [homeless community](#) is a model of dedicated teamwork, outside-the-box thinking and passion for serving those in need,” Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones said during a press conference on Tuesday. Along with being mobile, the program uses a “people-centric” approach, said Benjamin Kaska, Healthcare in Action’s director of clinical operations.

“There’s a barrier to care,” Kaska said for people who are dealing with homelessness. “When you go to a doctor’s office, you’re expected to arrive on time, have all your paperwork organized, I.D., your payment. In this environment, you remove those barriers. We come out and provide the care directly to them, wherever they’re located.”

A large percentage of folks experiencing homelessness are in “survival mode,” prioritizing where their next meal will come from, where they will sleep and taking care of their belongings, said Kelly Bruno-Nelson, CalOptima’s executive director of Medi-Cal/CalAIM.

“Clearly, health care needs come secondary to that,” Bruno-Nelson said. “It’s not that folks on the street don’t care about their health, it’s that they can’t prioritize it because they have to prioritize basic needs that those of us who are housed don’t have to prioritize.”

Deploying will be a medical team with a physician assistant and registered nurse, who will provide primary care and clinical management, and a “peer navigator” team with a social worker and an individual with lived experience, who will be offering supportive services and community resources.

The peer navigator team will approach people on the street to make connections and see what help they need; once someone engages with the program, Healthcare in Action will function as their primary care physician and visit on a regular basis, Bruno-Nelson said.

“We feel very strongly about, when it comes to street medicine, unlike the traditional health care system, it’s rapport first, and then care second,” she said. “If you can’t build rapport with those that you’re serving, you won’t be able to provide the care. So, you have to have folks on your team who know what it feels like to be unhoused. Lived experience is very important.”

Challenges the teams will face include locating their patients and providing medications, because most pharmacies require a form of identification, according to Kaska.

“Some of the barriers that we’ve tried to avoid still exist within other areas, and we try our very best to navigate those waters and provide the care despite the barrier,” he said. “Some of our teammates, for instance, will go and will pick up the medication for the patient and deliver it back to them, which is time intensive, but it matters.”

Kaska said locating unhoused patients is easier with the help of those who know the community best, including local law enforcement. Also, patients can be given a cellphone or a GPS tracker if they’re willing.

After six months of running the street medicine program in Garden Grove, the goal is to expand to other cities throughout the county, according to Bruno-Nelson.

[CalOptima CEO](#) Michael Hunn said the county organized health system's entry into providing street medicine is one of the many programs in the relatively new state initiative, California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal, or CalAIM. The state Department of Health Care Services launched the multiyear health program to strengthen Medi-Cal by integrating in other social services.

"We're taking (CalAIM) seriously," Hunn said. "The impetus for this, and us expanding into it, is to be that health plan that takes the health and – as this van says – puts it in action."

In his years working in health care, Michael Hochman, CEO of Healthcare in Action, said he has never seen so many community entities joining together to address homelessness.

"This is the first time in 20 years that I have seen around the table city leaders, county leaders, law enforcement, EMS, fire, health plans, community organizations; it's really an incredible testament to Hunn and his team at CalOptima and the city of Garden Grove to pull this together," Hochman said. "I applaud them not just for being ambitious with the goal of making a dent in homelessness in Garden Grove, but in the holistic approach."

‘House calls’ for the homeless

House calls by doctors are a thing of the past, but “house”calls for the un-housed may be the next big thing in coping with the homeless crisis in Orange County.

A new approach to “street medicine” that will be pioneered in the Big Strawberry was unveiled Tuesday in front of Garden Grove City Hall. Representatives of CalOptima Health, city and county officials revealed plans – already underway – for the Healthcare in Action project which seek to bring health care to the unsheltered and also help put them on the path to no longer being homeless.

The operation will utilize a van that is a mobile doctor's office and a team that includes physician assistants, a registered nurse, "peer" navigators and a care manager.

