






Thank you for your continued efforts to improve transportation and provide public transit options for the people of Orange County. I am excited to see the Orange County Transportation Authority's (OCTA's) investments in commuter rail and bus service that have helped improve congestion by providing convenient and affordable alternatives to driving and better access to jobs. I am eagerly awaiting the opening of the OC Streetcar, which will extend the reach of Metrolink service by connecting the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center to Harbor Boulevard. With Harbor Boulevard being the busiest bus corridor in the county, there clearly is significant demand for high-quality and high-capacity transit there. In addition, OC Streetcar will greatly benefit commuters from throughout the county who work in historic downtown Santa Ana and Civic Center, one of the largest employment centers in Orange County. A new mobility hub at the OC Streetcar's terminus in the City of Garden Grove will add to its convenience for those using the light rail or transferring to OC Bus.

Given the planned completion of the OC Streetcar in 2022, I am writing to you to express my support in studying an extension of the project north from the Harbor Boulevard/Westminster Avenue hub to job centers in Santa Ana, Garden Grove, and Anaheim. I believe an extension of OC Streetcar will offer the diverse communities much-needed transportation and access to jobs in the Orange County Civic Center, Garden Grove commercial corridor, and the Anaheim Resort. Nearly 30 percent of Orange County's population resides in these three cities, and traffic and travel conditions continue to worsen as population and employment grows with the economy. Better access to jobs offers new opportunities to the residents to get a college education and to continue living and working in Orange County.

I understand that the Central Harbor Boulevard Transit Corridor Study was completed in 2018 and included several northerly extension options, one of which included a terminus near Katella Avenue. Given the completed transit study and the

alternatives that were evaluated, I believe an environmental study for an extension project in this corridor is a logical next step. As you know, these projects take quite some time to plan and implement, and early action would help get an extension shelf-ready for future federal funding.

Garden Grove will be taking a resolution to city council for consideration on January 14, 2020 to demonstrate city council support to advance the study into the next phase. I appreciate your ongoing efforts to plan and implement a balanced and sustainable transportation network for Orange County's future.


Monthly Water Usage Data, Tier 2 Projection & Water Supply Information

The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Imported Water Sales for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply OCWD Groundwater was the main supply in November.
- OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years
   Water usage in November 2019 was slightly above average compared to the last 5 years. We are projecting a slight increase in overall water usage compared to FY 2018-19. It has been 33 months since all mandatory water restrictions were lifted by the California State Water Resources Control Board.
- Historical OC Water Consumption Orange County M & I water consumption is estimated to be 528,000 AF in FY 2019-20 (this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 12,000 AF more than FY 2018-19 and is about 12,000 AF less than FY 2017-18. Water usage per person is projected to be slightly higher in FY 2019-20 for Orange County at 144 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts. O.C. Water Usage for the last four Fiscal Years is the lowest since the 1982-83 Fiscal Year (FY 1982-83 was the third wettest year on record).

Water Supply Information Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.


- Orange County's accumulated precipitation through *late December* was above average for this period. Water year to date rainfall in Orange County is 6.62 inches, which is 179% of normal.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation through *late December* was 72% of normal for this period. Water Year 2019 was 137% of normal while water year 2018 was 82% of normal. The *Northern California snowpack* was 82% of normal as of December 31<sup>st</sup>. As of late December, 0.00% of California is experiencing moderate drought conditions while 3.57% of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation was initially set at 10% in December 2019.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through late December was 92% of normal for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 120% of normal as of December 30<sup>th</sup>. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 66% of their average storage volume for this time of year and are at 46.8% of their total capacity. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. As of late December, Lake Mead levels were 15.28' above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the start of 2020 will not hit the "trigger" level but there is a 4% chance that the trigger level will be hit in 2021 and a 24% chance in 2022.




# Accumulated Precipitation








# Accumulated Overdraft of the OCWD Groundwater Basin as of November 2019




Historical Northern California April 1st Peak Snow Water Equivalent







The City is offering First-Time Home Buyer Programs for qualifying low-income families as well as First-Time Home Buyer workshops.

The CalHome loan is a 30-year deferred payment loan requiring no monthly payments, not exceeding \$60,000, which accrues 3-percent simple annual interest for the life of the loan. The loan is designed to assist with covering the difference between a qualifying mortgage amount and the actual price of a single-family home for qualified low- and very low-income families.

