GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENT NO. GPA-002-2023 AMENDMENT NO. A-037-2023

The Garden Grove Planning Commission will hold a public hearing and consider a recommendation that the City Council: (i) adopt a General Plan Amendment (GPA-002-2023), which includes updates to the adopted 2021-2029 Housing Element and to amend the General Plan Land Use Designation of a property located at 13621 Harbor Boulevard (Assessor's Parcel No. 100-123-01), from Industrial (I) to International West Mixed Use (IW); and (ii) adopt a Zoning Map amendment (A-037-2023) to revise the Zoning Map to implement the updates to the Housing Element and to clarify the sites intended to be included in the International West Mixed Use Overlay and the Industrial/Residential Mixed Use 1 Overlay, pursuant to Ordinance No. 2925. \$750,000 for 'Rails to Trails'

Another segment of the planned "Rails to Trails" project connecting cyclists and pedestrians from Garden Grove with Santa Ana has been filled in. Financially, anyway.

On Tuesday Rep Lou Correa (D-Santa Ana) and Orange County Transportation Authority officials announced \$750,000 in federal funding to support what's officially called the "Santa Ana-Garden Grove Rails to Trails Gap Closure Project."

Upon completion it would seek to connect the existing bicycle and pedestrian path between Nelson and Brookhurst streets southeast along the former Pacific Electric rail right-of-way to link up with the Santa Ana River Trail, which runs north to Orange and south to Huntington Beach.

Someone on a bike or on foot would eventually be able to go from one downtown to another without generating any greenhouse gas emissions. It's called the "Rails to Trials" because it would allow people to bike or walk to the Santa Ana Transportation Center or board the under construction OC Streetcar.

This grant won't be enough to finish the job; the original request was for \$3 million. But it's considered another step – or turn of the wheels – forward.

Kittens saved; eight lives left

He started a company that moves people and their worldly goods. She moves people by helping kids to learn by reading as well as almost non-stop volunteering.

Joe Hammer and Andrea Palladino Perez on Friday evening were celebrated as Garden Grove's 2023-2024 Man and Woman of the Year at the 116th Annual Garden Grove Chamber of Commerce Gala Dinner and Awards.

Hammer and Perez are both longtime volunteers in the city, and the list of the organizations they have been involved with is quite lengthy. Hammer has been a member of the Garden Grove Rotary Club for more than two decades and has also served on the board of directors of the Garden Grove Community Foundation, Acacia Adult Day Services, and the Garden Grove Chamber of Commerce. "Volunteering is a very good way to help your neighbors," he said. "It's very fulfilling."

Perez is the immediate past president of the Garden Grove Strawberry Festival Association, served as a member of the Garden Grove Neighborhood Association for several years, and currently sits on the city's Parks, Recreation, and Arts Commission. She also works in the library at Garden Park Elementary School (part of the Garden Grove Unified School District) and has been involved in local PTA activities at various levels since 2005.

She is the immediate past vice chair of the GGUSD's special education community advisory committee and has been part of the Lamplighter Guild at Children's Hospital of Orange County for 11 years, where she assists with fundraising. "I wear so many hats," she said. "I just love volunteering and can't imagine my life without it. It's all about community and it makes you feel good."

Both honorees expressed surprise when informed of being chosen as Man and Woman of the Year. "I have a hard time wrapping my brain around it," Perez said. "I'm touched and honored." When asked why he thought he was chosen for the award, Joe Hammer laughed and jokingly said, "I have no idea. I've made an awful lot of friends in Garden Grove. I guess someone put my name on the ballot and too many people voted for me."


Perez, who has lived in Garden Grove for 30 years, talked about why she feels the city is special. "Everyone supports one another and it's like everyone is connected. There is such a true feeling

of community." Hammer's business (California Relocation Services) moved to Garden Grove in 1995, and he told us why he has enjoyed volunteering in the community for nearly three decades. "I've wanted the community and the city to do well, and I've always been one who wants to help others. It's the right thing to do."

