Dear President Richardson.

Thank you for honoring our September 18, 2020 request (attached) and reconvening a closed meeting of the SCAG RHNA Litigation Study Team on November 2, 2020.

The OC Mayor Group requested this meeting to allow the RHNA Litigation Study Team to consider:

- a) whether the State Department of Housing and Community Development (State HCD) failed to follow housing law in calculating the SCAG regional housing need number of 1.34 million units for the 6th cycle RHNA; and,
- b) new 2020 information released after State HCD's October 2019 regional housing determination, which question the accuracy of the 1.34 million housing units assignment and identify significantly lower numbers in the order of 650,000 housing units or less for the SCAG region.

At the 11/05/2020 meeting of the SCAG Regional Council, you reported out that the RHNA Litigation Study Team:

- 1) considered the February 2020 Freddie Mac report; and,
- determined, via a consensus majority, that litigation against State HCD was not the path to pursue, and that other options could be pursued. You also stated that an option is for subregional Councils of Government to separately pursue litigation, if they are so concerned.

Upon hearing your verbal report, our colleagues – City of Mission Viejo Councilmember Wendy Bucknum and City of Anaheim Councilmember Trevor O'Neil – sought clarifying information to understand the recommendation of the RHNA Litigation Study Team.

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Given and respecting the closed session nature of the RHNA Study Team discussions, they requested that a separate meeting of the SCAG Regional Council be convened, to allow the entire Regional Council to receive and discuss the same information that was presented to the SCAG RHNA Litigation Study Team, and thereby better understand the reasoning and factors that led to the Litigation Study Team's recommendation to not pursue litigation. SCAG Executive Director Kome Ajise also clarified that it is the prerogative of the SCAG Regional Council to consider litigation.

We believe our colleagues' request is sensible, worthwhile and deserving of the opportunity for further discussion.

We would therefore respectfully request that a special closed meeting of the SCAG Regional Council be convened, to thoughtfully discuss the recommendation of the SCAG RHNA Litigation Study Team to not pursue litigation, and determine, for the entire SCAG region, the appropriate actions to pursue.

RE: Request to Reconvene the SCAG President's RHNA Litigation Study Team to Re-Assess State HCD's RHNA Allocation of 1.34 Million Housing Units to the SCAG Region

Dear President Richardson:

On behalf of the thirty-four cities in Orange County, we, the mayors of each Orange County city, unanimously and respectfully support the request of our colleague – City of Yorba Linda Council Member Peggy Huang – that the SCAG President promptly reconvene the SCAG President's RHNA Litigation Study Team.

We have a deep respect for Council Member Huang and her stewardship of the SCAG RHNA Subcommittee these past two years. We all agree with Council Member Huang that the starting point – the 1.34 million RHNA housing units that the State Department of Housing and Community Development (State HCD) issued for the 6-county SCAG region – must be reexamined.

At the September 3, 2020 SCAG Regional Council meeting, Council Member Huang explained that new and recent housing shortage information has been issued by Freddie Mac, which states that the housing shortage for the entire State of California, not just the SCAG region, is 820,000 units (Attachment 1: Page 6, February 2020 Freddie Mac Insights Report: "The Housing Supply Shortage: State of the States."). Further, the Embarcadero Institute, a non-profit policy analysis organization, just released a September 2020 Report — "Double Counting in the Latest Housing Needs Assessment" — that questions whether State HCD's use of an incorrect vacancy rate and double counting has exaggerated the RHNA for the SCAG region, San Diego, the Bay Area and Sacramento area by more than 900,000 units (Attachment 3).

Clearly, this new and credible data should be explored with the members of the President's RHNA Litigation Study Team. It is our hope that upon examination of the new data, that the President's RHNA Litigation Study Team could deliberate on options to require State HCD to:

- 1) consider this and other new information from credible agencies:
- 2) justify how its 1.34 million housing unit determination is defensible in light of the new information and should be fittingly revised; and,
- 3) justify how its 1.34 million housing unit determination is consistent with State Statute provisions.

