The City of Garden Grove (City) is pleased to inform you of our support of SB 1386. This bill would protect fire hydrant system funding and ensure that the City and dozens of other public water suppliers statewide are able to operate sufficiently-sized and -pressurized water systems to supply water to their customers and to fight fires. This measure affirms that existing law allows water suppliers to include the costs of operating and maintaining these systems, as well as the costs associated with fire hydrants and the water served through them, in their property-related service charges. Because of lawsuits that threaten California water providers' ability to fund water services used in fire protection, this measure is critical to preventing these costs from being passed on to fire protection agencies.

The City is just one of the 81 local governments being sued to challenge the long-standing method of funding water service used in firefighting through property-related water service charges. The lawsuits allege that including these costs in our water rates is prohibited by Article XIII D of the California Constitution (i.e. "Proposition 218").

In the City's opinion, these lawsuits are without merit and threaten to force all of California's public retail water service providers to charge fire protection agencies directly for these costs. If that occurs, the ability of fire protection agencies to fund essential equipment and personnel would be greatly impacted. Our property-related service charges are legitimate under existing law, but in order to avoid lengthy and expensive legal battles with costs that will be passed on to our customers and to avoid additional burdens on fire protection agencies, the law needs to be affirmed by the Legislature.

Proposition 218 placed provisions into the California Constitution that limit local governments' authority to impose and increase taxes, fees, assessments, and charges. We faithfully abide by the requirements of Proposition 218 and are serious about our responsibility to provide services to our customers in an efficient and cost-effective manner. This includes the costs of operating and maintaining fire hydrant systems, as well as the costs associated with the water distribution system and the

water that is needed to fight fires within property-related water service charges as appropriate under Proposition 218. Ensuring water rates cover these costs is critical for the safety of all of our customers.

SB 1386 reinforces water service agencies' authority under the law to use propertyrelated service charges for funding water services related to fire protection. SB 1386 does this by amending Proposition 218's implementing statute to reflect a recent court case that confirmed that these costs are in fact a legitimate property-based service.

For these reasons, the City strongly supports your bill and urges your colleagues to vote "Aye" on SB 1386. CLOSURES AND RE-OPENING PLAN

OBJECTIVE

To provide City Council with the latest update regarding playground closures and re-opening plan with restrictions for parks and facilities per Stage 3 of the State's Re-Opening Plan.

BACKGROUND

On March 17 2020, City Manager Scott Stiles proclaimed a local emergency to ensure the safety of the community and help prevent the spread of COVID-19. As a result, the Community Services Department closed down all community centers/indoor sports facilities, park amenities, sports fields, in-person recreation programs/classes, pools, special events, and the dog park. Since March 17, 2020 the State has given direction to slowly re-open certain facilities and programs with a set of guidelines that adhere to social distancing and sanitization protocols. Each new stage of the State's Re-opening Plan has allowed for the public use of low to moderate risk facilities. In early May, one of the first park amenities to open were tennis courts with the restriction of singles play only. Tennis was considered a low risk sport and the facilities began to open with specific guidelines and restrictions. Other park amenities and facilities have remained closed until further notice from the State.

DISCUSSION

On June 13, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom approved Stage 3 of the State's Re-Opening Plan. This stage will allow for small gatherings in community centers/facilities/theaters; youth sports for skills-training and drills; and pools for lessons, lap swimming and diving, all with social distancing restrictions.

The Community Services department will open the Community Meeting Center to groups of 50 people or less for non-social use (i.e; meetings, trainings, testing), as long as the required seating and room set-up allow for social distancing. More active/social events such as weddings, quinceañeras, and large group workshops will not be permitted until Stage 4, or when more specific guidelines are provided by the State or County.

Also opening by permit only, will be the sports fields for youth team practices for training and/or drills. Competitive games will not be permitted during this stage. All rental groups must provide a written plan on how they will maintain social distancing, as required by the State and County guidelines, which will be part of the permit approval process.

Pools will open for swim lessons by following guidelines of providing sufficient space for participants to social distance within the pools. Due to the small size of City pools, a maximum of eight (8) participants will be allowed inside the pools at one time for swim lessons. Due to the small amount of participants allowed inside the pool, and considering current budget constraints, recreational swim will not open to the public this summer. However, private pool rentals will be permitted during the weekend, with limited capacity, on a reservation basis.

Theaters (GEM/Garden Amp) may submit a re-opening plan for the City's consideration that will require attendance reductions, social distancing and sanitation protocols.

