RE: Support for AB 1063 Housing Production Bill

Dear Assemblymember Petrie Norris,

On behalf of the City of Garden Grove, I am writing to express my support for AB 1063 which will provide necessary streamlining and flexibility to cities to be able to accelerate housing production.

The State has taken aggressive steps to promote housing production in the State. Further, in the current health pandemic, it is even more important that Cities are given flexibility to allow them to boost housing construction. This bill will take important steps to implement five objectives that will allow cities to facilitate housing and help the State meet the Governor's goal to create additional housing units by 2025.

- Allow local governments to credit up to 50 percent of its RHNA numbers through either rehabilitation, conversion and/or preservation.
- Clarify that committed assistance be demonstrated early enough such that the housing units would be completed and available before the end of the planning period.
- Present clear, objective standards for the review and certification of Housing Elements by providing guidance to local governments in the selection of appropriate sites, while minimizing local government's administrative time and cost.
- Expand the ability for cities to count ADUs as affordable units towards RHNA requirements by establishing an accepted assumption for estimating ADU production and affordability levels.
- Provide flexibility for the jurisdictions that have local voter-approval requirements, to submit a draft Housing Element by the October 2021 timeline.

This bill will provide critical clarifying language and establish clear standards that will help cities have clarity on how they can move forward in identifying viable sites for development. Further, this bill builds on existing State policy. The Legislature updated

ADU and junior law effective January 1, 2020 to clarify and improve various provisions in order to promote the development of ADUs and junior accessory dwelling units (JADUs). This bill will clarify current law to ensure that cities can count ADU's towards their housing element compliance. As an affordable home option, and one that the Legislature has focused on establishing, it is important that cities are able to receive credit for facilitating the development of ADU's and JADU's.

With the impacts of COVID-19 and the continued focus on housing, this bill is a common-sense solution that will help cities facilitate and expedite additional housing supply. For these reasons, I support AB 1063.

OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to report on the FY 2019-2020 First-Time Home Buyer (FTHB) Program accomplishments and to provide update on changes for the upcoming program year.

BACKGROUND

The FTHB Program is comprised of two components, the CalHOME loan and the Workforce Initiative Subsidy for Homeownership (WISH) grant.

- 1. CalHOME Loan Provides up to \$60,000 for second mortgage financing in the form of a 30-year deferred loan.
- 2. WISH Grant Provides up to \$22,000 of assistance in the form of a forgivable grant. The grant is forgiven after 5 years.

DISCUSSION

FY 2019-2020 FTHB PROGRAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The City of Garden Grove renewed it's partnership with Pacific Mercantile Bank in 2019 to allocate Workforce Initiative Subsidy for Homeownership (WISH) grant funds for eligible low-income first-time home buyers. The WISH grant matched every \$1 the home buyer contributed towards a down-payment with \$4, up to a maximum grant amount of \$22,000. The WISH funds were leveraged with the City's CalHOME funds, which allowed the City to repurpose funds that were received from past CalHOME loan payoffs and to redeploy the CalHOME funds for new firsttime home buyer loans. CalHOME funds provide up to \$60,000 of assistance to cover the difference between the amount of primary financing the home buyer is approved for and the actual cost of the home.

Extensive community outreach was conducted to promote the FTHB Program through an interactive FTHB webpage, press releases, and social media outlets. Ten (10) FTHB Workshops have been held to date with approximately five hundred

participants receiving information on the home purchasing process and homeownership.

The Office of Economic Development has successfully funded six (6) families with home purchases in FY 2019-2020 through the issuance of four WISH grants totaling \$88,000 in combination with six CalHOME loans totaling \$179,227. In addition, there are numerous families and individuals pre-approved for the program funds that are currently searching for homes to purchase in Garden Grove.

FY 2020-2021 PROGRAM UPDATE

The new WISH Program in partnership with Pacific Mercantile Bank will be issued on a first-come first-served basis. The City will not be limited in the amount of qualified WISH applicants that can receive the WISH grant and the City could potentially serve more first-time home buyers. In addition, the City will be doing virtual workshops in response to social distancing requirements for public gatherings.

There are six (6) virtual FTHB workshops scheduled for FY 2020-21. The virtual workshops will be held on the following dates:

- August 29, 2020
- October 24, 2020
- December 5, 2020
- February 27, 2021
- April 24, 2021
- June 5, 2021

FTHB outreach will continue via press releases and social media posts in the coming weeks to promote the upcoming FTHB workshops. Information about the FTHB Program is also available through the City's website at ggcity.org/neighborhood-improvement/first-time-home-buyer-programs.

OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to communicate information about substandard properties that have been resolved through recent Code Enforcement efforts.

BACKGROUND

In April 2019, a restructure of the Building and Safety Division merged the Building Abatement functions with the Code Enforcement Unit (CEU). This transition provided for a comprehensive Code Enforcement approach to enhance customer service delivery and improve responses to customer complaints about building code violations and/or non-permitted construction activity. On an annual basis, the CEU oversees +600 active code enforcement cases related to substandard properties and structures that uncover building code violations which potentially pose risk to the health, safety, or physical well-being of the public.

The CEU has expanded support alongside the Garden Grove Police Department (GGPD) in areas of cannabis enforcement and attractive nuisance properties. With the effective use of the Municipal Code and support from the City Attorney, CEU has been successful in resolving several long standing code enforcement cases.

DISCUSSION

The CEU team is comprised of nine (9) staff members: 1 CE Supervisor, 3 CE officers, 2 part-time CE Techs, 1 part-time contract CE Officer (STRs), and 1 grant-funded CE Officer. Collectively, the CEU team in coordination with GGPD and the City Attorney's Office achieved resolution and compliance on the following substandard properties:

An Unprecedented Collaboration in the Fight to End Homelessness Strengthening Landlord Outreach and Engagement for Voucher Program Success Funding Request, Orange County, CA

INTRODUCTION

In his February 2020 speech, HUD Secretary Ben Carson stated, "There is no single issue more important than the ideal of a place to live that is safe, decent and affordable" (Unhoused: Addressing Homelessness in California, USC). He emphasized the need for compassion and putting aside political differences to work together on the twin issues of housing affordability and homelessness.

Inspired by HUD's leadership, the four Public Housing Authorities who serve all of Orange County, have agreed to an unprecedented level of collaboration. We ask HUD to join us. On behalf of the County of Orange, Orange County Housing Authority (CA094), Anaheim Housing Authority (CA104), Garden Grove Housing Authority (CA102), Santa Ana Housing Authority (CA093), Orange County United Way and United to End Homelessness, we respectfully request \$34,107,780 reoccurring annually to bolster our voucher programs and a one-time investment of \$26,442,000 to fund our pivotal landlord incentive and housing program. HUD's funding and partnership will be the catalyst that propels Orange County's ability to permanently house our most vulnerable.

