#### **OBJECTIVE**

To provide information on Green Bird, a world-wide community based organization that promotes neighborhood cleanliness.

#### BACKGROUND

Green Bird is a world-wide grass roots movement that was founded in Japan approximately 15 years ago. The main focus is to get individuals involved in cleaning trash and litter from the community they live in. There are 74 independent teams located in various countries such as Japan, France, Italy, Norway, and Singapore. In 2014, Kevin Kidney started a Green Bird team in Anaheim, which is the only team in the United States.

#### DISCUSSION

After talking at length with Kevin, and participating in one of their recent cleanup events, staff was able to obtain more information about Green Bird. Tired of seeing litter in their neighborhoods, teams have formed on their own, purchased their own supplies, advertised and performed the clean ups separately and independently of the cities in which they operate. Worldwide, Green Bird is not supported by any governmental agency, however, their efforts are recognized.

Kevin said that one positive benefit of Green Bird Anaheim is the fact that they have helped to unite people from different areas of Anaheim. Volunteers from one section of the city regularly attend cleanups in other parts of the city. Often, residents from the areas where the cleanups take place become involved once they see and learn about the group and what it does. In Anaheim they conduct one to two projects per month, with attendance ranging from 30 to 100 people.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Since Green Bird does not receive any government assistance, it should be organized by a member of the community. Staff would be able to provide limited assistance establishing a Green Bird team in Garden Grove.



It has been six months since the ACC-OC Homelessness Task Force was inaugurated in September 2015. Significant progress has taken place in this brief amount of time, and the forward momentum ought to continue. Consequently, it is in the best interest of the Homelessness Task Force to ratify a Work Plan to guide its actions and frame discussions going forward. What follows is a framework that can be added to or pared back, subject to the Task Force's recommendations.

- 1. State Advocacy. With the passage and ratification of Assembly Bill 109 and Proposition 47, the State of California unwittingly worsened homelessness across the state. Released from state prisons, criminal populations are now free to roam the streets and face dim prospects in both the job and housing markets. Reports confirm that this population has intermingled with the traditional homeless population, affecting it negatively in myriad ways. The Task Force recognizes that responding to the homelessness population will require resources beyond what Orange County and its cities can currently marshal and seek to advocate for legislation and funding from the state level.
- 2. Research and Data. Quantifying and researching the issue of homelessness in each of Orange County's communities is a vital step forward in concocting effective remediation strategies. Cities, in concert with non-profit organizations and academic institutions, should gather and analyze data on their homeless populations so that precious resources can be utilized to their fullest extent.
- 3. Outreach and Sharing Knowledge. It is clear that policies ratified by the State of California affect homeless communities throughout the state. While it is a truism that a policy solution for Orange County may not be an appropriate fit for municipalities and organizations in other parts of the state and vice versa, the Taskforce and our partners should communicate its knowledge and best practices to interested

organizations throughout Orange County. Similarly, the Taskforce should become acquainted with the solutions and initiatives from organizations outside Orange County in furtherance of alleviating homelessness.

- 4. Housing Options. The Taskforce acknowledges and commends Orange County's decision to build and sustain its first year-round homeless shelter. This positive step forward notwithstanding, the shelter constitutes a temporary reprieve for homeless residents, rather than a long-term solution. In one of the most expensive counties in the state in which to reside, it is increasingly becoming clear that the current supply of housing is inadequate for average residents, to say nothing of the homeless community. For those homeless residents who are able and willing to rise above their current condition, permanent affordable housing options must be made available.
- 5. Communication to Constituencies. The Taskforce recognizes that communication with various constituencies—especially the voting public—is a prerequisite for the creation and eventual execution of sound public policy solutions. The Taskforce will be transparent and forthright with the public on policy matters related to homelessness, seeking suggestions, improvement, and buy-in.

# Garden Grove recycler hit with wage violations

Garcia Recycling Center & Metals owner compares it to a traffic ticket.


A federal investigation of Orange County's recycling industry yielded its first case March 10, as a Garden Grove company was ordered to pay \$200,378 in back wages and damages to its workers.

The U.S. Labor Department charged Garcia Recycling Center & Metals with cheating employees by paying them a flat rate, in cash, with no overtime, regardless of the number of hours worked.