Both the Dog Park and Skate Spot have been re-opened with social distancing guidelines.

High touch park amenities, such as park playgrounds, Atlantis Play Center, picnic shelters and outdoor fitness equipment, will remain closed per Stage 3 of the State's Re-opening Plan. Outdoor basketball courts (due to high contact pick-up games) at city parks will also remain closed.

The City's indoor-sports gymnasium will also remain closed until further guidelines are established for indoor sports activities.

Due to the high-risk population the Senior Center serves, it will remain closed until Stage 4 of the State's Re-opening Plan. Virtual programing and meal distribution will continue.

Family Resource Centers remain closed to the public, but will continue its virtual programming, virtual counseling and meal distribution.

SUMMARY

The Community Services Department has moved into re-opening most recreational facilities with limited capacities and specific guidelines that adhere with the State and County. Remained closed until Stage 4 of the State's Re-Opening Plan, or until further guidance is provided are park playgrounds, outdoor fitness equipment, outdoor basketball courts, and indoor-sports gymnasium. Both Senior Center and Family Resource Centers remain closed, but will continue virtual programing and meal distribution. Staff will continue to monitor updated guidelines and adjust accordingly.





I am pleased to inform you of the second allocation of Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) Program funds HUD is awarding to your jurisdiction in the amount of \$3,635,163, as authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136. These special ESG-CV funds are to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus pandemic (COVID-19) among individuals and families who are homeless or receiving homeless assistance; and to support additional homeless assistance and homelessness prevention activities to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19.

President Trump signed the CARES Act on March 27, 2020 to help the Nation respond to the coronavirus outbreak. The CARES Act made available an additional \$4 billion in ESG-CV funds to supplement the Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 ESG funding provided under the Further Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020 (Public Law 116-94). Of this amount, the Department previously allocated \$1 billion for ESG-CV grants based on the FY 2020 ESG formula and set aside \$40 million for technical assistance.

An additional \$2.96 billion in funding for ESG-CV grants is now being allocated directly to States or units of local government by a separate formula developed by the Secretary. The formula approved by the Secretary includes variables that quantify the population currently experiencing and at risk of homelessness, including:

- Total Homeless Population
- Unsheltered Homeless Population
- Total Very Low Income (VLI) Renters
- VLI Renters that are Overcrowded or without a Kitchen or Plumbing

The variables were further weighted to adjust for fair market rents. HUD's formula methodology for this second allocation can be found at

As with the first allocation, this second allocation of ESG-CV funds is subject to the following flexibilities and conditions provided by the CARES Act:

- The funds may be used to cover or reimburse allowable costs incurred by a State or locality before the award of funding (including prior to the signing of the CARES Act) to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19;
- The funds are not subject to the spending cap on emergency shelter and outreach under 24 CFR 576.100(b)(1);
- Up to 10 percent of funds may be used for administrative costs, as opposed to 7.5 percent as provided by 24 CFR 576.108(a);
- The funds are exempt from the ESG match requirements, including 24 CFR 576.201;
- The funds are not subject to the consultation and citizen participation requirements that otherwise apply to the Emergency Solutions Grants, however each recipient must publish how its allocation has and will be used, at a minimum, on the Internet at the appropriate Government web site or through other electronic media;
- The funds may be used to provide homelessness prevention assistance (as authorized under 24 CFR 576.103 or subsequent HUD notices) to any individual or family who does not have income higher than HUD's Very Low-Income Limit for the area and meets the criteria in paragraphs (1)(ii) and (1)(iii) of the "at risk of homelessness" definition in 24 CFR 576.3;
- That recipients may deviate from applicable procurement standards when using these funds to procure goods and services to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus, notwithstanding 24 CFR 576.407(f) and 2 CFR 200.317-200.326;
- While we encourage you to offer treatment and supportive services when necessary to
 assist vulnerable homeless populations, individuals and families experiencing
 homelessness must not be required to receive treatment or perform any other prerequisite
 activities as a condition for receiving shelter, housing, or other services for which these
 funds are used, notwithstanding 24 CFR 576.401(e).