A prompt assessment of this information, and options to pursue resolution with State HCD, would be invaluable and timely to SCAG's member agencies, many of which are currently exploring appeals of their individual RHNA allocations.

Moreover, if the SCAG President's RHNA Litigation Study Team is reconvened, we would strongly urge SCAG to revisit the critical issue that State HCD did not follow housing statute, when it determined SCAG's 1.34 million housing units need. We appreciate that SCAG raised this concern to State HCD. We object, however, that State HCD has chosen to not adhere to the provisions of our Government Code, and we have provided a detailed, technical assessment of such noncompliance in Attachment 2.

We thus respectfully seek your support and follow-through of your verbal commitment to Council Member Huang, that the President's RHNA Litigation Study Team be reconvened to undertake this important discussion. We look forward to your response, with the desire that the RHNA Litigation Study Team be reconvened prior to the next SCAG Regional Council meeting, October 1, 2020.

Re: MWDOC Annual Budget Process

Dear Mayor Jones,

I trust that this letter finds you safe and that your utility is secure from both an operational and financial perspective. In all the tumultuous change this year there is one dependable constant. It is once again my pleasure to notify you that MWDOC will again prepare an annual budget. We invite and welcome your formal participation in the development of our conceptual draft budget through your initial suggestion of activities and subsequent comments. Please let me know if there is any way we can assist you as you work with your staff on these items. This budget will be the first produced with our new accounting software and may have a different look. We have the additional component that we have started our rate study that will proceed simultaneously.

MWDOC's budget process starts and completes early in order to facilitate the budget and 218 process of our Member Agencies (schedule attached). This means that the initial review of budget issues with the MWDOC Administration & Finance (A&F) Committee will be on January 13, 2021, the first draft of the budget will be in A&F committee on February 10, 2021 and the final budget is scheduled to be approved by the Board of Directors on April 21, 2021.

Because of the accelerated schedule, we have modified the timing of the final commitments for the Choice portion of the budget. We restructured the Choice process to align with the Member Agencies' budget schedules including the confirmation of final Choice participation levels in June. The MWDOC Board then approves a revised, final Choice budget in September.

I hope that you and your family have a joyous Holiday Season and I look forward to the New Year and the annual spring renewal of the budget.

Several of Phong's works are painted in a circle, echoing the shape of the earth, and incorporate discarded, upcycled objects such as old cell phones, plastic, and metal remnants. Phong reshapes and redesigns these objects to evoke images of the impact humans have on Mother Nature and the environment.

As she stated in the <u>OC Register</u>, "I put used parts into my art to bring awareness to my belief that the more convenient we make our lives, the more waste we create and the more carelessly we deplete the earth's resources," said Phong. "There's a relationship between humans and nature. If we don't balance it, we will ruin it."

Born in Vietnam, Phong received a Masters in Fine Arts from California State University in 1995. She has actively participated in more than 150 solo and group shows in galleries and museums locally and internationally, including Los Angeles, Orange County, Houston, Bangkok, Seoul, Paris, Germany, and Tokyo.

Phong currently teaches drawing and painting at Cal Poly Pomona and has been invited to speak by many high schools, universities, and galleries on the subject of her unique work.





Construction Highlights:

- Full intersection closure at Bristol Street and W. Santa Ana Boulevard. Detour routes will be in place.
- Streetcar track installation in Segment 2. This work requires full lane and parking closures on Santa Ana Boulevard from Raitt Street to Shelton Street. Detour routes are in place.
- Streetcar track installation in Segment 3. This work requires full lane closures on Santa Ana Boulevard from Parton Street to Mortimer Street. A single lane is open for through traffic.
- Base installation for the overhead wire poles along the streetcar route. Please expect possible lane and parking closures.
- Water pipeline installation and storm drain construction along the streetcar route. Please expect lane and parking closures.

