Enclosed is the April 2016 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and The pie chart reflects the investment instruments as a Investment Report. percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City investment policy. As of April 2016, the City invested 18.388% of its total portfolio in treasury securities and 45.281% in federally backed securities. 27.537% of the portfolio or \$59.902 million is invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) managed by the California State Treasurer. A portion of the investment portfolio is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of April 2016, 8.794% of the portfolio is restricted. Please see chart on attachment A.

In summary, the investment portfolio is secured and the City has the necessary cash to pay its bills for six months in a timely manner.



VIETNAM WAR MUSEUM OF AMERICA FOUNDATION

OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this report is to transmit information to the City Council regarding recent actions by the Vietnam War Museum of America Foundation (VWMAF) and the pending dissolution of that non-profit organization.

BACKGROUND

In August 2015, following a recommendation from a City Council Sub-Committee, the City Council voted to suspend their financial support of the VWMAF until the Foundation could return to the City Council demonstrating that they had both 1) significantly grown their Board and 2) could provide evidence that they were receiving substantial monetary donations to the Foundation outside of the City of Garden Grove.

Since that time, the VWMAF has continued to lose vital members of their Board, making it difficult to gather a quorum for the meetings needed to allow for the continuation of the Foundation. Pursuant to a recommendation from City legal counsel, staff held a conference call in which all of the remaining Board members participated.

DISCUSSION

The results of that conference call were as follows:

- The Board voted to dissolve the Foundation and file all necessary paperwork with the Secretary of State;
- Pay all outstanding debts and liabilities; and
- Forward all remaining assets to a 501(c)3 Tax Exempt Organization. The VWMAF identified that they will be forwarding their assets to the Garden Grove Community Foundation, to be used as a pass-thru to the City's Community Services Department. The Foundation requested that the funds be used toward a capital improvement project for the creation of a Veterans Memorial or park improvement.

SUMMARY

Staff will assist with the following actions to dissolve the VWMAF:

- Obtain a letter from the Secretary of State agreeing to the proposed distribution of Foundation assets;
- File closing Tax Returns with the IRS and Franchise Tax Board on behalf of the Corporation; and
- File a Certification of Dissolution with the California Secretary of State.

Staff will work with both the Garden Grove Community Foundation and Public Works Department to identify a viable capital improvement project for use of the VWMAF's assets.

FINANCIAL REPORT

OBJECTIVE

To provide the City Council with the Vietnamese Community of Southern California (VNCSC) financial report summarizing the income and expenditures for the 2015 Tet Festival at Garden Grove Park.

BACKGROUND

In October 2014, the City entered into a one-year Agreement with the Vietnamese Community of Southern California (VNCSC), to allow VNCSC to conduct the 2015 Tet Festival at Garden Grove Park. As part of the Agreement with the City, the VNCSC was required to complete a financial report prepared by an acceptable Certified Public Accountant (CPA) approved by the City, to review the income and expenditures in connection with the festival and related activities. Additionally, the VNCSC was required to distribute a percentage of net proceeds from the festival to the community in the form of grants.

DISCUSSION

Pursuant to City Council direction and as part of the Agreement, attached is the financial report from the VNCSC for the 2015 Tet Festival at Garden Grove Park.

In reviewing the information provided on the financial report, the VNCSC did not fully comply with all financial reporting provisions outlined in the Agreement. For the festival related expenditures, there were a significant number of transactions of which supporting documents were not provided to the CPA. Additionally, there were no supporting documents provided to the CPA for the income collected by VNCSC for festival activities.

The report details that the VNCSC's net profit for the festival was \$17,798. VNCSC has informed the City that the organization did not have any revenue following the festival activities, and that VNCSC is unable to pay the outstanding balance due to the City in the amount of \$27,577. This outstanding balance is part of the total cost 2015 TET FESTIVAL FINANCIAL REPORT June 9, 2016 Page 2

of \$77,577, for the City's direct and indirect costs attributable to the operation of the festival.

The Agreement also includes provisions related to the distribution of proceeds. Based on the net profit for this event, and the outstanding balance due to the City, it has been determined by the City and VNCSC that there are no proceeds available to be distributed to the community in grants.

SUMMARY

Attached is the Tet Festival 2015 financial report from the VNCSC. According to this report, it was determined that there were no proceeds available from the 2015 Tet Festival at Garden Grove Park to be distributed to the community in grants. Additionally, the VNCSC did not comply with the financial reporting provisions outlined in the Agreement for the 2015 Tet Festival.

INTERNAL CONTROL DEFICIENCIES

A comprehensive system of authorization did not exist to insure that payments to independent contractors were supported by vendor invoices. Cash deposits totaling \$192,164, was unsupported as to source, in its entirety.

Cash disbursements in the amount of \$98,080 were unsupported by vendor invoices, representing 56% of total disbursements of \$174,366.

NON-COMPLIANCE WITH INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR REPORTING LAWS AND REGULATIONS

No evidence was made available that would indicate that required forms 1099 had been prepared and issued to independent contractors for the calendar year 2014.

NOTE 1 – NATURE AND PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Vietnamese Community of Southern California ("VNCSC") is a non-profit corporation that is organized under the non-profit public benefit corporation law for public and charitable purposes. VNCSC is composed of individuals from the Southern California area. The VNCSC's goal is to:

- Bring together individuals in order to build unity and solidarity between Vietnamese citizens in Southern California.
- Represent the diverse and dynamic Vietnamese population by encouraging interaction, participation, and activism in the Vietnamese American Community.
- Promote awareness of the Vietnamese culture, language, and history.
- Encourage a growth of leadership and service amongst Vietnamese people.

