CALENDAR YEAR 2018 AND JANUARY TO JUNE 2019

### **OBJECTIVE**

To provide the City Council with an update regarding Animal Care Services (ACS) for calendar year 2018 and January through June 2019.

### **BACKGROUND**

On January 1, 2017, the City's ACS took over animal care and control duties from Orange County Animal Care. The purpose of the transition to a city-run program was to better manage escalating costs while also providing more responsive services to the community. The new model called for ACS to provide field services in Garden Grove and for shelter services to be provided by the Orange County Humane Society (OCHS). The program is run through the Public Works Department and receives support from Police Department dispatchers and officers.

### **DISCUSSION**

### Field Services

In 2018, ACS received approximately 3,178 field service calls (Attachment A). The number of calls for service were consistent with the calls from 2017. In the first six months of 2019, ACS received approximately 1,611 field service calls (Attachment B). As shown, the call volume has been consistent from year to year.

In December 2018, ACS hired a third Animal Care Officer, Alexis Tarin. Alexis has over 10 years of experience working in the animal field and four years of experience working as an Animal Control Officer for the City of El Monte. The addition of a third animal care officer has allowed ACS to better manage its busy workload and provide faster, more proactive service to the community.

In addition to managing the many routine calls for service, ACS responds to various non-routine calls for service. These calls have included a skunk trapped in a fence, a vicious dog in a backyard attacking a cat, a dog trapped underneath a house while chasing a squirrel, and a dog trapped in a ditch. ACS staff were able to resolve all of these unusual calls with the added help of a veterinary facility and the Fire Department in a few cases.

### Shelter Operations

Shelter operations are contracted with OCHS. For 2018, there were 1,198 animals brought in by ACS staff, Good Samaritans, and/or owner surrenders from Garden Grove; this included 608

dogs, 518 cats, and 72 various other animals (Attachment C). The vast majority of these animals were returned to their owners, adopted or returned to the field as part of the stray cat return to field program.

As of June 30, 2019, year to date there were 670 animals brought in by ACS staff, Good Samaritans, and/or owner surrenders from Garden Grove; including 233 dogs, 374 cats, and 63 various other animals (Attachment D). Likewise, the vast majority of these animals were returned to their owners, adopted or returned to the field as part of the stray cat return to field program.

### Stray Cat Return-To-Field Program

The Stray Cat Return to Field (RTF) and Trap, Neuter, Release (TNR) program became active on March 22, 2018. Through June 30, 2019, 406 cats were treated and released through the RTF and TNR program. Additionally, 303 kittens were fostered and adopted out through the City's partnership with Stray Cat Alliance.

### Service Hours and Emergency Response

Garden Grove Animal Care Services staff are available to respond to all calls for service during normal working hours, and after hour emergency calls. Voicemail messages left after hours and on the weekend are forwarded to the ACS staff member on duty.

### **SUMMARY**

ACS staff continues to provide high-quality animal care services to the community. We are pleased to report consistent progress in reuniting found animals directly with owners, fewer animals taken to the shelter, reduced euthanasia and responsible cost management. The next scheduled report will be in July 2020 reviewing FY 2019-2020 activities.

### **OBJECTIVE**

To provide the City Council with information regarding the new "Meet on Beach" special event being held on Sunday November 17, 2019, highlight the City of Garden Grove's participation and invite the City Council to the Meet on Beach event.

### BACKGROUND

The City of Garden Grove will be one of seven cities connected by Beach Boulevard participating in a massive new street festival called "Meet on Beach," which will span the 21 miles of Beach Boulevard that begins in the hills of La Habra and stretches to the sands of Huntington Beach. The seven cities include Huntington Beach, Westminster, Garden Grove, Stanton, Anaheim, Buena Park, and La Habra. These cities are part of the Renew Beach Boulevard Coalition, whose mission is to reimagine State Route 39 as a more walkable and bikeable street, and reinvigorate the economic vitality of the historic thoroughfare.

### **DISCUSSION**

Each city will host its own unique special event connecting the seven communities together in one day, in an effort to activate its own tens of thousands of residents. "Meet on Beach" will promote an active lifestyle, with bike and pedestrian-friendly activities, live performances, food, and giveaways at pop-up events along Beach Boulevard.

The Community Services Department is partnering with the Police Department to stage Garden Grove's leg of the event, which will be held at Wakeham Elementary School, 7772 Chapman Avenue, from 11 AM to 2 PM. A 'Safety on Wheels' theme will feature the debut of a new grant-funded BikeSafe trailer, fun activities to educate and entertain families about safety on wheels, along with games, attractions, food, and music.

### FINANCIAL IMPACT

Each participating City will be reimbursed \$5,000 in event costs from a SCAG Go Human grant fund program, consisting of two sources: a Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee (MSRC) and CalTrans' Active Transportation program (ATP).

**Orange County, Calif. ### NOTICE OF TREATMENT FOR THE GUAVA FRUIT FLY

Collected between June 12, 2019 and July 8, 2019, the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) confirmed that two guava fruit flies (GFFs), *Bactrocera correcta* (Bezzi) group, were trapped in the cities of Cypress and Westminster in Orange County. These detections indicate that a breeding population exists in the area. The GFF infestation is sufficiently isolated and localized to be amenable to the CDFA's GFF treatment work plan.

A Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) has been certified which analyzes the GFF treatment program in accordance with Public Resources Code, Sections 21000 et seq. The PEIR is available at <a href="http://www.cdfa.ca.gov/plant/peir/">http://www.cdfa.ca.gov/plant/peir/</a>. The treatment activities described below are consistent with the PEIR.

In accordance with integrated pest management principles, the CDFA has evaluated possible eradication methods and determined that there are no cultural or biological methods available to eliminate GFF from this area. Notice of Treatment is valid until July 8, 2020, which is the amount of time necessary to carry out the treatment plan across three life cycles of GFF as required by the treatment protocol for GFF. The CDFA will employ chemical control as the primary tool and will additionally use physical control via host fruit removal when there is evidence that a breeding population exists on a property.