Access will be maintained for all residents and businesses. Construction activities are dependent on weather and resource availability.

SEGMENT 1 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Intersection of Harbor Blvd. and Westminster Ave. to Raitt St.

The north side of W. Santa Ana Boulevard is closed from Raitt Street to Pacific Avenue for streetcar track installation. One lane of eastbound traffic is open. Parking is closed on the north side of W. Santa Ana Boulevard. Please follow parking rules as posted to avoid towing.

The W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Bristol Street intersection is closed for streetcar track installation. Northbound and westbound traffic is detoured to Flower Street and Civic Center Drive. Southbound and eastbound traffic is detoured to Raitt Street and 1st Street.

Driving through Winter in the Grove



Cities are going online or drive-thru with their traditional holiday events, but they are finding ways to celebrate the season with their communities.

In Garden Grove, the annual Winter in the Grove featured giant blowup characters, treats handed out with long sticks and car-side, socially distanced photo ops with Santa Claus as families drove by in their cars.

Finding beds and services for the homeless? There's an app for that

Outreach Grid, designed in Irvine, harnesses data to help people find shelter.

The heavily used app on the cellphones belonging to Buena Park Police Officers Cory Boudreau and Lindsay Cruz is called Outreach Grid. But it doesn't guide them to a place to eat or the fastest route on the freeway; this app has a far more urgent purpose.

Outreach Grid helps find shelter and other services for homeless people, assisting the officers to get those people get off the streets of their city quickly and efficiently.

Using the app, Boudreau and Cruz can reserve an open bed for a homeless person at the recently opened <u>Buena Park Navigation Center</u>, turning a process that sometimes used to drag on for days or even weeks into something closer to 15 minutes. Many of the issues once handled by hand — filling out paperwork, assessing an individual's living and mental health situation, and connecting with groups that provide homeless services — are preprogrammed into Outreach Grid.

The officers — partners in Buena Park PD's Community Impact Team –are unequivocal in their attachment to the tech.

"We love it," said Cruz.

They can thank a pair of millennials in Irvine, who started developing the software in 2016 after working in the Bay Area, where the suffering of homeless people in San Francisco spurred them to social action.

Information bubbles

It's about as easy to find an open bed for a homeless person on Outreach Grid as it is to reserve a hotel room on <u>Booking.com</u>.

"We can pinpoint a bed right there and then," said Boudreau, who became part of his department's Community Impact Team about 18 months ago. That move came when he realized that about 90% of the calls he responded to as a regular patrol officer were "transient related," and there were few alternatives to address their issues.

"You were just kind of kicking the can down the road."

Now, Boudreau and Cruz spend their 10-hour shifts focused on homelessness. A county mental health clinician rides with them one day a week as they cruise city streets, visit known homeless outposts, and respond to calls.

During a shift just before Thanksgiving, a final stop included a visit with a couple who, most nights, sleep near a light industrial building on Dale Street.

Boudreau and Cruz know them well. Deborah Ann Floyd and Robert Shore both struggle with alcohol; Floyd, 54, once worked a caregiver and Shore, 57, used to do carpentry and

electrical work. The two are in and out of shelter, lasting days or weeks, until they fall off the wagon.

And, on this day, they are ready to try again. This time, they say they don't want to go into a shelter as a couple; too much drama. They want separate beds in the men's and women's sections at the shelter. But a quick check on Outreach Grid shows no beds are available for now; they'll have to wait for openings.

"You want to go?" Cruz asks.

As Floyd dances and laughs and runs about, Shore answers for them both. "She needs to go. I need to go. I don't want to be out here no more. It's hard out here. I've had enough."

There's a chance they'll get in soon. The app lets the officers keep on top of the "inventory" of shelter beds. And with a reservation, people in Buena Park get priority.

"Availability changes every day," Boudreau said.

