Dear Colleagues,

Navigating these turbulent waters during this unprecedented time in history takes collaboration and by working together we can meet this moment and help our communities thrive. I urge you to sign on to the California Mayors Coalition so that we may work together and speak with one voice urging the State and Federal government to assist cities with our continuation of essential services. Below is the COVID 19 Action Plan outline.

#### California Mayors Coalition - COVID 19 Action Plan

COVID-19 Testing – The Governor should mandate free, widely available testing across CA's 58 Counties immediately.

Healthy people need to get back to work. The only way to get the California economy moving again, is to provide easy testing that is free and widely available. Currently, each of the 58 counties in the State have distinct testing procedures and policies. This hurts California's residents. The Governor should standardize testing procedures and work with the federal government to ensure fast, accurate test kits are available to all Californians.

CALPERS – The Governor needs to mandate that CALPERS immediately freeze the current discount rate for two years.

The Governor must prevent CALPERS from attempting to lower the discount rate any further and spread the cost to its members. Because of the great financial strain resulting from the revenue losses due to the COVID-19 crisis, its members cannot sustain what would be a death blow to their finances. Additionally, a suspension of the COLA to retirees must be considered. This must be done prior to May 1<sup>st</sup>, before the 2020 COLA is implemented.

Federal Funding Allocation-\$1.5 billion in federal COVID disaster relief funding will come to California. A portion of that funding must be allocated to cities on a per capita basis

Simply put, cities under 500,000 population are in desperate need of COVID-19 federal funding infused directly into our General Funds. We must receive a fair and equitable share across county lines from the \$1.5 billion in federal funding coming to the State.

Even when negative economic shocks (e.g. COVID, the Great Recession, etc.) reduce income and spending, which in turn reduces income and sales tax revenues collected by state and local governments, our cities must balance our operating budgets annually. Local government provides essential services to each of our communities (e.g.

gentilizado

public safety, libraries, parks and recreation programs as well as major ongoing capital investments in roads, sanitary sewers, and water treatment and distribution systems).

To be wholly left to the generosity of county governments penalizes the millions of CA residents who live in our communities. The State should join with CA cities in advocating for a per capita funding to every city under 500,000 population in California.

In addition to any federal funding allocation related to COVID disaster relief, Congress needs to pass a Infrastructure Spending Bill. This bill would infuse much needed funds into local jurisdictions to pay for infrastructure (e.g. streets/roads/highways, bridges, sewer and water infrastructure) – this funding too should be allocated on a per capita basis and sent directly to cities.

More importantly, should a New Relief Bill be introduced that would provide direct relief to cities who have populations under 500,000; we must advocate for the passage of this legislation.

Sales Tax Reprieve – The State government should advance sales tax funding that would have been collected by local governments over the next twelve months to protect cities from insolvency because of lack of sales tax; one of the two main sources of city revenue.

Based on the Governor's recent announcement, small businesses will receive a no-interest loan of sorts from the State as those businesses will be allowed to keep sales tax collected during the next twelve months. While cities realize the very real struggles of small businesses, this creates an unbearable burden for cities. Cities will not be able to fund after school programs, public safety, or library services without their sales tax allocation. The State must use its resources to advance estimated sales tax funding to ensure cities are able to continue to serve the millions of CA residents who live in our communities.

Jobs – Workforce development programs and increased economic development funding must be a priority to put Californians back to work.

Many years ago, redevelopment funding for cities was eliminated and cities lost the ability to revitalize blighted areas of our communities and reinvest in commercial enterprises in order to bolster not only the city's finances, but most importantly, put our local workforce back to work. Now is the time for Sacramento to invest in the local community so that the thousands of out-of-work CA residents can access local programs, tailored to local needs; that's how they'll be able to feed their families moving forward

## URGENT ACTION NEEDED – SUPPORT "3.5" SUPPLEMENTAL PLAN

Orange County's Board of Supervisors, Mayors of 34 Cities Urge Congress, White House to Provide Immediate Relief to Support COVID-19 Response on the Ground

To the Members of the United States House of Representatives, United States Senate, and President of the United States:

As the duly elected officials of the fifth-most populous County in the United States representing more than 3.3 million people, we urge Congress to unite and put aside partisan differences by passing dedicated and flexible funding for all local governments. We are working at the county and municipal level as partners to provide unique and non-duplicative services to protect public health and economic stability, despite significant losses of revenue as a result of public health measures requiring a pause on most economic activity. The COVID-19 interim supplemental would provide \$150 billion in new funding for state and local governments – including \$29.5 billion for counties and \$29.5 billion for cities - to help cover expenditures and lost revenue. It is the only offer on the table for state and local governments right now. We simply cannot wait any longer.