Both honorees agree that volunteering in the community is very impactful. "You never know how the smallest thing you may do might touch someone's life," she said.

He "Cook-ed" up a new city

Garden Grove was founded in 1874, making next year the 150th anniversary of the establishment of the community. This is the first in a series of articles about the early days of the founding, excerpted from the book by Jim Tortolano.

In Garden Grove, Alonzo Gerry Cook is granted the status of founder of the community, father of his municipal country, as it were.

An elementary school is named after him. There's a giant photo of him hanging in City Hall, and a bronze statue in Civic Center Park. He looks a little surprised at all the fuss he's kicked up.

But like a lot of city founders in the post-cattle era of what would become Orange County, Cook was more of a speculator than he was a community-builder. He spent only about six years in Garden Grove, and claims that he established the community and invented its name are open to considerable variation of opinion.

There is also some confusion over just when the village was started, although 1874 is usually given as the year. It is certainly true that other American families preceded Cook to the area

that would become Garden Grove, and that there were settlers here as early as 1869, by some accounts.

Records and memories are sketchy, but the best information has John Mitchell as the first permanent settler in Garden Grove, arriving sometime in the late 1860s, and securing a deed to an 80-acre site at which is now the southwest corner of Cannery Road and Garden Grove Boulevard, quite a distance from the townsite that would spring up around what's now called Main Street.

Other families followed and small clusters of homes and farms began to dot the landscape. If Cook was not the literal pioneer of the community, he was certainly the man who helped give it a focus.

Cook was probably born in 1842, although some sources state 1839. "Probably" is a good word to employ heavily in this time and place, as identities, ages and addresses had a way of shifting under pressure in the Old West.

Garden Grove's titular founder has been variously described as a medical doctor, an attorney, a farmer and what would certainly today be considered a developer. He ran for the California state Assembly and reportedly worked as a probate judge in Idaho and a government attorney in Washington state, both territories at the time.

What brought he and his wife Belle to the Santa Ana Valley in 1874 is lost in the mists of time. What is certain is that when he left about a half-dozen short years later there was a crossroads village, a school district and a church – all the yeast and flour of the community that would eventually become a suburban metropolis.

It's easy to think of Orange County's boom as having taken place in the late 1940s and 1950s. In truth, the area has long had a series of boom-and-bust cycles. This was just the first. In fact, it wasn't even an Orange County boom – the partition of this region from Los Angeles County didn't take place until 1889.

In 1874 he came into possession of a 160-acre (later 200-acre) plot of land in the future Garden Grove. Today the boundaries would roughly be Lampson Avenue and Garden Grove Boulevard north and south, with Euclid (now Main) Street and Nutwood Street east and west.

The land had been purchased by C.E. Palmer, who sold it to Cook for the sum of \$2,280. Soon buildings began to rise, although the location of the Cook home is subject to dispute.

In "The History of Garden Grove," written by H.C. Head and published in 1939, Cook lived in a brightly-painted two-story wooden frame building a short distance west of what is now Main Street.

But in "The Village of Garden Grove," author Leroy Doig places Cook in a one-story "California" house at the southeast corner of Nelson Street and Lampson Avenue. Presumably a man of many vocations and talents had more than one address.

Readers interested in researching the history of the community will receive an interesting lesson on local geography. Garden Grove Boulevard, for instance, has been variously known as The Westminster Road and Ocean Boulevard.

Euclid was once called The Anaheim Road, not to be confused with Anaheim Boulevard.

If the names of the roadways offer an interesting study in ambiguity, the naming of the community also allows considerable room for speculation.

Mrs. J.D. Price, one of the community's pioneers, said that Cook named the newly-planted school district Garden Grove, which applied itself to the village.

In subsequent years the story has arisen that some early settlers expressed skepticism about using such a grandiose name for the flat, featureless and largely uncultivated plains that spread out in every direction.

