Project Status Report

February 17, 2020

ENGINEERING DIVISION - CAPITAL PROJECTS

The following are capital construction and design projects under the administration of the Engineering Division and their present status. This covers approximately the next 6 months.

CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

3245 – Orange County Streetcar (DAI)

The project proposes to construct an at-grade streetcar from the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center (SARTC) to the NE corner of Harbor Blvd & Westminster Ave

- Low Bidder: Walsh Construction Const. Amt: \$220.5M
- NTP: 3/4/19 Est. Project Completion: 2021
- Length: 4+miles

7414 – Cannery-Imperial Storm Drain from GG Blvd to Gilbert (NICK)

Proposed storm drain from GG Blvd and Cannery to Imperial and Gilbert.

- Low Bidder: Vaslij Low Bid: \$3,578,650 Award Contract: June 25, 2019
- Construction start: Aug 5, 2019 Construction status: 60%
- Anticipated completion date: April 2020
- NB Magnolia closure ended 2/10/20.

7281 – Bike Trail in OCTA Railroad right-of-way from Stanford to Brookhurst (MIKE S.)

Federal grant received thru OCTA and administered by Caltrans for proposed 3200' long, 20' wide bike and pedestrian path in the former railroad right-of-way

- Awarded: 11/12/19 Low Bid: \$1.904M Low Bidder: Los Angeles Engineering
- Pre-Construction Mtg: 12/17/19 **Construction start date: Feb 3, 2020**
- Duration: 90 working days – approximately 6-8 months (Signal Poles may be delayed)
- Contractor is currently rough grading the bike trail alignment

DESIGN PROJECTS

7212 – Brookhurst Street Rehabilitation – Lampson to Chapman L=2640 ft (NICK)

Budgetary Estimate = \$1.6M

- Advertisement: Timing dependent on Bike & Ped trail construction (above)
- Construction will follow completion of Bike Trail project traffic signal pole installation
- Striping will potentially be done by Planning Dept Design status: 95%
- Two catch basin repairs – 9558 Katella & 9635 Chapman
- Residential Streets: La Vaughn, Russell & Earle (Est. \$120,000)

7215 – Euclid Street Rehabilitation – Lampson to Chapman L=2640 ft (NICK)

Budgetary Estimate = \$1.7M

- Includes relandscaping medians for lower water consumption & pavement protection
- Project will remove all evergreen trees
- Design status – Plans 80%
- *Potential construction timing conflict with sewer project on Euclid N of Lampson*

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7287 – Euclid/Westminster Intersection Improvement – ROW Acquisition (MIKE S.)

Proposed improvement: southbound right turn lane & EB right turn lane

- Granted **\$834,721** from OCTA in grant funding for construction. City will provide 25% match (\$278,240)
- Estimated Construction Cost: **\$1.1M**
- Edison (still...) preparing vault & pole relocation plans

7292 – Magnolia Street Rehabilitation – Shelly to Katella L=3300 ft (NAVIN)

12/09/19 – Project Change, New Budgetary Estimate = \$1.6M

- Scope: Grind 2" of asphalt and replace with new asphalt & replacement of 2 grooved cross gutters.
- Status: Started – 15% Complete

7292 – Lampson Ave Rehabilitation – Brookhurst to Nelson L=3900 ft (NAVIN)

Budgetary Estimate = \$722k

- Scope: Grind 2" of asphalt and replace with new asphalt
- Status: 15% complete

7292 – Brookhurst Microsurfacing – Westminster Ave to Trask L=2550 ft (NAVIN)

Budgetary Estimate = \$150k

- Scope: Route and crack seal then microsurface with reinforcing fibers
- Caltrans Permit: Traffic control plans received by Caltrans. Work hours for work near 22 freeway from 10pm Fri to 10am Sat
- Status: 70% complete

72XX – Ward Street Rehabilitation – S'ly City Limits to Hazard L= 1.25 mi. (NICK)

City boundary follows centerline of street

Budgetary Estimate = \$1.25M **City of Westminster is Lead Agency**

- Scope: Grind 2" of asphalt and replace with new asphalt
- Schedule: Go to construction late 2020 or early 2021
- Status: Will get cooperative agreement started

7216 – Local Streets Rehabilitation – SW of Katella & Brookhurst (KAMYAR)

- Estimated construction cost: ~\$0.7 M - - Budgeted for construction FY 20/21
- Design status: Plans 30%

3240 – Pavement Condition Consultant (MIKE S.)