The treatment plan for the GFF infestation will be implemented as follows:

- Chemical Control: The male attractant technique (MAT) will be used to eliminate all sexually-mature male GFFs. MAT applies small bait stations using STATIC™ Spinosad ME, which is a pre-mixed solution containing the attractant methyl eugenol and an organically registered pesticide spinosad, mixed into a waxy time-release matrix (SPLAT®). The methyl eugenol lures male flies to the bait stations, where the flies ingest the insecticide as they feed. The flies are killed when they feed at the stations. In each square mile within the eradication boundary, a targeted density of 600 evenly spaced five- to ten-milliliter bait stations are applied to utility poles, street trees, and other unpainted surfaces using pressurized tree marking guns mounted on specially modified trucks. The bait stations are placed six to eight feet above the ground. The size of the eradication area is defined as that area within 1.5 miles of each detection site, squared off to create a nine-square mile block, and adjusted to use existing features as boundaries, such as roads. Applications are repeated every two weeks for one life cycle if no quarantine is triggered (typically two to three months), and for two life cycles if a quarantine is triggered (typically four to six months). Life cycle durations are dependent on temperature.
- Chemical Control: If evidence that a breeding population exists on a property (i.e., immature stages, mated female, or multiple adults are detected), foliar bait treatments may be used within 200 meters of each detection site in order to mitigate the spread of GFF by eliminating those adult life stages not directly affected by MAT (i.e., females and sexually immature males). Foliar bait ground treatments are a protein bait spray that contains an organic formulation of the pesticide spinosad (GF-120 NF Naturalyte® Fruit Fly Bait), and are repeated every seven to 14 days for one life cycle of the fly (typically two to three months, dependent on temperature). Physical Control: If evidence that a breeding population exists on a property (i.e., immature stages, mated female, or multiple adults), all host fruit from each detection site and all properties within a minimum of 100 meters of each detection site may be removed and disposed of in a landfill in accordance with regulatory protocols. Fruit removal will occur once at the beginning of the project, but may be repeated if additional flies are detected.

### **Public Information:**

For MAT applications in public areas, notification is given to the general public via mass media outlets such as newspapers or press releases.

Residents whose property will be treated via foliar bait sprays or host fruit removal will be notified in writing at least 48 hours in advance of any treatment, in accordance with the Food and Agricultural Code sections 5771-5779 and 5421-5436. Following the treatment, completion notices are left with the residents detailing precautions to take and post-harvest intervals applicable to any fruit on the property.

Press releases, if issued, are prepared by the CDFA information officer and the county agricultural commissioner, in close coordination with the project leader responsible for treatment. Either the county agricultural commissioner or the public information officer serves as the primary contact to the media.

Information concerning the GFF project shall be conveyed directly to local and State political representatives and authorities via letters, emails, and/or faxes.

### FINDINGS REGARDING A TREATMENT PLAN FOR THE GUAVA FRUIT FLY

Collected between June 12, 2019 and July 8, 2019, the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) confirmed that two guava fruit flies (GFFs), *Bactrocera correcta* (Bezzi) group, were trapped in the cities of Cypress and Westminster in Orange County. These detections indicate that a breeding population exists in the area. The GFF is a devastating pest of a wide variety of important fruit and vegetables.

In order to determine the extent of the infestation, and to define an appropriate response area, additional survey took place, centered on the detection site. Based on the survey data, and findings and recommendations from the CDFA *Bactrocera* Science Advisory Panel (BacSAP), the Primary State Entomologist, the CDFA's "Action Plan for Methyl Eugenol Attracted Fruit Flies including guava fruit flies (GFFs), *Bactrocera correcta* (Bezzi)," and County Agricultural Commissioner representatives who are knowledgeable on GFF, I have determined that GFF poses a statewide imminent danger to the environment and economy.

The results of the additional survey also indicated that the local infestation is amenable to CDFA's GFF response strategies, which include chemical treatments and removal of host fruit. These options were selected based upon minimal impacts to the natural environment, biological effectiveness, minimal public intrusiveness, and cost.

The GFF is an exotic insect originating in Asia and has been accidentally introduced into a number of Pacific Islands, including Hawaii. It is a member of a closely related group of species, known as the GFF group, which are difficult to distinguish based on individual specimens. Several of the group species are major fruit and vegetable pests, and collectively members of the GFF group are known to attack over 230 types of fruits and vegetables. Important California crops at risk include pome and stone fruits, citrus, dates, avocados, and many vegetables, particularly tomatoes and peppers. Damage occurs when the female lays eggs in the fruit. These eggs hatch into larvae, which tunnel through the flesh of the fruit, making it unfit for consumption.

This pest presents a significant and imminent threat to the natural environment, agriculture and economy of California. The combined 2015 gross value of these commodities of over \$16.4 billion. The permanent establishment and spread of this pest would result in increased production and postharvest costs to safeguard commercial fruit from infestation, increased pesticide applications on both production agriculture and residential properties to mitigate damage, and lost economic activity and jobs from trade restrictions imposed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and foreign trade partners.

This decision to proceed with treatment is based upon a realistic evaluation that it will be possible to eliminate GFF from this area and prevent its spread using currently available technology in a manner that is based on an action plan developed in consultation with the Pest Prevention Committee of the California Agricultural Commissioners and Sealers Association, the USDA, and scientists on the BacSAP. Due to the size of the infested area and the number of flies detected, historical data indicates that eradication is possible. The first California GFF detections occurred in Orange and Santa Barbara counties in 1960, and since that time, multiple re-introductions have been delimited and successfully eradicated.

The CDFA has evaluated possible treatment methods in accordance with integrated pest management (IPM) principles. As part of these principles, I have considered the following treatments for control of GFF: 1) physical controls; 2) cultural controls; 3) biological controls; and 4) chemical controls. Upon careful evaluation of each these options, I have determined that it will be possible to address the imminent threat posed by GFF using currently available technology in a manner that is recommended by the BacSAP.

Based upon input from the BacSAP, the Primary State Entomologist, USDA experts on GFF, and County Agricultural Commissioner representatives who are knowledgeable on GFF, I find there are no cultural or biological control methods that are both effective against GFF and allow CDFA to meet its statutory obligations and therefore it is necessary to conduct physical and chemical control methods to abate this threat. As a result, I am ordering that male attractant treatments, consisting of methyl eugenol, a pesticide (spinosad), and a time-release matrix be applied to utility poles and street trees to eliminate this infestation. Additionally, in the event of evidence of a breeding population on a property, foliar bait spray treatments will be applied to host trees using ground-based equipment and host fruit removal will occur.

A Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) has been prepared which analyzes the GFF treatment program in accordance with Public Resources Code (PRC), Sections 21000 et seq. December PEIR 2014, certified in and http://www.cdfa.ca.gov/plant/peir/. The PEIR addresses the treatment of the GFF at the program level and provides guidance on future actions against the GFF. It identifies feasible alternatives and possible mitigation measures to be implemented for individual GFF treatment activities. The GFF program has incorporated the mitigation measures and integrated pest management techniques as described in the PEIR. In accordance with PRC Section 21105, this PEIR has been filed with the appropriate local planning agency of all affected cities and No local conditions have been detected which would justify or necessitate preparation of a site specific plan.

### **Sensitive Areas**

CDFA has consulted with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's California Natural Diversity Database for threatened or endangered species, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Marine Fisheries Service, and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife when rare and endangered species are located within the treatment area. Mitigation measures for rare and endangered species will be implemented as needed. The CDFA shall not apply pesticides to bodies of water or undeveloped areas of native vegetation. All treatment shall be applied to residential properties, common areas within residential development, non-agricultural commercial properties, and rights-of-way.

### **Work Plan**

The proposed treatment area encompasses those portions of Orange County which fall within a 1.5-mile radius around each property on which an GFF has been detected and any subsequent detection sites within the program boundaries. Notice of Treatment is valid until July 8, 2020, which is the amount of time necessary to carry out the treatment plan across three life cycles of GFF as required by the treatment protocol for GFF. A map of the project boundaries is attached. The work plan consists of the following elements:

- 1. Delimitation. Traps will be placed in a 4.5-mile radius from each detection site to delimit the infestation and to monitor post-treatment GFF populations. The cardboard Jackson sticky trap is baited with the attractant methyl eugenol mixed with the pesticide naled (Dibrom® 8 Emulsive), and the McPhail trap is an invaginated glass flask baited with Torula yeast and borax in water. The Jackson trap is strongly attractive to sexually maturing males, while the McPhail trap is attractive to both sexes of the fly. Jackson traps and McPhail traps will each be placed at a density of 25 per square mile within a 0.5-mile radius of each detection site, and Jackson traps will be placed at a density of five per square mile in the remaining delimitation area going out to 4.5 miles from each detection site. Additional traps may be added to further delimit the infestation and to monitor the efficacy of treatments. These traps will be serviced on a regular schedule for a period equal to three GFF generations beyond the date of the last GFF detected. In addition, host fruit may be sampled for the presence of eggs and larvae in a 200-meter radius around each detection property.
- 2. Treatment. Any GFF detections within the original and/or expanded eradication area(s) will be treated according to the following protocol.
  - The male attractant technique (MAT) will be used to eliminate all sexually-mature male GFFs. MAT applies small bait stations using STATIC™ Spinosad ME, which is a pre-mixed solution containing the attractant methyl eugenol and an organically registered pesticide spinosad, mixed into a waxy time-release matrix (SPLAT®). The methyl eugenol lures male flies to the bait stations, where the flies ingest the insecticide as they feed. The flies are killed when they feed at the stations. In each square mile within the eradication boundary, a targeted density of 600 evenly spaced five- to ten-milliliter bait stations are applied to utility poles, street trees, and other unpainted surfaces using pressurized tree marking guns mounted on specially modified trucks. The bait stations are placed six to eight feet above the ground. The size of the eradication area is defined as that area within 1.5 miles of each detection site, squared off to create a nine-square mile block, and adjusted to use existing features as boundaries, such as roads. Applications are repeated every two weeks for one life cycle if no quarantine is triggered (typically two to three months), and for two life cycles if a quarantine is triggered (typically four to six months). Life cycle durations are dependent on temperature.
  - If evidence that a breeding population exists on a property (i.e., immature stages, mated female, or multiple adults are detected), foliar bait treatments will be used within 200 meters of each detection site in order to mitigate the spread of GFF by eliminating those adult life stages not directly affected by MAT (i.e., females and sexually-immature males). The foliage of host trees and shrubs within 200 meters of each detection site will be treated with an organic formulation of spinosad bait spray (GF-120 NF Naturalyte® Fruit Fly Bait) using hand spray or hydraulic spray equipment. Treatments are repeated every seven to 14 days for one life cycle of the fly (typically two to three months, dependent on temperature).
  - If evidence that a breeding population exists on a property (i.e., immature stages, mated female, or multiple adults are detected), all host fruit from each detection site

and all properties within a minimum of 100 meters of each detection site will be removed and disposed of in a landfill in accordance with regulatory protocols. Fruit removal will occur once at the beginning of the project, but may be repeated if additional flies are detected.

### **Public Information**

For MAT applications in public areas, notification is given to the general public via mass media outlets such as newspapers or press releases.

Residents whose property will be treated via foliar bait sprays or host fruit removal will be notified in writing at least 48 hours in advance of any treatment, in accordance with the Food and Agricultural Code sections 5771-5779 and 5421-5436. Following the treatment, completion notices are left with the residents detailing precautions to take and post-harvest intervals applicable to any fruit on the property.

### **Findings**

Due to the detection of GFF, there exists a significant, imminent threat to California's natural environment, agriculture, public and private property, and its economy.



### ERADICATION PROJECT WORK PLAN FOR METHYL EUGENOL RESPONDING EXOTIC FRUIT FLIES

(Includes Bactrocera correcta, Bactrocera dorsalis group, and Bactrocera zonata)

### **DETECTION**

### 1. Detection Trapping

The California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) maintains a cooperative State/County trapping program for the various fruit flies to provide early detection of any infestation in the State. Traps are serviced by either County or State personnel and funded by the Department. The program uses two types of traps: the cardboard Jackson sticky trap baited with the attractant methyl eugenol mixed with the pesticide naled (Dibrom® 8 Emulsive), and the McPhail trap, an invaginated glass flask baited with Torula yeast and borax in water. The Jackson trap is strongly attractive to sexually maturing males, while the McPhail trap is attractive to both sexes of the fly. Traps are hung from branches of host trees at specified densities in susceptible areas of California. County or State employees inspect these traps weekly or bi-weekly throughout the year in southern California and from April or May through October or November in northern California.