In addition, the Act authorizes the Secretary to grant waivers of and specify alternative requirements for statutes and regulations the Secretary administers in connection with the use of ESG funds (except for requirements related to fair housing, nondiscrimination, labor standards, and the environment). These waivers and alternative requirements can be issued when necessary to expedite and facilitate the use of funds to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus. HUD has made available the following waivers that are applicable to ESG-CV funding:

 - HMIS Lead Activities Allows any recipient to use ESG funds to pay costs of upgrading or enhancing its local HMIS to incorporate data on ESG Program participants and ESG activities related to COVID-19
 - o **Re-evaluations for Homelessness Prevention Assistance** For up to the 2-year period beginning on the date of the waiver memorandum (3/31/2020), the required frequency of re-evaluations for homelessness prevention assistance under section 576.401(b) is waived
 - Housing Stability Case Management For the 2-month period beginning on the date
 of the waiver memorandum (3/31/2020), the required frequency of housing stability
 case management for homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing assistance is
 waived
 - Restriction of Rental Assistance to Units At or Below FMR For the 6-month period beginning on the date of the waiver memorandum (3/31/2020), the FMR restriction is waived for any individual or family receiving Rapid Re-housing or Homelessness Prevention assistance who executes a lease for a unit

The Department is developing a notice that will further lay out the CARES Act provisions and other waivers and requirements to enable swift implementation of ESG-CV grants. This notice and any subsequent notices of waivers and alternative requirements will be made available on HUD's website and distributed to recipients. The Department will also support recipients with technical assistance.

As your jurisdiction continues to develop its plan to use these grant funds, HUD encourages approaches that prioritize the unique needs of persons experiencing homelessness and the development of partnerships between all levels of government and the private for-profit and non-profit sectors. Your jurisdiction should coordinate with State and local health authorities as you support state or local pandemic response. HUD encourages you to share successes that may help other recipients. Like other supplemental funding, ESG-CV grants are subject to oversight and tracking. We look forward to working with you to achieve the best possible outcomes for people experiencing and at risk of homelessness and to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse.

Importantly, proper reporting in the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS) and Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS) is critical to ensuring recipients are complying with program requirements and policies, providing demographic and income information about the persons who benefit from funded activities, and allowing HUD to monitor recipients. Your jurisdiction's ongoing attention is essential to ensuring complete and accurate reporting of performance measurement data.

All ESG recipients must ensure they maintain active Dun and Bradstreet Numbering System (DUNS) numbers in the System for Award Management (SAM) system. Entities must have an active and unexpired DUNS before execution of grant agreements to avoid delays in the obligation of funds which will delay your ability to drawdown funds in IDIS. Recipients are required to maintain an active SAMs registration by re-activating their DUNS number annually in the SAM system for the entire drawdown period of their grants. 

Monthly Water Usage Data, Tier 2 Projection & Water Supply Information

The 2019-20 Water Year (2019-20 WY) officially started on October 1, 2019. Thus far, the Northern California accumulated precipitation (8-Station Index) is reporting 31.03 inches or 65% of normal as of May 27th. For 2019-20 WY, the Northern Sierra Snow Water Equivalent is reporting 19.5 inches on April 8th, which is 71% of normal for that day. Due to a slight increase in precipitation/snowfall, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) has increased the State Water Project (SWP) .,%. This allocation provides Metropolitan with approximately 382,300 AF in SWP deliveries this water year. DWR's approval considered several factors including existing storage in SWP, conservation reservoirs, SWP operational regulatory constraints, and the 2020 contractor demands.


The Upper Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation is reporting 19.2 inches or 82% of normal as of May 26th. On the Colorado River system, snowpack is measured across four states in the Upper Colorado River Basin. The Upper Colorado River Basin Snow Water Equivalent was reporting 19.7 inches as of April 6th, which is 100% of normal for that day. Due to the above average precipitation/snowfall in 2018-19 WY, and due to average conditions in WY 2019-20, there is now a 0% chance of a shortage at Lake Mead in 2021 and an 9% chance of shortage in 2022.

As of May 26th Lake Oroville storage is at **69% of total capacity and 82% of normal**. As of May 26th San Luis Reservoir has a current volume of **66% of the reservoir s total capacity and is 82% of normal**.



With estimated total demands and losses of 1.63 million acre-feet (MAF) and with a 20% SWP Table A Allocation, Metropolitan is projecting that demands will exceed supply levels in Calendar Year (CY) 2020. Based on this, estimated total dry-year storage for Metropolitan at the end of *CY 2020 will go down to approximately 2.85 MAF*.