Capital Projects has taken over the pavement condition analysis for all the streets in Garden Grove from PW/Streets Maintenance Division. NCE hired 5/23/17

- Due to submit PMP report to OCTA in June 2020.
- 5-yr Pavement Management Plan for arterial and local streets - Complete
- NCE completed street survey in December 2019 for 2020 PMP. 2020 report being prepared.

 - is revising and refining plans with new scope.
 - anticipate advertisement of the project in spring 2020. Construction fall 2020

7425 – Line B-5 Storm Drain (NICK)

Due to formidable challenges with various alignments, Capital Projects will take a closer look at those challenges and determine the best alignment for the proposed storm drain from its present end 150 feet N of Westminster Avenue on Newland Street

- Alignment study on hold pending completion of other storm drain projects

Euclid SB Right Turn Lane at Trask (MARK)

City acquired property from the Nazarene Church in fulfillment of a former grant from OCTA.

- Complete plan set complete. ROW acquisition complete.
- Construction cost estimate: \$400k

Grooved Cross Gutter Replacement (NICK)

There are currently 10 known grooved cross gutters at various locations around the city. These will be replaced with regular cross gutters and modifications to the existing streets to adjust surrounding grades.

- DESIGN COMPLETE. Construction will proceed as funding becomes available.
- The grooved cross gutter on Lampson at Groveview is proposed with the **Brookhurst St. Reconstruction** project in 2020.
- The grooved cross gutter on Katella & Homeway *and* Laurianne & Dewey are proposed with the **Magnolia St. Rehab** project in 2020.
- Designing grooved cross gutter on Chapman at Jasper St (W Garden Grove)

SANITARY SEWER

- **CIP Project 96 & 99 (Ward Street Sewer Improvement Project # 7824** – GGSD has awarded contract to Paulus Engineering Inc. in the amount of \$719,809. This project will replace 820 feet of 8-inch VCP sewer with 210 feet of 10-inch VCP sewer and 514 feet of 12-inch VCP sewer in Ward Street from McFadden Avenue to Davit Avenue, and from Bolsa Avenue to 200 feet north of Bolsa Avenue.

Project Limit: Ward Street (Davit Ave. to McFadden Ave. & Bolsa Ave. to 200' North of Bolsa Ave.)
Contractor: Paulus Engineering
Contract Amount: \$719,809
NTP: November 15, 2019
Working Days: 75

Status:

- Construction started on February 3, 2020.

- **Sewer Main Lining and Spot Repairs Projects 1&2- Project #7839** – This project consists of rehabilitating approximately 17,430 linear-feet of 8-inch sewer using UV-Cured Glass Reinforced Plastic cured-in-place liner. The project will be at various locations throughout the City. The project will also include 9 spot repairs, 421 sewer lateral reinstatements and 69 top hat sewer lateral seals.

Project Limit: Various Locations throughout the City
Contractor: Insituform Technologies
Contract Amount: \$1.1M
NTP: January 6, 2019
Working Days: 150

Status:

- Contractor will begin spot repair on February 24, 2020.
- Anticipate to start installing lining in March, 2020

- **Sewer Main Replacement Project 1- Project #7840** – The Sewer Rehabilitation Plan Phase 1, Sewer Main Replacement Project 1 (at Euclid Street, Pinehurst Court, Nelson Street, Pine Street, Pearl Street, Allen Drive, Stanford Avenue, Euclid Park, Trask Avenue, and Wilson Street) is one of many projects designed to address defective sewer pipe throughout the City under the GGSD System Evaluation and Capacity Assurance Plan of 2012. The sewer improvements consist of

approximately 30 feet of 6-inch diameter, approximately 5,440 feet of 8-inch diameter and, 1,290 feet of 12-inch diameter extra strength Vitrified Clay Pipe (VCP). It also includes the construction of 27 new manholes, modification of 2 existing manholes and 124 sewer house reconnections.

Project Limit: Throughout the City
Contractor: Chi Construction
Contract Amount: \$2,705,830
Working Days: 185

Status:

- Submitted for District approval during the February 25, 2020 Board Meeting.

UNDER DESIGN

SANITARY SEWER

- **Partridge Lift Station Improvements Project** –The District has been experiencing frequent pump clogging caused by wet wipes from the tributary area. The District is considering to install a new grinder at the upstream of the lift station. Staff has hired AKM to provide a preliminary design of the grinder installation for the Partridge Lift Station.