In 2018, HUD formed a Landlord Task Force and held seven listening sessions with landlords across the country to solicit input on increasing participation in the Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program. This listening tour brought to the forefront the critical role that landlords play in the success of the HCV program. As HUD's Office of Policy Development and Research (PD&R) states, "the success of the HCV program depends on the availability of units in the private market and landlords play a pivotal role. Landlord participation determines how many units are available for HCV participants, where those units are located and how well the program achieves goals such as making units available in high-opportunity neighborhoods and alleviating high concentrations of voucher holders in very low-income neighborhoods." However, limited information about the HCV program exists. Landlords have misconceptions about the voucher process and tenant quality, there are complaints about communicating with housing authorities and ultimately many landlords choose not to participate in the HCV program. (PD&R, Evidence Matters, Winter 2019). To expand affordable housing options for voucher holders, many housing authorities are using various types of incentives to encourage landlords to participate in the HCV program.

REGIONAL COLLABORATIVE

Toward this same goal, in late 2018 Orange County United Way, on behalf of the United to End Homelessness collaborative¹, partnered with the: County of Orange (the County), Apartment Association

of Orange County, California Apartment Association, individual property owners, Orange County Housing Services Collaborative, Santa Ana Housing Authority, Anaheim Housing Authority and the Orange County Housing Authority to design **WelcomeHomeOC**. WelcomeHomeOC is the only program of its kind in Orange County that creates affordable housing opportunities through relationship building, trust, collaboration and incentives at the core source of affordable housing: long-term relationship building with landlords. WelcomeHomeOC's goals include:

- 1) Increasing available rental units through landlord outreach, engagement and incentives,
- 2) Reducing the length of time between voucher issuance and lease up.
- 3) Assisting Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) to increase their voucher lease up success rate and
- 4) Permanently housing homeless households.

WelcomeHomeOC focuses on elements that HUD's listening tour concluded are some of the most important opportunities to recruit landlords in the HCV program, the things that are most important to the landlords: "reliable rent payments and tenants that stay and care for the property". WelcomeHomeOC incentivizes landlords to rent to homeless voucher holders with funding for security deposits, application fees, unit holding costs, property damage fees, and other costs not covered by a housing voucher. WelcomeHomeOC also connects landlords to homeless voucher holders through housing navigation services and facilitates the lease-up process while ensuring wrap-around case management services are in place afterward for the tenants. In 2018, Assistant Secretary Hunter Kurtz met with our United to End Homelessness Leadership Council and provided his tremendous support for the design and launch of WelcomeHomeOC. The following year, HUD's Region IX Administrator Christopher Patterson toured the WelcomeHomeOC program, met our housing cohort and spoke with some of our recently housed (formerly homeless) tenants. HUD Region IX acclaimed our collaborative work as an "exemplary best practice" in fighting homelessness (December 2019) nationwide.

Over the past 24 months, HUD has provided multiple opportunities for our county to rise-to-the-occasion and at each step Orange County has successfully met HUD's challenges, resulting in stronger partnerships, healthy collaborations, increased landlord engagement, increased available properties and the pilot of a successful landlord incentive program. For example, HUD invigorated our efforts by issuing additional Mainstream Vouchers to our local housing authorities, selecting the Santa Ana Housing Authority as a unique **Foster Youth to Independence** participant and collaborating with us to build initiatives that resulted in compassionate service and permanent housing. We submit this request to continue to build on our shared successes and respectfully request funding in support of:

- 1. Existing vouchers allocated,
- 2. Allocation of new vouchers, and
- 3. Increasing the number of available rental units through WelcomeHomeOC to permanently house households.

FUNDING REQUEST

1. Fully Fund Existing Housing Choice Vouchers, Request \$27,042,780 annually.

To continue the larger fight to house 100% of our homeless population, we ask that HUD leverage our collaborative work as a proving-ground, by fully funding Orange County's Housing Choice Vouchers and providing 100% proration of administrative fees. Across all four PHAs, 1785 Housing Choice Vouchers are currently allocated but unable to be utilized.

Due to higher rent costs in Orange County, current HUD funding for actual rental assistance in accordance with these vouchers is insufficient, rendering them unusable. In 2019, rent costs rose at the fastest pace in 14 years, according to the Consumer Price Index. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports an increase of 5.8% annual rate in July 2019. That is the highest for the month of July since 2005. The current voucher funding is not keeping up with the fair market value for Orange County. Based on previous data, a per unit cost by HUD is calculated as \$1,262, however, the average cost to rent a 1-bedroom apartment in Orange County is now \$1,632.

Housing Choice Vouchers are the most flexible and nonrestrictive when it comes to who can be awarded the voucher and a major part of our success housing various homeless populations. Let us prove what can be accomplish, and the number and timeliness with which we can house hundreds of households, when fully powered for success.

The Orange County Housing Authority (CA094), Anaheim Housing Authority (CA104), and Santa Ana Housing Authority (CA093) have a policy in their HCV Administrative Plan to set aside up to 50% of their turnover vouchers to end homelessness. There is a profound commitment in Orange County to provide vouchers for homeless households in partnership with HUD. This policy commitment by the three housing authorities can be achieved with HUD's help fully funding for our existing vouchers and 100% proration of our administrative fees. This would be a tremendous catalyst to housing a major portion of our homeless population.

2. Fund a total of 575 new special-purpose vouchers for homeless youth, families and individuals, Request \$7,065,000 annually.

To leverage WelcomeHomeOC's ability to segment and successfully house specific populations, we request HUD to provide a total of 575 new fully funded vouchers which will ensure that we can immediately deploy a win-win strategy and provide a home for homeless youth, families and individuals. Vouchers will be allocated to the PHAs that currently deploy these programs.

A. <u>Foster Youth to Independence vouchers, Quantity 50.</u> In December 2019, Orange County became one of only two regions in California (to date) to receive HUD's new pilot Foster Youth to Independence vouchers with a challenge to house 25 formerly foster youth through WelcomeHomeOC. Tragically,

many Orange County young adults who reach their 18th or 21st birthdays while in foster care are expected to secure housing and achieve self-sufficiency, seemingly overnight. It is an enormously difficult undertaking that leaves far too many of our vulnerable youth precariously housed, or worse, homeless. The Santa Ana Housing Authority and WelcomeHomeOC collaborated with the OC Social Services Agency to provide a voucher-based system for young adults leaving child welfare systems, as the program would only succeed if it gained the trust of the youth it is serving. WelcomeHomeOC proved that housing the formerly foster youth could be done with compassion, accuracy and speed. Within 60 days from the onset of the challenge, United Way raised \$228,000 additional private market dollars to fund WelcomeHomeOC and within 90 days of voucher issuance, all 25 voucher-holders were housed. Ours was the first Foster Youth to Independence program in the country to lease up all 25 vouchers.

Our PHAs have identified an additional 50 youth who qualify for this assistance. We would like to bring these young adults home. This funding will fulfill Secretary Carson's vision when he established the Foster Youth to Independence Initiative.

B. <u>Family Unification Program vouchers, Quantity 100.</u> Our 2019 Point in Time Count identified 466 homeless families in Orange County. If we are to provide any sense of security for our younger generations, if we are to cultivate the future workforce or break the multi-generational cycle of poverty, we must bring these families home.

The Family Unification Program is one of our most effective tools to provide housing opportunities for a segment of these homeless families. Our PHAs request an additional 100 vouchers to end homelessness and reunite families qualified under this program, effectively and swiftly ending homelessness for at least 20% of this population. In combination with other housing efforts, we believe that together and in the near-term, we can bring family homelessness to functional zero.