A projected dry-year storage supply of **2.85 MAF will be the second highest amount for Metropolitan**. A large factor in the increase in water storage is because **water demands regionally have been at approximately <u>36-year lows</u>.**



2019-20 CYCLIC IN-LIEU OPERATIONS

In regards to the 2019-20 Cyclic In-Lieu operations (a.k.a. MET Cyclic Cost Offset Program), as of December 2019 approximately **9,354.7 AF of imported water has been delivered into the OC Basin Cyclic Account via In-Lieu**.


Unfortunately, due to dry hydrology and a State Water Project allocation of 15 percent, Metropolitan has suspended all cyclic deliveries as of December 31, 2019, including Cyclic In-Lieu deliveries. Metropolitan will also begin reducing State Water Project deliveries to preserve flexibility in case the allocation remains low. Metropolitan will regularly revisit operational plans throughout early 2020, as the final SWP allocation for the calendar year will be unknown until the May/June timeframe.

- 2. Reinforce grid reliability and grid resiliency in case of an emergency; and
- 3. Improve customer service and communication, integrate distributed energy resources, and offer customers more choices to meet their needs.

If SCE's rate request is approved by the CPUC, the average residential monthly bill would increase by approximately \$14 in 2021, \$4 in 2022, and \$6 in 2023.

CPUC PROCESS

At the EHs, the assigned Administrative Law Judges (Judges) will receive the testimony of SCE, consumer advocacy groups, and all other parties to this proceeding. These EHs are open to the public but only those who are parties to the proceeding may present evidence, testimony, and are subject to cross-examination. The hearings and documents submitted during this proceeding will become part of the formal record that the Judges rely upon in writing a proposed decision to present to the Commissioners for their consideration.

After considering all proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process, the assigned Judges will issue a proposed decision which may adopt SCE's application as proposed,

modify, or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon at a scheduled CPUC Voting Meeting.

The Public Advocates Office has reviewed this application. The Public Advocates Office is the independent consumer advocate within the CPUC with a legislative mandate to represent investor-owned utility customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. "I greatly look forward to seeing youth sports start in Orange County and encourage all sports leagues to maintain social distancing and follow safety protocols."

The County of Orange will require all youth sports practices to follow state guidance of physical distancing and safety protocols for small and stable groups without spectators.

"After many weeks away from their teams and teammates, children across Orange County can once again be able to do what all children should be encouraged to do which is to play, work on their physical, as well as mental, strength and learn valuable life lessons about collaboration and uniting for a common goal," said Vice Chairman Andrew Do, First District.

At this time, youth sports activities will allow for practices only. There is no set time in which the state will re-open sporting events and games with spectators.

"The State's guidance is the next big step in bringing OC back to normal. I advocated for a safe return to youth activities because playing sports is a fantastic way to build character, in addition to burning off the past months' pent-up energy," said Supervisor Don Wagner. "The Day Camp guidance also gives youth leaders clarity on how to safely conduct business. Our families have been wanting healthy outlets for their children and I am beyond thrilled to see young people now able get out and play once again."

Youth sports leagues must ensure that they meet the proper safety protocols as outlined in the <u>COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Day Camps</u> which include proper cleaning, disinfection, limits on the number of participants, and physical distancing.

"The need for children to be active while practicing safe social distancing at sports practices is important," said Supervisor Doug Chaffee, Fourth District. "We understand that people want to have their lives return to as normal as possible, but it's important to stay vigilant and follow state guidelines on how to do so."

Youth sports league staff will be required to train all staff and families on how to follow safety actions, including screening practices and enhanced sanitation practices.



"Orange County residents understand the severe impacts that COVID-19 has on our residents but these issues can be mitigated by following state guidelines," said Supervisor Lisa Bartlett, Fifth District. "By allowing youth sports practices to resume in a safe manner, it allows Orange County children to enjoy time with their peers and have a little bit of normalcy at this time."

OCTA Adding More Bus Service Back Beginning June 14

Bus service will increase to modified Saturday levels on most routes, about 60 percent of regular service, with safety measures as Orange County gradually reopens

ORANGE – The Orange County Transportation Authority on Sunday, June 14 will implement changes that increase daily OC Bus service to Saturday service levels on most routes Monday through Saturday, add bus trips on the busiest routes to help allow for social distancing, and restore regular weekday service on 14 routes.

The change to modified Saturday service reflects about 60 percent of the regular service that was offered before the start of the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Sunday bus service will continue at regular Sunday service levels. And OC ACCESS paratransit, for eligible riders with physical or cognitive limitations, will remain operating at full service levels.