Project Limit: Partridge Lift Station

Status:

- Consultant working with SCE to get a service plan to support the added requirement.
- **SSMP Update** – The California State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) requires each waste agency to develop a Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP). The SSMP must be self-audited at least every two (2) years and updated every five (5) years. The last SSMP for GGSD was prepared in 2015. The engineering staff is working with Brent and his staff to prepare the 5-year update to include all the significant changes since the 2015 report.
- **CIP Project 92 (Donegal Drive Sewer - GGSD Project #7835)** – GGSD Board awarded a design contract to JIG Consultants on 1/26/2016. Kick-off meeting was held on 3/10/2016.

Project Limit: Donegal Drive (Medison Cir. to Bolsa Ave.)

Status:

- The consultant has completed approximately 60% of the design. Alternate alignment required due to the portion of the existing alignment being sandwich between block wall and houses.

WATER

- **Water Master Plan Update** –Staff has awarded a contract with West Yost Associates, Inc. for the Water Master Plan (WMP) update. The WMP update will reflect any changes that have occurred impacting the water system since the 2008 Water Master Plan. The WMP update will include an update to the hydraulic model and capital improvement plan.

Project Limit: N/A

Consultant: West Yost

Status:

- West Yost has completed the model calibration.
 - West Yost will be submitting the SCADA Master Plan Report on February 21, 2020.
- **Magnolia Reservoir and Booster Pump Station Rehabilitation Project (GG Project #7402)** – The reservoir repairs consist of crack and joint repair, construction of seismic curb, roof waterproofing, rust spot repair, and the addition of a fall protection system. The repair work for the pump station consists of replacement of the existing engine and booster pump, replacement of the existing exhaust system, replacement of the existing catalytic converter, replacement of two 10-inch butterfly valves, replacement of the 10-inch check valve, refurbishment of the existing flow control valve, and replacement of the roof and existing removable dormer.

Project Limit: Within the existing facilities (No traffic impact).

Status:

- Finalized design document.
- **Public Works Yard Block Wall** – Civiltec Engineering has completed the design. Building Department reviewed and approved the plans.

Project Limit: Within the existing facility (No traffic impact).

Status:

- **This project will be packaged with one of the water facility projects in the future.**

SANITARY SEWER SHARED

City of Anaheim

- Anaheim continues to resist updating 1986 Shared Sewer Agreement. The main stumbling block is that they do not want to lower the current d/D ratio of 0.75.

City of Santa Ana

- Santa Ana has agreed to include GGSD's portion of Westminster Sewer upgrade in their design and construction. Santa Ana City Council and GGSD Board have approved the reimbursement agreement between the City of Santa Ana and GGSD for this project.

- Santa Ana and GGSD staff agreed on the areas and contents of the shared sewer agreement. The final draft has been reviewed by attorneys. Santa Ana City Council approved the shared sewer agreement in August 2017. GGSD Board approved the agreement in October 2017.

City of Orange

- Water Services has initiated the conversation with City of Orange to draft a share sewer agreement. We have researched with the City Clerk to see if there is any existing share sewer agreement. The City Clerk did not find any.

PICK OC BENEFITS

5% PICK OC

INVITATION FOR BID (IFB)

- When the lowest bidder is a non OCLSB, the sole lowest certified OCLSB within 5% of the lowest bid shall be given the opportunity to price match.
- The lowest certified OCLSB must accept the County's offer to price match within 3 business days from the County's offer, unless otherwise specified by County.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL (RFP)

- An extra 5% shall be applied to the tallied score of each certified OCLSB to obtain the final score. If the final score of any OCLSB matches the final score of a non OCLSB, preference shall be given to the certified OCLSB.
- If two or more OCLSBs have the same final score, the County shall determine the contract award based on the County's best interest.

PICK OC REQUIREMENTS

LOCAL BUSINESS REQUIREMENTS

- Maintains their principal center of operations (i.e. headquarters) within Orange County, AND;
 - Has a business address located in Orange County that is not a post office box.
- OR-
- Has a valid business license or certificate of occupancy issued by the County of Orange or by an Orange County city, or other documentation acceptable to the County of Orange.

GETTING CERTIFIED AS AN OCLSB IS SIMPLE AND FREE

Sign up to receive every advantage available to your business. It's simple, and there are no costs involved.