Functioning as a non-profit organization, VNCSC services the Vietnamese American Community of Southern California, working collaboratively with groups to promote community service, cultural awareness, and leadership. As a means to accomplish these objectives, VNCSC provides opportunities, such as the annual Tet Festival, for individuals to learn more about their heritage, while, at the same time, serving the community at large.

The net proceeds from the Tet Festival are not only to be used to support VNCSC's non-profit activities throughout the year, but also are to be used to award other charity and non-profit organizations in the local community.

NOTE 2 – REVENUE AND EXPENSES

VNCSC's policy is to prepare its statement of revenue received and expenses paid, and the statement of community assistance payments on the cash basis of accounting; consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received, rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when paid, rather when the liabilities are incurred. Accordingly, such accompanying statements are not intended to be presented in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

NOTE 3 – INCOME TAXES

VNCSC is organized and operated exclusively for charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and is exempt from income taxes for all activities that do not generate unrelated business income (UBI).

NOTE 4 - COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS

In accordance with the agreement with the City of Garden Grove in November 2014, the Tet Festival event for the year 2015, VNCSC must distribute 50% of its revenue over expenses to local not-for-profit, non-political community groups that serve Southern California residents. These distributions were to be made within 150 days after the event of the current year. No evidence exists to indicate that payments were made to community groups for the year ended August 31, 2015.

It's a crowd for second place in the 46th

Only Lou Correa is a lock for the November ballot. About 1,000 votes separate the next three candidates.

With hundreds of thousands of ballots still being counted in Orange County, the dogfight intensified Wednesday in the race to fill the 46th Congressional District seat vacated by Loretta Sanchez.

One part of the 46th race isn't in doubt: Former state senator Lou Correa holds an overwhelming lead and is almost certain to be the first-place finisher.

"I had to remind people who I was and what I was about, and they remembered me," Correa said Wednesday.

But the contest to finish second, and secure the right to face Correa in the November general election, remains intense.

About 1,000 votes separate Republican Bob Peterson, an Orange County Sheriff's Department commander, Democratic Garden Grove Mayor Bao Nguyen and Democratic former state Sen. Joe Dunn. Peterson had the second-place lead; Dunn is fourth. A final tally is expected before June 20.

Peterson's hold on second place is surprising, given that he is a Republican in a central Orange County district that has a 21 percentage-point Democratic Party advantage in voter registration. Peterson also raised the least of the front-runners at \$25,600, compared with Correa's \$431,000.

Peterson, 48, said Wednesday he expects to hold his advantage and is confident he can raise the money to take on Correa.

"I'm OK losing. I'm just not OK not trying," said Peterson, taking a break from a Sheriff's Department retirement ceremony.

"It's a modern day David and Goliath as far as the money goes."

The race marks Peterson's first foray into elected politics. He argues that his experience as a top-level leader with a major law enforcement agency gives him the skills to go to Washington, D.C.

He sets himself apart from the Democrats in the race on several issues. Unlike the Democrats, he opposes a federal limit on gun magazine capacity, opposes an increase in the federal minimum wage and opposes California's law allowing transgender students to be treated accordingly in terms of transgender students to be treated accordingly in terms of bathroom and locker room use.

Nguyen, 35, is a Vietnamese refugee with degrees in political science and Indo-Tibetan Buddhist studies. He served on the Garden Grove Unified School District board from 2011 to 2014, when he became the first openly gay directly elected mayor in Orange County.

Nguyen says he knows to be patient with voters, after his experience winning the mayor's post. In that election, the polls closed with Nguyen losing. But after the final ballots were counted, Nguyen had won.

"I am familiar with waiting," Nguyen said.

Dunn, 58, served in the state Senate from 1998 to 2006. He was fired from his job leading the state bar in 2014 after an internal report found he misled board members about the use of bar money. Dunn denied the accusation and filed a wrongful-termination suit. He could not be reached Wednesday for a comment.


Two males were caught in the act by police and surveillance video trying to break into a pharmacy in Garden Grove early Wednesday morning.

A veritable feast of trumpets

The 41st annual conference of the International Trumpet Guild spends the week in Garden Grove.

In case you hadn't heard, there are a whole lot of trumpeters in town this week. They launched the International Trumpet Guild's 41st annual conference Tuesday evening with a recordbreaking performance of John Williams' "Olympic Fanfare" behind the Hyatt Regency Orange County in Garden Grove. A total of 350 trumpet players showed up to play it; none other than Doc Severinsen conducted.

The five-day conference,

which ends today, is gathering trumpet players from around the world, both famous and garden variety. The jam-packed schedule includes panel discussions, lecture recitals, academic presentations, concerts, master classes and competitions, morning, noon and night. Exhibitors have taken over two floors of the hotel, showing off their latest model instruments, mouthpieces, mutes, cases and music.

After taking in the earsplitting fanfare Tuesday, I

attended several conference events later in the week. Choosing what to see and hear can be a problem, as many events occur simultaneously in different parts of the hotel. The program brochure, which runs to Il8 closely printed pages, lists many tantalizing possibilities, from quirky to nerdy to surprising. Early one morning, for instance, a conference attendee might get things started with the "Yoga for Trumpets" session.

Or maybe you feel the need to learn more about "Thai Composers and Their Works for Trumpet," a lecture recital presented by Surasi Chanoksakul, principal trumpet of the Thailand Philharmonic Orchestra. For younger trumpet players (presumably), Logan Place, of Southeastern Louisiana University, was presenting "Trumpet Playing and Braces: Issues and Solutions."