The back wages and damages, covering two years of violations, were paid to 15 workers at three collection sites: in Santa Ana, on Main Street and on West McFadden Avenue, and in Garden Grove, at Seaboard Circle.

The Orange County crackdown is part of a statewide campaign aimed at what officials say are widespread labor law violations at California's 1,837 recycling centers.

"This is an industry that doesn't seem to be following the law," said Rodolfo Cortez, director of the department's wage and hour district office. "It employs a large number of vulnerable workers who are afraid to speak up and don't know their rights."





Reached at his Garden Grove office, Jesus Garcia, owner of Garcia Recycling Center & Metals, said, "I made a mistake," and compared the enforcement to a traffic ticket.

"It is like when you don't stop at the stop sign, then you pay a fine," he added.

Garcia said he did not keep wage records for his employees because they are mostly "brothers, sisters, nephews and cousins." Labor investigators determined they earned about \$600 a week for working 55 to 60 hours.

Garcia's, like other centers, collects aluminum, glass and plastic beverage containers that consumers redeem for a nickel or a dime each, as well as other scrap that is sold by weight.

Californians redeem \$900 million worth of beverage containers each year. Most of the recycled material is exported to Asia where it is reprocessed to manufacture new products.

Tax records show many rewcling companies are highly profitable, Cortez said, adding, "The annual dollar value is in the millions."

Orange County has 126 collection centers, all but seven with employees onsite. The other seven, run by RePlanet, an Ontariobased statewide company, have automated vending machines.

Apart from RePlanet, Garcia's is among the largest of Orange County's 56 recycling companies, most of which have only one or two collection sites.

Cortez said the labor department is investigating about a dozen local companies

In Los Angeles County, a sweep of 46 collection sites last year found that 42 cheated their workers. The labor department assessed the operators \$275,000 in back wages and damages for 70 employees.

None of the Los Angeles companies paid overtime. More than half of them paid workers in cash, and half of the employees earned less than the legal minimum wage, investigators found.

A 2012 study by UCLA's Luskin School of Public Affairs found most recycling companies employ fewer than 10 workers. "Workers at the lowest tier are primarily male and Latino, and perform physically demanding tasks such as sorting and dismantling scrap material," it reported.

Besides Los Angeles and Orange counties, the federal probe is targeting recycling companies in San Diego, Fresno and Sacramento counties.

"We find the exact same issues everywhere," Cortez said. "The underground economy is a big problem in California. We are trying to clean it up."

When workers are paid in cash, questions also arise as to whether employers are paying required taxes and workers' compensation, he added. Such cases are referred to the Internal Revenue Service and the California Employment Development Department.

Simply paying employees a salary does not exempt them from overtime, which is paid at time-and-a-half Register Fountain Valley View March 24, 2016 2 of 2

for hours beyond 40 per week, according to the labor department. Only executive, administrative, professional and outside sales positions can be exempt under certain conditions, including a salary of at least \$455 per week.


Or maybe it was the tutor we saw not long ago at the Garden Grove Regional Library, volunteering her time with some kids doing homework after school.


help-wanted notice ranges from teaching Internet classes to after-school homework assistance to shelving books and special events – but the point is the same: They have needs, and you can help

# RESIDENTS RAIL AGAINST POTENTIAL AERIAL SPRAYING

MISSION VIEJO • Emotions bubbled up Monday night at a town hall on the battle against mosquitoes, with handfuls of parents, many with children and

carrying protest signs, voicing their opposition to aerial spraying of pesticides to combat the potentially deadly West Nile virus.

The Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control Dis-

trict, the public agency responsible for killing disease-carrying pests, has never used helicopters or planes in its war against mosquitoes, though it did plan to, unsuccessfully, last year. It also hasn't taken the option off the table for this year – and the backlash has been fierce.

"We don't trust the government," said Rebecca Nelson, a Garden Grove mother who helps run a Facebook group of

more than 2,600 members devoted to preventing aerial spraying in Orange County.

Nelson and other residents concerned about the effects of aerial spraying toted handmade signs: "Save our organic gardens," "If its so safe will you spray it on your face?" and "Has the EPA ever been wrong?" which, in part, was a reference to an announcement last spring by an agency of the World Health Organization that glyphosate – the main active ingredient in Roundup – "probably" causes cancer. The Environmental Protection Agency

deems it safe.