- OCLSB certification must be active at IFB or RFP closing date and must remain valid at time of contract award.
- The OCLSB preference is given only to those who qualify, however, all vendors are encouraged to compete in the solicitation bid process.
- The solicitation and evaluation process established by Orange County remains unaltered while applying for OCLSB certification.

SMALL BUSINESS REQUIREMENTS

- Must be certified as a Small Business by the State of California Department of General Services (DGS).
- DGS Small Business requirements must be valid at the time of bid submittal.

EXCEPTIONS

PICK OC does not apply where prohibited by law or regulation and including, but not limited to:

- Specific state or federally funded projects
- Cooperative contracts
- Sole Source contracts
- Emergencies

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DIRECT DEPOSIT PAYMENTS VIA EFT

LOCAL SMALL BUSINESS

Effective January 1, 2020, the County of Orange Board of Supervisors adopted the Local Small Business (LSB) Preference Policy. The LSB Preference Policy supports local business opportunity, economy and the development of the County's tax base.

ENVIRONMENTALLY PREFERABLE PURCHASING

The County's Environmentally Preferable Purchasing (EPP) Policy is intended to assist



in the procurement of goods, services, and materials that have the lowest life cycle cost. The regulation provides the basis for securing environmentally friendly and sustainable

purchasing practices through the EPP Best Practices Guide. The EPP Policy and Guide are available to view at: <http://olb.ocgov.com/green>

Environmentally Preferable Purchasing refers to the procurement of goods and services that have a lesser or reduced effect on human health and the environment when compared with competing goods or services that serve the same purpose. This comparison shall take into consideration such things as: raw materials acquisition, production, manufacturing, packaging, distribution, reuse, disposal, energy efficiency, performance, safety and cost.

SURPLUS PROPERTY AND DISPOSAL

Surplus is tangible property that is no longer of use to any County department. Surplus property may include anything from office supplies and furniture to vehicles and heavy equipment. The County Surplus Policy allows the allocation of surplus to county schools and non-profit organizations.

The County's Surplus School Donation Program allows surplus items to be donated to local schools operating under the Orange County Department of Education.

VENDOR REGISTRATION



All prospective vendors must first register with BidSync. Registration on BidSync is free of charge.

4. Once logged in, select the "Tools" tab to edit your account profile, e.g. add NIGP codes; update company information.
5. BidSync will send email notifications when bids/solicitations match the NIGP codes selected in the profile.

Garden Grove declares golf course site 'surplus land,' readies it for sale

The move paves the way for possible public development, but local neighbors remain wary

Forced to comply with a new state law, the Garden Grove City Council has declared the 102-acre Willowick Golf Course as "surplus land," readying it for a sale or lease and possible development.

The council's vote Feb. 25 means that the site, which sits in Santa Ana but is owned by the city of Garden Grove, first must be made available to public agencies and others interested in acquiring it for affordable housing, parks and open space.

Previously, city officials hoped the land would be developed in a way that generates new revenue. But some residents objected, saying they want to see the land benefit local residents and not become the site of luxury apartments or a private stadium.

At the Feb. 25 meeting, members of a residents coalition fighting to make the land more open and available for affordable housing and parks said they are pleased that the property is now declared surplus land.

But they also criticized city officials' motives and ques-

tioned their commitment to comply with the law in a transparent and inclusive manner.

They pointed to a paragraph in the resolution adopted Feb. 25 that describes Willowick "to be a city asset held for the purposes of investment and revenue generation to support city services." They also noted a second paragraph that states the city must comply with the law "in order to pursue new uses for Willowick, including the possible disposition through a sale or preferably a lease."

Cynthia Guerra, a member of the Rise Up Willowick Coalition, said such language indicates city officials are "going to do the minimum" necessary to comply with the law.

