



- Addressed Municipal Code violations at 1,681 properties in low- and moderate-income neighborhoods
- Section 8 rental assistance to 2,337 tenant households
- Homeless prevention and intervention to help 1,386 persons avoid or recover from homelessness
- Assisted 1,007 seniors with services and meal delivery
- Reduction of crime in gang activity hot spots in low- and moderate-income areas.

HUD requires local jurisdictions to make the CAPER available to the public for examination and comment for at least 15 days. A public notice published on August 15 and 16 advertised a public comment period to conclude with this public hearing before City Council. The Neighborhood Improvement and Conservation Commission held a meeting on September 9, 2013 to accept public comments.


#### FINANCIAL IMPACT

The CAPER reports accomplishments using \$5,234,700 of CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds during FY 2012-13 in accordance with the 2012-13 Action Plan previously approved by City Council. Expenditures enabled the City to provide a higher level of services to its low/moderate-income residents and neighborhoods.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Hold a Public Hearing to hear and issue comments concerning the FY 2012-13 CAPER; and
- Accept the report and direct its transmission to HUD.