Many of the approximately three dozen people in attendance shouted at vector control officials, rejecting assurances from the county's top epidemiologist, Dr. Matthew Zahn, that

the chemical that would be used, Duet, is safe for humans.

Zahn said human exposure would be limited to very small amounts during an aerial attack.

The vector control district is hosting a series of town halls this month to get community feedback on aerial spraying.

Its governing board is scheduled to vote April 21 on a proposal to give the district's manager, Rick Howard, authority to launch an air campaign if he deems it necessary.

"It's still an option we want to consider," said Robert Cummings, vector control's director of scientific technical services.

Aerial spraying would happen at night and over targeted neighborhoods, to suppress adult female "Southern House" mosquitoes, vector control spokesman Jared Dever said. That's the species that spreads West Nile virus in Orange County.

West Nile, which can cause encephalitis and meningitis, killed eight Orange County residents in 2015 and nine the year prior.

The district also is informing residents about two other species of mosquitoes, Aedes albopictus and Aedes aegypti, which are not native but have found their way into nine Orange County cities and are capable of spreading tropical diseases, mainly dengue, chikungunya and Zika viruses. Aerial spraying wouldn't be as effective against the Aedes, which bite during the day, Dever said.

#### 4 questions about aerial spraying

Are you going to aerial spray this year? That decision will be made April 21 at a public meeting. Vector control officials said it's an option they want to consider if there are signs of another bad season of West Nile virus. The season typically runs from summer to fall. One of the key indicators, they said, is the infection rate in the mosquitoes they trap. If a lot of mosquitoes are infected with the virus, that's a good predictor that many humans will get sick, too. What chemical would be used?


Duet. The active ingredients are Sumithrin and Prallethrin. The World Health Organization says Prallethrin is "very toxic" to bees and fish but of "low toxicity" to birds; it has found no evidence it's carcinogenic to mammals. What studies prove aerial spraying is safe?

Dr. Matthew Zahn pointed to two separate studies analyzing emergency room data that found aerial spraying in Sacramento and New York City weren't "associated with any of the known types of diagnoses for which exposure to these insecticides has been implicated." The California Department of Public Health says, "While the pesticides used for mosquito control can cause adverse health effects under certain circumstances ... the available data suggest that they are relatively safe when applied by (ultra low volume) spraying according to label instructions."

Is aerial spraying a last resort? Have you tried other methods?



Mike, Silva's son, shared these thoughts of his mother.

"My mother's laugh and smile were truly contagious — she never had a bad day — and my father hit the lottery the day he met my mom. Mom was the single happiest and nicest person I've ever known, working together with my dad, they ran the restaurant business for nearly 50 years, with their duties perfectly split: my Dad in the kitchen and Mom in the dining room.

"To say they had different attitudes is an understatement. My Dad was there to put out good food, as fast as possible, with little or no chit chat, while Mom was there to meet people, inject joy into their life, and if and when they got a meal, that was a bonus.

"I'll never forget the first night we re-opened Kaye's Kitchen, after moving from Jorene's. It was a Friday Night Car Show and we had been closed for approximately two-to-three weeks, so the entire family pitched in, including a couple of kids we knew to get things going.

"At that time, my parents had run Jorene's with two-to-three employees and took in approximately \$3,000 a week, but that first night as Kaye's Kitchen, we made that much in the first six hours.

"My Dad and I were in the kitchen; a friend of Timmy's was

doing fries, and we were throwing food through the pass-out window like a factory, with the dining room so full of customers that people were doubling up in booths and waitresses were running around sweating like the Lakers.

"That's when Mom stepped up to the pass-out window with her big smile and looked at my Dad—who was beyond stressed and wearing a huge scowl—and said, 'Boy John, we are really busy, this is a lot of fun.'

"I think my Dad wanted to jump through the pass-out window, but I couldn't stop laughing, hearing the joy in my Mom's voice and seeing the big smile on her face; this was heaven for her.

"A lot of Mom's customers over the years ate cold food because of the constant chatter and greetings, and they loved it. She was not ever in the restaurant business; she was in the people business. Seriously, who wouldn't want to go to Kaye's Kitchen to see Kaye?"