The City also offers the Workforce Initiative Subsidy for Homeownership Grant. The matching grant is up to \$22,000 that assists qualifying low- and very low-income families with the down payment or closing costs. For every dollar a resident puts towards the down payment, the City will match with four dollars.

The Legislative Analyst's Office has just published the following report:

#### The 2020-21 Budget: Overview of the Governor's Budget

This report presents our office's initial assessment of the Governor's budget.

We estimate the Governor had a \$5.9 billion surplus to allocate to discretionary purposes in 2020-21. The Governor allocates most of the surplus toward one-time purposes, including maintaining a positive year-end balance in the state's discretionary reserve. Under the administration's estimates, total reserves would reach \$20.5 billion at the end of 2020-21—this represents a \$1.7 billion increase from the 2019-20 enacted level.

California continues to enjoy a healthy fiscal situation. Despite its positive near-term picture, the budget's multiyear outlook is subject to considerable uncertainty. In addition to describing the condition of the budget under the Governor's proposal, this report discusses tools the Legislature can use to mitigate against these heightened risks.

### Governor Newsom Unveils Proposed FY 2020-21 State Budget

Governor Gavin Newsom unveiled his 2020-21 State Budget proposal this past Friday in Sacramento, which includes \$153.083 billion in General Fund, \$64.758 billion in special funds, and \$5.352 billion in selected bond funds totaling \$222.193 billion. This proposed budget reflects a 3.5 percent increase in spending from the current fiscal year budget.

To prepare for potential recession scenarios in the coming years that could result in a larger than \$40 billion budget deficit, the Governor's budget proposal builds up state reserves to \$21 billion overall (\$18 billion Rainy Day Fund) and primarily focuses the remainder of the budget surplus of \$5.6 billion on one-time spending. Down below are key components of interest for cities in the Governor's proposed budget.

#### **Housing**

The Governor's 2020-21 State Budget proposal contains minimal new funding to spur housing production in California. However, it does outline numerous policy changes and reforms the Governor would like to pursue this year. These include:

- Revamping the next Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) cycle to promote and streamline housing development. This new process will provide more ambitious housing goals for cities;
- > \$10 million annually for the next three years to continue to pursue policy changes that support housing production as well as hold local jurisdictions accountable to remove barriers to more housing production in the state;

- > Working with the Legislature on additional actions to expedite housing production, including changes to local zoning and permitting processes, as well as adding predictability and reducing the costs of development fees; and
- ➤ Changes made in the 2019-20 budget to streamline the creation of Enhanced Infrastructure Financing Districts (EIFD) to fund housing and infrastructure projects. However, the EIFD tool remains difficult for cities to initiate without further cleanup of the law in addition to significant bolstering of tax increment financing.

#### Homelessness

The Governor's 2020-21 State Budget proposal:

- ➤ Establishes the California Access to Housing and Services Fund, and allocates \$750 million in new funding to develop affordable housing units, supplement and augment rental subsidies, and stabilize board and care homes. Funding will flow through the California Department of Social Services and regional administrators;
- ➤ Allocates \$650 million to transform Medi-Cal to boost preventive health care that brings down the cost of delivering care. This effort is largely targeted at those who are chronically unsheltered; and
- ➤ While not directly part of the budget, the Governor released an <u>Executive Order</u> on Jan. 8, 2020 aimed at addressing the homelessness crisis. The Executive Order compliments some of the new funding allocations in the budget by freeing up access to excess state property, decommissioned state hospitals, and Caltrans property.

#### Climate Resiliency

The Governor's 2020-21 State Budget proposal includes significant investments in climate resiliency, with the Governor proposing multiple "climate resiliency" initiatives, including a \$1 billion climate catalyst fund, a \$4.75 billion climate resiliency bond, and \$965 million in Cap-and-Trade expenditures for climate change related programs. Additional items of interest include:

- > \$2.9 billion for water, flood management, and drought measures;
- > \$500 million for projects to protect critical infrastructure due to sea level rise in coastal communities:
- > \$250 million for community resiliency projects;
- > \$50 million for communities to deal with the impacts of utility-initiated power shutoffs; and
- > \$25 million for waste diversion projects.

#### **Emergency Preparedness and Response**

With historic investments in emergency preparedness and response in the 2019-20 budget, the 2020-21 State Budget proposal largely builds off the previous investments with modest new investments. Some items of note are:

- > \$500 million for hardening of the electrical grid and critical infrastructure;
- ➤ \$16.7 million to repair, restore, or replace public real property damaged or destroyed by a disaster, and to reimburse local government costs associated with certain activities undertaken in response to a state of emergency; and
- > \$9 million to implement SB 209 (Dodd, 2019) to develop a Wildfire Forecast and Threat Intelligence Integration Center."