Charles Daval's lecture recital on "Notable Cornet Soloists of the Sousa Band" might at first seem obscure, but it proved a fascinating look at a time when cornet soloists were as famous as popular singers.

Denny Schreffler told me about his presentation on "Herald Trumpeting: On Stage and at the Track," which examined the role of the "long horn" – those trumpets with extended bells – at horse races and on the opera stage. Now retired, Schreffler is an experienced horse track bugler who has made a study of the genre.

"Yes, the traditional one is called 'Call to the Post,' or 'First Call,' "he said of the most familiar fanfare heard at the track. "It's a military bugle call that was actually used to alert the bu-

glers that they needed to bugle."

The herald trumpet also brought Schreffler work in onstage opera bands (think "Aida" and "Lohengrin"), Renaissance fairs and any event requiring pageantry. "I'd make more for playing 10 seconds at a wedding reception than the guy who played the wedding made," Schreffler said.

"There are acres of exhibitors," Richard Birkemeier, artist chair of the conference, warned me, and he was right. Up a level, room after room was filled with gleaming instruments from boutique makers and big manufacturers, trumpeters everywhere trying them out, tootling and screeching and not shy about it. A trumpet is a trumpet, you might think, but seen, and heard. here - including beautiful silver cornets and ornate rotary valve trumpets - is to experience the glorious variety of the instrument,

The loud exhibitors rooms seemed proof of the theory that different types of instrumentalists have distinctive personalities.

"Trumpet players tend to be very outgoing, sort of type A, maybe double A, personalities," Birkemeier said.

"And I would say they have a generally positive outlook on life, and for the most part they tend to be fearless, maybe to a fault," he added, laughing. "You can't play the trumpet if you're worried too much about sticking out and being the star of the show."

Charles Leinberger, a professor of music at the University of Texas in El Paso, was scheduled today to give one of the conference's more curious presentations, "'Degüello,' No Mercy for the Losers: The Enduring Role of the Solo Trumpet in the Soundtrack of the Old West."

The "Degüello," Leinberger explains, was a bugle call the Mexican troops played before attacking the Alamo. A version of it, composed by Dimitri Tiomkin, shows up in the John Wayne movie "Rio Bravo" and then again in "The Alamo." Trumpet solos subsequently began showing up at climactic moments of many Westerns after that, including spaghetti Westerns.


"It's pretty well documented that Sergio Leone the director was influenced by the music that Dimitri Tiomkin wrote from 'Rio Bravo,' "Leinberger said. With film clips, Leinberger will trace the history of those cinematic trumpet solos, as well as the trumpet soloists, from 1958's "Cowboy," through Clint Eastwood's "Dollars Trilogy," to "The Quick and the Dead" and beyond. "No one has taken it back as far as I have, if I could be so bold," Leinberger said.

Not all was trumpet-centric. In a master class, the great Cuban jazz trumpeter Arturo Sandoval told jokes, improvised on the piano (astonishingly so; it's his daily warmup, he said) and demonstrated a little device with valves with which he can practice silently on airplanes. Though prodded by trumpeters in attendance, he didn't really want to get into matters of technique.

"It's better to be a so-so technician and a good musician," rather than vice versa, he said, advice that anyone can take to heart.


Giving Vietnamese designers their due

Viet Fashion Week event in Westminster shines a light on people not always recognized for their creations while introducing collections to a wider audience.

ucked behind the Westminster
Mall on a recent weekend was a
tent, plain white, nondescript.
But inside the 8,000-squarefoot structure was a flurry of
sequins, tulle, stilettos, jewels and
thumping dance music, where
500 people in suits and ball gowns gathered for
the third annual Viet Fashion Week, whose mission is to showcase high-end Vietnamese and
Vietnamese American designers.

The two-day event, attended by nearly 1,000 people including the mayors of Garden Grove and Westminster, featured seven designers, four performers, more than 80 models and a red

carpet.

"Creating this platform has not only opened up the Vietnamese community to seeing fashion in a different light, but also our designers get to branch out into the mainstream," said Tracy Pham, Viet Fashion Week's executive producer.

On the first night, the collections spanned traditional to avant-garde ao dai, the Vietnamese national costume made up of a fitted, long-sleeve tunic worn over wide-legged pants; contemporary business and evening wear; and Western-style wedding gowns.

Son Minh Luong, a Vietnamese designer, showcased his collection of richly colored evening gowns and ao dai made of silk, sequins and

rhinestones.

"They're considered traditional because he didn't do much to the sleeves or bodice, just embellished them," explained Pham.

The ao dai in the Son Collection featured bold, contrasting colors — a green tunic over yellow pants, a purple tunic over red pants and a turquoise tunic over orange pants — with flashy gold rhinestones and sequins around the neck line.

Calvin Hiep, owner of Westminster-based Hyp Fashion and Beauty, also featured ao dai in his

Dripping Gold collection — but with an avant-garde twist.

"The idea of modernizing the traditional dress has been around for a while, but American designers took it to the next level," said the creative director of Viet Fashion Week, Viktor Nguyen-Lieu, who goes by Viktor NL. "I feel like this is unlike a lot of other cultures, which keep their cultural outfit very traditional."

Dripping Gold showed off tunics that were risqué and often sheer or sleeveless — one was made of melted-down plastic and painted gold to give the effect of flames — and instead of loosefitting pants, they were worn over bodysuits to show off the model's entire leg.

"He creates amazing collections that blow people's minds when you see them," Pham said

about Hiep.

