As you know, Ms. Stephanie Klopfenstein is the representative for the City of Garden Grove on the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District Board of Trustees.

Ms. Klopfenstein was appointed by the City of Garden Grove to serve on the Board of Trustees until January 4, 2021 at 11:59 A.M. Since her term of office will not expire for one year, it will not be necessary for the City of Garden Grove to take any action this year for appointment of a representative to the Board of Trustees.

Ms. Klopfenstein was appointed to a four-year term of office (Section 2024 of the Health and Safety Code) and cannot be replaced except for cause.

Section 2024. (a) Except as provided in Section 2023, the term of office for a member of the board of trustees shall be for a term of two or four years, at the discretion of the appointing authority. Terms of office commence at noon on the first Monday in January.

(b) Any vacancy in the office of a member appointed to a board of trustees shall be filled pursuant to Section 1779 of the Government Code. Any person appointed to fill a vacant office shall fill the balance of the unexpired term.

Notification will be sent to the City Council when Ms. Klopfenstein has completed her term of office. Please contact me, or District Manager Rick Howard, if you have any questions.


Monthly Water Usage Data, Tier 2 Projection & Water Supply Information

The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Imported Water Sales for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply oCWD Groundwater was the main supply in August.
- OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years
 Water usage in August
 2019 was above average compared to the last 5 years.
 We are projecting a slight increase in overall water usage compared to FY 2018-19. It has been 30 months since all mandatory water restrictions were lifted by the California State Water Resources Control Board.
- Historical OC Water Consumption Orange County M & I water consumption is estimated to be 526,000 AF in FY 2019-20 (this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 10,000 AF more than FY 2018-19 and is about 14,000 AF less than FY 2017-18. Water usage per person is projected to be slightly higher in FY 2018-19 for Orange County at 142 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts. O.C. Water Usage for the last four Fiscal Years is the lowest since the 1982-83 Fiscal Year (FY 1982-83 was the third wettest year on record).

<u>Water Supply Information</u> Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.


- Orange County's accumulated rainfall through late September was above average for this period. Water year to date rainfall in Orange County is 20.47 inches, which is 159% of normal.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation through late September was 141% of normal for this period. Water Year 2018 was 82% of normal while water year 2017 was 187% of normal. The Northern California snowpack was 172% of normal as of April 1st. As of late September, 2.06% of California is experiencing moderate drought conditions while 10.27% of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation was increased to 75% in June 2019.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through late September was 112% of normal for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 128% of normal as of April 15th. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 65% of their average storage volume for this time of year and are at 46.9% of their total capacity. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. As of late August, Lake Mead levels were 8.00' above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the start of 2019 will not hit the "trigger" level but there is a 0% chance that the trigger level will be hit in 2020 and a 4% chance in 2021.




Accumulated Precipitation





Construction News Week of October 28, 2019

Sewer installation work continues along the project route with activities including excavation, trenching, installation of sewer pipelines, and road work and restoration. Sewer installation work requires temporary parking and lane restrictions. Drivers traveling to downtown Santa Ana and to the Santa Ana Transportation Center from the 5 Freeway will encounter detours on Santa Ana Boulevard to accommodate the work activity. Please leave extra time.

Crews will also continue to perform water pipeline work and storm drain installation work along the project route, which requires temporary lane and sidewalk restrictions.

Access will be maintained for all residents and businesses.

For specific work activities in your area, see the segment overviews and maps below. All scheduled activities are weather permitting and are subject to change.


SEGMENT 1 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Intersection of Harbor Blvd. and Westminster Ave. to Raitt St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 1 construction activities will include:

- Preliminary work at the site of the future Maintenance Storage Facility
- Excavations and storm drain installation within Pacific Electric Right-of-Way (PEROW)
- Santa Ana River Bridge construction
- Rebar installation and wall construction at Westminster Avenue, near PEROW. A temporary pedestrian detour will be maintained
- · Westminster Avenue Bridge construction

Construction activities for the Westminster Avenue Bridge will require a single lane closure of westbound and eastbound Westminster Avenue, form Enterprise Drive to Harbor Boulevard, for the duration of the work. Only one lane of westbound and eastbound Westminster Avenue will be closed at a time.