Locally, Outreach Grid is used most by the North Orange County Public Safety Task Force, a four-year-old coalition of police agencies and cities that has grown to include 13 communities. The task force takes a regional approach to issues such as homeless outreach, youth violence, and helping criminals re-adjust to non-incarcerated living.

The task force was awarded \$20 million in state funding over a four-year span beginning in 2017, with the money set to expire next June. At least \$330,000 of that money has been spent on Outreach Grid.

The app is the gateway to a software platform that allows users to plug in pertinent data about homeless people. Color-coded pinpoints — orange, purple, green — open up on a map showing where some people were last known to stay. Hover over an orange dot and details about that individual pop up in an information bubble; name and date of birth, demographic information, city ties, and special concerns ranging from disabilities and military background to pet ownership.

Before contracting with Outreach Grid, task force officers could find it challenging to coordinate services for the homeless people they encountered on the street, said Soo Kang, assistant to the city manager of Stanton and point person for the task force.

In the past, the bed-finding routine of calling a shelter day after day, with long waits and a slim chance of success, made placing someone a crapshoot.

"It was like calling a radio station to win \$1,000," Kang said.

Even with the app in hand, homeless people still fall through the cracks. But that's happening less frequently because in the past year three new shelters have opened in Buena Park, Placentia and Fullerton, making more beds available. Outreach Grid adds to the new climate by making it easier to track people as they migrate through the area and are assisted by different agencies handling various services.

Two years ago, a homeless survey identified 1,837 homeless people in the north Orange County communities that are part of the task force. About 1,375 of those people gave their names and other identifying information to the census takers, which included people from the task force, nonprofits and the homeless services provider City Net.

Those people are now known, collectively, as Project 1375, a sort of study group to see how well (or how poorly) the task force addresses homelessness.

By tracking that group on Outreach Grid, Kang learned that, by early October of this year, 450 people had "street exited," a term that means they found some sort of housing, anything from a rented room or subsidized housing to living with family or friends or even an emergency shelter bed.

Outreach Grid has provided the technology to stay engaged with those individuals and others who are newly homeless in the area. It's also let providers integrate all the different bits of data to see a bigger picture.

"This was built from the ground up," Kang said of Outreach Grid. "They consulted with the users – law enforcement, service providers, homeless people.

"We liked that."

Between October and November, the software showed that the task force had contacted 80 people who were newly homeless in the area, Kang said. The data also showed that of the 60 new arrivals who requested shelter, 45 actually went and, by the end of last month, 20 remained housed.

"We will never say Outreach Grid will end homelessness," Kang said. But, she added, "it's promising."

Coders with purpose

Tiffany Pang, 30, is the chief executive officer and co-founder of Outreach Grid. Her boyfriend, John Cadengo, 33, is chief technology officer.

Pang grew up in San Francisco, got a degree in neuroscience at Yale, and moved back home after deciding not to pursue a career in medicine. She went to work for the grocery delivery service Instacart.

Pang said the chaos on the streets of the city she returned to, where the homeless population was exploding, deeply disturbed her.

Walking to work meant avoiding stepping in human feces. While other residents engaged in what she calls "joke apps" that mapped where poop was spotted, Pang sought pre-emptive measures. She had already used her savings to study coding, and was one of the few women programmers at Instacart, so she decided to turn her skills toward technology that might help address homelessness.

"It made me very sad as someone who was born and raised there," she said.

Pang and Cadengo, from Loma Linda, brainstormed what became Outreach Grid. They began building it in 2016, working alongside police officers who were doing homeless outreach in the city of West Sacramento.

Their challenge was to integrate data that was already collected about homeless people but stored in different media — paper forms, Google maps and documents, Excel spreadsheets.

"The systems don't talk to each other," Pang said.

"That creates time delays for people getting services."

Outreach Grid bridges the communication gaps.

The platform can be shared by participating police agencies, street outreach workers, homeless services providers, shelter operators and community organizations. The account connected to the North Orange County Public Safety Task Force has 99 users, Kang said.