Viet Fashion Week is the brainchild of Pham, a fashion industry veteran and director of the Huntington Beach-based modeling agency Runway Entertainment.

Pham came up with the idea after seeing that many Vietnamese designers weren't getting the same opportunities as their white counterparts.

"I worked with so many Vietnamese designers that didn't have the advantage of mainstream exposure," she said. "I saw them struggle to create a brand and a name for themselves."

So Pham approached some of the designers she knew about hosting a fashion event to specifically highlight Vietnamese and Vietnamese American designers.

"They all said, 'Oh my god, I would love that,' " Pham recalled. The first Viet Fashion Week was

launched in 2013.

"Our goal was to preserve our culture and art through fashion," Pham said of the ao dai in particular, "and to create that platform for Vietnamese designers. Every time the designers showcase their work, they sell a lot of their pieces, people call to get custommade designs, and it helps their business a lot."

Even though fashion has long been a staple in the Vietnamese community, the event was the first of its kind in the country, Pham said. Of course, it might not be surprising that Orange County has been a trailblazer since it is home to one of the largest communities of Vietnamese Americans and expats in the U.S.

"This is the first time fashion has been put on a pedestal to showcase its own talent," she said. "It shows the community that we're branching out into so many fields and industries."

This year's show also included more practical collections. Westminster-based Jacky Tai featured his new bridal collection, which included richly embroidered red and gold ao dai and white Western-style gowns.

This summer Tai will open his own bridal boutique in Orange County.

Another featured designer was Yorba Linda resident Yvon Nguyen.

Barely 5 feet tall, Nguyen, who heads a public relations and marketing firm in Anaheim, said she has always had trouble finding trendy, well-fitted business and special-occasion wear.

"Over the years I started customizing, and then I started designing my own," she said. "Then I started to get really good feedback from my colleagues and girl-friends who share the same problem of finding beautiful, fashionable business wear."

Last year, Viet Fashion Week inspired her to launch her own petite line, Yvon Lux.

This year, Nguyen returned to Viet Fashion Week — held May 20 and 21 — but as a designer to debut her collection called Like a Boss.

The collection includes a wide range of pieces, from business wear to cocktail dresses, jumpsuits and evening wear.

"It was a little bit of everything, to speak to the different roles that women play daily," Nguyen said. "A lot of designers opt for that fantasy, really creative work of art, which is entertaining and fun to watch. But I approached the collection a little differently. My end goal was to have any woman walk away saying, 'I can wear Yvon Lux.'"

Nguyen knew her collection would play well with the audience — and not just because of the built-in support for Vietnamese designers.

"We are a petite-tailored line, and there is a big Asian population that fits our brand," she said. "I knew the majority of the audience would be 100% Asian."

Nguyen said she's received incredible support ever since the debut May 20.

"I had people approaching me that night, asking to buy things off the models," she said.

Now Nguyen is focusing on filling custom design orders and scaling the line upward.

"Most of the petite lines out there aren't trendy. They're very dowdy," Pham said. "Yvon makes it fashionable and fun to wear petites."

Additional designers on the second day of Viet Fashion Week included Quynh Paris, Cynthia Bui and Christy Pham.

Tracy Pham is already looking ahead to the fourth annual Viet Fashion Week and hopes it will be even bigger.

"I have a feeling that next year is going to be three days because we have so many designers that really want to showcase their work," she said. "Viet Fashion Week has finally grown beyond Orange County. It has roots here, but it's branching out internationally."

Pham also anticipates the featured designers will soon expand beyond their Vietnamese customer base.

"I can see Jacky Tai being the go-to bridal fashion designer for Caucasians and many others, because his gowns aren't just for Vietnamese, they're for everyone," she said. "I see Yvon Lux's stuff in Nordstrom."

Because the future of Vietnamese American designers is clear, she said: "It's mainstream."



GARDEN GROVE • If you were anywhere a fanfare. When near Chapman Avenue and Harbor Boulevard a little before 7 p.m. May 31, and weren't subtle.

Trumpeter Richard Birkemeier, chairman of the artist committee, is the man behind the record effort, and when he sent word out that Severinsen, the longtime bandleader on "The Tonight Show," was going to conduct, musicians arrived in droyes.

"Is there still music on the table?" Birkemeier asked the crowd of players as they picked up their parts for rehearsal in the Royal Ballroom. "No," came the answer Everyone would have to double up.

Severinsen, 88, baton in hand, showed up a few minutes later, dressed as Severinsen of old in a floral shirt, a checkered jacket and jeans.

"If you can live through the warm-up period, the rest of it is a piece of cake," he said.

Asked what he would be looking for from the players, he quipped: "I think I'm going to look for the exit."

The piece chosen was the "Olympic Fanfare" by John Williams, written for the 1984 Games in Los Angeles. Birkemeier discovered that the Guinness record for players of a trumpet fanfare was 105, and he figured that would be easy to beat. Only to make the record official, he said, he would have to pay Guinness \$10,000, money he didn't have.

"We're going to break a record, not set a record," he explained.

Players young and old, professional and amateur, stretched across the front of the ballroom for the rehearsal, several deep.

"I'm very hopeful that our performance this evening doesn't signal the apocalypse," Birkemeier told them, and then introduced Severinsen to cheers.

"Just use your ears, I'm not going to be much help to you," Severinsen said, and gave the downbeat.

After a single ear-splitting rendition of the familiar tune, Severinsen pronounced himself satisfied and instructions were given to meet outside and to not play in the lobby. Someone counted the players as they exited the ballroom.