### 2. Intensive Trapping

Intensive trapping is triggered after a single fly is caught. Following confirmation of the specimen, trap densities will be increased over an 81-square mile area centered on the detection. Within the next 24 hours, 25 Jackson and McPhail traps are placed in the square mile core around each find. Five Jackson traps are placed in each mile of the remaining delimitation area. Traps in the core will be checked daily during the first week. Traps in the first buffer zone will be serviced every two days; those in the remainder of the delimitation area are checked at least once during the first week. All traps in the delimitation zone will be checked weekly following a week of negative trap catches. Intensive trapping ends after the third complete life cycle following the last fly find. This time period is determined by a temperature-dependent developmental model run by the Pest Detection/Emergency Projects Branch in Sacramento.

### 3. Post-Treatment Monitoring

The success of the eradication program is monitored by intensive trapping levels for three life cycles of the fly after the last fly has been detected. If no flies are caught during that time, trap densities return to detection levels.

### 4. Larval Survey

Fruit on a property where a fly has been trapped may be inspected for possible larval infestation. Small circular oviposition scars are occasionally visible indicating an infested fruit. Fruit on properties adjacent to a trap catch may also be inspected. If two or more flies are trapped close to each other, fruit cutting may be extended to all properties within a 200-meter radius of the finds, concentrating on preferred hosts.

#### TREATMENT

### 1. Male Attractant Technique

The male attractant technique (MAT) will be used to eliminate all sexually-mature male OFFs. MAT applies small bait stations using STATIC™ Spinosad ME, which is a premixed solution containing the attractant methyl eugenol and an organically registered pesticide spinosad, mixed into a waxy time-release matrix (SPLAT®). The methyl eugenol lures male flies to the bait stations, where the flies ingest the insecticide as they feed. The flies are killed when they feed at the stations. In each square mile within the eradication boundary, a targeted density of 600 evenly spaced five- to ten-milliliter bait stations are applied to utility poles, street trees, and other unpainted surfaces using pressurized tree marking guns mounted on specially modified trucks. The bait stations are placed six to eight feet above the ground. The size of the eradication area is defined as that area within 1.5 miles of each detection site, squared off to create a nine-square mile block, and adjusted to use existing features as boundaries, such as roads. Applications are repeated every two weeks for one life cycle if no quarantine is triggered (typically two to three months), and for two life cycles if a quarantine is triggered (typically four to six months). Life cycle durations are dependent on temperature.

### 2. Foliar Sprays

If evidence that a breeding population exists on a property (i.e., immature stages, mated female, or multiple adults are detected), the foliage of host trees and shrubs within 200 meters of each detection site will be treated with an organic formulation of spinosad bait spray (GF-120 NF Naturalyte® Fruit Fly Bait) using hand spray or hydraulic spray equipment. Following treatment, completion notices are left with the homeowners detailing precautions to take and post-harvest intervals applicable to any fruit on the property. Treatments are repeated at seven to 14 day intervals for one life cycle of the fly (typically two to three months, dependent on temperature).

### 3. Host Fruit Removal

If evidence that a breeding population exists on a property (i.e., immature stages, mated female, or multiple adults are detected), host removal (fruit stripping) may be used in conjunction with the other treatment options. All host fruit will be removed from all properties within a minimum of a 100-meter radius around the detection sites. The fruit is taken to a landfill for burial using regulatory compliance protocols. Fruit removal will occur once at the beginning of the project, but may be repeated if additional flies are detected.

### **SENSITIVE AREAS**

The CDFA has consulted with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's California Natural Diversity Database for threatened or endangered species, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Marine Fisheries Service and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife when rare and endangered species are located within the treatment area. Mitigation measures for rare and endangered species will be implemented as needed. The CDFA will not apply pesticides to bodies of water or undeveloped areas of native vegetation. All treatment will be applied to residential properties, common areas within residential development, non-agricultural commercial properties, and rights-of-way.

### **PUBLIC NOTIFICATION**

For MAT applications, notification is given to the general public via mass media outlets such as newspapers or press releases. Residents of properties affected by foliar bait sprays or host fruit removal shall be notified in writing at least 48 hours in advance of any treatment, in accordance with the California Food and Agricultural Code (FAC) Sections 5771-5779 and 5421-5436. For any questions related to this program, please contact the CDFA toll-free telephone number at 800-491-1899 for assistance. This telephone number is also listed on all treatment notices. After foliar bait treatment, completion notices are left with the residents detailing precautions to take and post-harvest intervals applicable to any fruit and vegetables on the property.

Either the county agricultural commissioner or the public information officer serves as the primary contact to the media.

Information concerning the OFF program shall be conveyed directly to local and State political representatives and authorities via letters, emails, and/or faxes.

# INTEGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT ANALYSIS OF ALTERNATIVE TREATMENT METHODS TO ERADICATE METHYL EUGENOL RESPONDING EXOTIC FRUIT FLIES October 2016

The treatment program used by the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) for control of methyl eugenol responding exotic fruit flies (MEREFFs) employs an area-wide chemical treatment called male attractant technique, complemented with a targeted foliar bait spray treatment using an organic pesticide and with fruit removal, as needed.

Below is an evaluation of alternatives treatment methods for MEREFFs which have been considered for eradication programs in California. These flies include, but are not limited to, the oriental fruit fly (*Bactrocera dorsalis*) (OFF) and its sibling species (collectively referred to as *Bactrocera dorsalis* group) (OFF group), guava fruit fly (*Bactrocera correcta*) (GFF), and peach fruit fly (*Bactrocera zonata*) (PFF).

### A. PHYSICAL CONTROL

Mass Trapping. This method involves placing a high density of traps in an area in an attempt to physically remove the adults before they can reproduce. For MEREFFs, trapping is considerably enhanced when an insecticide is added to the lure to help capture adults. Mass trapping with lure only and without an insecticide, would capture some adult OFF, but would not eradicate an infestation.

Active Fly Removal. Adult flies are mobile daytime fliers, and adults could theoretically be netted or collected off of foliage. However, due to their ability to fly when disturbed, and the laborious and time prohibitive task of collecting flying insects from several properties by hand, it would be highly improbable that all of the adults could be captured and removed. Larvae live inside the fruit, so all potentially infested fruit in the entirety of the eradication area would have to be removed and disposed of in order to eliminate the larvae from the environment. For these reasons, active fly removal is not considered to be an effective alternative.