C. Mainstream Vouchers, Quantity 425. In August 2019, United Way and WelcomeHomeOC partnered with the Santa Ana Housing Authority and Illumination Foundation to test out a theory; together, we could run a 30-day fundraising campaign that would result in funding to house 30 voucher-holders. If successful, HUD would unlock additional vouchers based on full utilization of the first award of vouchers. The campaign focused on a particularly vulnerable homeless population: individuals with disabilities and families with an adult household member with a disability. The private market in Orange County banded together and raised \$500,000 in just 30 days for WelcomeHomeOC. WelcomeHomeOC staff capacity was increased and within 90 days of receiving the client referrals, all 30 households were housed. As a result of this successful utilization effort, Santa Ana ended up receiving an award of 106 additional Mainstream Vouchers due to this extraordinary success to combine landlord incentives and vouchers for homeless households.

Homeless individuals remain on our streets and in our shelters for months and years without assistance available to provide them with housing solutions. Once funded, Orange County can lease

up and utilize all of these Mainstream Vouchers quickly through WelcomeHomeOC. HUD can demonstrate not only the impact of landlord incentives to expand landlord participation, but also the value of combining landlord incentives with vouchers for homeless households. This is a win-win for both HUD and Orange County.

3. Fund WelcomeHomeOC to build upon HUD's recently completed listening tour and expand an innovative, replicable and best-practice landlord incentive program in Orange County, Request \$26,442,000 one-time.

In the fight to end homelessness it is **prudent and cost effective** to marry funding and vouchers with a landlord incentive program rather than the alternative of paying the ongoing costs of homelessness. Housing a homeless household through **WelcomeHomeOC** has a one-time cost of \$26,000 per household (including 1-year wrap around services), while the recurring annual cost per homeless person, according to the 2017 research study *Homelessness in Orange County: The Costs to Our Community*, funded by UC Irvine and the United Way, is \$100,759. We know from our local UC Irvine study and other similar studies across the country, including the Family Options Study, that vouchers combined with landlord incentives is the most efficient way to provide permanent housing for homeless households relative to other best practices. Accordingly, "The Family Options Study suggests that families who experience homelessness can successfully use and retain housing vouchers, and that having priority access to deep permanent housing subsidies has considerable benefits..." (Family Options Study, October 2016)

Relative to developing project-based affordable housing units that take at least three to five years to develop, WelcomeHomeOC is able to expand affordable housing for homeless households immediately. This funding request allows WelcomeHomeOC to expand and house at minimum 1017 of the aforementioned voucher holders, by implementing many of the outreach, engagement and incentive opportunities outlined in the PD&R, Evidence Matters (Winter 2019) listening tour summary, including "partnering with landlords, encouraging and engaging landlords, landlord incentives, and breaking barriers." Staff conduct regular landlord outreach through events, presentations and referrals and continue to build our landlord database. To date, there are 56 property owners in our network with an average of 30 available units at any one time. We estimate there are thousands of vacant units to target for inclusion into the WelcomeHomeOC network and we know that we can expand and secure additional units. For example, the Apartment Association of Orange County is a valuable property owner partner. David Cordero, Executive Director, sits on the United to End Homelessness Leadership Council and the association has been actively involved in the design of WelcomeHomeOC since the beginning, ensuring that the program offers the right incentives to landlords to keep them engaged. In April 2019, the association endorsed WelcomeHomeOC. Overall, the association has 2,000 property owner members representing 85,000 private market rental units in Orange County. The Southern California Association of Governments has a 4-5 percent vacancy rate for the housing forecast; meaning there are approximately 3,825 vacant units within the Apartment Association network alone. With the resources and manpower, we can reach out to them.

Landlords have shared that working with a trusted entity, such as United Way, instills them with the confidence to be able to securely rent their properties to voucher-holders. This relationship results in property owners who are more knowledgeable about the housing system. It also quells their fears by breaking the myths and provides undeniable business value through additional rental costs like holding fees and security deposits, as well as benefits like new furnishings for clients. Benefits of participating in the network include filling vacancies quickly from a wait list of prescreened candidates and the satisfaction of providing needed housing at market rates to end homelessness in Orange County.

CONCLUSION

This is timely, not a long-term strategy. Issuing, processing, scaling-up and leasing-up these new vouchers is an immediate strategy for our county with WelcomeHomeOC as our backbone.

Never before has there been a stronger collective partnership to end homelessness in Orange County. The above requests are priority and integral to make giant strides toward this shared goal. Funding existing and new vouchers combined with WelcomeHomeOC will bring homelessness for foster youth and families in Orange County to functional zero, effectively ending homelessness for these populations, and result in an innovative, successful, replicable best-practice housing and model for HUD to adopt in other regions. Funding for landlord incentives through WelcomeHomeOC and vouchers for target homeless households is a perfect progression of HUD's listening tour and the formation of HUD's Landlord Task Force. It also builds upon our existing research and knowledge of what works most effectively to reduce homelessness.

Together, the County of Orange, United Way and our four Public Housing Authorities commit to ensuring that our homeless populations are served with compassion and that we can meet the vision that Secretary Carson set forth providing them a permanent and ideal place to live that is safe, decent and affordable.

Bars Ordered Closed in Orange County, California Effective July 2

Santa Ana, Calif. (July 1, 2020) – Effective July 2, 2020, all bars are ordered closed in Orange County, California due to the increasing number COVID-19 cases.

"While we would prefer not to close bars at this time, many of our neighboring counties have closed their bars, and it's important to take precautions to ensure the safety of the general public," said Chairwoman Michelle Steel, Second District.

Acting County Health Officer and OC Health Care Agency (HCA) Director Clayton Chau, M.D., Ph.D. has ordered all bars in Orange County closed to help slow the spread of COVID-19. A copy of the Order may be found here.

"The health and safety of Orange County's residents is paramount," said Vice Chairman Andrew Do, First District. "We must continue to fight the spread of COVID-19. I encourage all residents and business owners to be extra cautious this holiday weekend."

The Order, which is effective Thursday, July 2, helps align counties in Southern California due to the increases in COVID-19 cases across the region.

Bars had been allowed to operate in Orange County <u>since June 12</u> as the County of Orange received approval from the State to open more business sectors under an accelerated Stage Two. The County of Orange <u>received this approval</u> from the State on May 23, 2020.

"As surrounding counties have closed their bars, the County of Orange has made the decision to temporarily close theirs as well. I wish everyone a safe and healthy holiday weekend," said Supervisor Donald Wagner, Third District.

The County of Orange continues to monitor the spread of COVID-19 cases and has recently updated the HCA's Novel Coronavirus <u>website</u> with further information for residents and researchers.

"If we are to successfully fight this COVID-19 pandemic, we must be vigilant in maintaining social distancing, washing our hands and wearing our face coverings," said Supervisor Doug Chaffee, Fourth District.

The Order does not prohibit restaurants, pubs and breweries that offer dine-in services to operate but the establishment must only serve alcohol in the same transaction as a meal. Should a bar offer meals, they are required to comply with the same industry guidance as restaurants.

"As we experience a rise in positive cases and hospitalizations, it is important that we take swift and prudent action so that we do not overload our healthcare system or jeopardize the progress we have made in reopening our economy," said Supervisor Lisa Bartlett, Fifth District.