Out back, the musicians quickly deployed on the sidewalk, Severinsen with music stand in the driveway before them, hotel employees directing traffic as music blared. The performance that followed wouldn't win any awards, but it was impressive nevertheless.


The final tally? 350 trumpeters had blown.

"Twice what I dreamed of," Birkemeier said.

a look at previous local politicians

Not that there's anything particularly wrong with the judges, mind you, it's just that if you ask us, there has to be a better way to pick judges than this. Be honest: How many of you really feel qualified to pick between the various defense attorneys and prosecutors who file to fill these posts?

It was a little bit sad to walk into the polling place and not see our neighbor Jack on the job as an election volunteer. He's done that for years, always with a friendly hello when you walk in the door to get checked in to vote, but this year rolled around without him due to various health issues. We wish him well and hope he's back by the general election in November.

Looking over the candidates in the county voter guide one last time at home, we started thinking about the politicians who've represented our fair cities of Westminster, Garden Grove, Midway City and Stanton over the years.

A lot of them have stuck around for years, moving from one job to the next when ambitions—or term limits—spark a move.

U.S. Rep. Loretta Sanchez, D-Orange, has represented parts of Garden Grove since first winning her place in Congress in 1996, and this year it's ambition that moved her up the ballot to compete for the seat in the Senate being vacated by longtime Sen. Barbara Box-er.

Given that it's been a Democratic seat for two decades and that the three best-known candidates running to succeed Sanchez all are Democrats – Garden Grove Mayor Bac Nguyen and former state senators Joe Dunn and Lou Correa – it's likely to stay that way unless one of the Republican challengers (Louie Contreras, Rodoffo Rudy Gaona, Bob Peterson and Lynn Schott) or independent candidate Nancy Trinidad Marin managed to squeeze into the November runoff.

Regardless, it's unlikely, nay, unfathomable, than any of them will ever match the fame – or infamy – of the representative for the 46th congressional district for a dozen years before Sanchez and shifting Orange County demographics toppled him.

Bob Dornan – or B-1 Bob, as he came to be known for his loud support for that aircraft – was colorful if you liked him and obnoxious if you didn't. It's not that much of a reach to suggest he was Trump before there was Trump, a candidate who spouted his opinions regardless of what others

might think, riling up supporters with an aggressive in-your-face political style.

He blamed at least part of his loss to Sanchez on election fraud by Latinos. When he later ran against Rep. Dana Rohrabacher his comments about Muslims also ignited controversy. Truly, there were few groups he didn't tick off

at one time or another, something he seemed to relish. "Every lesbian spear chucker is hoping I get defeated," Dornan once said.

Dornan, 83, once grabbed another congressman roughly on the floor of the House, though he claimed he only did so to straighten his tie. Right.

Unlike Trump, whose pro-military comes off more bluster than belief, Dornan actually served in the Air Force as a fighter pilot and flew in Vietnam as a combat photographer. Like the Donald, though, his career before politics involved a long run in show business of questionable quality.

He starred in small roles in film and TV projects though about the only one you can find today is the 1964 movie "The Starfighters," a movie so bad – it's lengthy "action" sequences involve things like mid-air refueling – that it ended up lampoon by the wags at "Mystery Science Theater 3000." (That version is on Hulu.com if you think you can endure it.)

So good luck, whichever newbie eventually wins the 46th congressional district. You'll need it to fill Sanchez's high heels, and even more so to match Dornan's big mouth.

Political watchdog growls at Garden Grove website

City says it's fixed setup implying illegal hurdle to seeing election records.

CARDEN GROVE • The City Clerk's Office violated a state requirement by making people submit public records requests before viewing election-related documents, the California agency that monitors political activity has said.

State law allows anybody to view election documents,

such as campaign statements or financial disclosures, by walking into a city clerk's office and asking for them.

But Garden Grove violated that when it "required that a public records request be completed when a request was made for campaign statements," the Fair Political Practices Commission said in a warning letter to City Manager Scott Stiles last month.

Garden Grove officials, though, say the violation was a misunderstanding caused by wording on the city clerk's website.

"We were acting in compliance, but the website made it look like we weren't following the rules," City Clerk Kathy Bailor said. "I understood we made that mistake, so I wasn't surprised when (the commission) brought that to our attention."

The clerk's office has a binder at the front counter with all of the election documents, which anyone can view when City Hall is open, said Terri Pomeroy, Garden Grove's deputy city clerk. Fountain Valley View June 9, 2016

Those who call or email asking for election forms usually receive them by email the same day – or, at most, the next day if the office is busy, Bailor said.

But the clerk's website used to have a link to a public records request form, sometimes used by the public to get documents an agency is initially declining to turn over. The link was somewhat near where information was provided about election materials.

The commission, Pomeroy said, thought that the location and the wording were vague and may lead people to think they had to submit requests for election documents. The web-

site now has a line saying election documents are available during regular business hours.

"We're confident the city has taken the steps necessary to alleviate the issue," Jay Wierenga, the commission's spokesman, said. He noted that this type of violation is relatively common.

Several residents who follow the goings-on of Garden Grove and often speak at City Council meetings said they have never had a problem looking at election documents at the clerk's office.