Kelly Bruno-Nelson, executive director of MediCal/CalAIM, explains how the process will work.

"This programming is using a canvassing approach," she said. "Care teams of two people – one individual that is a social worker and one with lived experience – literally canvass the streets. And so, working with the police department, we know the hot spots in the city. They literally go out and introduce themselves. Rapport first, care second."

"They tell them [homeless persons] about the program and ask them if they'd like to be a part of it. Other 'street medicine' programs will set up in a park or a shelter, and while those programs are important, that's not genuine street medicine because we still require the person to come to us. This is us coming to the people."

The care teams will have a case load and visit their clients weekly and sometimes twice a week, said Bruno-Nelson, "to see if they need help with housing, with doctor's appointments, things like that."

Speakers at the press conference included Orange County Supervisor (Second District) Vincente Sarmiento, Micheal Hunn (CEO of Cal Optima Health), Bruno-Nelson, Health Care in Action CEO Michael Hochman and Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones and City Manager Lisa Kim.

Housing project before council

Action to clear the way for an improved 78-unit affordable housing project goes before the Garden Grove City Council when it meets on Tuesday.

The council will be asked to approve a preliminary award letter to New Tamerlane LLC to implement the substantial rehabilitation and “reset” of the project on Tamerlane Lane west of Harbor Boulevard and between Lampson and Chapman Avenues.

Garden Grove had been assisting the original Tamerlane Associates in assembling 15 multi-family properties. In 2022 that organization sold the properties to New Tamerlane, and in order

to modernize them, the new owner is seeking tax credit and a loan which would amount to \$12.5 million for a term of 58 years.

New Tamerlane will be responsible for renovation, interiors and exteriors of all 15 buildings and 78 units. Work would include new paint, fixtures, flooring, etc.

According to a staff report, the new operators intend to add new amenities such as a playground and art.

Also on the agenda is a resolution of commendation to Rep. Lou Correa for his years of representing Garden Grove in Congress as part of the 46th District.

The council will meet at 6:30 p.m. in the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Ave.

Appellate court finds state law unconstitutionally penalizes charter cities for exercising home rule authority

The appellate court's ruling is consistent with the arguments made in the League of California Cities' amicus brief and serves to reinforce the strength of the home rule doctrine.

The California Court of Appeal for the Third Appellate District recently [ruled](#) a 2018 state law unconstitutional to the extent it penalizes charter cities for exercising their “home rule” authority to manage their own municipal affairs under Article XI, Section 5 of the California Constitution. Cal Cities had filed an [amicus brief](#) in the case, *Cultiva La Salud v. State of California*.

The 2018 state law — as part of the “Keep Groceries Affordable Act” — prohibited cities from adopting taxes on certain groceries, including sodas and other sugary beverages. If a charter city adopted a prohibited tax and a court found that the tax was a valid exercise of the city’s home rule authority, then the state law imposed a penalty. Specifically, it directed the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration to stop collecting that city’s sales and use taxes, effectively depriving the city of all sales and use tax revenue.

The appellate court affirmed a lower court ruling finding the penalty unconstitutional. The court reasoned, in relevant part, that the penalty had no purpose other than to threaten charter cities against exercising their home rule authority to levy a tax for local purposes. According to California Supreme Court precedent, this was “patently unconstitutional.”

The state has a limited amount of time within which it can appeal the ruling to the California Supreme Court. Cal Cities will continue to report on further developments in the case. In the meantime, cities with questions about the impact of the ruling should consult their city attorney.



New survey results show cities are making progress reducing homelessness, but the demand for housing and services is outpacing efforts

Cities call on the state to invest \$3 billion in ongoing state funding to prevent and reduce homelessness and jumpstart the construction of affordable housing

Sacramento — Hundreds of city officials from throughout the state gathered outside the Capitol Wednesday morning to unveil the results of a recent survey that shines a light on cities' response to the statewide homelessness crisis. City leaders shared the barriers cities face when serving unhoused residents and called on the state to find a permanent home in the budget to prevent and reduce homelessness and boost the supply of affordable housing.