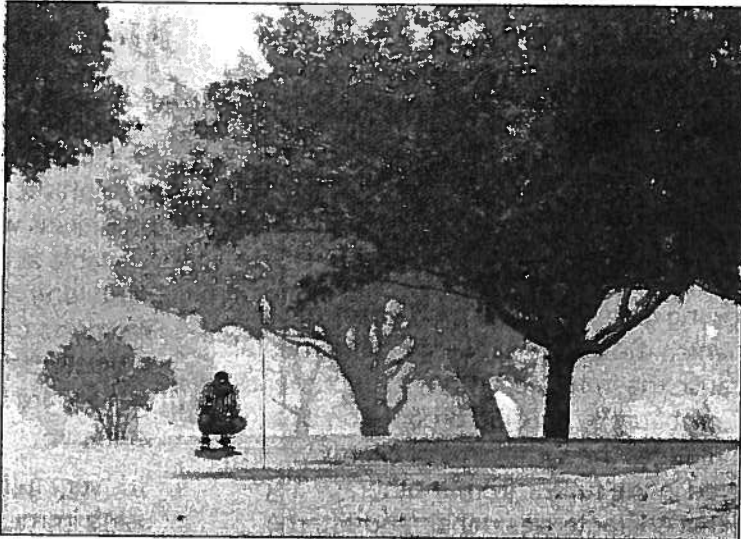
"They have no intention to engage in good-faith negotiations,"

Guerra said Feb. 26.

The city eventually could end up building what it wants and leasing or selling it to a tax-generating developer. But that could happen if no agreement is reached for parks or affordable housing with an interested party, such as a housing sponsor, a park authority or a school district.

At the meeting, the Garden Grove council voted unanimously, without discussion, to adopt a resolution declaring Willowick surplus land.

Last year, city officials appeared to try to get around a new law before it kicked in Jan. 1: a new version of the Surplus Land Act law, which requires local agencies to offer public lands for affordable housing and open spaces before selling or leasing. The city was ready to vote on a development deal but provided few details of what the project would eventually look like. It called for a company called MWillcock Land to buy up to 30 acres and lease the rest to other developers.

That deal frustrated Rise Up members from Santa Ana and Garden Grove, who complained that the city acted without input from the community and with little transparency.

In December, a Los Angeles Su-

perior Court judge stopped the city's plan to offer a long-term lease to MWillowick Land, which is affiliated with the developer of the Great Wolf Lodge, a Garden Grove hotel with an indoor water park. A local nonprofit known as

OCCORD, Orange County Communities Organized for Responsible Development, had sued both Garden Grove and Santa Ana, alleging the cities violated the state's Surplus Land Act.

In 2018, Garden Grove and Santa Ana worked together to stage community workshops and came up with three "Envision Willowick" concepts for the land: a new stadium, a "district" with a large corporate tenant and a cultural or educational center, or either a tech or agriculture-focused campus. (The cities last year received 12 proposals for the land, but neither city has made those proposals available to the public.)

Meanwhile, the court order in December that stopped Garden Grove from moving ahead with its long-term lease plan remains in effect. A trial has not yet taken place to determine whether it will become permanent.

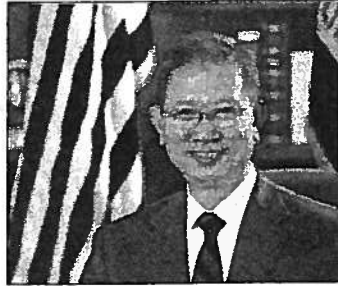

'It only takes one mistake' for outbreak to happen

OC supervisors spearhead training plan for protection against Coronavirus

Orange County Supervisors Andrew Do, who represents Garden Grove and Westminster, and Michelle Steel are proposing an emergency training and resource program for frontline healthcare workers and first responders to better prepare Orange County to respond to COVID-19 — the technical name for the Coronavirus — and avoid mistakes and delays experienced by other jurisdictions in the worldwide response to the virus.

"Orange County will take every step to prepare and protect our community from Coronavirus," said Steel, chairwoman of the Orange County Board of Supervisors. "We want all frontline health care workers and first responders to know exactly what to do, how to interact with suspected coronavirus cases, when to notify federal health authorities, and the proper ways to protect themselves from

exposure to the virus."

The proposal comes amid new reports that up to 100 healthcare workers in Solano County have been exposed to the Coronavirus.

"It only takes one mistake to go from containment to outbreak," said Do, vice chairman of the County Board of Supervisors. "We want to learn from other jurisdictions now — while Orange County still has no active cases."

The county-sponsored training program was considered at an emergency board meeting on March 2 (after press time), following Orange County's state of emergency declaration issued on Feb. 26.

New video from the Republic of Georgia shows medical personnel dragging a suspected Coronavirus patient back into the hospital — without any personal protective equipment covering their hands or face. Reporters at the press conference are also seen improperly wearing face masks.