**Fruit Bagging.** Fruit bagging involves individually enclosing each developing fruit in a bag which prevents fruit flies from laying eggs. In order to be effective, frequent monitoring of the bagged fruit is needed to identify and repair damage to the bags before female flies can enter and lay eggs. Fruit bagging is considered an economically inefficient option for area-wide treatment because it is so labor intensive. It is also intrusive to residents, who may oppose having their home grown produce confined inside bags. Additionally, this method may possibly promote the dispersal of female flies in search of egg laying sites, thus spreading the infestation if other treatments are not used outside the fruit bagging area. For these reasons, fruit bagging is not considered to be an effective alternative.

Host Fruit Removal. Removal of host fruits involves the physical removal of all suitable fruit from both the host plant and from the surrounding ground, in order to eliminate developing eggs and larvae. The fruit is collected and double-bagged before being buried in a landfill. California's MEREFF program performs host fruit removal within a 100-meter radius of detection sites which are indicative of an active breeding area, such as those with immature stages, a mated female, or multiple adults, as an added measure to reduce populations within that area and to prevent spread of adult life stages which are not targeted under the preferred area-wide treatment of male attractant technique, such as sexually immature males and females. Fruit removal is not considered an economically inefficient option for area-wide treatment because it is so labor intensive. It is also intrusive to residents, who may oppose losing their home grown

produce. Additionally, this method may possibly promote the dispersal of female flies in search of egg laying sites, thus spreading the infestation if other treatments are not used outside the fruit removal area. For these reasons, fruit removal is most useful as a complimentary treatment to one or more other treatments.

Host Plant Removal. Removal of host plants involves the large-scale destruction of plants by either physical removal or phytotoxic herbicides. Host plant removal is not considered an economically inefficient option for area-wide treatment because it is so labor intensive. It is intrusive to residents, who may oppose losing their plants. Additionally, this method may possibly promote the dispersal of female flies in search of egg laying sites, thus spreading the infestation if other treatments are not used outside the host plant removal area. And finally, because only the fruit becomes infested, there is no need to remove the entire plant during a temporary eradication project as long as the fruit can be removed.

### **B. CULTURAL CONTROL**

**Cultural Control.** Cultural controls involve the manipulation of cultivation practices to reduce the prevalence of pest populations. These include crop rotation, early harvest (i.e., harvesting green fruit before it is suitable for oviposition), using pest-resistant varieties, and intercropping with pest-repellent plants. None of these options are applicable for MEREFF eradications in an urban environment with multiple hosts, and may only serve to drive the flies outside the treatment area, thus spreading the infestation.

### C. BIOLOGICAL CONTROL

**Microorganisms.** No single-celled microorganisms, such as bacteria, have been shown to be effective at controlling MEREFFs.

Nematodes. No nematodes have been shown to be effective at controlling MEREFFs.

Parasites and Predators. Parasites and predators are not considered an effective stand-alone eradication method because their success is density dependent; they are more effective against dense prey populations than against light populations, so their effectiveness decreases as the prey populations decline. Although several organisms, such as parasitic wasps, have been investigated as potential biological control agents against exotic fruit fly species, they have only been used in suppression programs and not in eradication programs. Since there is insufficient research documenting their efficacy in an eradication program, using these organisms could lead to the ineffectiveness of the program.

**Sterile Insect Technique (SIT).** SIT is currently used to suppress OFF and GFF populations in mango orchards in Thailand, and research is ongoing for use against OFF in Hawaii and against a member of the OFF complex, *Bactrocera philippinensis*, in the Philippines. However, there are no production-level colonies of these species outside of Thailand, and these facilities and research colonies are too small and too far away to support an active eradication effort in California. In addition, for introduced populations of the OFF complex, there is uncertainty as to which species has actually invaded, and therefore SIT using the wrong species could lead to ineffectiveness of the program.

#### D. CHEMICAL CONTROL

Male Attractant Technique. The use of male attractant technique (MAT) (formerly male annihilation technique) in California can be traced back to the 1960's. MAT applies small bait stations using STATIC™ Spinosad ME, which is a pre-mixed solution containing the attractant methyl eugenol and an organically registered pesticide spinosad, mixed into a waxy timerelease matrix (SPLAT®). The methyl eugenol lures male flies to the bait stations, where the flies ingest the insecticide as they feed. The flies are killed when they feed at the stations. In each square mile within the eradication boundary, a targeted density of 600 evenly spaced fiveto ten-milliliter bait stations are applied to utility poles, street trees, and other unpainted surfaces using pressurized tree marking guns mounted on specially modified trucks. The bait stations are placed six to eight feet above the ground. The size of the eradication area is defined as that area within 1.5 miles of each detection site, squared off to create a nine-square mile block, and adjusted to use existing features as boundaries, such as roads. Applications are repeated every two weeks for one life cycle if no quarantine is triggered (typically two to three months), and for two life cycles if a quarantine is triggered (typically four to six months). Life cycle durations are dependent on temperature. Sexually maturing males are strongly attracted to methyl eugenol because it is needed for proper production of their sex pheromone. The male flies responding to the methyl eugenol die from the pesticide when they feed at the stations. In each square mile within the eradication boundary, a targeted density of 600 evenly spaced five milliliter bait stations are applied to utility poles, street trees, and other unpainted surfaces using pressurized tree marking guns mounted on specially modified trucks. The bait stations are placed six to eight feet above the ground. The size of the eradication area is defined as that area within 1.5 miles of each detection site, and squared off to create a nine square mile block, and adjusted to use existing features as boundaries, such as roads. Applications are repeated every two weeks for one life cycle if no quarantine is triggered (typically two to three months), and for two life cycles if a quarantine is triggered (typically four to six months). Life cycle durations are dependent on temperature.

Foliar Bait Treatment. Foliar bait treatments use an insecticide mixed with a food attractant in order to kill adults, particularly females. The bait makes the treatment selective for flies, and therefore biological control agents for other pests are not affected. The CDFA uses this treatment If evidence that a breeding population exists on a property (i.e., immature stages, mated female, or multiple adults are detected). The goal is to decrease the population density and to target adult life stages which are not susceptible to MAT (e.g., mated females, sexually immature males) in order to contain the population while MAT drives the population to extinction. The foliage of host trees and shrubs within 200 meters of each detection site is treated with an organic formulation of spinosad bait spray (GF-120 NF Naturalyte® Fruit Fly Bait) using hand spray or hydraulic spray equipment. This treatment is repeated at seven to 14 day intervals for one life cycle beyond the last fly detected. While effective in the area treated, this type of treatment is considered economically inefficient to apply in a biologically relevant timeframe over the entirety of the eradication area, so it is used as a complimentary treatment to MAT rather than a standalone treatment.