"The state's homelessness crisis is so severe that the Governor has called in the National Guard, and several city leaders have declared emergencies in their jurisdictions. However, lasting progress will be out of reach without an ongoing source of state investment in local communities," said **Cal Cities Executive Director and CEO Carolyn Coleman**. "City officials are doing their part to be a strong partner to support unhoused residents and keep Californians in their homes, and dedicated state funding is critical if we're going to reverse this decades-in-the-making crisis."

The [survey](#), conducted by the League of California Cities last month, shows while cities are accelerating their efforts to prevent and reduce homelessness and boost affordable housing in their communities, the demand for housing and services is outpacing their efforts, straining capacity, and draining resources.

The survey found that nearly 85% of cities reported they have implemented programs to prevent and reduce homelessness. Eight in ten cities are spending general fund money to address homelessness.

"Cities like San Luis Obispo are innovating with on-the-ground programs to address homelessness," said **San Luis Obispo Mayor Erica Stewart**. "In fiscal year 22-23, our city spent over \$3 million to address homelessness and invest in preserving low-income housing

units in the city. Cities need long-term funding from the state to be able to grow our investment in addressing the homelessness and housing crisis.”

Nearly 90% of cities that responded to the Cal Cities survey have fiscal concerns over their ability to provide existing homelessness services long term.

"Our community is committed to addressing the urgent crisis of homelessness and affordable housing, but our efforts alone cannot meet the overwhelming demand," said **Citrus Heights Mayor Porsche Middleton**. "With ongoing funding, we can provide critical services and shelter to those in need and work towards a brighter future for all residents."

When asked about the barriers to progress, survey respondents listed limited supportive housing options and a lack of ongoing funding as two of the top challenges.

"The addition of more affordable housing continues to be a vital part of Santa Ana's efforts to end homelessness in our community, in addition to our Homeless Navigation Center already in place," says **Santa Ana Mayor Valerie Amezcua**. "The allocation of \$50.9 million in grant-related funding to address homelessness and 254 new permanent supportive housing units through multiple projects currently under construction demonstrates the city's commitment towards alleviating the ongoing crisis."

Cities are calling on \$3 billion in ongoing funding to help cities prevent and reduce homelessness and boost affordable housing. According to the survey, cities would use increased state funding to provide additional supportive services, increase shelter space, accelerate affordable housing development, invest in homeless outreach teams, and expand rent subsidy programs.



State provides new information on local Gann Limit reporting requirement

The local appropriations limit, often referred to as the Gann Limit, is back in the limelight for local governments. In late March, the state [released new guidance](#) on how local governments can identify and report excesses beyond their Gann limits for fiscal years 2022-23 and 2023-24.

This follows guidance that the California Department of Finance [released](#) last year.

What is the Gann Limit?

The Gann Limit is a result of Proposition 13 (1978) and Proposition 4 (1979), which limit the growth of government spending. As a result, there is a cap on local government revenue that can be appropriated in any given fiscal year.

There is also an appropriation limit for state expenditures. The state must spend any revenue that exceeds a certain limit — adjusted for inflation and population — on K-12 education and colleges or rebates back to taxpayers. The new policy is the result of an attempt by legislators to avoid exceeding the state Gann Limit in last year's state budget.

What is the requirement?

Local agencies are now required to identify and report any new state subventions — unrestricted money received by a local agency from the state — that would cause them to exceed local appropriations limits. The requirement takes effect starting with [the 2021-22 fiscal year](#), as outlined by the California Department of Finance.

The state will count those amounts at the state level instead. These additional expenditures are counted by local governments towards their local appropriation limits when capacity exists at that level of government.

What is the new guidance?