Other local police departments — Westminster, Garden Grove and Huntington Beach — began using Outreach Grid this year. In the Inland Empire, the city of Riverside employs the technology as part of its homeless outreach, as does a growing list of communities around the country. The app also is being used in a dozen big cities, including San Antonio and Baltimore.

"It's a really good communication tool," said Hafsa Kaka, officer of homeless solutions for Riverside. "If I were to look up a person, I can see where that person last was."

Outreach Grid also shows users what type of services a homeless person has been offered, accepted or declined. Quick access to those details means it's not necessary to ask an individual to repeat — or remember — potentially critical information.

Outreach Grid can collect and disseminate even minute details, such as distribution of hygiene kits, bottles of water, bus passes. In addition to the reservation tool for beds at homeless shelter, there's another that helps people connect to potentially permanent housing, by listing apartment owners who accept subsidized vouchers along with advertising housing events for tenants.

Pang said a routine task — finding an open bed at the Buena Park Navigation Center and relaying its availability to a task force officer — has been reduced from 45 minutes to less than 10 minutes.

The app, she added, is more equitable too.

"You no longer have to rely on the enthusiasm of the case manager or the outreach worker."

Commissioners serve as advisors to the City Council, providing recommendations that become part of the City's decision-making process.

The following briefly describes each of the City's commissions:

Administrative Board of Appeals (5 members) – Conducts hearings, on an on-call basis, on the suitability of building and construction materials; interprets building codes and ordinances; and reviews water billing disputes.

Neighborhood Improvement and Conservation Commission (7 members) – Recommends programs to improve and preserve neighborhoods through zoning enforcement, housing rehabilitation, street improvement, Community Development Block Grant, and other programs.

<u>Downtown Commission (7 members)</u> – Oversees Historic Main Street Garden Grove. Six commissioners must own or lease property on Main Street; the seventh member is appointed at-large.

<u>Parks, Recreation and Arts Commission (7 members)</u> – Reviews and makes recommendations on the status of City parks and recreation programs, capital improvement plans, propose amendments to the General Plan Parks and Recreation Element, and existing and potential City arts programs.

<u>Planning Commission (7 members)</u> – Studies proposed development projects that may impact community's growth and environment.

<u>Traffic Commission (7 members)</u> – Reviews requests for traffic safety devices, investigates unsafe and/or malfunctioning traffic conditions, conducts public hearings, and assists in transportation planning.

Measure O Citizens' Oversight Committee (7 members) - Provides citizen oversight of Measure O funds to ensure all funds are properly spent; reviews the City's annual general fund budget, mid-year budget, and year end audited financial information in regards to the receipt and expenditure of the fiscal year's one-cent transactions and use (sales) tax revenue; and communicates its findings to the public and the City Council annually.

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

<u>PUBLIC HEARING – FY 2020-24 Regional Analysis of Impediments:</u> Staff gave a brief presentation and accepted public comment on the Analysis of Impediments and identified goals and strategies to overcome impediments to fair housing choices at both the regional and local level.

Regional Goals:

- Increase the supply of affordable housing in high opportunity areas.
- Prevent displacement of low- and moderate-income residents with protected characteristics, including Hispanic residents, Vietnamese residents, other seniors, and people with disabilities.
- Increase community integration for persons with disabilities.
- Ensure equal access to housing for persons with protected characteristics, who are disproportionately likely to be lower-income and to experience homelessness.
- Expand access to opportunities for protected classes.

Local Strategies:

- Update Density Bonus Ordinance Garden Grove will update the 2011 Density Bonus Ordinance to comply with current State law. The update will streamline the approval process, increase feasibility, and facilitate future housing development at all affordability levels.
- Create Objective Residential Development Standards to allow for streamlined housing development in all residential zones.
- Create Objective Development Standards for Supportive Housing. These standards would be for new construction of Supportive Housing.
- Evaluate the creation of Objective Development Standards for Hotel/Motel/Office Conversion to Supportive Housing.
- Review and amend Garden Grove's current Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU)
 Ordinance to comply with State requirements and further increase housing supply.
- Continue to invest in landlord and tenant counseling and mediation services, unlawful detainer assistance, housing discrimination services, homebuyer education and outreach, and local eviction prevention strategies.