**Foliar Cover Spray Treatment.** Foliar cover spray treatments use a contact insecticide in order to kill adults. This treatment is non-selective and will affect any insects which come into contact with it, including biological control agents for other pests. In order to sufficiently cover an area, much more pesticide must be applied per area than with foliar bait sprays. For these reasons, cover sprays are not used for this program.

**Soil Treatment.** Contact insecticides drenched into the soil have been used against MEREFFs in the past. The goal is to directly kill larvae entering the soil to pupate, pupae in the soil, and adults emerging from pupae by drenching the soil surrounding host plants. The insecticide previously used for this purpose contains the organophosphate insecticide diazinon. However, this treatment has not been used since 2001 in California because of its environmental toxicity, difficulty in removing all ground clutter and debris, and a potential lack of effectiveness in the varied soil types found in urban environments.

<u>Description</u>: The adult guava fruit fly (GFF) is about the size of a housefly, five millimeters in length. The top of the thorax is black with yellow patches, the abdomen is yellow-orange with a dark T-shaped mark, and the face has two black spots which "bleed" toward each other, sometimes connecting to each other in the middle. The wings are clear with a very light dark streak along the front edge to about 3/4 length, followed by a separate light dark spot at the tip. Immature stages of GFF have not been described in the literature, but are likely typical for members of this genus; i.e., the egg is very small, white, cylindrical, rounded at the ends and about six times as long as wide; the larva is creamy-white, legless, and may attain a length of six to ten millimeters; and the pupa is encased in a dark brown cylindrical puparium.

History and Economic Importance: The GFF is an exotic insect originating in southern Asia from Pakistan eastward through India and into Thailand. GFF feeds on many types of fruits and vegetables. Important California crops at risk include guava, peach, cherry, citrus, grape, and melons. Damage occurs when the female lays eggs in the fruit. These eggs hatch into larvae, which tunnel through the flesh of the fruit, making it unfit for consumption. The first California detection occurred in Orange County in 1986, and since that time, several re-introductions have been delimited and successfully eradicated.

<u>Distribution</u>: GFF is widespread through much of the mainland of southern Asia, from Pakistan eastward to Thailand and southern China.

<u>Life Cycle</u>: Females lay eggs under the skin of host fruits. The amount of time it takes for egg development depends on the ambient temperature, but is normally about two days. Larvae tunnel through the fruit feeding on the pulp, shed their skins twice, and emerge through exit holes in eight to 17 days, depending on temperature. The larvae drop from the fruit and burrow into the soil to pupate. The pupal period varies from seven to 18 days. The newly emerged adult females need 16 to 38 days to mature sexually prior to egg-laying. Breeding is continuous, with several annual generations.

<u>Hosts and Damage</u>: A number of commercially valuable fruits and vegetables are attacked by GFF (see Partial Host List below). Fruit that has been attacked may be unfit for consumption due to the larvae tunneling through the flesh as they feed. Decay-producing organisms then enter, leaving the interior of the fruit a rotten mass.

## Thousands of Catholics attend dedication of transformed megachurch

Orange County added a new page to its history with the dedication Wednesday of Christ Cathedral, not only a center of Catholicism but an architectural wonder, as well.


At the start of the four-hour service, Kevin Vann, bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Orange, assumed guardianship in a ceremonial "handing over of the building" by those in charge of its renovation.

In that brief exchange, the Southern California landmark officially became the area's cathedral, replacing Orange-based Holy Family, which had served as the mother church since the diocese's establishment in 1976.

Vann and the Rev. Christopher Smith, rector for Christ Cathedral, took turns presenting the inaugural homily.

"This is testimony that we, like this building, are open to being transformed," Smith said.



formation, although the changes aren't visible on the outside.

The Garden Grove megachurch opened 40 years ago as the Crystal Cathedral, led by worldwide televangelist Robert H. Schuller.

When Schuller's Crystal Cathedral Ministries filed for bankruptcy in 2010, the fate of the impressive monument off Chapman Avenue became a question mark. After two years of suspense, the Diocese of Orange purchased the 34-acre campus for \$57.5 million — then spent another \$72.3 million on remodeling.

"Comfort-wise, the most welcome change is the addition of air conditioning and heat-deflecting screens. Shading each of the 11,000 window panes, "quatrefoils" give the space an ethereal feel.

However, for a religion steeped in ritual, the most sacred task was remaking a Protestant church into a Catholic place of worship. That meant adding such features as the 20-foot-tall homze "Bishop's Doors," a centerpiece called a baldachin and a 1,000-pound jewaled crucifix. Walnut pews marble floors contribute to the splendor.

"It's spectacular, phenomenal, more than anything I

could have imagined," said Mary Faley, 56, a teacher in Orange. "Robert Schuller is here in spirit, smiling down on us."

As an example of the cathedral's multiculturalism, various choirs sang as one in four languages — accompanied by a stirring orchestral performance.

"It sounds like a Broadway musical," Faley said.

About 3,000 visitors attended the invitation-only debut — including priests and congregants representing the 62 parishes in Orange County. Overflow from the 2,200-seat cathedral spilled into an adjacent building.

Some said they felt thrilled and amazed that they managed to secure entrance. before."

Ed Leaverton, 76, a contractor in Yorba Linda, recalled sweating through a July wedding at Crystal Cathedral years ago. "They have done just an amazing job with the renovation," he said. "I've been to cathedrals all over Europe, and this is one of the most beautiful."

For Betty Cotton, 80, of Cypress, the cathedral's ded-

"I still don't know how I got so lucky," enthused Garden Grove resident Rose Anguili, 80, who volunteers at St. Hedwig in Los Alamitos. "My pastor got to invite a few people, and he invited me."

Echoing her sentiment, Sergio Torres, 49, a construction worker in Anaheim, said, "It's hard to believe I'm here. I've never seen or done anything like this

ication offered a moment to reflect on commonalities rather than differences.

"It draws so many cultures together at a time when there is such division," the retired real estate agent said.

"I've heard people say, 'All that money spent on the cathedral could have gone to the homeless.' I understand their concern," Cotton said. "But this is a gathering spot where everyone is welcome, whoever you are, whatever neighborhood you live in, however much money you make, whatever your background. Here, we honor Jesus' two greatest commandments: Love God with all your heart and love your neighbor as yourself."