NOTIFICATION OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA GAS COMPANY'S REQUEST FOR COMPENSATION THROUGH THE GAS COST INCENTIVE MECHANISM A.20-06-005

On June 15, 2020, Southern California Gas Company (SoCalGas®) filed an Application (A.20-06-005) with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to request approval of its management of savings incurred during the purchase of natural gas for its customers.

Natural gas purchases are reviewed through a mechanism referred to as the Gas Cost Incentive Mechanism (GCIM). The CPUC authorized the GCIM as a means of encouraging utilities to seek the best rates available for natural gas. Under the GCIM, a target price is set and if the utility secures a better rate, the savings is shared with customers and shareholders. If a higher rate is paid, the utility must absorb a portion of the higher rate. SoCalGas shares the savings with its "Core" customers, that is, customers who rely on the utility for all their natural gas needs, including both gas transportation and gas commodity service.

In the latest GCIM year, SoCalGas purchased natural gas at \$82.0 million below the target price during the program period of April 1, 2019, to March 31, 2020. Using the CPUC's formula to determine the incentive for purchasing gas below the target price, SoCalGas is holding \$12.8 million for its shareholders. This means that these purchases provided customers a benefit of \$69.2 million in lower gas costs. In this application, SoCalGas requests that the CPUC approve SoCalGas' reward of \$12.8 million. If the CPUC approves this request, there will be no additional change in customer rates from this application. If the CPUC approves less than \$12.8 million for SoCalGas shareholders, the difference will be credited to customers through a rate decrease. If the CPUC approves more than \$12.8 million for SoCalGas shareholders, the difference will be charged to customers through a rate increase.

HOW WILL THIS AFFECT MY GAS BILL?

A typical residential customer's average monthly bill for 33 therms of gas has already increased by 11 cents/month, from \$51.42 to \$51.53. A typical residential customer's monthly summer bill for 22 therms of gas has already increased by 7 cents/month, from \$38.83 to \$38.90. The impact on each customer and customer class has varied depending on individual usage. Based on SoCalGas' request, the rate impact for each customer class is represented below. This chart represents an increase that has already taken place on your bill due to the GCIM program.

CPUC PROCESS

This application will be assigned to a judge, who will consider proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process. The judge will issue a proposed decision which may adopt SoCalGas' application, modify it or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon by the CPUC Commissioners.

The Public Advocates Office (Cal Advocates) will review this application. Cal Advocates is the independent consumer advocate within the CPUC with a statutory mandate to represent customers of investor-owned utilities to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with safe and reliable service and the state's environmental policy goals. Officials caution OC residents to be aware of the dangers of fireworks

From burned hands to blast injuries and hospitalization, officials from law enforcement and fire agencies detailed the danger of setting off fireworks Tuesday.

The joint effort — coordinated by the Orange County Fire Authority, the Orange County Sheriff's Department, Veteran's Hospital Long Beach and Garden Grove Animal Control — focused on children, veterans and pets.

Fireworks cause about 13,000 injuries in the U.S. every year, officials said.

And, veterans who suffer from Post-Traumatic Stress Syndrome experience more trauma during this holiday and animal control officers receive double the number of missing pet calls over the Fourth of July holiday when compared

to other times of the year, they said.

With fireworks already exploding early in neighborhoods across Orange County, officials are particularly set on urging caution.

"We have two major concerns: bodily harm and fire danger," said OCFA Fire Chief Tracey McClelland. "Last year, we had 24 significant injuries where people were hospitalized; 76 fires were started."

Ten cities — Anaheim, Buena Park, Costa Mesa, Fullerton, Garden Grove, Huntington Beach, Santa Ana, Stanton, Villa Park and Westminster — allow the sale and use/safe and sane fireworks, but the rest of Orange County's communities do not.

Safe and sane fireworks have a specific state seal and include fountains, sparklers, wheels, smoke and snake items, strobes, ground spinners, snappers and caps — fireworks that don't fly or explode.

Still, McClelland cautioned these can be just as dangerous as some illegal fireworks.

"You're dealing with an explosive," he said.

Tuesday's coordinated event took place at OCFA headquarters in Irvine and included examples of how fires can be started and an explosives display put on by the Orange County Sheriff Department's bomb squad.

Alfred Aguirre, senior animal control officer in Garden Grove, likens the Fourth of July weekend to the retail industry's Black Friday.

"When this season comes up, they're spooked and they look for anywhere to escape," he said, adding he has spent many nights chasing wayward dogs on the freeway or on busy city streets. "The volume of calls doubles with people looking for their lost pets. The number of deceased animals also increases."

He recommends pet owners secure their properties to prevent animals from getting out of back yards or homes. Dogs and cats should have marked pet identification, or better yet, be microchipped — make sure the microchip is registered.

CITY OFFERING FIRST-TIME HOME BUYER PROGRAMS

The City is offering First-Time Home Buyer Programs for qualifying low-income families as well as First-Time Home Buyer virtual workshops.

The CalHome loan is a 30-year deferred payment loan requiring no monthly payments, not exceeding \$60,000, which accrues 3-percent simple annual interest for the life of the loan. The loan is designed to assist with covering the difference between a qualifying mortgage amount and the actual price of a single-family home for qualified low- and very low-income families.

The City also offers the Workforce Initiative Subsidy for Homeownership Grant. The matching grant is up to \$22,000 that assists qualifying low- and very low-income families with the down payment or closing costs. For every dollar a resident puts towards the down payment, the City will match with four dollars.

There are openings available for the First-Time Home Buyer workshops which introduce potential Garden Grove homeowners to the process of buying a home, how to qualify for a home mortgage, and information regarding financial assistance programs offered through the City.

CITY TO RESUME WATER SHUT-OFFS FOR NON-PAYMENTS

As of Wednesday, July 1, 2020, the City of Garden Grove will begin issuing normal late fees on water payments. Payments for delinquent accounts before June 30, 2020 will be accepted without penalty if paid by July 15, 2020. Starting August 2020, the City will resume water shut-offs for non-payments.

The suspension of limitations on the hours of operation of, and deliveries to, businesses and establishments engaged in essential activities will expire on July 30, 2020.

On March 17, 2020, the City of Garden Grove proclaimed a local emergency due to COVID-19, undertaking various relief actions that included the suspension of water shut-offs for non-payment until further notice.

CITY REMINDS COMMUNITY OF JULY 4 SAFETY TIPS AND REGULATIONS

As July 4 approaches, the City reminds the community to celebrate the national holiday responsibly. Safe and sane fireworks bearing the California State Fire Marshal seal may be discharged on July 4, from 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. only.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, an estimated 19,500 fires were started by fireworks in the U.S. in 2018. The fires caused five civilian deaths, 46 civilian injuries, and \$105 million in direct property damage. From 2014 to 2018, three of every five reported incidents were brush and grass fires caused by fireworks.

"Last year, the Orange County Fire Authority responded to a fireworks-related vegetation fire in Black Star Canyon," said Orange County Fire Authority Division Chief Ron Roberts. "Fortunately, no injuries were reported. However, the Orange County Fire Authority stresses the need for the community to follow the recommended safety tips and regulations, ensuring a safe and fire-free holiday."

Do not light fireworks near combustibles such as vegetation and structures.