Cities must use the [same subvention information](#) provided in late 2022 when calculating fiscal year 2022-23 and 2023-24 local appropriation limits. The provided subvention

information identifies the total dollar value of all subventions that should be included within a city's appropriations limit for the 2022-23 or 2023-24 fiscal year.

If any portion of those values causes a city to exceed its appropriations limit, cities must identify the specific amount attributable to these subventions *in excess of their limit* and report that information to the Department of Finance. These excess amounts will instead be included within the state's appropriations limit.

The deadline to report this information is Nov. 1, 2023, and annually thereafter. The Department of Finance will provide updated subvention information for fiscal year 2024-25 no later than Feb. 1, 2024, and information for subsequent fiscal years on Feb. 1 annually thereafter.

Cities that *will not* exceed their appropriation limit for fiscal year 2021-22 *do not* need to report to the Department of Finance. No action is required if your city is not identified in the spreadsheet.

State Bills in Brief: April 5-19

A weekly primer on the bills and committee hearings that have a direct impact on cities

The Legislature is on recess, but the League of California Cities is not. Cal Cities is gearing up for next week's City Leaders Summit and the grueling April gauntlet of legislative policy committee meetings. [Once again](#), the biggest bills this week are the ones not being heard in committee.

Lawmakers shelved [AB 1532 \(Haney\)](#) for the rest of 2023. The Cal Cities-opposed measure would have forced the conversion of non-residential buildings into new housing units regardless of underlining zoning. The zoning fight is not over yet though: A similar bill, [AB 1490 \(Lee\)](#), is still being debated.

The Assembly Public Safety Committee will postpone its hearing for [AB 1708 \(Muratsuchi\)](#) due to scheduling concerns. Sponsored by Cal Cities, the bill would increase accountability for repeat theft offenders and offer pathways for pre-plea diversion programming. Any provisions that amend Proposition 47 would become effective upon approval by voters during the next statewide general election. [Bills to act on](#)

Proposed dashboard would increase access to behavioral health care

- **What would this dashboard do?** [SB 363 \(Eggman\)](#) would create a real-time dashboard of available beds in psychiatric and substance abuse facilities. It would also include related data, such as the appropriate age range for the bed.
- **How would this bill help?** Mental illness and substance abuse are best treated early and with appropriate support, just like any other health condition. The database would also cut down on extended emergency room stays.

- **When is the next advocacy opportunity?** Lawmakers will discuss SB 636 in the Senate Judiciary Committee on April 11. *Cal Cities supports the measure.*

Other bills with major impacts

Two key trash bills are up for consideration, along with a controversial shelter euthanasia measure.

Organic waste procurement flexibility

- **I need a refresher on California's organic waste law.** [SB 1383 \(Lara, 2016\)](#) calls for a dramatic reduction in organic waste to reduce methane emissions, a powerful climate pollutant. As part of that law, cities must [procure organic waste products](#), such as mulch, from in-state processing facilities.
- **What sort of flexibility is being proposed?** It's narrow but important. In some parts of the state, there simply are not enough processing facilities, especially for rural and border cities. [AB 573 \(Garcia\)](#) would allow cities to send organic waste outside the state under certain conditions.
- **When is the hearing?** The Assembly Natural Resources Committee will hear AB 573 on April 10. *Cal Cities supports the measure.*

Funding for the most polluted river in the U.S.

- **Which river?** [AB 1597 \(Alvarez\)](#) would provide funding for two rivers, the New River and the Tijuana River. The New River is the most polluted river in the U.S., thanks to a potent combination of raw sewage, pathogens, trash, and industrial activities. The Tijuana River is often contaminated by raw sewage. Both rivers flow through the U.S.–Mexico border.
- **How much funding?** AB 1597 would provide \$50 million, upon appropriation by the Legislature, in funding. Historically, funding has been in short supply for these rivers. Even a modest investment could have a substantial environmental impact and create savings for related health and disaster costs.
- **When is the next advocacy opportunity?** The bill will be heard on April 18 in the Assembly Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee. *Cal Cities supports the measure.*