Saturday service levels will be implemented on 37 bus routes in all, and additional OC Bus trips will be added on weekdays to 15 more heavily traveled routes to continue allowing for social distancing. More information on bus routes and schedules is available online at www.ocbus.com.

"OCTA remains committed to keeping the health and safety of our customers and OCTA employees as the No. 1 priority while continuing to provide essential transit services," said OCTA Chairman Steve Jones, also the Mayor of Garden Grove. "As our county begins to gradually and responsibly reopen, the OC Bus system will be there to help our residents safely get where they need to go."

OCTA continues to follow health guidance from federal, state and local agencies. Since the public health crisis began, OCTA has implemented several safety measures, which continue. That includes hand sanitizer available to riders on every OC Bus, enhanced nightly cleaning of buses with extra focus on surfaces frequently touched and temporary rear-door boardings.

OC Bus riders are also asked to wear face coverings on board and follow social-distancing recommendations while on the bus. When possible, OCTA will limit the number of passengers onboard to allow for social distancing.

On March 23, OCTA reduced OC Bus service levels to Sunday service levels – about 40 percent of regular service – on all days of the week.

That temporary reduction in service was implemented to protect coach operators and the community from the spread of COVID-19. It was also in response to a sharp decline in ridership as Orange County followed the state's stay-at-home orders, and OC Bus continued to operate for essential workers and those who relied on public transportation for essential trips.

As Orange County has started to reopen under the state's guidance, ridership has also seen corresponding increases. Before the coronavirus pandemic, the OC Bus system saw an average of nearly 125,000 riders per day. That number dropped in March and April to approximately 33,000 daily riders, but in recent weeks has picked up again to approximately 47,000 daily riders.

The modified Saturday service schedule is listed by route on the www.OCBus.com website. Bilingual signs notifying bus riders of the June 14 changes are being placed at all OCTA bus stops and printed brochures will be mailed to customers who call in requesting the information.

Riders will also be notified through onboard announcements, social media, and email blasts, and in multiple languages, including Spanish and Vietnamese.

OCTA is continuing to monitor the evolving situation and will adapt as needed for the health and safety of the public. OC Bus riders are encouraged to periodically check the OC Bus website and look for updates.



OCTA Approves \$1.4 Billion Balanced Budget for FY 2020-21

Budget was revised with lower anticipated spending due to effects of COVID-19 pandemic but keeps advancing transportation improvements for Orange County

ORANGE – The Orange County Transportation Authority has approved a budget of more than \$1.4 billion for the upcoming fiscal year – a balanced budget that makes conservative assumptions due to the financial effects of the COVID-19 pandemic while keeping important transportation improvements moving forward.

The OCTA board on Monday OK'd the balanced budget, down more than \$98 million compared to last year's OCTA budget, for the 2020-21 fiscal year that begins July 1.

Major initiatives for the budget include advancing capital improvement projects, including the I-405 Improvement Project, I-5 projects in South County and Central County, the OC Streetcar, improving local streets and continuing to serve Orange County's transit needs, while keeping health and safety as the top priority.

The budget underwent several revisions in recent months based on revenue estimates that show sharp declines in funding from both Measure M, the county's half-cent sales tax for transportation and state sales-tax funding, in the wake of the ongoing public health crisis. No plans for new hiring or salary increases for administrative and professional staff are included in the budget.

"We clearly had to make some difficult decisions because of the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, but this budget demonstrates OCTA's ongoing commitment to improving the lives of residents through transportation," said OCTA Chairman Steve Jones, also the Mayor of Garden Grove. "We're happy to continue on the path to delivering a balanced and sustainable transportation system for Orange County."

The FY 2020-21 budget encompasses all services, projects and programs that are administered by OCTA. The budget reflects a significant investment in capital projects.

Measure M, also known as OC Go, will continue to fund improvements to freeways and streets throughout Orange County, along with multiple transit programs. Included in the budget is \$418 million to help fund freeway improvements and \$32 million for the OC Streetcar now under construction, which will be the county's first modern electric streetcar in Santa Ana and Garden Grove.

Additionally, approximately \$146 million will go toward improving streets and roads, including more than \$56 million to provide more traffic capacity and \$36 million for traffic-signal synchronization.

The budget also included funding that would keep OC Bus fixed-route service at up to the same levels as before the pandemic, with 1.6 million revenue hours made possible with additional funding from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act.