Always light fireworks outdoors, in a clear area away from buildings, vehicles, and shrubbery. Have a bucket of water and hose nearby to soak fireworks before disposing in a metal trashcan. Never point or throw fireworks at another person.

Pet owners are also encouraged to take precautions on July 4 by keeping pets indoors, in a safe, escape-proof room or crate; removing large items away from walls that would allow the pet to escape over the fence; and having an up-to-date Garden Grove license and personal tag on the pet at all times.

As a reminder, using or possessing illegal fireworks, including misusing or tampering with legal ones, carries a \$1,000 fine.

To report illegal fireworks, call the Garden Grove Police Department's nonemergency number at (714) 741-5704. Be prepared to provide the address where the illegal firework(s) were lit and a description of the individual(s) involved.

Sở cảnh sát Garden Grove nhắc nhở cộng đồng để có được ngày lễ July 4 an toàn, trong dịp lễ này, chỉ có thể đốt pháo bông vào ngày Thứ Bảy, 4 tháng Bảy, từ 10:00 giờ sáng đến 10:00 giờ tối và có ký hiệu 'California State Fire Marshal.'

Theo Hiệp hội Phòng cháy chữa cháy Quốc gia (National Fire Protection Association), ước tính có khoảng 19,500 vụ cháy gây ra bởi pháo bông ở Mỹ vào năm 2018. Vụ cháy đã khiến 5 người dân thiệt mạng, 46 người bị thương và thiệt hại tài sản trực tiếp lên đến 105 triệu USD. Từ năm 2014 đến 2018, ba trong số năm vụ cháy và cháy cỏ do đốt pháo bông gây ra.

Trưởng Cảnh sát phòng cháy quận Cam Ron Roberts cho biết, "Năm ngoái, Cơ quan phòng cháy chữa cháy Quận Cam đã phản hồi với một vụ cháy liên quan đến pháo bông ở núi Black Star Canyon. May mắn thay, không có thương tích nào xảy ra. Tuy nhiên, Cơ quan cứu hỏa quận Cam nhấn mạnh sự cần thiết và nhắc nhở cộng đồng tuân theo các quy định an toàn được khuyến nghị, đảm bảo một kỳ nghỉ an toàn."

League Provides Update on Key Bills of Interest in the Legislature

July 1, 2020

The Senate and Assembly just wrapped up a busy month that held several

key legislative deadlines, and are now on summer recess until July 13.

When the Legislature returns, they will have until Aug. 31 to pass any pending legislation.

The League is closely monitoring and engaging on a number of priority bills to ensure the voices of

cities are being heard in the Capitol.

The League has compiled the below list of priority bills in the Legislature with important impacts to

cities, and the League's position on them.

(As of July 1, 2020)

Environmental Quality

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

AB 3279 (Friedman) California Environmental Quality Act. Administrative and Judicial

Procedures.

This measure would revise CEQA litigation procedures by:

• Reducing the deadline for a court to commence hearings from one year to 270 days;

• Provide that a lead agency may decide whether a plaintiff prepares the administrative record;

and

Authorizes a court to issue an interlocutory remand, if certain findings are made.

League Position: Pending

Climate Change

AB 3256 (E. Garcia) Economic Recovery, Wildfire Prevention, Safe Drinking Water, Drought

Preparation, and Flood Protection Bond Act of 2020.

This measure would put a \$6.980 billion bond for a wildfire prevention, safe drinking water, climate

resilience, drought preparation, and flood protection program on the

November 2020 ballot for voter approval.

League Position: Support

SB 45 (Allen) Wildfire Prevention, Safe Drinking Water, Drought Preparation, and Flood

Protection Bond Act of 2020.

This measure would put a \$5.51 billion bond for wildfire prevention, safe drinking water, drought preparation, and flood protection programs on the November 2020 ballot for voter approval. League Position: Support

Emergency/Disaster Preparedness and Response

AB 2178 (Levine) Emergency Services.

This measure would amend the California Emergency Services Act to additionally include "deenergization," defined as a planned public safety power shutoff, within those conditions constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency. Similar to <u>SB 862</u> (Dodd). League Position: Support

<u>SB 378</u> (Wiener) Electrical Corporations. Deenergization Events. Procedures. Allocation of Costs. Reports.

This measure would require electrical corporations, such as Pacific Gas and Electric, Southern California Edison, and San Diego Gas and Electric, to collect more data on their equipment and ensure that costs accrued by local governments and customers during a utility-initiated power shutoff are recovered in a timely manner. This measure would also establish a civil penalty imposed on electrical corporations during a deenergization event as determined by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). Electrical corporations must also notify cities and counties as early as possible of any utility-initiated power shutoff, and provide all specific local information. League Position: Support

SB 862 (Dodd) Planned Power Outage. Public Safety.

This measure would amend the California Emergency Services Act to additionally include a deenergization event within a sudden and severe energy shortage constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency.

This measure would also require electrical corporations to:

- Include protocols that deal specifically with access and functional need individuals;
- Coordinate with local governments to establish community resource centers;
- Perform any necessary electrical upgrades to ensure that a mobile backup generator can be located at a community resource center during a deenergization event; and
- Is similar to AB 2178 (Levine).

League Position: Support

<u>SB 1099</u> (Dodd) Emergency Backup Generators. Critical Facilities. Order for Abatement. Stipulations.

This measure would require air districts to develop stipulations for an order of abatement that would allow permitted facilities to use backup generators exceeding hour limits, if facilities choose

to enter into a stipulated order of abatement (SOA) with the local air district. This measure would dictate some terms of that SOA, including reporting of use, and a schedule for replacing older polluting generators with the cleanest, feasible, applicable technology that is economically feasible. League Position: Pending

<u>SB 1185</u> (Moorlach) Emergency Backup Generators. Emergency Variance. Operation during Deenergization Events.

This measure would require a facility permittee, when applying for an emergency variance from backup generator runtime rules, to demonstrate they are using the cleanest, feasible, available backup power source. This includes, but not limited to, natural gas-powered generators. League Position: Oppose* (letter pending)

Energy and Utilities

SB 350 (Hill) The Golden State Energy Act.

This measure would authorize the creation of a non-profit public benefit corporation, Golden State Energy (GSE), to acquire the Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) Corporation under specified circumstances, including in the event PG&E does not emerge from Chapter 11 bankruptcy. This bill would provide specified actions should PG&E not emerge from bankruptcy or have its CPUC-issued license revoked. The Governor signed this bill on June 30.

League Position: Watch

SB 1312 (McGuire) Electrical Corporations. Deenergization.

This measure would propose a number of requirements related to reducing wildfire risks and proactive power shutoffs by electric investor-owned utilities (IOUs). Including:

- Requiring a revision to the CPUC Rule 20 tariff to underground overhead electric lines in high fire threat areas; and
- Directing the CPUC to oversee the IOU's efforts on new requirements including specified reporting, ability to assess fines and penalties, notification requirements, and requiring specified fire risk mitigation capital expenditures by the electric IOUs by certain dates.

League Position: Support

Solid Waste and Recycling

AB 1672 (Bloom) Solid Waste. Nonwoven Disposable Products.

This measure would require labels indicating a product should not be flushed on specified nonwoven disposable products.