Figure 2.9 Bicycle and Pedestrian Opportunities and Constraints Map



Drones: Know Before You Fly

Santa Ana, California—Recent exponential growth in the purchase of low cost unmanned aircraft, popularly called drones, has created new issues for all consumers and government entities regarding safety and privacy. What was once a relatively small, build-it-yourself hobby segment has evolved into a much larger population of consumers interested in using drones as platforms for low cost still and video photography. In the past, the hobby community organized itself into self-policing groups which functioned according to acceptable community standards. Now consumers purchasing drones are much more likely to operate them outside any organized activity, and this raises questions and concerns about safety and privacy.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is responsible for all airspace in the United States, and issues operational guidelines for aircraft. It has chosen to require registration of a drone weighing more than 0.55 lbs. (8.8oz.), but less than 55 lbs., and used solely for outdoor hobby or recreation. The FAA has not addressed the use of drones operated at altitudes below 400 ft. with the exception of requiring operator registration. Registration creates a unique FAA identification number which must be marked on the registered aircraft. The new FAA registration requirement provides local law enforcement with the means for tracing ownership of drones and gives teeth to any local ordinances that may be enacted in the future.

Concurrent with the publication of this report, legislation is going through Congress that could affect local efforts to regulate the design, ownership, and operation of drones. This could affect the recommendations of this report. As with all pending legislation, however, it could change significantly prior to passage, or even fail to pass.

Governor Brown recently vetoed several drone bills that had bipartisan support citing existing laws that already prohibit interference with first responder duties. Meanwhile, local communities in California have experienced several serious incidents involving interference with fire-fighting and law enforcement aircraft, as well as complaints regarding invasion of privacy. Since neither the Federal nor California State governments have yet interceded, regulation falls to local communities to enact ordinances tailored to local use of these drones.

In December 2015, the City of Los Angeles passed an ordinance, based upon FAA operational guidelines, which could serve as a model for the County of Orange and its cities. As a result of this investigation and in the interest of public safety, the Grand Jury recommends that cities and the county develop local ordinances and promote drone education.

Settlement Agreement Process Insights/Appreciation (Insights upon the Expiration of the Settlement Agreement)

Dear Mayor Nguyen:

The Municipal Water District of Orange County ("MWDOC") was formed in 1951 to improve water supply reliability throughout Orange County. For 65 years MWDOC has enabled economic development to the four corners of the county by the provision of water in partnership with our Member Agencies. This collaborative relationship is the foundation of both past success and the achievement of future goals.

In 2011 MWDOC and its Member Agencies entered into a Settlement Agreement that addressed various operational topics including the MWDOC budget, rate methodology, choice of services, selection of MET Directors, and LAFCO/legislative activities. However, the essence of the Settlement Agreement was fundamentally communication. The 5-year Settlement Agreement expires this June and there have been a number of very positive outcomes from the process. Perhaps the most important is remembering the strength of working together and understanding the benefits of attentive, cooperative communication on the part of all parties. This alliance is an approach that has served Orange County well for 65 years and will do so into the foreseeable future.

Several components of the Settlement Agreement which have produced positive outcomes include:

- MWDOC Core/Choice Budget Process In general, this process has brought
 more interaction between agencies and focused services and payments on specific
 Member Agency needs. There are many significant differences between
 MWDOC's 28 Member Agencies. This budget process has facilitated the
 balanced provision of services and costs. The pairing of Core and Choice strikes a
 flexible balance between district-wide Core services and tailored Choice services.
- MWDOC Rate Structure The contract rate structure established in the Settlement Agreement expires with the agreement and modifications are required by Proposition 26. However, transparency and open discussion during the rate study have produced a knowledgeable airing of thoughts, concerns and support during the process. While the rate structure will change from that determined by the Settlement Agreement, it has engendered a beneficial process.

- MET Director Recommended Appointments The Settlement Agreement calls for two of the four MWDOC MET directors to be recommended by the two Member Agency parties (i.e., North County Agencies and South County Agencies). Unfortunately, the passing of Col. Jack Foley necessitated the implementation of this process. In general, the process as implemented by the South County Agencies resulted in deliberative and cooperative considerations and a recommended nomination that was well received and approved by the MWDOC Board of Directors. This success fueled ongoing improvements between all parties.
- Communications between MWDOC and Member Agencies Both entities developed a deeper appreciation of the old adages that it "takes two" to communicate and that a critical skill in communication is listening. Parties will not always agree but tremendous improvements have been made in communication. While not every communication vehicle has been a consistent success (i.e., not every Elected Officials Forum), the commitment to persevere, prepare and interact has yielded a record of continuing improvement.

Much has changed over the last 65 years in Orange County and change will continue into the future. 
The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Tier 2 volume for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- Fig. 1 OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply OCWD Groundwater water was the main supply in April.
- Fig. 2 OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years Water usage in April 2016 was about low compared to the last 5 years. Lower usage is primarily due to strong conservation efforts and mandatory restrictions set by the governor. Rainfall for April 2016 was below the historical average and temperatures were slightly above average.
- Fig. 3 Historical OC Water Consumption OC water consumption was 571,000 AF in FY 2014-15 (this includes ~17 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency Usage). This is about 50,000 AF less than FY 2013-14 but is about 16,000 AF higher than FY 2010-11 (Fiscal year with lowest usage). Water usage per person was the lowest it has been for Orange County at 164 gallons per day. Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts. High Temperature, precipitation and the economy all remain indicators to O.C. water consumption.
- Fig. 4 MWDOC "Firm" Water Purchases, 2016 "Firm" water above the Tier 1 limit will be charged at the higher Tier 2 rate. Our current projection of Tier 2 purchases is zero in 2016.

Water Supply Information Includes data on: Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data has implications for the

magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.