Enclosed is the March 2020 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and Investment Report. The pie chart (please see chart on attachment A) reflects the investment instruments as a percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City's investment policy. As of March 2020, the City's total portfolio is invested in:

The cash with fiscal agents is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of March 2020, 2.928% of the portfolio is restricted.

In summary, the investment portfolio is secured and the City has the necessary cash to pay its bills for six months in a timely manner. Please call me at extension #5060 if you have any questions.







Garden Grove coronavirus infections had climbed to 50 as of press time. Stanton had reported 10; Westminster 22.



At about 10:30 a.m., Garden Grove officers started following a car believed to have been stolen, Garden Grove Lt. Carl Whitney said.



### LOCAL EMERGENCY ORDER TO CONTINUE UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

Due to the continuing COVID-19 health emergency, and in concurrence with the Executive Orders by Governor Gavin Newsom, the City of Garden Grove has officially extended its local emergency order to continue until further notice.

The local emergency order maintains extended closures of City Hall and City facilities; cancellation of City programs and classes; suspension of water shut-offs for non-payment, and acceptance of late water payments without penalty; discontinuation of street sweeping parking citations; moratorium on rental evictions and foreclosures; and suspension on limitations on the hours operation of, and deliveries to, businesses and establishments engaged in essential activities, all until further notice. The City's Emergency Operation Centers will also remain activated until further notice.

The previous local emergency order, extended on Thursday, March 26, 2020, was set to expire on Friday, April 17, 2020. The City originally proclaimed the existence of a local emergency due to COVID-19, on Monday, March 16, 2020, that went into effect the following day.

### Two local Vietnamese-American business owners donated 700 masks to the City of Garden Grove

On Wednesday, April 15, 2020, two local Vietnamese-American business owners graciously donated 700 reusable masks to the City of Garden Grove, knowing many people need masks at this time, including government employees.

Councilmember Patrick Phat Bui shared the news that two local business owners donated 500 reusable masks to the City's Public Works Department and 200 masks to the employees at City Hall. According to Councilman Bui, the Garden Grove Public Works Department has more staff than City Hall.

At approximately 11:30 a.m., on Wednesday, Ms. Tran Dang and her younger brother, Mr. Andrew Pham, from Chapman Corporation, brought over 500 reusable masks to the Garden Grove Public Works Department.

Ms. Tran had shared with the Nguoi-Viet reporter: "My company is located near City Hall. I feel that public servants like City employees and police officers don't have enough masks for their protection. After my donation to other places in the community, I found I still had many leftovers masks, so I ordered more to make a donation to the City of Garden Grove. I want to help the City and the community during this difficult time."

According to Bill Murray, Director of Garden Grove Public Works: "It's not mandatory for employees to wear a mask when working inside the building,

but they must wear masks when going out. However, the City does not have enough masks to provide to employees. I appreciate Ms. Tran Dang and Mr. Andrew Pham for thinking of public servants. We now have enough masks to give two masks to each person. These reusable masks certainly are more comfortable than the N95 masks. They are washable and employees can reuse them."



> "Chúng tôi rất cảm kích vì việc làm của họ. Hai người này sống ở Garden Grove và nói họ thấy nhân viên của thành phố như các cảnh sát viên, nhân viên ra đường không đeo khẩu trang nên quyết định tặng cho thành phố," ông Phát nói.

Tất cả các thành viên của Hội đồng Thành phố sẽ tham gia cuộc họp bằng hội nghị từ xa (teleconference.) Các phòng họp sẽ được mở và sẵn sàng cho các thành viên và những người muốn tham gia cuộc họp. Tuy nhiên, trước những rủi ro về sức khỏe liên quan đến dịch COVID-19 và lệnh Thống đốc yêu cầu nên ở nhà, các thành viên công đồng được yêu cầu cân nhắc kỹ trước khi tham dự cuộc họp công khai và giữ khoảng cách sáu foot với những người khác. Cuộc họp cũng sẽ được phát trưc tiếp trên Spectrum Cable Channel tai https://ggcity.org/cgibin/city council/videos and agendas.cgi,và kênh Youtube tai <a href="https://www.youtube.com/c/GardenGroveTV3/live">https://www.youtube.com/c/GardenGroveTV3/live</a>.