#### Transportation, Communication and Public Works

The Governor's 2020-21 State Budget proposal outlines a \$53 billion, five-year infrastructure plan,

which includes \$45 billion for transportation and high-speed rail from ongoing revenue sources such as the Road Repair and Accountability Act (SB 1), general obligation bonds, and Cap-and-Trade funds.

The proposal includes \$22 billion for maintenance and \$3 billion for capital improvements to the state highway system, \$5 billion for public transit and rail infrastructure, and \$1 billion for active transportation projects, not including the ongoing investments in local streets and roads funded primarily through the Highway Users Tax, and the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Program.

Additionally, the Governor's State Budget proposal also calls for mapping state connectivity, namely, the existing broadband network in California as it seeks to close the digital divide for those that have no or limited access to high-speed internet.

#### **Governance, Transparency, and Labor Relations**

The Governor noted the challenge cities are facing in meeting their pension obligations, but his proposed budget does not propose any new supplemental payments to CalPERS. It also does not include any new tools or proposals to help local agencies manage their significant pension obligations.

The budget proposal seeks to expand the Paid Family Leave program by increasing the use of the benefit along with aligning it with job protections and resources to support small businesses that extend the benefit to their employees.

For AB 5 (Gonzalez, 2019) enforcement regarding independent contractors, the Governor's proposal provides \$22 million.

The Department of Industrial Relations would receive \$17.5 million to increase access to workers' compensation and to adjudicate labor law violations, the Employment Development Department would receive \$3.4 million for staff training and to increase hearings and investigations, and the Department of Justice would receive \$780,000 for investigations.

#### **Public Safety**

The Governor's 2020-21 State Budget proposal includes several components of targeted funding that either directly or indirectly pertain to public safety at the city level. These dollars are spread across a variety of agencies and departments, as described below.

CalFIRE would receive \$120 million (\$150 million ongoing) for additional resources for operational flexibility throughout peak fire season and beyond. This includes permanent funding to pre-position additional firefighting personnel earlier in the spring or later in the fall and winter, as fire conditions warrant, rather than continuing the current practice of adding additional firefighter surge capacity on a year-to-year basis.

For Proposition 47, the Department of Finance estimates net savings of \$122.5 million, which is an increase of \$44 million over the estimated savings in 2019-20, attributable primarily to the state's reduced reliance on contract facilities to house prison inmates.

The Governor proposes to consolidate the three cannabis licensing entities into a single Department of Cannabis Control by July 2021, centralizing and aligning critical regulatory functions, and thereby creating a single point of contact for cannabis licensees and local governments.

The excise tax is forecasted to generate \$479 million in 2019-20 and \$550 million in 2020-21. This forecast assumes continued growth of more than 15 percent annually as new businesses continue to enter the marketplace and local jurisdictions adjust to the state's legal framework.

#### **Next Steps**

Following the release of the Governor's budget, an analysis by the Legislative Analyst's Office will be completed shortly. The League will continue to examine the details of this budget proposal and provide additional analysis next week.

### **Governor Newsom Proposes 2020-21 State Budget**

SACRAMENTO – Governor Gavin Newsom submitted his 2020-21 State Budget proposal to the Legislature today which makes responsible investments in the state's economic future while tackling head-on persistent challenges facing the state.

"California's economic growth has fueled the nation's economy. As 2020 begins, California's economy is the strongest in the nation and the fifth largest in the world. We're eliminating debts, paying down pension liabilities, growing our reserve funds – the largest ever at \$21 billion – and one out of every seven new U.S. jobs is in California," said Governor Newsom. "Despite the progress we've made, there are deep, structural challenges that threaten our state's future and demand our urgent attention. These problems – our widespread affordability crisis, expanding homelessness crisis and catastrophic wildfires – have been decades in the making and won't be fixed overnight. California is doing more than ever to tackle these challenges and this budget builds on that work with new investments and ideas to take on these longstanding issues."