Proposed public notice requirement would increase animal shelter overcrowding

- **What changes are being proposed?** [AB 595 \(Essayli\)](#) would require animal shelters to provide public notice at least 72 hours before euthanizing any animal.
- **The bill would make a bad situation worse.** Shelters in California are already over capacity, understaffed, and underfunded. Since shelters are statutorily required to admit certain animals, this bill could actually increase euthanasia as staff scramble to accommodate new animals. The measure would also create related criminal provisions. Although well-intended, the bill would not help the animals most in need.
- **When is the next advocacy opportunity?** The Assembly Business and Professions Committee will hear the bill on April 11. *Cal Cities opposes the measure.*

Bills to follow

Lawmakers are still hammering out the exact details of many bills. Cal Cities does not have a position on the measure below but will likely issue one.

CEQA document requests

- **What would the bill do?** [SB 69 \(Cortese\)](#) would require local agencies to provide any subsequent revised or amended copy of CEQA documents upon request by mail or email and to submit the documents to the state clearinghouse.
- **What time is the hearing?** Lawmakers will discuss the measure during the Senate Judiciary Committee on April 11.

Two revenue bills to watch

- **What are the bills?** [AB 1249 \(Ta\)](#) would exempt qualified school supplies from sales and use taxes for a two-day period. [AB 537 \(Berman\)](#) would prohibit short-term lodging “junk fees” — fees charged in addition to the upfront price.
- **When are the hearings?** The Assembly Revenue and Taxation Committee will hear AB 1249 on April 10. The Assembly Business and Professions Committee will hear AB 537 on April 11.

An act of the Legislature to change “Act of God” clauses

- **This sounds familiar.** [SB 751 \(Padilla\)](#) would prohibit municipalities from entering into an exclusive franchise agreement for waste hauling services that contains a force majeure provision that can be triggered by a labor impasse. Sen. Padilla introduced the bill in response to a [high-profile strike](#) that affected residents in Chula Vista and San Diego.
- **A force what?** Sometimes known as an “Act of God,” a force majeure frees organizations from obligations due to extraordinary circumstances, such as a natural disaster.
- **When will the bill be heard?** Lawmakers will discuss the measure on April 12 in the Senate Governance and Finance Committee.

Expect positions from Cal Cities on these two labor bills soon

- **What do the bills do?** [AB 504 \(Reyes\)](#) would allow public employees to participate in strikes even if they are not members of the striking union. [AB 1484 \(Zbur\)](#) would allow temporary employees to be automatically included in the same bargaining unit as permanent employees.
- **When will the bills be heard?** The Assembly Public Employment and Retirement Committee will hear both bills on April 12.

A proposed prohibition on gas stove prohibitions

- **Try saying that three times fast.** [AB 698 \(Essayli\)](#) would restrict state agencies and local governments from prohibiting the use of gas stoves in residential and nonresidential buildings.
- **What time is the hearing?** The measure will be heard on April 12 in the Assembly Utilities and Energy Committee.

Two water bills to watch

- **What are the bills?** [AB 1567 \(E. Garcia\)](#) would provide funding for various drought, water, parks, climate, and coastal protection projects. [AB 460 \(Bauer-Kahan\)](#) would authorize the State Water Resources Control Board to issue fines for a violation of an interim relief order.
- **When are the hearings?** The Assembly Water, Parks, and Wildlife Committee will hear both bills on April 18.

Cal Cities-sponsored bond agency issues more than \$65 million in tax-exempt bonds for housing

The California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) issued over \$65 million in tax-exempt and taxable affordable housing bonds in Palm Desert and Dixon. CSCDA partnered with the cities and others for the acquisition of the properties and issuance of bonds.