Hội đồng Thành phố sẽ xem xét việc sử dụng \$1,194,311 trong quỹ CDBG và \$602,486 trong quỹ ESG để hỗ trợ cung cấp dịch vụ cho cư dân bị ảnh hưởng bởi dịch Coronavirus (Covid-19). Thành phố đang xem xét tài trợ cho các hoạt động CDBG sau đây để đối phó dịch Covid-19: mở rộng Chương trình 'Meals on Wheels' cho người cao niên; thực hiện Chương trình 'Food Pickup program' cho các gia đình; thực hiện Chương trình duy trì việc làm cho các doanh nghiệp nhỏ; mua thiết bị bảo hộ cho những người hoạt động tuyến đầu của Garden Grove; và các chương trình hành chánh khác. Các hoạt động ESG mà Thành phố sẽ thực hiện sẽ giúp ngăn chặn sự lây lan của Covid-19 trong cộng đồng người vô gia cư tại Thành phố và sẽ hướng tới việc ngăn chặn các cá nhân và gia đình trở thành vô gia cư. Tài trợ ESG sẽ cung cấp thêm quỹ cho các hoạt động sau: Tiếp cận đường phố, Hệ

thống thông tin quản lý vô gia cư, Tái định cư nhanh, Ngăn chặn vô gia cư và quản lý hành chánh.

Ngoài ra, Hội đồng Thành phố sẽ xem xét sửa đổi Kế hoạch City's Citizen Participation Plan (CCPP) để cho phép thời gian nhận xét và thông báo công khai giảm xuống còn 5 ngày khi sửa đổi Kế hoạch Hợp nhất (Consolidated Plan) hoặc AAP trong tình trạng khẩn cấp tại địa phương, liên bang hoặc quốc gia. Việc điều chỉnh để giảm thời gian nhận xét công khai xuống còn 5 ngày trong tình trạng khẩn cấp giúp Thành phố tăng khả năng ứng phó với những trường hợp khẩn cấp, trong khi vẫn tạo cơ hội cho công chúng nhận xét về các sửa đổi đối với Kế hoạch Hợp nhất và/hoặc AAP.

Across the state, local leaders continue to focus on efforts to ensure their communities are doing their part to stop the spread of COVID-19, prepare for a surge, and plan for the gradual reopening of their local economies. At the League of California Cities, we are fighting to ensure every city has the resources they need to protect their communities. We know that, in times like these, it is also important to be able to connect with each other and the experts on innovative strategies for managing city finances and cost recovery, parking requirements, emergency orders, virtual meetings, affordable housing, and more. A brief recap of important developments related to COVID-19 that you should know are below.

Cities Left Out of Interim Emergency Spending Package. Despite calls from city officials in California and nationwide, the Senate passed a \$484 billion spending package yesterday that failed to include direct and flexible aid to local governments of all sizes to help address the revenue shortfalls and increase in expenses due to COVID-19. Following the Senate vote, Senator Chuck Schumer (NY) said that robust funding for state and local governments was at the "top of the list" in a fourth package. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (CA), who also spoke after the Senate vote, called [yesterday] a "great victory" but said more would be done for state and local governments in the next bill. Pelosi said money from the CARES Act would be used to backfill lost revenue and pledged that additional money for state and local governments would be included in a final fourth package. On Twitter, President Donald Trump said: "After I sign this Bill, we will begin discussions on the next Legislative initiative with fiscal relief to State/Local Governments for lost revenue from COVID 19." On the other hand, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (KY) is

signaling that he will not support a quick pass on phase four, saying that more funding will not solve the "problem" created by the rapid spread of the coronavirus. He said, "I think it's also time to begin to think about the amount of debt we're adding to our country and the future impact of that... until we can begin to open up the economy, we can't spend enough money to solve the problem." The House is expected to take up the Senate-passed legislation on Thursday, and the President is expected to sign it. Discussions on a next package are expected to start shortly.