Christ Cathedral will be open for Mass on weekends. On weekdays, services will take place in the adjacent Christ Cathedral Arboretum for about a year while the 16,000-pipe organ is tuned.







Schuller and to hear Schuller express gratitude that, "Thanks to the Catholic Church's purchase of the Crystal Cathedral, it will remain a place for Christ Forever."

Rev. Smith said that since meeting Schuller, "For Christ Forever" has been the motto and inspira-

tion for those who were tasked with transforming the iconic house of worship and the serene grounds into Christ Cathedral, "now a West Coast center of Catholic worship and the seat of the Bishop of Orange."

Donnelly shared some other interesting history. Members of the Crystal Cathedral expressed concern that not only was their church was being sold but especially that the Catholic Church was purchasing it.

"On the Catholic side, some people were upset that Catholics were moving into a Protestant Church; Bishop Kevin Van said he wasn't aware of that being done before. However, many of the Cathedrals in European history were taken over by protestant sects. Westminster Abbey comes to mind," Donnelly said.



#### Citizenship Question Will Not Appear on 2020 Census

July 12, 2019

On July 11, President Donald Trump <u>announced</u> that a citizenship question will not appear on the 2020 Census, ending months of speculation and litigation into the matter.

President Trump has issued an <u>executive order</u> directing federal agencies to supply the Department of Commerce with all records regarding the population of non-citizens in the country and will use this information to complement Census data in 2020.

Shortly after the ruling, Gov. Gavin Newsom released a <u>statement</u> saying that "California won't back down. Our state will continue to move forward with an unprecedented \$187 million outreach campaign to make sure all Californians are counted." Additionally, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra released a <u>statement</u> saying, "We encourage everyone to complete the census form and remember that individual information collected by the Census Bureau is confidential and protected by law. Now it's time to get to work to ensure a fair, legal, and accurate count." California Secretary of State Alex Padilla also released a <u>statement</u> reminding Californians that "Even with this victory, the hard work of achieving a complete count in 2020 remains. This Administration has created a very real fear of the federal government in many communities, but the stakes of the census are too high for any Californian to sit it out."

The National League of Cities (NLC) Principal Associate for Finance, Administration, and Intergovernmental Relations, Brian Eagan also released an <u>article</u> saying, "The rhetoric surrounding the debate to add a question has already damaged trust in the census. Community leaders will need to continue their work to build trust in the process and undue some of that damage. The goal of every community has not changed. Every city, town and village needs to be counted fairly and accurately. Local leaders serve an invaluable role in making sure that happens by partnering with the Census Bureau and convening trusted voices to serve as champions."

# Utility Wildfire Liability Bill Package Passed by the Legislature and Approved by the Governor

The substantially amended AB 1054 and accompanying trailer bill AB 111, were approved by Gov. Gavin Newsom on July 12.

The recently approved wildfire liability legislation, <u>AB 1054</u> (Holden, Burke, Mayes), was significantly amended last week to include protections for employees of investor-owned utilities (IOU) in the case that they are sold or municipalized, stronger language around obtaining a safety certification, and provisions clarifying that any successor agencies must follow the same rules laid out in the bill.

The recent amendments to AB 1054 removed language that sets up the California Catastrophe Council and the Wildfire Advisory Division at the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) and placed that language into AB 111.

AB 1054 is an urgency bill meaning that it required a two-thirds vote to pass and will take effect immediately upon the Governor's signature. AB 1054 passed off the Senate floor on a 31 to 7 vote and off the Assembly floor with a 63 to 8 vote. AB 1054 then made its way to the Governor's desk, where he signed the bill on Friday, July 12. With the passage of both AB 1054 and AB 111, the Legislature has met the Governor's deadline of passing wildfire related legislation before summer recess begins on July 12.

#### **Summary of AB 1054 Amendments**

The key contents of the amendments are below:

- **Protection of Workers:** Includes intent language that declares it is in the interest of the state to have a qualified workforce to minimize the risk of wildfires and includes requiring the size of the workforce be preserved or increased. Changes existing law by prohibiting any successor employer from reducing or not honoring negotiated wages, hours, and other terms and conditions from 2 to 3 years after their acquisition of an entity or their assets.
- **CPUC Safety Certification**: The executive director of the Wildfire Safety Board shall issue this safety certification which is required for utilities to have access to the new cost recovery standard. To obtain a safety certification, an electrical corporation must establish an executive incentive compensation plan, approved by the Wildfire Division, linked to safety performance metrics, including tying 100% of incentive compensation to safety performance.

- Cost Recovery: The previous language put the onus on third parties to demonstrate that an electrical corporation's actions were not reasonable. Third parties now need to create "serious doubt" that an electrical corporation's conduct was not reasonable. It is then the utilities' burden to dispel that doubt in proving that their conduct was in fact reasonable.
- Change in Ownership of Assets: These amendments would require the CPUC to authorize any voluntary or involuntary change in ownership of assets from an electrical or gas cooperation to a public entity. The mayors of Oakland, San Francisco, and San Jose have raised concerns over this provision as they have considered municipalizing IOUs within their service areas.
- Insurance Fund: The insurance fund is expected to total \$40 billion funded by an initial combined Surplus Money Investment Fund Ioan of \$21 billion, \$10.5 billion from IOU rate pass-throughs, \$7.5 billion from IOU initial contributions, and \$300 million from IOU annual contributions.
- **Deletions:** Removes the establishment of the California Catastrophe Council and the Wildfire Safety Division within the CPUC.

#### **Summary of AB 111**

The key contents of this budget trailer bill are below. This language was taken from the original version of AB 1054:

- Establishes the California Catastrophe Response Council: This council will oversee the California Earthquake Authority and the "Wildfire Fund Administrator" who oversees and operates the Wildfire Fund.
- Creates the Wildfire Safety Division and Advisory Board at the CPUC: Starting Jan. 1, 2020, the
  Wildfire Safety Division will oversee and enforce investor owned utilities' safety compliance, and
  evaluate all electrical utilities' compliance with their wildfire mitigation plans. As of July 1, 2021,
  all functions of the Wildfire Safety Division are transferred to the Office of Energy Infrastructure
  and Safety.
- Creates the Office of Energy Infrastructure Safety, within the Natural Resources Agency: The director of Office of Energy Infrastructure Safety is appointed by the Governor, and confirmed by the Senate. Effective July 1, 2021, the Office is the successor to the Wildfire Safety Division at the CPUC. The Office and CPUC shall enter into a memorandum of understanding to work cooperatively with each other.