Kaye Lou Silva was born in Casper, Wyoming on March 5, 1943. She and husband John Anthony Silva were married for more than 50 years. They were a Garden Grove High School love story and they were parents to six children, Debbie, Mike, Pam, Renee, Chris and Tim.

She raised her family on Old Fashion Way and Perrin Drive, where over the years, she basically employed the entire neighborhood, and she helped raise 10 grandchildren, Christopher, Kyle, Brad, Rachel, Anthony, Emma, John, Wyatt, Walker and Sophia.

"This is a sobering statistic, and



### Register 2016 March 21, 2016 A name recognition problem in House race

I'd never heard of Bob Peterson until March 10, the day before the candidate filing deadline, when the commander with the Orange County Sheriff's Department took out papers to run for the House of Representatives. He's one of eight candidates for the vacancy being created by Rep. Loretta Sanchez's bid for U.S. Senate.

Despite this being his first real step into the political arena. Peterson could emerge as the most viable of the four Republicans in the race. The Orange resident has a fundraising goal of \$250,000, and if he can raise anywhere near that, he could earn the attention of GOP votes.

He probably doesn't have a lot of ground to make up in terms of name recognition among the Republicans.

Anaheim's Rudy Gaona may be best known for his 2014 run for supervisor, when he received 16 percent of the vote. Fullerton's Louie Contreras' previous campaign experience, before he changed from a Democrat to a Republican, was his 2006 bid in a San Bernardino-Riverside counties congressional district, when he lost 67 percent to 33 percent to GOP incumbent Jerry Lewis.

First-term Irvine Councilwoman Lynn Schott lives outside Sanchez's central county district and is taking advantage of the fact that district residency isn't a requirement.

I'm curious to see what voter contact Schott does; I've called her perhaps a dozen times and always ended up in voice mail. On the occasions she's responded, it's been by email.

Given two days' notice before the deadline for this column, she said she couldn't respond in time because she was attending an educational forum. She was the only candidate who didn't respond.

Of course, it's probably academic who the strongest Republican is. With Democrats holding a 20-point advantage in the district's voter registration and with three Democratic candidates - each of whom is better known than any of the Republicans - it's likely two Democrats will advance to the November election under the state's top-two open primary system.

#### **IMMIGRANT ISSUES**

Peterson picked up a key endorsement Saturday from the conservative California Republican Assembly, although his position on immigration reform is slightly softer than that of some in the group.

He opposes President Barack Obama's DACA and DAPA executive orders to allow some undocumented immigrants to remain in the country, saying it's presidential overreach. But he said he would support legislation that would accomplish the same thing.

For those not covered by such le-

gislation, he says no action should be taken until the border is secure.

Contreras and Gaona favor a path to citizenship that includes a fine, a background check and a waiting period. Contreras' plan would take place only after the border is secure and would incorporate DACA and DAPA. Gaona said he didn't have a position on DACA and DAPA.

The Democrats - former state Sens. Lou Correa and Joe Dunn and Garden Grove Mayor Bao Nguyen and independent Nancy Trinidad Marin all favor a path to citizenship, with some variations in terms of fines and background checks. And the four also support DACA and DA-PA.

#### TRUMP AND CALIFORNIA

If the Republican presidential nomination comes down to California's 172 delegates in the June 7 primary, polling this month shows Donald Trump would be the biggest beneficiary.

The race is for the 1.237 delegates needed to secure the nomination in advance of the national convention. If no one reaches that magic number, a contested convention selecting a nominee other than the candidate with the most primary delegates is possible.

Irvine-based Landslide Communications teamed up with the NSON polling firm to survey 407 likely voters - 38 percent of whom favored Trump, 22 percent **Ted Cruz** and 20 percent John Kasich.

Smith Johnson Research polled 454 likely voters and found 25 percent favored Trump, 20 percent favored Cruz, and 15 percent favored Kasich.

But Trump's advantage in the two polls is so widely different - 16 percentage points and 5 points - it raises the question of which poll, if either, is accurate.

"Great Wolf Lodge is all about family, spending time with your families and enjoying everything that families do," said Phil Cunningham, general manager at Great Wolf Lodge Southern California, during a media event March 5. "We create family traditions one family at a time. Great Wolf Lodge is a total family experience."