League position: Support* (letter pending)

SB 54 (Allen)/AB 1080 (Gonzalez) Solid Waste. Packaging and Products.

These identical measures would direct the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) to establish a comprehensive framework to address plastic pollution and waste by:

- Adopting regulations by Jan. 1, 2024 that require producers, which includes the people who manufacture single-use packaging or priority single use products, to achieve a 75 percent reduction of waste generated from single-use packaging and priority single-use plastic products in the California market by 2030;
- Requiring producers to source reduce single-use packaging and priority single-use products to the maximum extent feasible:
- Requiring producers to make single-use packaging and priority single-use products recyclable or compostable by 2030; and
- Developing criteria, via an implementation plan with stakeholder input, to determine which packaging materials qualify to be labeled as recyclable or compostable. This implementation plan will also include the development of incentives and policies to encourage in-state manufacturing using recycled material generated in California as a way to shift towards a more circular economy.

League Position: Support

Water Quality

SB 1044 (Allen) Firefighting Equipment and Foam. PFAS Chemicals.

This measure would prohibit the use of firefighting foam containing perfluoroalkyl and polyfluroalkyl substances (PFAS) chemicals, except where federally required, and would require notification of the presence of PFAS in the protective equipment of firefighters.

League Position: Support

Community Services

<u>Disaster Preparedness and Community Resiliency</u>

AB 2213 (Limón) Office of Emergency Services: Model Guidelines.

This measure would require the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) to develop model guidelines for local governments and other local entities active in disasters to identify, type, and track community resources that could assist in responding to or recovering from disasters. League Position: Support

SB 1196 (Umberg) Price Gouging.

This measure would amend the crime of price gouging. Specifically, the measure would provide that if the person, contractor, business, or other entity did not charge a price for the goods or services immediately prior to the proclamation or declaration of emergency, it may not charge a price that is

more than 50 percent greater than either the amount that the seller paid for the goods or, if the seller did not purchase the goods, the seller's costs in selling or providing the goods or services. League Position: Watch

Parks and Recreation

SB 217 (Portantino) Recreational and Organizational Camps.

This measure would make significant changes to how organized and recreational camps operate. Specifically, this measure would:

- Require an organized camp and a recreational camp to obtain a license from the local agency of the jurisdiction where the camp is located before operating a camp;
- Establish a procedure for a camp to submit an application to a local agency for a license and would authorize a local agency to charge an application fee in a specified amount;
- Require the local agency to inspect a camp for compliance with these provisions before issuing
 a license to operate;
- Impose specified requirements on specific camp activities including, among others, riflery, archery, horseback riding, climbing, swimming, and scuba diving;
- · Require each camp to obtain specified certifications before offering high-risk activities; and
- Authorize a local agency to levy a civil penalty on each camp that fails to comply with the
 requirements of the bill, in an amount not to exceed \$200 per day until the local agency finds
 the camp is in compliance.

League Position: Pending

Tobacco, E-Cigarettes, and Vaping

SB 793 (Hill) Flavored Tobacco Products.

This measure would:

- Prohibit a tobacco retailer from selling a flavored tobacco product;
- Create a violation of this prohibition an infraction punishable by a fine of \$250 for each violation:
- State the intent of the Legislature that these provisions not be construed to preempt or prohibit the adoption and implementation of local ordinances related to the prohibition on the sale of flavored tobacco products; and
- Exempt shisha tobacco for use in hookahs.

League Position: Watch

Public Safety

AB 66 (Gonzalez) Police. Use of Force.

This measure would establish clear standards on the use of rubber bullets and other "less lethal" weapons by law enforcement for crowd control and would also ban the use of tear gas by all California law enforcement agencies.

League Position: Pending

AB 1196 (Gipson) Peace Officer. Use of Force.

This measure would prohibit law enforcement agencies in California from authorizing the use of the carotid artery restraint or a chokehold.

League Position: Pending

AB 1314 (McCarty) Law Enforcement Use of Force Settlements and Judgements: Reporting.

This measure would require municipalities to annually post on their internet websites specified information relating to use of force settlements and judgements, including amounts paid, broken down by individual settlement and judgment, premiums paid for insurance against use of force settlements or judgements, and information on bonds used to finance such payments.

League Position: Pending

AB 1472 (Stone) Personal Rights. False Reports to Law Enforcement.

This measure would make false reports to police, including 911 calls, a violation of the Ralph Civil Rights Act when made falsely or in reckless disregard of the truth. This bill would also allow for civil action against persons who make false police reports or claims, regardless of discriminatory motive. League Position: Pending

AB 1506 (McCarty) Police Use of Force.

This measure would allow local law enforcement agencies and district attorneys to more regularly request the Attorney General to launch a formal review of situations where an officer used force that resulted in death or harm. Under the measure, the Department of Justice would have to review the incident and, upon its conclusion, could pursue prosecution should that force be found unwarranted.

League Position: Pending

AB 1550 (Bonta) Discriminatory Emergency Calls.

This measure would authorize a person to bring civil action against any responsible party, who, motivated by a person's protected status, knowingly causes a peace officer to encounter the person with the intent to infringe upon the person's rights or cause the person to feel harassed, humiliated, or embarrassed. The measure outlines the various types of damages a prevailing plaintiff may recover from a responsible party. Additionally, it would make a false report that is deemed a hate crime punishable as a misdemeanor or a felony.

League Position: Pending

This measure would allow local government agencies to impose a civil penalty on persons aiding and abetting unlicensed commercial cannabis activity of up to \$30,000 for each violation.

League Position: Support

AB 2532 (Irwin) Firearms. Gun Violence Restraining Orders.

This bill would add both a district attorney and city attorney to the list of persons authorized to request the issuance or renewal of a gun violence restraining order.

League Position: Pending

AB 2617 (Gabriel) Firearms. Prohibited Persons.

This measure would specify that any person who owns or possesses a firearm, and is subject to an out-of-state issued gun violence restraining order (GVRO), is prohibited from having custody or control of, or attempting to purchase or receive, a firearm or ammunition for a five-year period, commencing upon the expiration of the existing GVRO.

League Position: Support

AB 3330 (O'Donnell) Cannabis. Advertising and Marketing. Penalties.

This measure would prohibit a person from collecting a fee or any other form of compensation for advertising or marketing the sale or provision of unlicensed cannabis products.

League Position: Support

SB 629 (McGuire) Public Peace. Media Access.

This measure would ensure access to closed off areas by members of the media during a demonstration, march, protest or rally, and would establish misdemeanor liability for an officer who assaults a journalist or obstructs their ability to gather or process news.

League Position: Pending

Revenue & Taxation

SB 217 (Portantino) Recreational and Organizational Camps.

This measure would make significant changes to how organized and recreational camps operate. Specifically, this measure would:

- Require an organized camp and a recreational camp to obtain a license from the local agency
 of the jurisdiction where the camp is located before operating a camp;
- Establish a procedure for a camp to submit an application to a local agency for a license and would authorize a local agency to charge an application fee in a specified amount;
- Require the local agency to inspect a camp for compliance with these provisions before issuing
 a license to operate;
- Impose specified requirements on specific camp activities including, among others, riflery, archery, horseback riding, climbing, swimming, and scuba diving;
- Require each camp to obtain specified certifications before offering high-risk activities; and

Authorize a local agency to levy a civil penalty on each camp that fails to comply with the
requirements of the bill, in an amount not to exceed \$200 per day until the local agency finds
the camp is in compliance.