"The video is a great example of why we need a local training program," said Do. "Frontline healthcare workers and first responders are the backbone of our emergency response plan, and this training program is about giving them the resources they need to keep us safe."

In responding to Coronavirus patients quarantined to the Diamond Princess cruise ship, Japanese health officials were exposed to and later diagnosed with

the virus after wearing masks, but not full protective suits.

Chinese health workers responding to Coronavirus have suffered a heavy toll and experienced high rates of exposure to COVID-19. As many as 3,400 health workers in China have reportedly been infected with the Coronavirus. Other outbreaks, such as the Ebola outbreak, have shown that "health workers were up to 32 times more likely to be infected with Ebola than adults in the general population," according to a 2015 World Health Organization report.

Under the proposal, the training and resource program will be available to all frontline health workers and first responders, including firefighters, paramedics, EMTs, nurses, doctors, and all other relevant personnel, to provide proper training for identifying the first signs and symptoms of Coronavirus, educate personnel on proper response protocols for handling suspected Coronavirus cases, and ensure that every first responder and health care work has access to proper protective equipment.

"Orange County needs to develop an immediate training

program to implement the best practices for responding to Coronavirus," said Steel. "We want to learn from other jurisdictions."

In addition to their proposal for a training program, Supervisors Do and Steel are also proposing immediate action to develop a plan to secure John Wayne Airport from spreading the disease as well as a full assessment of the county's protective health equipment.

A new whistleblower report also alleges that U.S. health officials were sent to Travis Air Force Base and March Air Reserve Base without proper equipment and training of safety protocols. That report adds credibility to the County of Orange's decision to join a legal case challenging the state and federal plan to house Coronavirus patients at a dilapidated facility in Costa Mesa, the supervisors said.

Last week, the City of Costa Mesa received a temporary restraining order from a federal judge after learning about the state's plan to send individuals affected with Coronavirus from the Travis Airforce Base in Solano County to the Fairview Developmental Center in Costa Mesa.