Until then, the League is continuing to push <u>H.R. 6467</u>, the Coronavirus Community Relief Act, and urging California House members to co-sponsor this bill. H.R. 6467 would provide \$250 billion in direct aid from the federal government to local governments with a population less than 500,000 as they face mounting challenges related to the pandemic. If you haven't already, please contact your U.S. House member and urge them to support this legislation. A sample template letter is available <u>here</u>.

The League will continue to tell the city story and make the case for direct and flexible federal aid for cities of all sizes. None of our cities should be left behind.

Assembly and Senate Budget Committees Focus on State COVID-19 Response. The Senate Special Budget Subcommittee on COVID-19 Response met last week and the Assembly Special Budget Subcommittee met earlier this week for a budget overview of the state's response. Both hearings highlighted the magnitude of the state's COVID-19 response and the costs associated with it. The Department of Finance is estimating that the state will spend \$7 billion in 2020 on its COVID-19 response and is projecting that 75 percent of this amount (\$5.25 billion) will be reimbursed by the federal government. There is great interest in how the pandemic will impact the state's reserves, but new estimates for available funds in the Rainy Day Fund will have to wait until Gov. Gavin Newsom's May Budget Revision is released next month. As far as budget allocations so far, in March the Legislature provided the Governor up to \$1 billion in funding to respond to COVID-19; he has allocated approximately \$650 million, thus far. The Governor has also transferred \$1.3 billion to the Disaster Response Emergency Operations Account, which can be used to respond quickly to emergencies, like COVID-19, bringing its balance to \$1.4 billion. In terms of funding on-going expenses associated with COVID-19, California received approximately \$26 billion in the first three federal stimulus packages, and the Administration is developing a plan for using the state's share. The state may also consider payment deferrals, shifting payments, and borrowing from specials funds to access additional resources in the short-term; the League will be monitoring these activities closely to ensure no local dollars are grabbed. The Governor has also reached out to House Speaker Nancy Pelosi requesting \$1 trillion in direct and flexible relief be provided to states and local governments in the next federal stimulus bill.

In general, lawmakers were supportive of the Governor's quick actions to contain and mitigate the spread of this deadly virus; however, it appears they want and expect more oversight and

transparency going forward. There is also a growing concern regarding the availability of resources to help local governments address the impact of COVID-19 on their communities. The Department of Finance representative who testified in the Assembly's hearing, acknowledged their awareness of the fiscal issues cities are facing. In the coming weeks, the League will make sure the state is aware of the full extent of the fiscal impact of COVID-19 on local budgets and the scale of resources needed to address the revenue shortfalls and increased expenses due to COVID-19.

Governor Announces Recovery Taskforce. To chart a path forward on recovery in the wake of COVID-19, the Governor recently <u>announced a new taskforce</u> for Business and Jobs Recovery, which includes leaders from California's economic and social sectors. Since recovery can only be realized at the local level, we are working to make sure the local government perspective is considered as part of the taskforce's efforts.

# League-Sponsored Bond Agency Issues Nearly \$252 Million in Tax-Exempt Bonds for Affordable Housing in Six Cities

April 22, 2020

Affordable apartments for low-income families and seniors in Fremont, Huntington Beach, Palm Springs, Riverside, Salinas, and San Jose are getting a facelift and funding with tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds issued by the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA).

CSCDA has set a record of closing 10 affordable housing projects during the month of April, which total \$355,150,000 in bonds to be issued, creating and preserving 1,593 affordable units. Glen Haven 2018, LP acquired Glen Haven Apartments, which include 81 multi-family affordable housing apartments for low-income residents in Fremont. Under the new ownership the apartments will continue to be 100 percent affordable. CSCDA and the project sponsor KDF Communities (KDF) partnered with Citibank and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide \$20 million tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the Glen Haven Apartments.

Hermosa 2019, LP acquired Hermosa Vista Apartments, with 88 multi-family affordable housing apartments. These apartments will also continue to be 100 percent affordable and be available to low-income residents in Huntington Beach. CSCDA and KDF partnered with Citibank and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide the \$19 million in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the development.

Huntington Pointe 2019, LP acquired Huntington Pointe Apartments, with 104 multi-family affordable housing apartments. These apartments will also continue to be 100 percent affordable and be available to low-income residents in Huntington Beach. CSCDA and KDF partnered with Citibank and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide the \$24 million in tax-exempt multifamily affordable housing bonds for the development.