It was moved by Vice Chair Crawford and seconded by Chair Blackmun, to accept staff's recommendation to transmit the 2020-24 Orange County Analysis of Impediments, along with any public comments, to City Council for adoption. The motion carried by a 6-0 vote, with Commissioner Hanssen absent, as follows:

The following is a brief outline of the Housing and Community Development goals and priorities that have been identified and will guide the City's community and economic development activities over the next five years:

- Provide decent and affordable housing.
- Address the needs of homeless individuals and those at risk of homelessness.
- Provide for a variety of community and supportive services.
- Address public facilities and infrastructure needs.
- Promote economic development and employment opportunities.
- Provide for planning and administration activities to address housing and community development needs in the City.

It was moved by Commissioner Newbold and seconded by Commissioner Pham, to accept staff's recommendation to transmit the 2020-2025 Consolidated Plan and Fiscal Year 2020-21 Action Plan, along with any public comments, and an updated staff report, to City Council for adoption. He then asked for 30 seconds of silence to remember those affected by the crisis including black and indigenous people of color affected by systemic racism, and to also celebrate June as Pride month.

Final SB 1383 regulations now available on CalRecycle's website

SB 1383 Short-Lived Climate Pollutants Regulations approved by Office of Administrative Law

December 8, 2020

On Nov. 3, the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) received a Notice of Approval of Regulatory Action from the Office of Administrative Law on SB 1383 Short-Lived Climate Pollutants regulations.

This notice indicates that the SB 1383 regulations, which seek to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from organic waste, are final and set to go into effect on Jan. 1, 2022. The final regulations text are available <u>online</u>.

To assist with the imminent implementation of SB 1383 regulations, CalRecycle continues to publish education and outreach tools. Specifically, CalRecycle created a series of model tools, including a model franchise agreement, model mandatory organic waste disposal reduction ordinance, model procurement policy, and model edible food recovery agreement. These tools are highly customizable, allowing for consideration of an individual jurisdiction's particular needs or circumstances.

In addition to these model tools, CalRecycle has provided other education and outreach materials. These materials include an overview of SB 1383's Organic Waste Reduction Requirements through <u>PowerPoint</u>, <u>Word</u>, and <u>video</u> format. CalRecycle's SB 1383 <u>webpage</u> also provides case studies on franchise agreements, enforcement ordinances, edible food, and procurement. Additionally, CalRecycle recently released a new guidance <u>document</u> outlining the proposed compliance process.

Cal Cities will continue to work with CalRecycle to distribute information related to SB 1383 to our member cities. Cal Cities weekly COVID-19 update: Dec. 2-9

December 9, 2020

Gov. Gavin Newsom <u>announced</u> the launch of CA Notify, a new digital tool designed to reduce the transmission of COVID-19.

Starting Dec. 10, Californians can opt in to receive COVID-19 notifications informing them if they have been exposed to someone who has tested positive for the virus. CA Notify is a digital tool that protects privacy and security - it does not collect device location to detect exposure and does not share a user's identity. The tool was developed in partnership with Google and Apple and piloted with the help of the University of California, San Diego and the University of California, San Francisco.

The California Department of Public Health issued a <u>regional stay-at-home order on Dec. 3</u>, along with a <u>supplemental order on Dec. 6</u>, to further prevent the spread of the COVID-19 virus and avoid overwhelming hospitals so that more people may receive care. The order remains in place for at least three weeks from the date that the order takes effect in a region and continues until the state's four-week projections of that region's adult ICU bed capacity is greater than 15 percent.