#### **Building Reserves and Reducing Liabilities**

California is continuing to build a strong economic foundation to anticipate potential risks. The Budget continues to grow the reserves in the Rainy Day Fund and assumes an additional transfer of nearly \$2 billion in 2020-21 and an additional \$1.4 billion over the remainder of the three-year forecast period. The Rainy Day Fund balance is projected to be \$18 billion in 2020-21 and \$19.4 billion by 2023-24. The Budget also:

- Maintains \$900 million in the Safety Net Reserve
- Sets aside \$110 million more in the Public School System Stabilization Account, bringing its total balance to \$487 million.
- Reserves \$1.6 billion in the Special Fund for Economic Uncertainties to address emergencies and other unforeseen events. Overall, the Budget has \$21 billion set aside in reserves.

#### **Addressing the Affordability Crisis**

The state's affordability crisis continues to threaten working families who are burdened by the rising costs of health care and prescription drugs, and the sky-high cost of housing and rent. Last year, the state passed historic measures to expand access to health care subsidies for the middle class, approved the strongest renter protection law in the nation, and provided \$1 billion in tax relief for working families through the expanded Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), while investing in affordable housing production efforts.

The Administration has announced a new CalRx generic drug program making California the first state to create its own generic drug label and making the state's generic prescription drugs available for sale to all Californians. The Budget transforms Medi-Cal to a more consistent and seamless system by reducing complexity and increasing flexibility and establishes a single market for drug pricing within the state.

The Budget also moves the state toward universal coverage and furthers cost containment goals by expanding full-scope Medi-Cal coverage to low-income undocumented Californians aged 65 and above.

Building on the state's new renter protection law and unprecedented \$1.75 billion investment in last year's budget to increase housing supply and hold cities accountable for regional housing goals, this year's Budget authorizes \$500 million annually for the state's housing tax credit program and continues to support housing development on excess state lands. In addition, the Administration is streamlining state processes to accelerate housing production. Finally, the Administration continues to work to establish a trust with \$331 million that will provide borrower relief and support housing counselors or other legal aid agencies in representing homeowners and renters in housing-related matters.

#### Confronting the Homelessness Crisis

Homelessness is an issue that impacts both urban and rural communities throughout the state, and puts stress on public resources from emergency rooms to jails and public works departments. It is a complex social services problem and must be combatted at its root causes, which is why the Budget introduces several new strategies to build on the \$1.15 billion provided to local governments in the last two budgets.

The Budget proposes more than \$1 billion to radically shift the state's involvement to house the many unsheltered individuals living in California, by launching the <u>California Access to Housing and Services Fund</u> with a \$750 million initial investment. This Fund will create a structure for developing affordable housing units, supplementing and augmenting rental subsidies, and stabilizing board and care homes.

The additional funding will come from the Medi-Cal Healthier California for All initiative and will also contribute to addressing the homelessness crisis by transforming the Medi-Cal system to better serve individuals experiencing mental illness and homelessness. The Administration will form a task force to improve the state's behavioral health system as well as strategies to strengthen enforcement of behavioral health parity laws.

#### **Emergency Response and Effective Government**

The 2019 Budget Act included nearly \$1 billion to enhance the state's emergency response capabilities. The Budget builds on this foundation with investments that further strengthen California's ability to prevent and respond to fires and that provide the state's first responders with additional capabilities and support. The Budget enhances the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection's operational capabilities by adding funding for new firefighters during peak fire season, increasing the number of year-round engines, and providing further relief coverage to support state firefighter health and wellness. The Budget also increases the use of technology by obtaining Light Detection and Ranging (LiDAR) data to better inform resources management and hazard assessment decisions, and establishes a new Wildfire Forecast and Threat Intelligence Integration Center to analyze data on wildfire risk.

#### **Promoting Opportunity for All**

The Administration continues working toward a universal preschool system and a comprehensive, quality, and affordable child care system for California while helping parents thrive. The Budget builds on the historic investments made last year to expand access to child care, preschool and full-day kindergarten with funding for 10,000 additional full-day or full-year preschool slots, moving the state closer to its goal of universal preschool for all income-eligible four-year-olds. The Budget also expands the EITC, and increases the amount of child support payments retained by families on CalWORKs, effective January 1, 2022.

The 2019 Budget Act expanded Paid Family Leave from six to eight weeks, moving twothirds towards the goal of six months of paid family leave for two parents to bond with a new child. The Budget builds on this expansion by proposing to extend job protections to more employees, thereby expanding the number of families that can take advantage of this benefit.

The Budget also proposes developing a new adverse childhood experiences, or ACEs, cross-sector training program with the goal of reducing adverse childhood experiences and toxic stress by half in a generation and establishing a new Department of Early Childhood Development under the Health and Human Services Agency, effective July 1, 2021.