- Orange County's accumulated rainfall through May was well below average for this
 period. This continues the impact of the previous four hydrologic years' belownormal rainfall in reducing those local supplies that are derived from local runoff. El
 Nino conditions are weakening and unfortunately there has not been the large
 amounts of precipitation for Southern California that was anticipated.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation in May was around 119% of normal for this period. The Northern California snowpack is 97% of normal as of April 1st. This follows three below-average hydrologic years. The State of California has been in a declared Drought Emergency since January 2014. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation is only 60% as of the end of May.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation in March was 102% average for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 85% of normal as of April 15th. This follows two below-average hydrologic years, and this watershed is in a long-term drought. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 59% of their average storage volume for this time of year. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries for the Lower Basin states. As of Late May Lake Mead Levels were hovering around the "trigger" limit but fortunately levels are expecting to increase from the large amounts of precipitation that hit the Colorado River Basin this summer and spring. The USBR predicts that the "trigger" level will not be hit by the end of 2016.

Metropolitan prepared the 2015 UWMP in compliance with the California Water Code, including the Urban Water Management Planning Act (Act). The Act requires that every urban water supplier providing water for municipal purposes to more than 3,000 customers or supplying more than 3,000 acre-feet of water annually prepare and adopt, in accordance with prescribed requirements, an urban water management plan (CWC §§ 10617, 10620).

The 2015 UWMP reports on Metropolitan's long-term plans for ensuring the reliability and quality of water resources for the region and was designed to meet all requirements of the law. The 2015 UWMP was adopted by Metropolitan's Board of Directors on May 10, 2016.

The city of Bakersfield's Recreation and Parks Department partnered with Kaiser Permanente, First 5 Kern and USA Swimming to offer swim lessons, water safety programs and information on healthy choices. The department searched for grants and partnerships to teach water safety and healthy choices in order to improve community health. After creating the Make a Splash and Operation Splash programs, the city was able to offer \$5 swim lessons and successfully taught more than 450 kids how to swim.

According to the Kern County Network for Children 2014 Report Card, the city of Bakersfield has the third largest child population among California counties. The same report indicated that 28 percent of families in Kern County raise their children with incomes below the poverty level and 69 percent of the county's children were eligible to receive free or reduced price meals as compared to 58 percent statewide.

Drowning is the leading cause of death for children under age four and the second leading cause of death for adolescents under age 14. In Kern County alone, from 2000-2012, 47 children drowned. The cost of swim lessons in city pools is \$50 per person, but due to the low income of many Bakersfield families this cost was prohibitive, especially for families with more than one child. The city's recreation and parks staff pursued grants and partnerships to be able to offer swim lessons for \$5 in order to encourage more children to learn to swim.

With high rates of diabetes and heart disease, and 60 percent of its population considered obese, Kern County residents are considered some of the unhealthiest in the state. Over 24 percent of the residents report no physical activity and many of the children are not able to meet the minimum fitness standards when testing for the California Physical Fitness Test.

Swimming is a physical skill that can be used throughout a lifetime as fitness. The activity can increase confidence and also make people safer when participating in other activities in the water. According to USA Swimming statistics, participation in formal swim lessons reduces the risk of childhood drowning by 88 percent. Nationally, 70 percent of African American children cannot swim, and 60 percent of Latino children cannot swim. Children from non-swimming families are eight times more likely to be at-risk of drowning than those from families that have learned to swim. Kern County's population mix is 49 percent Latino, 6 percent African American and 37 percent Caucasian. Offering low cost swimming lessons became a priority in Bakersfield due to its proximity to the Kern River, canals, lakes and ponds combined with the county's demographics. Non-swimmers could also learn about water safety tips, what to avoid and even how to assist their children in and around water.

Additionally, the recreation and parks staff wanted to expand on healthy living, healthy choices and begin educating the public on the high sugar contents of many of the drinks that their families consume regularly. According to the California Center for Public Health Advocacy, over 63

percent of children in Kern County consume one or more sodas per day. For children, each extra can or glass of sugary beverage consumed per day increases their chance of being obese by 60 percent, according to the Obesity and Sugary Beverage Fact Sheet, Project Lean.

In order to offer affordable swim lessons and inform the public about water safety and healthy choices, the recreation and parks department created two programs, Make a Splash and Operation Splash. In 2014, the city received three grants totaling \$88,618.

Donations, grants and sponsorships for water safety education and ReThink Your Drink campaign in 2014 totaled \$97,812.58. The recreation and parks department exceeded expectations in offering swim lessons, water safety programs and healthy choice information. Through the First 5 Kern Make a Splash and Kaiser Permanente Operation Splash and USA Swimming Foundation grants, 901 participants used the discounted swim lessons in 2014.

In 2014, the swim lesson participants totaled (regular price swim lessons included) 2,071 children, 72 day camp participants and 47 adults. This was a 17.4 percent increase from the previous year. Offering more swim lessons to a greater number of people with diverse backgrounds increased the number of learning opportunities for safe water activities year round.

Participation in The World's Largest Swim Lesson, where simultaneous lessons were being held around the world helped spread the message that swimming lessons save lives. Locally, 78 participants helped break the Guinness World Record of simultaneous swim lessons.

Staff presented American Red Cross Water Safety Education to 3,701 pre-school aged children through the First 5 Kern Make a Splash program grant, exceeding the program goal of 3,340.

Additionally, 766 participants signed the pledge to "Rethink your Drink" for their families to consume fewer drinks loaded with sugar.

Overall attendance in all four city pools in 2014 was 180,927; a 9 percent increase over the previous year, and a record high attendance in Bakersfield's public pools. These programs have been well-received by the public and are making a difference in educating the public about healthy choices, water safety and learning about taking personal responsibility for individual health.