League Position: Pending

SB 1049 (Glazer) Local Ordinances. Short-term Rentals.

This measure would authorize a city to impose a fine of up to \$5,000 for a violation of a short-term rental ordinance. This measure would also define "short-term rental" for these purposes as a residential property that is rented to a visitor for fewer than 30 days through a centralized online platform where the rental is advertised and payments for the rental are securely processed. League Position: Support if Amended

SB 1441 (McGuire) Local Prepaid Mobile Telephony Services Collection Act.

This measure would remove the sunset on local governments' ability to collect Utility User Taxes from retail sales of prepaid wireless telecommunication products and services and would assist the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration with administration of the program. League Position: Support

Transportation, Communications, Public Works

AB 326 (Muratsuchi) Vehicles. Motorized Carrying Devices.

This measure would require local governments to allow "motorized carrying devices" to operate in the public right-of-way, including sidewalks and city streets. The bill would allow for these devices to be as large as the average person, weigh up to 85 pounds, and go as fast as eight miles per hour. League Position: Pending

AB 1286 (Muratsuchi) Shared Mobility Devices. Agreements.

This measure would prohibit shared mobility device providers (such as Lime and Bird) from waiving the legal rights and remedies of their users, require them to maintain general liability insurance coverage, and have prior authorization from the jurisdictions where they wish to operate. League Position: Support/Co-Sponsor

<u>SB 431</u> (McGuire) Mobile Telephony Service Base Transceiver Station Towers. Communications Infrastructure. Performance Reliability Standards.

This measure would require CPUC and Cal OES to develop and implement performance reliability standards for "cell towers" and other infrastructure for providing mobile telephony service located within a commission-designated Tier 2 or Tier 3 High Fire Threat District.

League Position: Support

SB 794 (Jackson) Emergency Services. Telecommunications.

This measure would authorize cities to enter into agreements with their own social services departments and/or public utility or to utilize its own records to automatically enroll their residents into the city- or county-operated public emergency warning system. The measure would require local governments exercising this authority to provide an opt-out for residents that do not wish to be enrolled in the system.

League Position: Support

SB 865 (Hill) Excavations. Subsurface Installations.

This measure would strengthen safe excavation practices by increasing collaboration between excavators and operators, requiring data sharing amongst key stakeholders, and moving the Dig Safe Board to the Office of Energy Infrastructure Safety. Entities that violate the requirements of SB 865 would face civil penalties.

League Position: Support

SB 1130 (Gonzalez) Telecommunications. California Advanced Services Fund.

This measure would require the CPUC to develop, implement, and administer the California Advanced Services Fund program to encourage deployment of 21st century-ready communications. The bill would provide that the goal of the program is to approve funding for infrastructure projects that will provide high-capacity, future-proof infrastructure to unserved areas or unserved high-poverty areas.

League Position: Support

Governance, Transparency, and Labor Relations

AB 664 (Cooper) Workers' Compensation. Injury. Communicable Disease.

This measure would define "injury," for certain state and local firefighting personnel, peace officers, certain hospital employees, and certain fire and rescue services coordinators who work for Cal OES to include being exposed to or contracting, on or after Jan. 1, 2020, a communicable disease, including COVID-19, that is the subject of a state or local declaration of a state of emergency that is issued on or after Jan. 1, 2020. The bill would create a conclusive presumption, as specified, that the injury arose out of and in the course of the employment. The bill would apply to injuries that occurred prior to the declaration of the state of emergency. The bill would also exempt these provisions from the apportionment requirements.

League Position: Watch

AB 2473 (Cooper) Public Investment Funds.

This measure would exempt specified records from disclosure under the California Public Records Act regarding an internally managed private loan made directly by a public investment fund, including quarterly and annual financial statements of the borrower or its constituent owners, unless the information has already been publicly released by the keeper of the information. League Position: Support

AB 2999 (Low) Employees. Bereavement Leave.

This measure would enact the Bereavement Leave Act of 2020. The bill would require an employer to grant an employee up to 10 business days of unpaid bereavement leave upon the death of a spouse, child, parent, sibling, grandparent, grandchild, or domestic partner, in accordance with certain procedures, and subject to certain exclusions. The bill would prohibit an employer from interfering with or restraining the exercise or attempt to exercise the employee's right to take this leave. This bill would authorize an employee who has been discharged, disciplined, or discriminated against for exercising their right to bereavement leave to file a complaint with the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement or bring a civil action against their employer for reinstatement, specified damages, and attorney's fees.

League Position: Oppose

AB 3216 (Kalra) Employee Leave. Authorization.

This measure would revise and recast provisions under the Moore-Brown-Roberti Family Rights Act, or California Family Rights Act, to make it an unlawful employment practice for any employer to refuse grant a request by an employee, with qualified employment service, to take up to 12 workweeks of unpaid protected leave during any 12-month period for family care and medical leave, including birth of the employee's child or adoption, to care for the employee's own medical condition, or for a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner, as specified. The bill would also make it an unlawful business practice for an employer to refuse to grant an employee up to 12 workweeks of leave in a 12-month period for emergency leave, as defined. League Position: Oppose

SB 1159 (Hill) Workers' Compensation. COVID-19. Critical Workers.

This measure would, until an unspecified date, define "injury" for a critical worker, as specified, to include illness or death that results from exposure to COVID-19 under specified circumstances. The bill would create a disputable presumption, as specified, that an injury that develops or manifests itself while a critical worker is employed arose out of and in the course of the employment. League Position: Note Concerns

SB 1173 (Durazo) Public Employment. Labor Relations. Employee Information.

This measure would generally authorize an exclusive representative to file a charge of an unfair labor practice with the Public Employment Relations Board, as specified, alleging a violation of the requirements to provide employee information. Current law requires public employers to provide certain labor representatives with the names and home addresses of newly hired employees, as well as their job titles, departments, work locations, telephone numbers, and personal email addresses, within 30 days of hire or by the first pay period of the month following hire. Current law also requires the public employers to provide this information for all employees in a bargaining unit at least every 120 days, except as specified.

League Position: Oppose

Housing, Community and Economic Development

Planning and Zoning

AB 1279 (Bloom) Housing Developments. High-resource Areas.

This measure would require the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) to designate areas in this state as high-resource areas by Jan. 1, 2021, and every five years thereafter. In any area designated as a high-resource area, this measure would require cities, at the request of a developer, to allow up to fourplexes in single-family zones and up to 100 units per acre in commercial zones. These projects shall receive ministerial approval (use by-right). League Position: Watch

AB 2345 (Gonzalez) Planning and Zoning. Density Bonus.

This measure would greatly expand Density Bonus law and allow developers to receive up to five concessions and incentives from local governments and up to 50 percent more density. League Position: Oppose Unless Amended

AB 3040 (Chiu) Local Planning. Regional Housing Need.

This measure would create a voluntary program to incentivize local governments to allow four units per parcel, by-right, in exchange for additional credit towards the city or county's share of the regional housing need allocation for each site identified under these provisions. The measure would prohibit the cumulative credit received by a city or county from exceeding more than 25 percent of the total units needed to meet its regional housing needs allocation.