CSCDA issued \$44,363,541 in tax-exempt and taxable affordable housing bonds for Gerald Ford Apartments in Palm Desert. Gerald Ford Apartments is the new construction of 150 two- and three-bedroom affordable housing units. The rental units will be 100% rent restricted for low- and very low-income residents. Units will be reserved for households earning less than 30%, 50%, 60%, and 70% of the area median income.

The joint powers authority also announced the issuance of \$20,940,000 in tax-exempt and taxable affordable housing bonds for Silvey Villas at Homestead — 72 new one- and two-bedroom affordable housing units — in Dixon. The rental units will be 100% rent restricted for low- and very low-income senior residents. Units will be reserved for seniors earning less than 30%, 50%, and 60% of the area median income.

The financing for both the Gerald Ford Apartments and Silvey Villas at Homestead requires the affordability of the units for low- and very-low income tenants to be maintained for 55 years.

Guide to Local Recovery Update: April 5

Apr 5, 2023

The State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund reporting portal is open, and reports are due April 30. Many cities are eligible for two key climate grants, including a noncompetitive energy grant. Also, the National League of Cities has partnered with the U.S. Department of Labor for a new infrastructure workforce development initiative.

[American Rescue Plan Act reporting portal now open](#)

The U.S. Department of Treasury's State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF) reporting portal is now open. The funds were authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act.

Cities are encouraged to review the Treasury Department's [reporting guide](#), which provides information on reporting requirements and instructions on how to use the online reporting portal. Cities can contact the SLFRF help centers at SLFRF@treasury.gov or call (844) 529-9527. The Treasury Department also has several [self-help resources](#).

The deadline to file an annual or quarterly SLFRF Project and Expenditure Report is April 30.

Be sure to include your city, state, UEI number, federal tax identification number, and contact information for each email to SLFRF@treasury.gov, along with a detailed description of the problem you need help with. For each request to change the reporting portal account administrator, cities should include the following:

"The email you have for the City's Account Administrator is [defunct email address]. We are unable to access Treasury's reporting portal using this account. Please reset our Account Administrator as indicated below ASAP so we can make our ARPA filing by 4/30/2023 as required. The individual below is currently registered in Login.gov and will need to be set as account administrator. The former account administrator [passed away, resigned, no longer works for the city, lost the election, etc.]"

[Your city could be eligible for this key energy block grant](#)

The U.S. Department of Energy is accepting applications for its [Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant \(EECBG\)](#). The formula grant program supports initiatives that reduce fossil fuel emissions, decrease total energy use, and improve energy efficiency. [Over 200 cities in California are eligible](#) for funding.

Although formula grants are noncompetitive, cities must apply to receive the funding. All eligible entities must complete a [pre-award application sheet](#) by April 28. Matching funds are not required.

Unlike previous versions of the program, EECBG funding can be used for renewable energy, zero-emission transportation, and energy efficiency projects. The program also has an optional voucher program for communities that receive less than \$250,000. Instead of receiving the formula grant, the value can be exchanged for technical assistance or as an equipment rebate.

The Department of Energy will hold a [webinar on April 13](#) at noon to discuss the voucher program.

[NLC and Department of Labor launch new infrastructure workforce development program](#)

The National League of Cities has partnered with the U.S. Department of Labor on the [Good Jobs, Great Cities](#) initiative. The program will help accelerate city efforts to design, develop, and launch workforce initiatives that build pathways to well-paying infrastructure jobs, particularly in historically underserved and underrepresented communities.

The initiative will support up to 12 cities throughout 2023 and 2024. Selected cities will work with federal agencies, employers, workforce development boards, nonprofits, labor unions, and other cross-sector partners to create or scale up innovative workforce programs.

NLC will hold an [informational webinar](#) on the opportunity on April 10. [Applications](#) must be submitted by April 28.

[Climate Pollution Reduction Grant eligibility could be expanded](#)

More cities could be eligible for a new greenhouse gas reduction grant according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The [Climate Pollution Reduction Grants Program](#) currently goes to the largest [67 Metropolitan Statistical Areas](#) (MSA). However, the EPA is encouraging other large MSAs to complete a [notice of intent to participate](#) if funding becomes available.