Pacific Palms Apartments, LP acquired Pacific Palms, which include 140 multi-family affordable housing apartments for low-income residents in Palm Springs. Under the new ownership the apartments will continue to be 100 percent affordable. CSCDA and Spira partnered with Capital One Bank to provide \$15 million tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the Pacific Palms Apartments.

Breezewood 2019, LP acquired Breezewood Apartments, which include 157 multi-family affordable housing apartments. Under the new ownership the apartments will continue to be 100

percent affordable and available for low-income residents in Riverside. CSCDA and the project sponsor KDF partnered with Citibank and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide \$20 million tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the Breezewood Apartments.

Valley Palms 2018, LP acquired Valley Palms Apartments, which include 354 multi-family affordable housing apartments. Under the new ownership the apartments will continue to be 100 percent affordable and available for low-income residents in San Jose. CSCDA and KDF partnered with Citibank and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide \$120 million tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the Valley Palms Apartments.

Salinas Pointe 2019, LP acquired Salinas Pointe Apartments, which include 220 multi-family affordable housing apartments for low-income residents in Salinas. Under the new ownership the apartments will continue to be 100 percent affordable. CSCDA and KDF partnered with Citibank and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide \$33 million tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the Salinas Pointe Apartments.

All of these projects will undergo an extensive interior and exterior renovation, ensuring that residents have an updated, safe, and affordable community to call home for years to come. The financing of these projects will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.

The League's co-sponsorship of CSCDA continues to be a significant benefit for League members. CSCDA has issued more than \$63 billion in tax exempt bonds for projects that provide a public benefit by creating jobs, affordable housing, healthcare, infrastructure, schools, and other fundamental services.

CSCDA is a joint powers authority created in 1988 and is sponsored by the California State Association of Counties and the League of California Cities. More than 530 cities, counties, and special districts are program participants in CSCDA, which serves as their conduit issuer, and provides access to efficiently finance locally-approved projects.

# Cities Can Now Review and Comment on CalRecycle's Updated SB 1383 Regulations and Documents

Comments Due by May 20

April 22, 2020

The California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) released its revised draft of the SB 1383 regulatory text, and the final, identified list of documents it relied upon for the rulemaking, for a 30-day public review and comment period.

The official notice, including the identified list of documents relied upon, and full text of the regulation, including the newly proposed changes indicated, is available on the <u>SB 1383</u> Rulemaking website. This comment period will run from April 20-May 20.

Given the dramatic impacts that SB 1383 regulations will have on cities, the League is encouraging cities to review the new draft regulations, and provide comments to CalRecycle by the May 20 deadline. This will be the final public comment period for the SB 1383 regulations and the last opportunity for city input to be submitted into the record. City feedback is necessary to craft more implementable regulations.

In order to be compliant with Section 508 accessibility requirements, CalRecycle requests the submission of public comment letters in Microsoft Word DOC format in addition to other electronic formats (PDF, etc.).

Due to the widespread impacts of the COVID-19 public health emergency and feedback from local governments, CalRecycle issued an extended timeframe for submission of comments beyond

the minimum 15 days required by the Administrative Procedures Act to provide an adequate opportunity for stakeholders to be prepared and respond.

#### Background on SB 1383

SB 1383 (Lara, 2016) establishes targets to achieve a 50 percent reduction in the level of the statewide disposal of organic waste from the 2014 level by 2020 and a 75 percent reduction by 2025. CalRecycle is charged with implementing this bill to achieve the organic waste disposal reduction targets and establishes an additional target that not less than 20 percent of currently disposed edible food is recovered for human consumption by 2025.

#### **Next Steps**

The League has been engaged during each step of the regulations review and will be submitting comments to CalRecycle highlighting key issues of the upmost importance to cities by the May 20 deadline.

# Despite Revenue Shortfalls, Cities Remain Committed to Providing for Their Communities

April 22, 2020

With businesses shut down throughout the state, taxes and fees are coming in well below what cities were counting on, leaving city leaders with fewer dollars to pay for police officers, firefighters and other basic services.

At the same time, cities are still finding ways to deliver not only the traditional core services to residents, but also necessary COVID-19 response efforts.

Cities recognize that some communities, seniors, and the homeless, are at higher risk during the coronavirus pandemic and are working to protect their citizens and reduce the spread of the virus.