#### Supreme Court Preview for Local Governments 2019

July 15, 2019

This article was written by Lisa Soronen, executive director of the State and Local Legal Center in Washington, D.C. The State and Local Legal Center (SLLC) files Supreme Court amicus curiae briefs on behalf of the Big Seven national organizations representing state and local governments.

The Supreme Court's docket for its 2019-2020 term is only half full but it is already teeming with interesting cases, almost all of which involve local governments. Local governments are a party in both of the big cases: the gun case and the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) case. While it is difficult to pick only five, this article summaries the most significant cases for local governments the Supreme Court has agreed to hear so far in its term beginning Oct. 7, 2019.

In <u>New York State Rifle & Pistol Association Inc. v. City of New York</u>, the Supreme Court will decide whether New York City's ban on transporting a handgun to a home or shooting range outside city limits violates the Second Amendment, the Commerce Clause, or the constitutional right to travel. The Second Circuit held the law is constitutional on all accounts.

Applying intermediate scrutiny under the Second Amendment, the Second Circuit held the rule was "substantially related to the achievement of an important governmental interest." It seeks to "protect public safety and prevent crime."

The Second Circuit concluded the rule doesn't discriminate against interstate commerce in violation of the Commerce Clause. First, it does not facially discriminate against interstate commerce. Licensees may still patronize out-of-state firing ranges—they just can't bring their gun licensed in New York City. Second, no evidence suggests the rule was intended to protect the economic interests of the City's firing range industry. Finally, the challengers failed to offer evidence that the rule has had a discriminatory effect on interstate commerce. While the challengers claim they have not attended out-of-city shooting events with their gun they may have attended them without their gun.

The Second Circuit rejected the challengers' right to travel argument "for much the same reasons as does their parallel invocation of the dormant Commerce Clause."

In <u>Department of Homeland Security v. Regents of the University of California</u> the Supreme Court will decide whether the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) decision to end the DACA program is judicially

reviewable and lawful.

DACA was established through a DHS <u>Memorandum</u> during the Obama presidency. The program allowed undocumented persons who arrived in the United States before age 16 and have lived here since June 15, 2007, to stay, work, and go to school in the United States without facing the risk of deportation for two years with renewals available.

DHS rescinded DACA in September 2017 after receiving a letter from the Attorney General stating the program was unconstitutional and created "without proper statutory authority."

The United States <u>argues</u> that a court can't review DHS's decision to rescind DACA because the federal Administrative Procedures Act precludes review of agency actions "committed to agency discretion by law." According to the United States, DHS's decision to discontinue DACA "falls comfortably within the types of agency decisions that traditionally have been understood as 'committed to agency discretion'"—particularly because this decision arose in the immigration context.

The United States argues DACA may be rescinded because it is unlawful as it is a legislative rule which should have been promulgated through notice-and-comment rulemaking and is "substantively inconsistent" with the Immigration and Nationality Act.

Three lower courts have concluded ending the program is both reviewable and unlawful.

In <u>Zarda v. Altitude Express</u>, the Supreme Court will examine the Second Circuit's holding that discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation violates Title VII. Title VII prohibits discrimination "because of ... sex." The main opinion in Zarda concluded the question in this case is whether sexual orientation is "properly understood" as a "subset of actions taken on the basis of sex." The court concluded it is by looking at the statute's text. According to the court: "the most natural reading of the statute's prohibition on discrimination 'because of ... sex' is that it extends to sexual orientation discrimination because sex is necessarily a factor in sexual orientation."

In <u>EEOC v. R.G. & G.R. Harris Funeral Homes</u> the Sixth Circuit held discriminating against transgender persons violates Title VII because it amounts to discrimination on the basis of sex stereotyping. The court also held that transgender status is protected under Title VII. The Supreme Court will review both lower court holdings.

In <u>Price Waterhouse v. Hopkins</u> (1989) the Supreme Court held that employees may bring sex discrimination claims based on sex stereotyping under Title VII. In 2004 the Sixth Circuit extended Price Waterhouse's reasoning to transgender persons as they are also engaging in "non sex-stereotypical behavior." So that previous case controlled the outcome of Harris Funeral Homes.

Harris Funeral Homes argued that transgender status refers to "a person's self-assigned 'gender

identity" rather than a person's sex, and therefore such a status is not protected under Title VII. The Sixth Circuit disagreed noting "it is analytically impossible to fire an employee based on that employee's status as a transgender person without being motivated, at least in part, by the employee's sex."

In <u>County of Maui, Hawaii v. Hawaii Wildlife Fund</u>\* the Supreme Court will decide whether the Clean Water Act (CWA) requires a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit when pollutants originate from a point source but are conveyed to navigable waters by a nonpoint source, such as groundwater.

Maui County injects treated wastewater from wells into the groundwater. Some of the treated wastewater reaches the Pacific Ocean. The Hawaii Wildlife Fund sued the County arguing it was required to obtain an NPDES permit under the CWA for these discharges.

A party must obtain an NPDES permit if it discharges a pollutant from a point source to a navigable water. Wells are point sources and the Pacific Ocean is a navigable water. The Ninth Circuit assumed without deciding that groundwater isn't a point source or navigable waters.

The Ninth Circuit held that the CWA requires Maui to get an NPDES permit in this case. It concluded that the discharges in this case are point source discharges because "nonpoint source pollution" excludes, for example, roadway runoff that isn't "collected, channeled, and discharged through a point source." Here the pollutants are collected in wells. According to the lower court, they are also "fairly traceable" from the point source to the navigable water and reach the navigable water at "more than de minimis levels."

#### Conclusion

Further developments in the gun case and the groundwater case may impact whether and how the Supreme Court decides these cases. New York City has informed the Supreme Court it thinks the case is moot as it is in the process of changing the law to allow license holders to transport handguns from various locations previously forbidden. The parties in the groundwater case have discussed settling the case. But local governments are most curious about the census case. Only time will tell whether the ongoing dispute over whether it may contain the citizenship question will end up (again) on the Court's docket this fall.