League Position: Support in Concept.

AB 3107 (Bloom) Planning and Zoning. Housing Developments.

This measure would require, notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of a city's or county's general plan, specific plan, zoning ordinance, or regulation, a housing development in which at least 20 percent of the units have an affordable housing cost or affordable rent for lower income households shall be an allowable use on a site designated in any element of the general plan for commercial uses.

League Position: Watch

<u>SB 474</u> (Stern) Very High Fire Severity Zones. Development.

This measure would prohibit the construction of a new development project within a very high fire hazard severity zone or a state responsibility area. Development projects include residential dwellings, including, but not limited to, mobilehomes, accessory dwelling units, and junior accessory dwelling units, of one or more units or a subdivision of land for the purpose of constructing one or more residential dwelling units, and projects for commercial, retail, or industrial use.

League Position: Watch

SB 1085 (Skinner) Density Bonus Law. Housing for Lower-income Students.

This measure would require a city or county to grant additional incentives or concessions for a project that contains a specified percentage of units for moderate income rental housing and lower income student housing developments.

League Position: Oppose Unless Amended

SB 1120 (Atkins) Subdivisions. Tentative Maps.

This measure would build off the Accessory Dwelling Unit law allowing for at least three units per parcel to further encourage development in single-family neighborhoods by creating a ministerial approval process for duplexes and lot splits that meet local zoning, environmental and tenant displacement standards.

League Position: Support if Amended

SB 1299 (Portantino) Housing Development. Incentives. Rezoning of Idle Retail Sites.

This measure would, upon appropriation by the Legislature, require HCD to administer a program to provide incentives in the form of grants allocated as provided to local governments that rezone idle sites used for a big box retailer or a commercial shopping center to instead allow the development of workforce housing.

League Position: Support

SB 1385 (Caballero) Local Planning. Housing in Commercial Zones.

This measure, the Neighborhood Homes Act, would deem a housing development project, as defined, an authorized use on a neighborhood lot that is zoned for office or retail commercial use under a local agency's zoning code or general plan. The measure would require the density for a housing development under these provisions to meet or exceed the density deemed appropriate to accommodate housing for lower income households according to the type of local jurisdiction, including a density of at least 20 units per acre for a suburban jurisdiction.

League Position: Watch

<u>Homelessness</u>

ACA 10 (Bonta) Personal Rights. Right to Housing.

This measure would declare that the fundamental human right to housing exists in this state. The measure would declare this right is exclusively enforceable by a public right of action. The measure would specify the shared obligation of state and local jurisdictions to respect, protect, and fulfill this right through progressively implemented measures, consistent with available resources, within an aggressive but reasonable time frame.

League Position: Watch

This measure, upon appropriation by the Legislature, would require the Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council to conduct, or contract with an entity to conduct, a statewide needs and gaps analysis to identify, among other things, state programs that provide housing or services to persons experiencing homelessness and funding required to move persons experiencing homelessness into permanent housing. This measure would also state the intent of the Legislature that each state and local agency aim to reduce homelessness within its jurisdiction by 90 percent by Dec. 31, 2028. League Position: Watch

AB 3300 (Santiago) Homelessness Grant Funds.

This measure would appropriate, commencing with the 2020–21 fiscal year and every fiscal year thereafter, without regard to fiscal year, \$2 billion from the General Fund to HCD for the purpose of providing local jurisdictions and other specified entities with ongoing grant funds to sustain or expand efforts to address their immediate and long-term homelessness challenges. The measure would require \$1.1 billion to be distributed to counties and continuums of care, \$800 million to be distributed to cities with a population of at least 300,000, and \$100 million to nonprofit housing developers for specified purposes relating to the provision of housing. The measure would require the method of allocation to be based on a formula that considers specified data.

League Position: Watch

Mitigation Fees/Development Fees

AB 1484 (Grayson) Mitigation Fee Act.

This measure would prohibit a local agency from imposing a housing impact requirement adopted by the local agency on a housing development project unless specified requirements are satisfied by the local agency, including that the housing impact requirement be roughly proportional in both nature and extent to the impact created by the housing development project.

League Position: Oppose

Miscellaneous

SB 795 (Beall) Affordable Housing and Community Development Investment Program.

This measure would invest \$2 billion annually for 5 years into the immediate construction of affordable housing units and programs that address and prevent homelessness. Additionally, this measure would create two new programs administered by the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development to help local governments with their economic recovery and natural disaster preparedness.

Of the \$2 billion, \$1.15 billion shall be used to construct affordable housing, spur economic development and create jobs through infrastructure and employment programs. Funds will be distributed as follows:

1) Multi-family Housing Program-\$500 million (25 percent);

- 2) Infill Incentive Grant Program-\$300 million (15 percent);
- 3) Local Housing Trust Fund Matching Grant Program-\$200 million (10 percent);
- 4) Cal Home Program-\$75 million (3.75 percent);
- 5) Joe Serna, Jr. Farmworker Housing Grant Fund-\$75 million (3.75 percent) League Position: Support

Legislature Takes Final Actions Before Adjourning for Summer Recess

July 1, 2020

June has been a busy month for the Legislature.

This month held several key deadlines; most importantly it held the house of origin deadline and the deadline for the Legislature to pass a budget. In order for legislators to keep their bills moving through the legislative process they had to get them through their respective houses of origin by June 19 in the Assembly and June 26 in the Senate. The Legislature also met the June 15 deadline sending Gov. Gavin Newsom an on-time budget. Since passing the budget, the Legislature has sent the Governor numerous budget trailer bills based on negotiations between the Legislature and Governor. The Governor signed the budget and several trailer bills on June 29. The League's full analysis of the budget and the budget trailer bills can be found here.

Even though the Assembly went into recess on June 19, it made a brief return last week to vote on budget trailer bills and constitutional amendments. The Senate will start its recess on July 2. The Assembly and the Senate's summer recess schedules are different in order to realign their calendar, which was disrupted by a COVID-19 related recess which ran from March 20 to May 4 in the Assembly and to May 11 in the Senate.

Once both houses are back on July 13, their schedules will be aligned and legislators will have until Aug. 31 to pass any pending legislation. This final stretch will be the last opportunity for cities to weigh in on legislation for this year. The League has created a Priority Bills List that compiles the remaining bills that cities should be aware of and consider taking action on.

California Legislature Budget Highlights



Recessionary State Budget and Trailer Bills Sent to Governor's Desk

The California State Assembly gave final approval to a budget package Friday evening, including numerous budget-related bills that further the implementation of the FY 2020-21 State Budget. The California State Senate gave their stamp of approval Thursday. The budget package is now on its way to Gov. Gavin Newsom's desk.

The budget in its totality largely rejects the cuts proposed in the Governor's May Revision and instead balances itself against a projected \$54 billion shortfall on the potential of federal assistance, deferrals, and significant use of budget reserves. The budget-related bills reflect a provisional compromise between the Legislature and Governor in anticipation of an

August revision following the reporting of state income tax receipts in mid-July.

The League will continue to fight for resources that cities need to address revenue loss related to the COVID-19 pandemic response and recovery.