SEGMENT 2 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Raitt St. to Parton St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 2 construction activities will include:

- Storm drain installation and water pipeline work on Raitt Street, from 1st Street to W. Santa Ana Boulevard
- Water pipeline installation on W. Santa Ana Boulevard, from Raitt Street to Flower Street

- · Water pipeline work and testing at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Bristol Street
- Sanitary sewer work on W. Santa Ana Boulevard, from Bristol Street to Baker Street
- Water pipeline work on W. Santa Ana Boulevard, from Shelton Street to Flower Street

Storm drain installation will require a temporary closure of the northbound lane on Raitt Street from 1st Street to Santa Ana Boulevard. Both northbound and southbound traffic on Raitt Street will be shifted to the southbound lane. Temporary parking restrictions on Raitt Street will also be in place from 1st Street to Santa Ana Boulevard.

Sewer installation and water pipeline work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures W. Santa Ana Boulevard. If visiting residents or businesses in the work zone, please ask crews to assist you in accessing the driveways. They can pull plates over the work area to facilitate entering and exiting.



- · Water pipeline work at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Broadway
- Storm drain installation on Broadway, from 3rd Street to W. Santa Ana Boulevard
- Storm drain installation on Main Street, from 3rd Street to W. Santa Ana Boulevard
- Water pipeline work at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Bush Street



SEGMENT 4 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Ross St. to Mortimer St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 4 construction activities will include:

· Water pipeline work on 4th Street, from Ross Street to Broadway



SEGMENT 5 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Mortimer St. to SARTC

Over the next two weeks, Segment 5 construction activities will include:

Sanitary sewer installation from Mortimer Street to Santiago Street

Sewer installation work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures on W. Santa Ana Boulevard. If visiting residents or businesses in the work zone, please ask crews to assist you in accessing the driveways. They can pull plates over the work area to facilitate entering and exiting.



Safety of the crews and community is our top priority. Please slow down near work sites and follow pedestrian instructions.

About the Project

OC Streetcar is the first modern streetcar project to be built in Orange County and will serve Santa Ana's historic and thriving downtown, which includes federal, state and local courthouses, government offices, colleges, an artists' village and a thriving restaurant scene. Expected to begin carrying passengers in 2022, it will operate along a 4.15-mile route that connects the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center (SARTC) and a new transit hub at Harbor Boulevard and Westminster Avenue in Garden Grove.

Here are seven new Vietnamese restaurants to try in Little Saigon

Orange County's Little Saigon isn't so little anymore. It is a sprawling wonderland of food in Westminster, Fountain Valley and Garden Grove that grows bigger by the minute.

You could eat Vietnamese food every day for a year and still not keep up with all the additional restaurants that have opened since I last updated my guide to dining in

Little Saigon two years ago. Here are seven new (or newish) places to consider.

1. Quán Vit Vit Vit

Must order: noodles with fried duck. The name translates to Duck Duck Duck, and almost everything on the menu here involves some variation of fried duck or fried chicken. Sometimes the duck is braised first, then fried. Sometimes it's boiled.

The duck salad is popular.



In the style of central Vietnam, Quán Mii serves these crepes with dried rice papers, which you dip into water to soften, then grab the scissors and chop off a piece of the banh xèo and roll it into the rice paper with fresh herbs (mint, basil, shiso, cilantro, rau rum) and, if you dare, bird's-eye chiles.

Rolling your own is an art that takes a lifetime to master. Sit next to someone who looks like a grand-




Must order: No. 2 sausage banh mi.

GGUSD student commits suicide

District issues statement; community grieves loss of 10 year old

The Garden Grove Unified School District has issued a statement after a student committed suicide.

Few details were given about the student and the suicide. She was a 10-year-old girl who attended Hazard Elementary School. Her sister found her body at the family's Santa Ana home.

"The Garden Grove Unified School District community is devastated by the tragic suicide of one of our students that occurred earlier this month. We are grateful for the diligence of the Santa Ana

Police Department in conducting a thorough investigation to determine what factors may have contributed to this horrible suicide. School district administrators have been working alongside the police to support their investigation. After interviewing more than 50 students and 30 staff, family, and friends, and reviewing over 2,500 videos and social media posts, the Santa Ana Police Department has been unable to identify a triggering event or intention that led to the suicide. According to the Santa Ana Police Department, the detectives did not uncover anything that rose to the level of bullying or criminal conduct.