Arguably, the 105,000-squarefoot waterpark is the resort's main attraction. It's the only element of the multi-faceted resort that is exclusive to hotel guests. A limited number of extra tickets per room for friends and family not staying at the hotel are available for \$40 each.

The waterpark features multiple water slides — some geared toward kids and others toward adults — as well as a lazy river for floating and relaxing; a wave pool, which offers the occasional simulated wave to mimic the ocean; and the Fort Mackenzie play structure, a multistory, interactive treehouse with suspension bridges, swinging cargo nets and multiple water effects.

Cunningham said about 565,000 gallons of water gets recirculated daily in a special water filtration system, a nod to California's persistent drought.


He said the company had been eyeing California as a resort location for years and began talking with Garden Grove city officials in 2009. He said it doesn't aim to compete with Disneyland, which is less than a mile away in Anaheim.

"Southern California is a great area to be in," he said. "This is a family mecca already. We believe we can be a great complement to this area with our unique offerings that we have."

Indeed, the two may end up being allies more than adversaries. Great Wolf spokeswoman Kristen Olson said company officials are even considering offering special discounted Disneyland tickets in the future.

The Garden Grove lodge features a number of family attractions that are open to the public, including a motion theater, miniature golf, an arcade, a kids spa and a bowling alley.

In addition, the MagiQuest game sends players on a journey

through six levels of the hotel to rescue a princess from a dragon. Participants can purchase wands that can be aimed at TV-like screens in order to access clues. Imagine a giant multi-room adventure that is part video game and part scavenger hunt.

The hotel also offers seven restaurants, including a pizza place, a bar and grill, a Dunkin Donuts and a sweets shop.

Chris Hammond, executive chef for the Great Wolf Resort franchise, said he aims to serve his customers tasty dishes.

He said all of the produce comes from local farms, and meats and other products are purchased from high-quality vendors.

Each restaurant also has gluten-free options, and allergens like peanuts are taken into account. Many dishes can be accommodated to fit customer needs, he said.


"It's important for us that we serve something real," Hammond said. "We aim to have a balance between healthy eating and organic."

Guests also have the option of seven types of rooms to stay in, with prices starting around \$350.

While each room is its own unique experience, families with children are likely to favor the Wolf Den, a kids-themed room with a bunk bed, queen bed and full sofa sleeper. Company officials said children will have fun using the MagiQuest wands to control animatronics in the room.

# Man acquitted of 1st-degree murder in neighbor's killing

Jury deadlocks on lesser charge, leading to mistrial on that count.

An Orange County Superior Court jury on Thursday acquitted a man of first-degree murder in the shooting death of his neighbor in Garden Grove.

The jurors deadlocked, II-1, in favor of acquittal on a second-degree murder

charge for 55-year-old Robert Price, prompting Judge Patrick Donahue to declare a mis-

trial on that count.

Price is accused of shooting his neighbor, 53-year-old Glen Berry, at about 1:30 a.m. June 21, 2013, after Berry went to Price's home to confront him about shooting fireworks into his backyard. The two had lived next to each other for more than a decade and were involved in a long-running dispute.

Price is due back in court on April 22, when the Orange County District Attorney's Office is expected to discuss whether to retry him on the second-degree Cynthia Herrera on Thursday said she "respectfully disagrees" with the jury's decision and plans to pursue the case.

In the trial, Herrera said Price shot an unarmed Berry in the face as "payback" for years of bickering. Price's defense attorney, Doug Myers, argued that Price shot his neighbor in self-defense after Berry stormed over to his home in an "out-of-control" rage.

Myers said he spoke to several jurors after the verdict and the majority felt that Price acted in self-defense.

"It's a sad, tragic situation for the Berry family, and I feel for them, but to me it's always been a selfdefense case," he said.

Attorneys said the bickering began when the Berry family moved into the home directly behind the Prices about 15 years ago. Herrera said both neighbors shot fireworks, and Price had accused Berry of throwing rocks over the fence at his two dogs.

"The men acted at times like 12- or 13-year-old boys with each other," Herrera said.