\$1 Million PG&E Community Grants Available for Climate Change Resilience Planning Over Next Five Years

Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) this week launched the Better Together Resilient Communities grant program to help local governments meet the challenge of climate change. The shareholder-funded initiative will invest \$1 million over five years — or \$200,000 per year — to support local planning efforts to help better prepare for, withstand, and recover from extreme events and other risks related to climate change, such as sea level rise, flooding, land subsidence, heat waves, drought and wildfires.

Beginning in 2017, PG&E will award two grants of \$100,000 through a competitive process. A panel of community and sustainability leaders, including members of PG&E's Sustainability Advisory Council, will select the winning applications from across Northern and Central California.

Strategies and solutions resulting from the grants will be made publicly available to help all communities, and encourage local and regional partnerships.

"Extreme weather and a changing climate are not just felt in places like Antarctica or Alaska. Instead, people across California — in cities big and small — experience it every day. Drought. Floods. Wildfire. Extreme heat. These are real life occurrences and they disrupt real lives — particularly the lives of our most vulnerable citizens. The League of California Cities welcomes the launch of the Resilient Communities grant program and looks forward to working with PG&E to help engage local governments throughout Northern and Central California," said League Executive Director Chris McKenzie.

Grant Criteria and Eligibility

Grant proposals will be assessed according to the following criteria:

 Replicability: the extent to which others can learn from and adopt the strategies and solutions.

- Partnerships: the extent to which the grant proposal reflects a multi-organizational and collaborative effort.
- Disadvantaged communities: the extent to which the grant proposal and partnership focuses on disadvantaged communities and identified needs.

To be eligible, applicants must be a governmental organization, educational institution or 501(c)3 nonprofit organization. All applicants must have a local government within PG&E's service area as a partner.

Federal Officials Warn City Officials to be Aware of Zika Threat

U.S. Centers for Disease and Prevention and Homeland Security representatives say that the Zika virus is not cause for panic — but that it must be taken seriously by state and local officials.

As of June 1, 591 people in the United States and another 939 in its territories had tested positive for Zika virus disease, according to the CDC. Of those, 310 are pregnant women, 168 of whom are in the continental United States.

None of those cases were acquired within the 50 states. The CDC and Homeland Security are monitoring Southern states, like Florida and Texas, and states like California with high numbers of overseas travelers.

No vaccine yet exists for Zika, which is spread to people most often through the bite of an infected *Aedes* mosquito, but may also be spread sexually by an infected man. Four out of five people who are infected suffer no symptoms or mild symptoms, like fever, rash, joint pain or red eyes, for up to a week.

Based on reports from Brazil, in about 29 percent of cases involving pregnant women, there appears to be a link between Zika and miscarriages or serious birth defects. These include microcephaly, in which a baby is born with a smaller head and results in children never being able to walk, talk or feed themselves. According to the CDC models, 1-13 percent of Zika infections in women during their first trimester of pregnancy result in microcephaly.

Federal officials said in a White House call with local officials on Tuesday that their primary concern was about pregnant women, their partners and developing fetuses. Much remains unknown about Zika, officials said, including other risk factors and the long-term impact on babies infected in utero.

Two types of tests are being used: the first a blood or urine test to confirm the presence of the virus, the second an antibody test to confirm symptoms.

Limiting mosquito populations will be crucial to combatting the virus. The invasive *Aedes* mosquito, which can transmit Zika after biting an infected person, is a particularly problematic foe because it is resistant to a number of pesticides and bites during the daytime. The eggs that the mosquitoes lay in the water in buckets and other containers can survive through months of dry weather.

Aedes mosquitos have been detected in <u>12 California counties</u>: Alameda, Fresno, Imperial, Kern, Los Angeles, Madera, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Mateo and Tulare.

Cities are urged to remain in regular contact with their county health officials and mosquito and vector control districts to learn how they can convey mosquito and virus information to residents.

Local officials can learn more about the virus with information available from the CDC. The State Department of Public Health's Zika information online as well. It includes an outreach toolkit.

The state of California's <u>Vector-Borne Disease Section webpage</u> includes a regularly updated map of Aedes mosquito infestations throughout California.

The Obama administration has requested \$1.9 billion for Zika response, in part to bolster state and local efforts. So far, Congress has not acted upon that request.

Cities Eligible for Grants to Upgrade Technology; Learn More with June 8 Webinar Deadline to Apply is July 15

Cities can apply for funds to support tech projects or equipment purchase through the <u>CRT</u> Settlement Fund.

As a result of a computer industry lawsuit settled by the California Attorney General, about \$2.27 million in one-time funds will be awarded to both public and nonprofit agencies, with grants ranging from around \$30,000 to \$86,000, and one to two years in duration. The grant process will be administered by Harry M. Snyder, consumer attorney, Cy Pres Funds, with final grant approvals by the California Department of Justice.

Projects that increase access to computer or visual technology will be considered. Examples include funding to train displaced or unemployed workers in new tech occupations; new software, technology or hi-tech equipment for local water, sewage treatment, or mosquito abatement district improved services; or funding for computer or visual technology services that will improve tech access, skills and knowledge for California populations.

- June 1: CRT Settlement Funds Request for Applications (RFA) released.
- June 8: CRT Settlement Funds Applicant Webinar (recording and FAQs will be posted online).
- July 15, 5 p.m.: Grants are due electronically to www.cypresfunds.net.
- October: Grants awarded and Grant Agreements Executed by Cy Pres Fund Administrator.