The story has Cook replying, "Then we'll make it appropriate by planting trees and gardens." And Garden Grove did soon become a garden and a grove, serving as an agricultural center for the next 80 years or so.

Even the suburban sprawl that displaced the orange trees has a verdant look to it. Drive along Lampson Avenue (especially between Brookhurst and Magnolia streets, for example) and you'll find yourself traveling under a leafy canopy of many varieties of lush, mature trees.

Cruise along the Garden Grove Freeway as it rises above the tree-line and it looks like someone scattered a bunch of cars, houses and streets in the midst of an evergreen forest.

California Supreme Court ruling leaves voting rights lawsuit unresolved

Aug 30, 2023

A recent ruling by the California Supreme Court provided little clarity on a long-running legal battle over Santa Monica's election system. The <u>case centers</u> on whether the city's at-large election system dilutes the voting power of Latino voters. The plaintiffs argue that the city should adopt district-based voting.

The Supreme Court held that a lower court failed to properly evaluate the plaintiffs' claim that Santa Monica's election system violated the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA). The Supreme Court provided a more nuanced test and sent the case back to the lower court for further proceedings.

The League of California Cities had urged the Supreme Court to adopt clear guidelines so that cities could evaluate their election system without fear of unjustified litigation. Despite the overall disappointing and unclear result, there are a couple of helpful takeaways for cities.

Case background

In the initial 2016 lawsuit, a trial court agreed with the plaintiffs and ordered Santa Monica to switch to a district-based election system. The city appealed the decision, and the Court of Appeal reversed it. The Court of Appeal concluded that the plaintiffs failed to prove unlawful vote dilution.

The plaintiffs showed a potential increase in Latino voting power from 14% under the atlarge system to 30% in one district under the district-based system. However, the Court of Appeal concluded this was not unlawful vote dilution. It reasoned that 30% is not enough to change the outcome of an election: The CVRA only prohibits at-large election systems if they "impair the ability of a protected class to elect candidates of its choice or its ability to influence the outcome of an election."

The California Supreme Court reviewed the case to resolve what a plaintiff must prove to establish unlawful vote dilution.

What did the Supreme Court say?

The Supreme Court rejected the Court of Appeal's reasoning. The Supreme Court pointed out that local elections are nonpartisan and that candidates can win with only a plurality — not a majority — of votes. It also noted that the CVRA was passed to make it

easier to challenge at-large election systems using state law as opposed to federal law. Thus, a plaintiff does not need to prove that the protected class would make up a majority or near-majority of a district to establish unlawful vote dilution.

Rather, to prove that an at-large elections system impairs the ability of a protected minority "to elect candidates of its choice," a plaintiff must show that "under some alternative electoral system, the protected class would have the potential, on its own or with the help of crossover voters, to elect its preferred candidate."

In assessing whether a plaintiff has met this standard, courts must review the facts and circumstances as a whole, "including the characteristics of the specific locality, its electoral history, and an intensely local appraisal of the design and impact" of the contested election system and potential alternative systems. The Supreme Court also encouraged courts to "consider the experiences of other similar jurisdictions that use alternative electoral systems."

What does this ruling say or not say about CVRA violations?

The Supreme Court's opinion does lay out the standard for reviewing claims of unlawful dilution of a protected minority group's ability to "elect candidates of its choice." However, the standard is fact-based and complex. Since the lawsuit is ongoing, it remains uncertain what evidence might persuade a court that a city's at-large elections system has led to unlawful voter dilution.

Moreover, the ruling left a significant question unanswered. The Court stated that it was not deciding "the scope of the ability-to-influence prong" in this case. Therefore, it is unclear what might give rise to a successful claim that an at-large elections system unlawfully dilutes the ability of a protected minority group to "influence the outcome of an election" as opposed to "electing candidates of its choice."