The families eventually erected a wooden extension on top of the 5-foot wall that bordered their backyards.

At about 10 p.m. on the night of the shooting, Herrera said, Berry lit fire-crackers to scare off birds in a lemon tree in his backyard. The noise apparently awakened Price, who waited until about 1:10 a.m. and then shot fireworks into Berry's backyard in retaliation, Herrera said.

Berry was awakened by the noise and went to Price's home. The two briefly exchanged words through a locked, metal security door before Price, armed with a 44-caliber Magnum revolver, shot through the door, striking Berry in the eye, prosecutors said.

He then dialed 911 and told authorities that he had shot his neighbor and thought his neighbor had a gun. Authorities later determined that Berry was unarmed and did not own a gun.

Myers argued that Berry stormed over to his neighbor's home in an uncontrollable rage. As Price opened the door, he said, Berry lurched his arm back and said, "I'm going to kill you," causing Price to fear for his life.

"Mr. Price believed he was in real danger," Myers said during the trial.

MATTERS FROM COMMISSIONERS: Commissioner Zamora asked for an update on the street painting near Costco. Staff responded that the City's new Traffic Engineer, Dai Vu, would follow up with her. Zamora then mentioned that the City's online project update list was dated from 2004-2015 with no status of projects indicated. She would like a list of current and future projects, along with updates on larger projects, similar to information found on Huntington Beach's website.

I am pleased to inform you of your jurisdiction's Fiscal Year (FY) 2016 allocations for the Office of Community Planning and Development's (CPD) formula programs, which provide funding for housing, community and economic development activities, and assistance for low and moderate-income persons and special populations across the country. President Obama signed Public Law 114-113 on December 18, 2015, which includes FY 2016 funding for these programs. Your jurisdiction's FY 2016 available amounts are:

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	\$1,931,623
HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME)	\$485,556
Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)	\$ 0
Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)	\$174,448

This letter highlights several important points related to these programs. First, Secretary Julián Castro is committed to making HUD the "Department of Opportunity" and has established a number of initiatives intended to achieve that goal. In 2015, we celebrated the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Department's establishment, and these initiatives build on HUD's mission to promote homeownership, support community development, and increase access to affordable housing free from discrimination. The Department is working hard with grantees on these key goals and urges you to review the entire plan at: <a href="http://portal.hud.gov/hudportal/HUD?src=/hudvision">http://portal.hud.gov/hudportal/HUD?src=/hudvision</a>. In an era when the nation's severe shortage of affordable rental housing creates substantial housing instability—contributing to homelessness, family mobility and unequal educational attainment—I am particularly interested in working with grantees to increase affordable housing production through our CPD formula programs.

Second, HUD recommends that grantees effectively plan and implement programs that leverage these critical Federal financial resources to achieve the greatest possible return for the communities and individuals they are intended to assist.

- HUD urges grantees to consider using CDBG funds, to the extent possible, to support
  investments in predevelopment activities for infrastructure and public facilities activities that
  can provide multiple benefits for communities.
- HUD has created a Renewable Energy Toolkit specifically tailored to CPD grantees. To the extent that grantees are interested in using funds for renewable energy projects, please feel free to access that toolkit online at <a href="https://www.hudexchange.info">www.hudexchange.info</a>.
- If you would like assistance from CPD in redesigning, prioritizing or targeting your programs,

either you or the head of the agency that administers your program may request assistance through your local CPD Director.

Third, CPD is asking grantees to renew their focus on administration and management of these programs as part of an effort to ensure effective use of the funds. Throughout 2016, CPD and HUD's Office of the Inspector General expect to issue a range of guidance that will highlight particular areas where grantees commonly stumble. I urge grantees to actively review their policies and procedures governing these programs and to strengthen management practices, particularly with regard to recordkeeping, in order to avoid problems and risk this vital funding. This focus on administration is particularly critical because the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS), which is HUD's financial and data system for managing these formula programs, will no longer commit and disburse grant funds on a first-in first-out (FIFO) basis beginning with the FY 2015 grants. All FY 2015 and future grants will be committed and disbursed on a grant specific basis.

The Office of Community Planning and Development is looking forward to working with you to promote simple steps that will enhance the viability and performance of these critical programs and successfully meet the challenges that our communities face.