#### Largest K-12 Education Per-Pupil Expenditure in History

Preparing students to succeed is important to California's future. That's why the Budget proposes a historic level of funding for K-12 schools. Per-pupil funding has grown by more than \$7,200 since its low point in 2011-12 and achievement gaps are closing for many students. The state has a well-documented, long-term, statewide teacher shortage in the areas of special education, science and math. The Budget proposes an investment of approximately \$900 million in teacher training, including professional development, educator service awards, and teacher residency programs. These investments will increase and improve the teacher workforce, which is foundational to improving student outcomes.

The Budget also includes \$300 million one-time for grants and technical assistance to prepare and implement improvement plans at the state's lowest-performing schools, and includes \$300 million one-time for grants to develop community school models with innovative partnerships that support mental health and the whole child. The

Budget includes a 40-percent increase in state funding for school nutrition programs to boost the quality of meals provided and to expand access. The Budget also includes \$10 million for grants to foster innovative farm-to-school linkages that support sustainable agriculture and make more healthy foods available to schoolchildren. Local educational agencies will also continue to benefit from the massive \$3.15 billion non-Proposition 98 General Fund payment made on their behalf to the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) and the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) Schools Pool. An estimated \$850 million is buying down the employer contribution rates in 2019-20 and 2020-21 and the remaining \$2.3 billion is being paid toward long-term unfunded liabilities. Overall, these payments are expected to save schools \$6.9 billion over the next three decades.

#### **Expanding Access to Higher Education**

The 2019 Budget Act included major investments in higher education that provided two years of tuition-free community college and increased enrollment and investments to improve student success across all segments. The Budget establishes expectations that the University of California and California State University increase undergraduate enrollment, increase student supports and encourage degree completion through innovative delivery methods, including University Extension centers.

The Budget proposes major investments in Inland California communities that face higher unemployment and create fewer jobs in high-wage sectors. The Budget allocates additional ongoing funding to expand enrollment and increase operational support for the UC Riverside School of Medicine and to expand the UC San Francisco School of Medicine Fresno Branch Campus in partnership with UC Merced. The Budget also includes funding for a major new food innovation corridor in the Central Valley.

#### **Climate Budget**

The Budget proposes a comprehensive approach to California's investments to protect the state's environment, address the effects of climate change, and promote resiliency. This climate budget includes \$12 billion over the next five years. Three key areas of the climate budget are a proposed climate resilience bond, cap-and-trade expenditures to continue the transition to a carbon-neutral economy, and a new Climate Catalyst Fund to promote the deployment of new technologies, especially by small businesses and emerging industries.

The Climate Catalyst Fund, which will be administered by the Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank, will finance investments in low-carbon transportation, sustainable agriculture and waste diversion through low-interest loans. The Budget proposes to capitalize the Fund with \$1 billion General Fund over the next four years.

The Fund will have a revolving loan structure that will leverage private capital and will support projects well into the future. It will be designed to support good jobs and a just transition to achieving California's climate goals.

#### Reimagining Criminal Justice

The Budget builds on important steps taken last year, including shifting juvenile justice to focus on rehabilitation and reentry, investing in restorative justice, community-based violence prevention, substance-use disorder treatment, prison literacy and pretrial diversion. The Budget proposes to continue expansion of opportunities for rehabilitation and treatment – starting with the youngest offenders in state prison. The Budget proposes to cluster the 5,800 young offenders (under age 26) into campus-style environments within existing facilities, with specialized programming and educational opportunities. The Budget also includes a major investment in technology for inmates participating in academic programs and expanded access to higher education programming through partnerships with the California State University system. The

Budget includes a major proposal to enhance staff development through a new training facility and training program for correctional officers and counselors.

Jobs, the Economy and Protecting the Environment

As California enters a new decade, it must prepare for the jobs and economy of tomorrow. Rapid advancements in technology, automation and artificial intelligence are reshaping the economy and the nature of work, and the state needs to better align data, policy and program analysis for the state's workforce training programs. The Budget includes funding to establish a new Department of Better Jobs and Higher Wages to consolidate the workforce functions currently dispersed across the Labor and Workforce Development Agency. It also funds the next \$1 dollar increase in the state's minimum wage, bringing it to \$13 per hour for most employees as of January 1, 2020. The Budget also proposes to reduce the minimum franchise tax for new small businesses, removing a barrier to entrepreneurship and job creation. Finally, the Budget allocates \$53 billion to the state's infrastructure over the next five years, focusing on investments that underpin economic activity and create a sustainable and resilient California.