Despite this lack of clarity, the opinion did provide a couple of tangible takeaways. The Court rejected the suggestion that a CVRA violation could be proven simply by showing that racially polarized voting was occurring. The Court held that a plaintiff must prove vote dilution *and* racially polarized voting to establish a violation of the CVRA. "Racially polarized voting" means that there is a marked difference between the electoral choices of voters in a protected class versus the choices of the rest of the electorate.

The Supreme Court further noted that a plaintiff must show that the incremental gain in a protected class's ability to elect its candidate of choice in such districts would not be offset by a loss of the class's potential to elect its candidates of choice elsewhere in the locality. Santa Monica has suggested that moving to district elections might leave Latinos with less voting power. The Supreme Court's conclusion on this point suggests that the city could still prevail in the case if they can make that showing.

It is unknown how long it will take for the Court of Appeal to decide the case. Cal Cities will report on significant developments and may consider filing additional amicus briefs if appropriate. City leaders with questions about the ruling should consult their city attorney.



Cal Cities-sponsored bond agency issues over \$5 million in affordable bonds for housing

The California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) issued \$5,968,922 in affordable housing bonds for the city of Twentynine Palms.

Twentynine Palms Apartments is the acquisition and rehabilitation of 48 one-, two-, and three-bedroom affordable housing apartments. The apartments will remain 100% affordable to very low and low-income residents. The apartments will undergo extensive interior and exterior renovation so that residents have an updated, safe, and affordable community to call home for years to come.

CSCDA partnered with Twentynine Palms and others for the acquisition of the properties and issuance of bonds. The financing of Twentynine Palms Apartments will maintain the affordability of units for very low and low-income tenants for an additional 55 years.

Cycling on sidewalk bill puts pedestrians at risk

Protecting pedestrians from speeding bikes could get a lot more difficult next year. Lawmakers are pushing a bill that would remove cities' authority to prohibit cycling on certain sidewalks.

The measure, AB 825 (Bryan), is expected to move to the Assembly this week for concurrence. The League of California Cities opposes the bill.

Asm. Bryan introduced AB 825 to reduce unnecessary stops of people of color. A *Los Angeles Times* investigation found that the LA County sheriff's deputies pulled over Latino cyclists at a disproportionate rate compared to other riders.

However, this bill would do so to the detriment of public safety and open cities up to new legal risks. Cities would also need to make costly, potentially unnecessary investments in cycling infrastructure.

What would AB 825 specifically do?

If passed, AB 825 would stop cities from restricting cycling on a sidewalk when a proper bike lane does not exist (Class I, Class II, or Class IV bikeways). The only exceptions are Business Activity Districts and streets with a posted speed limit of 20 mph or lower.

AB 825 ignores well-documented safety risks — including those reported by <u>federal and state agencies</u> — associated with shared sidewalks. Cyclists can go too fast, lose control, and collide with a pedestrian. This can be even more dangerous for <u>vulnerable populations</u>, including the disabled, elderly, and younger children. This is especially true when a cyclist is approaching from behind.

Previously, the bill contained some protections for pedestrians, including a maximum speed limit for cyclists on sidewalks. The author recently eliminated that provision, along with a requirement that cyclists yield the right-of-way to pedestrians, making the bill far worse than its earlier iterations.

To avoid litigation, cities would need to adopt an ordinance — containing findings from studies — requiring cyclists to ride safely and reasonably, as well as yield the right-of-way to pedestrians. They would also need to make costly and possibly unwarranted investments in new bike lanes.

Even if cities made those investments, they could still be open to new legal risks. The bill would make it easier for the plaintiff (pedestrian) and the defendant (cyclist) to sue

the city when there is a collision. A court would then need to decide what is "reasonable," such as undulations on an aging sidewalk caused by tree roots.

Discounted Zero-Emission Lawn Equipment Available for Residents and Commercial Landscapers and Gardeners



There are two South Coast AQMD programs that help clean the air through the replacement of gasoline and diesel-powered lawn and garden equipment.