Actual OC Bus service levels will be added back as demand increases and with the health and safety of the public and employees as the top priority.

The 2020-21 budget is a result of OCTA's mission to deliver innovative, long-term sustainable transportation solutions for the residents of Orange County.

INCREASED PATROLS, WARNINGS FOR JULY 4

The City, in collaboration with the Garden Grove Police Department and Orange County Fire Authority, is raising the public's awareness to safety and increased police presence during the upcoming July 4 holiday. Police patrols will be identifying violators of the City's municipal code on fireworks. Using or possessing illegal fireworks, including misusing or tampering with legal ones, carries a \$1,000 fine.

Only safe and sane fireworks bearing the California State Fire Marshal seal may be discharged in Garden Grove on July 4, from 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., on private property only.

As in previous years, on July 4, the Garden Grove Police Department will deploy additional officers to identify violators of the City's code on fireworks. Patrols will focus on areas of high-activity illegal fireworks use.

In addition, Garden Grove Animal Care Services will have an Animal Control Officer on-duty on July 4. If a pet goes missing, call (714) 741-5565; press 1 for Field Services; and leave a detailed voice message. The on-duty Animal Control Officer will automatically be notified of call/voice messages.

Increased Patrols, Warnings for July 4 2-2-2

All city parks will close by 5:00 p.m. on July 4, including tennis and handball courts, with park sprinklers activated.

Garden Grove firework sales take place from July 1 through July 4. Hours are: 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., July 1 through July 3; and 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on July 4.

Due to the current COVID-19 crisis, Fourth of July block parties will not take place in the city of Garden Grove.

To report illegal fireworks, call the Garden Grove Police Department's non-emergency number at (714) 741-5704. Be prepared to provide the address where the illegal firework(s) were lit and a description of the individual(s) involved.

Call 9-1-1 for emergencies only.

In 2019, the Garden Grove Police Department issued 75, \$1,000 citations, a 5.6% increase from 2018. The Garden Grove Police Department received 218 firework-related service calls on July 4; and 284 firework-related calls from July 1 through July 5, 2019.



League of California Cities Provides California State Legislature Budget Highlights

June 15, 2020

Today, the Senate and the Assembly passed the Legislature's compromise FY 2020-21 State Budget and sent it to Gov. Gavin Newsom.

June 15 is the constitutional deadline for the Legislature to pass a budget and send it to the Governor. The Legislature's budget largely rejects the Governor's proposed cuts from the May Revision budget and instead relies on federal assistance, accounting maneuvers, and additional reserves.

The Legislature acknowledged additional work on the budget is needed, which will be carried out in the coming days and weeks. Numerous budget trailers bills will be considered to implement the budget or make cuts to existing programs if federal assistance is not forthcoming.

Negotiations between the Governor and Legislature on additional budgetary items continue this week. It is anticipated that an August revision to the budget will occur once tax receipts are received in July. The League will continue to fight for resources that cities need to address revenue loss related to the COVID-19 pandemic response and recovery.

Read League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman's response to the FY 2020-21 State Budget <u>here</u>, and read below for highlights that are of interest to cities:

Trigger Cuts

If California does not receive the anticipated \$14 billion in additional federal assistance by Sept. 1, the following "trigger solutions" may occur:

- \$2.7 billion more from the rainy day fund and Safety Net Reserve.
- \$1.3 billion one-time benefit from reinstatement of a longstanding deferral of state payments to CalPERS, including from state special funds.
- \$5.9 billion of increased deferrals to Proposition 98 (K-14 education) funding.
- \$600 million reduction to the county realignment backfill in this budget plan (leaving \$400 million of county backfill remaining).
- \$770 million of university reductions (\$370 million for University of California and \$400 million for California State University systems).
- \$100 million of reductions to the judicial branch budget.
- At least \$1.5 billion in state employee compensation reductions to be achieved, for represented employees, through the collective bargaining process.

• Potentially another \$1.6 billion from reinstatement of the one-day June payroll deferral that was instituted during the last recession (this change would be optional at the direction of the Director of the Department of Finance).

CARES Act Funding

The Legislature's budget allocates \$500 million to cities for homelessness, public health, public safety, and other services to combat COVID-19 pandemic as follows:

- \$225 million directly to cities with a population greater than 300,000 that did not receive a direct allocation from the Federal CARES Act. Allocation based on the city's population.
- \$275 million to cities with a population less than 300,000. Allocation based on the city's population. No city shall receive less than \$50,000.