The <u>City of Arcata</u> is safely housing their homeless population by closing off two city-owned parking lots to set up tents. Within these parking lots, the city has set up tents six feet apart to maintain physical distancing while providing shelter for the homeless. These lots are able to house 15 to 19 people, and in addition to tents, the lots have portable restrooms and handwashing stations. The city is focusing on housing the homeless population without subjecting them to close living quarters to maintain the health and safety of the population during this pandemic.

The city is also working with the Department of Health and Human Services to secure hotel rooms for them. The city has successfully secured over 20 rooms and have begun moving high-risk people into hotels.

"Our work on the ground to quickly support those experiencing homelessness during the threat of COVID-19 would not have been possible without Governor Newsom's prompt action. The funds he sent to Humboldt County and our Continuum of Care are making our emergency social-distance sheltering operation in Arcata possible," explains Arcata Council Member Sofia Pereira.

The <u>City of San Francisco</u> has successfully transferred 750 people experiencing homelessness to private hotel rooms following Gov. Gavin Newsom's announcement on initiative <u>Project Roomkey</u>. <u>Stanislaus County</u> has made an agreement with Modesto hotel owners to provide housing for the at-risk homeless population throughout the pandemic. The housing priority for these cities are people over the age of 65 and those with preexisting medical conditions that make them especially vulnerable to COVID-19. Similarly, in the <u>City of Oakland</u>, 211 people have moved in to hotel rooms and dozens of state-owned trailers that were brought in to house the homeless. <u>Ontario</u> and <u>Corona</u> are using existing motel voucher programs to accelerate placement of people into

Homeless shelters in <u>San Diego</u> and <u>Los Angeles</u> were packed leading up to the pandemic and with the physical distancing order, they have had to reduce capacities. To continue to house the homeless, both cities have offered temporary housing to the homeless communities and plan to expand their efforts, with Los Angeles rolling out a plan to house 15,000 people.

With the closures of public parks, libraries, and restaurants due to COVID-19, those public restroom options are unavailable, so the <u>City of Modesto</u> has taken initiative to install portable restrooms for the homeless. The portable restrooms are placed in high-need areas within the city based on input from the Modesto Police Department and Stanislaus County's Office of Emergency Services. These portable restrooms will also have handwashing or hand sanitizer stations with the hope of reducing the spread of coronavirus.

In addition to focusing on protecting those experiencing homelessness, cities are finding ways to support senior citizens and others who may need assistance.

The Yountville Neighbor Network, which started in 2019 as part of the <u>Town of Yountville</u>'s emergency preparedness effort, has evolved and expanded to meet the new needs that have emerged as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. City staff passed out door hangers requesting people, particularly seniors, contact the network if they need assistance, and they would be matched with a volunteer who would provide help.

Getting information to communities is especially important during a crisis and much of this information is shared via social media. The <u>City of San Jacinto</u> realized that many senior citizens are not connected "virtually" and decided to use tried and true methods from the past to share vital information. The City of San Jacinto began reaching out to families with seniors that are home bound and seniors without family support by mailing out 17,000 fliers encouraging seniors to sign up to be connected with resources.

"The mayor and city council wanted to ensure the city connected with its most precious community members, our seniors, so staff quickly and creatively used the reliable U.S. Post Office to connect them to resources," stated San Jacinto City Manager Rob Johnson.

Seniors can fill out and mail the fliers back to the city or go online to register to receive the resource information. This program connects seniors with the Family Services Association and the Salvation Army which delivers food and household essentials to seniors.

The <u>City of El Centro</u> has worked hard to get information to residents through special meetings, which are livestreamed twice weekly on social platforms in both English and Spanish, to keep the community updated on city operations and updates throughout the coronavirus pandemic. El

Centro has included leaders from El Centro Regional Medical Center (ECRMC) in the meetings to help address questions from city council and the public and provide reassurance.

As we enter the second month of physical distancing, the City of Goleta is working to uplift spirits and promote positive images within their community by launching the #GoodLandGoodPeople photo campaign. The campaign calls community members to send in photos on how families and residents are staying busy and positive during this time, as well as photos of people in the community that are bravely working to provide for our country, including city staff, medical professionals, grocery store workers, and first responders.

As cities work to provide resources and information to their residents, the League continues to update the <u>coronavirus resource and response webpage</u> as a resource for city leaders. Daily updates on COVID-19 news, resources, and guidance specifically geared toward local officials will help local governments navigate the current situation and is updated as new developments occur.