The Commercial Electric Lawn and Garden Equipment Incentive & Exchange Program is available for commercial landscapers and gardeners operating within South Coast AQMD's region. This program is also open to local governments, school districts, colleges and non-profits. Commercial lawn and garden equipment will be made available at a discounted price of up to 85% off through pre-authorized retailers. Equipment available through this program includes handheld trimmers, chainsaws, pruners, backpack and handheld blowers and ride-on, stand-on and walk-behind lawnmowers. An equivalent operable gasoline or diesel-powered piece of lawn or garden equipment must be scrapped when the new battery-electric equipment is purchased.

Additionally, the agency has a Residential Electric Lawn Mower Rebate Program available for eligible residents within South Coast AQMD's area to receive a rebate of up to \$250 with the purchase of a

cordless, battery-electric lawn mower. An operable, gasoline-powered lawn mower must be scrapped to be eligible for the rebate.

These programs are available to all eligible participants who work or reside within the South Coast AQMD's four-county jurisdiction. For more information visit www.aqmd.gov/mower.

Register for South Coast AQMD's Free Air Quality Education Programs for Elementary, Middle and High School Students

South Coast AQMD's free air quality educations programs, Why Healthy Air Matters (WHAM) and the Clean Air Program for Elementary Students (CAPES) are open for registration for the 2023-24 school year. The programs were created to generate awareness of local air quality issues to elementary, middle and high school students.

The WHAM program introduces students to academic and career paths they can take to help clean the air. Students learn about air quality through a hands-on science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) based curriculum. There are four lessons featuring air quality topics such as: regulations and public policy, chemistry, health impacts, sources of air pollution and clean air solutions. This curriculum, aligned with Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), is flexible to fit inperson, hybrid, and/or distance learning. In Orange County, schools in Fountain Valley, Fullerton, Garden Grove, Huntington Beach, Mission Viejo and Santa Ana have been participating in WHAM.

CAPES is geared toward first through sixth grade students. The program educates students about the importance of clean air, health impacts and actions students can take to improve air quality. Educators

participating in this program are provided with short videos and an NGSS-aligned curriculum kit that includes lesson plans, worksheets and answer keys. Locally, schools in Buena Park, Huntington Beach,



Orange, and Santa Ana have been participating in CAPES. The air quality education programs have collectively reached more than 31,000 students since their inception in 2019. Last school year, WHAM was implemented in a total of 409 classrooms in 70 high schools and 45



middle schools within South Coast AQMD's jurisdiction, reaching more than 10,000 middle and high school aged students. CAPES was implemented in a total of 90 schools, reaching more than 6,000 students throughout South Coast AQMD's jurisdiction. Both programs are available at no cost for eligible schools, youth groups, clubs and organizations. If you have heart or lung disease (such as asthma), consult your doctor to make a plan and keep 5+ days of medication on hand.

The Story of Two Trees

The first tree planted at Stanley House after it was moved to its present location from the middle of the orange grove was the black walnut, one of which is still standing in the courtyard. It was a seedling from a black walnut that had been planted near the house at its previous location. The mother tree was reported to be grown from a seed from George Washington's estate (but, like much legend, this has yet to be verified). The seedling was cared for by students in a horticulture class at Rancho Alamitos High School prior to planting as a three-foot tree in 1972. The picture shown at right was taken 34 years later, showing Bill and Jan Null's great grandson circling the tree.

The second tree on today's Ranch was a pepper tree donated by the Nulls and planted next to the barn. At that time, farm equipment was displayed in front of the tree. The 1973 photo shows farm equipment along the right edge, next to Bill and Jan and their son, Kip, nattily attired in period costume.

The pepper tree has grown up (and out), now providing welcome shade to the Barn Sale



cashiers, just to the west side of the barn. When you visit the sale in October, take a moment to admire this fifty-year-old remnant of the early days of the Stanley Ranch.