'Garden Grove Unified School District continues to support the school community members who are hurting and grieving this terrible tragedy. Our focus is on providing support and counseling to students and staff members. We have partnered with Didi Hirsch Mental Health Services which has provided and will continue to provide expert crisis counseling to our students and staff. Additionally, district psychologists, social workers, and counselors provide grief counseling and crisis support to school staff and students throughout the district. GGUSD has a longstanding commitment

to supporting the socio-emotional well-being of our students and staff. In September, the Board of Education and district launched a Choose Wellness campaign aimed at increasing awareness and resources to support students' mental health and wellness, addressing important topics like mental illness, social media dangers, and positive school culture and climate.

"In recent years, the district has increased its number of school psychologists and social workers and expanded counseling services. This tragic incident has further highlighted the need to continue increasing educational resources for staff, parents, and students about mental health, suicide warning signs, and safe online activity. The district is partnering with mental health and police safety experts to offer parent education workshops about these important topics. The district also plans to increase awareness about the importance of monitoring the online activity of children and becoming familiar with social media platforms that create dangerous environments for children.

"Additionally, all GGUSD schools use WeTip and other anonymous reporting hotlines to encourage students to report any threats to student safety. The safety of our students – both physically and emotionally – is our highest priority."

Azteca owner sculpts tribute to police

Jennifer Stewart's work could be displayed on public property

Jennifer Stewart made a living as a sculptor before her return, five-years-ago, to the restaurant business as new owner of Azteca, a beloved fixture on Historic Main Street.

Azteca, located in downtown Garden Grove, features wall-to-wall and floor-to-ceiling Elvis memorabilia for Elvis fans to enjoy during lunch, dinner and weekend Karaoke nights.

But while all the décor inside the restaurant itself is dedicated to the memory of "The King," the bar area inside Azteca has always featured a wide variety of other classic-music references and memorabilia. It's there you'll find where Stewart's love of art and her obsession for classic-rockmusic intersect within the ongoing installation of her "Iconic Album Covers" series.

The original wall-relief sculptures are back-lit with color-morphing LEDs and celebrate a variety of music icons. The collection of sculptures includes The Beatles'

"Abbey Road"; Madonna's "True Blue"; and the latest, a tribute to the heavy metal band "Metallica."

So, what's next?

The monument will feature a life-sized, detailed study of human and canine officers spotlighting the necessary trust and special bond of the K-9 team.

League Update on Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS)

Several cities across the State are being impacted by the recent wildfires that are currently burning, as well as the continued utility-initiated Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) that are leaving millions of California residents without power.

Over the past few weeks, the League has been working closely with the Governor's Office and the California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) to ensure the most up-to-date information on community resource centers and safety guidelines were reaching cities and residents impacted by the shutdowns.

On behalf of CalOES, we also assisted with coordinating calls between Pacific Gas & Electric, Southern California Edison, San Diego Gas & Electric and the cities that have been affected by the public safety power shutoffs.

We are currently working to find solutions that will mitigate the impact of utility use of PSPS on public health, safety, and commerce in affected communities.

Governor Newsom has launched a Local Government PSPS Resiliency Program that includes a \$75 million one-time General Fund appropriation from the 2019 Budget Act to support State and local government efforts to protect public safety, vulnerable populations and individuals and improve resiliency in response to PSPS.

Half of the funds will be allocated to local governments – at least \$150,000 will be awarded to all 58 counties with additional funding based on county size and experience with PSPS. The cities of Los Angeles, San Jose, San Diego and Oakland will receive \$500,000 each.

A total of \$8 million will support competitive grants available to other incorporated cities. Cities will be required to outline how they intend to use the funds, as well as information on the following factors:

- > Population;
- > Days of PSPS experienced; and
- Money in disaster reserve fund compared to total budget.

Total individual allocations will be capped at a maximum of \$500,000. The program also provides \$1.5 million for federally recognized tribes, and \$37.5 million for state agencies and departments to

ensure continuity of operations and public services statewide.

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

Over the past few weeks, cities throughout the state have been affected by wildfires and utility-initiated power shutoffs that have left millions of California

residents in the dark. The League's thoughts and prayers are with those that have been evacuated or are without power, and we thank the firefighters and first responders who are working around the clock to keep our communities safe.

Following this increase of extreme fire weather conditions across the state and continued utility-initiated Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS), Gov. Gavin Newsom has launched a \$75 million Local Government PSPS Resiliency Program to support state and local government efforts to protect public safety, vulnerable populations and individuals and improve resiliency in response to utility-led PSPS actions. **Cities may apply for funds by Monday, Nov. 4** through a streamlined application process.