The Legislature's budget allocates \$550 million through the Department of Housing and Community Development for acquisition or acquisition and rehabilitation of motels, hotels, or hostels; master leasing of properties; acquisition of other sites and assets; conversion of units from nonresidential to residential in a structure with a certificate of occupancy as a motel, hotel, or hostel; purchase of affordability covenants and restrictions for units; and the relocation costs for individuals who are being displaced as a result of rehabilitation of existing units. The budget also adopts a placeholder trailer bill to implement Project Roomkey.

Homelessness Funding

The Legislature's budget includes additional funding to support existing homelessness programs. The budget directs \$350 million to the Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council, however, it is unclear how these funds will be allocated. A budget trailer bill is likely needed to provide direction to the Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council.

Transportation Funding

The Legislature's budget rejects the Governor's May Revision proposal to transfer \$130.5 million in interest earnings from the State Highway Account (SHA) to the General Fund.

Broadband

The Legislature will adopt budget trailer bill language to better enable telecommunications providers to compete for federal funding with the intent of improving access to broadband Internet in California.

California Office of Emergency Services

The Legislature's budget allocates \$50 million one-time General Fund for Community Power Resiliency to support additional preparedness measures that bolster community resiliency and includes budget bill language reflecting the Legislature's priorities in this area.

The Legislature's budget allocates \$2 million General Fund for the Wildfire Forecast and Threat

Intelligence Integration Center, consistent with Chapter 405, Statutes of 2019 (SB 209), reducing the proposal by \$6.8 million General Fund across various departments.

Department of Parks and Recreation

The Legislature's budget rejects the \$30 million General Fund ongoing baseline cut to the Department of Parks and Recreation scheduled to begin 2021-22.

Department of Water Resources

The Legislature's budget approves \$18 million General Fund and \$10 million Proposition 68 for the New River Project.

The Legislature's budget approves the withdrawal of \$35 million General Fund for the Tijuana River Project.

Minor Revenue Increases

The Legislature will adopt budget trailer bill language for used car dealer sales tax. This trailer bill language would require used car dealers to remit the sales tax from a vehicle sale to the Department of Motor Vehicles with the registration fee. This change is projected to increase by millions state and local revenues from these transactions.



State and Local Leaders -

Today, June 16, President Donald J. Trump took historic action and signed an **Executive Order on Safe Policing for Safe Communities** (<u>remarks</u>; <u>video</u>). Prior to the signing, the President met with families who have lost loved ones to violence – many involving deadly interactions with police – and reiterated and the Administration's commitment to deliver safety and security for Americans of every race and background. The <u>Executive Order</u> is the product of close collaboration with law enforcement professionals, community leaders, and impacted families and demonstrates the President's commitment to decisively advance common sense reforms that improve accountability, increase transparency, and invest more resources in police training, recruiting, and community engagement. "Americans can achieve anything when we work together as one national family," President Trump stated in remarks prior to the Executive Order signing. "To go forward, we must seek cooperation, not confrontation; we must build upon our heritage, not tear it down; and we must cherish the principles of America's founding as we strive to deliver safe, beautiful, elegant justice and liberty for all."

 - The White House: "In order to make real progress on public safety, we have to break old patterns of failure. Many of the same politicians now presenting themselves as the solution are the same ones who have failed for decades on schools, jobs, justice, and crime."

President Trump strongly believes in the rule of law, and through the Executive Order, has directed his Administration to seek reforms that improve the relationship between law enforcement and all communities. Importantly, the Executive Order represents a commitment by the President and the Administration to support – not defund – the brave men and women of law enforcement by providing them with necessary resources to implement best practices and protect the communities they serve. Key provisions include:

- **Certification**: The Justice Department will now allocate certain funding only to law enforcement agencies that meet high standards for use-of-force and de-escalation, as credentialed by reputable independent bodies. As part of this new credentialing, chokeholds will be banned except if an officer's life is at risk.
- Information Sharing: The Attorney General will create a database for federal, state, and local law enforcement to track terminations, criminal convictions, and civil judgments against law enforcement officers for excessive use-of-force.
- **Mental Health**: To protect both officers and our most vulnerable populations, the Administration will prioritize training for police and social workers who respond to incidents involving the mentally ill, addicted, and homeless.

• **Legislative Action**: The Administration will develop and propose new legislation to Congress to build on these policies and boost community engagement.