Local governments within an MSA will need to develop an implementation plan for their region and designate an entity to serve as the lead. The lead organization must submit a notice of intent to participate by April 28, 2023. MSAs ranked 68-100 on the national list are strongly encouraged to apply.

SCAG Prohousing Designation Awarded to the City of Los Angeles

The City of Los Angeles is the most recent jurisdiction to be awarded a Prohousing Designation by the State of California. The [Prohousing Designation Program](#) provides cities and counties with incentives in the form of eligibility and preference for state grant funding programs such as Prohousing Incentive Pilot (PIP), Affordable Housing & Sustainable Communities (AHSC), Infill Infrastructure Grant (IIG), and Transformative Climate Communities (TCC). Jurisdictions earn this designation by implementing policies that reduce barriers to housing production and promote affordable and transformative housing. Castro Ramírez, Secretary of the Business, Consumer Services and Housing Agency, states, "California commends the City of Los Angeles for establishing policies and

practices that streamline development, accelerate housing production and reduce costs to expand safe and dignified housing options for Angelenos.”

Los Angeles City joins ten other jurisdictions, including the City of Fontana, which pioneered this exclusive designation for the SCAG region by being among the first group to achieve a Prohousing Designation. Fontana demonstrated the city prioritizes housing by significantly reducing impact fees for infill development, streamlining CEQA review through specific plan environmental documents, and publishing an interactive GIS map for all proposed and approved entitlements within the past three years. Currently, two more jurisdictions within the SCAG region, the City of Adelanto and Los Angeles County, are revising their application to achieve a Prohousing Designation.

2023 Local Housing Trust Fund Program Notice of Funding Availability - \$53 Million

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (Department/HCD) has announced the release of a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for approximately \$53 million in funds for the [Local Housing Trust Fund \(LHTF\) Program](#). This funding provides Matching Grants to Local Housing Trust Funds established by cities and counties, Native American Tribes and incorporated 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations.

Fifteen percent of the funds made available by this NOFA shall be reserved for Local or Regional Housing Trust Funds meeting the definition of “New Local Housing Trust Fund.” In the event that there are insufficient applications from New Local Housing Trust Funds that pass threshold, the funds shall be used for applications from Existing Local Housing Trust Funds.

Program Funds awarded under this NOFA shall be used to provide construction loans and/or permanent financing loans at simple interest rates of no higher than 3 percent per annum, for payment of predevelopment costs, acquisition, construction, or rehabilitation, as well as to construct, convert, reconstruct, rehabilitate, and/or repair Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) or Junior Accessory Dwelling Units (JADUs).

The application portal is open beginning on April 19, 2023 through 4:00 p.m. May 17, 2023. On-line support and technical assistance closes at 3:30 p.m. on May 17, 2023.

Take the California's Housing Future 2040 Survey to Inform the 7th Cycle RHNA

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) is soliciting ideas and input from the public for ways to continue to improve the 7th cycle Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) process and address California's housing shortage. This survey is a component of HCD's broader stakeholder engagement for the California's Housing Future 2040: The Next RHNA initiative.

HCD is conducting this California's Housing Future 2040 stakeholder engagement initiative from March - May 2023, which will consist of several venues for stakeholder input. HCD will hold listening sessions and other opportunities for input as part of their engagement plan, though specific dates were not available at the time of this publication. Upon completion of this stakeholder engagement initiative, HCD will compile its findings and recommendations, and will submit a report to the Legislature by December 31, 2023.

The [survey](#) is organized by five topic areas identified as priorities and should take approximately 10-15 minutes to complete. After the survey deadline of Friday, May 5, HCD will summarize and analyze the responses gathered by the survey. HCD will utilize the survey responses to inform HCD's recommendations for improving the RHNA process and methodology but will not respond to each survey response.