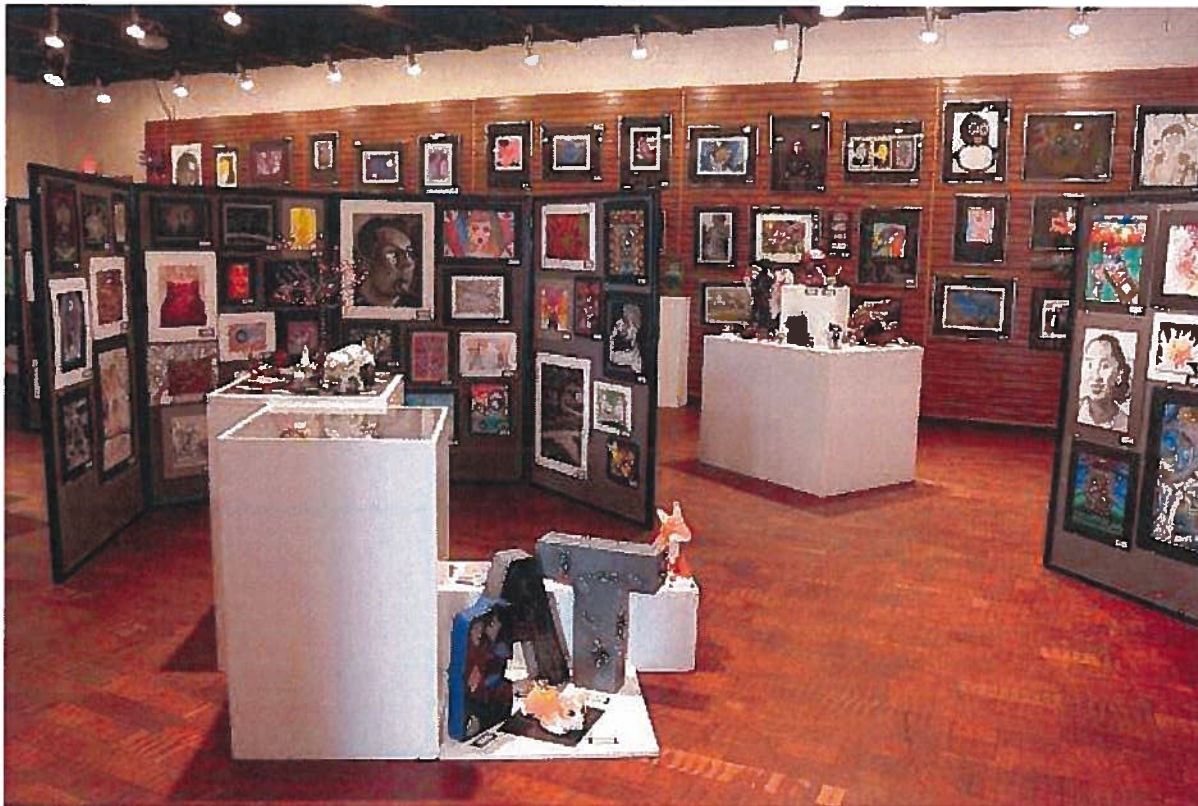

Cities Encouraged to Provide Comments on CPUC Rule 20 Program

March 3, 2020

Deadline to submit feedback for parties to the proceeding is March 20.

The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) Rule 20 undergrounding program (Rule 20 Program) lays out guidelines and procedures for undergrounding overhead electric facilities. This program is provided at four levels, known as Rule 20A, B, C, and D.

Over the past several years, the Rule 20 Program has been fraught with issues related to the allocation of work credits and the buildup of unused work credits across the state. The Rule 20 Program has also been criticized for failing to focus on undergrounding projects designed to improve safety, such as wildfire mitigation and energy source reliability.

As a result of these concerns, the CPUC issued an Order Instituting Rulemaking to Consider Revisions to Electric Rule 20. On Feb. 13, 2020, the CPUC issued a [Staff Proposal for Rule 20 Program Reform and Enhancements \(Staff Proposal\)](#).

The staff proposal presents recommendations for changing the Rule 20 Program to resolve issues at all four levels of the program. Significantly, the staff proposal recommends the CPUC sunset the existing Rule 20A and Rule 20D programs over a 10-year period, and replace the allocation-based programs with a modified Rule 20B program or other new programs. Such a change would alter the way work credits are allocated to cities, and the way cities use work credits to fund undergrounding projects.

How to Engage

Cities can submit formal comments on the staff proposal directly to the CPUC, or reach out to League staff to provide feedback.

In the staff proposal, CPUC staff specifically requests comments on the following questions, among others:

- Are there ways that the CPUC can better encourage or incentivize self-taxation or surcharge programs among the cities and counties to accelerate undergrounding?
- How should local surcharge programs interact with the Rule 20 program?
- Is 90 calendar days enough time for cities and counties to form a workable underground utility district? Would 90 business days be more appropriate?
- How have the communities benefitted from Rule 20A work credit trading?

- Should the CPUC continue to allow work credit trading among the communities?
- Are there other policies that the CPUC can implement to incentivize more efficient and less expensive project completion?
- What are reasonable time thresholds for the project milestones?

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League of California Cities Unveils Bold Housing Production Proposal

Sets the foundation for immediate production of housing across all income levels

March 4, 2020

For more than a year, the League of California Cities has been proactively working with city leaders on solutions to the housing crisis that is gripping all regions of the state.

In February, the League's board of directors overwhelmingly supported a bold housing production proposal that, if fully implemented, will lay the foundation for the immediate production of much needed housing across all income levels.

The League's board which consists of mayors, council members, and appointed officials who represent the League's professional departments, regional divisions, and at-large representatives, voted nearly unanimously to support the proposal in February 2020. The proposal was developed by the League's Housing, Community and Economic Development Policy Committee, a 60-member committee made up of mayors, council members, and appointed officials who represent the League's professional departments, diversity caucuses, and regional divisions.

"While prior proposals have missed the mark and were unable to garner the support to advance out of the Legislature, the League strongly believes that with this housing production proposal and continued partnership with the state and other organizations, we are on the right path to providing housing for all Californians," said League of California Cities President John F. Dunbar.

The League's housing production proposal consists of both near-term and longer-term actions:

Near-term actions

Any realistic solution must include new long-term funding to support the construction of affordable housing and essential infrastructure. Without a source of reliable, ongoing funding that matches the scale of the problem, little will be done to actually produce new, affordable housing units. Funding could come from the following pending bills or other sources:

- SB 795 (Beall) Affordable Housing and Community Development Investment Program – a measure that would restore a more robust property tax-based financing mechanism focused on building affordable housing and infill infrastructure that would provide up to \$2 billion annually.

- ACA 1 (Aguiar-Curry) Affordable Housing and Public Infrastructure. Voter Approval – a measure that would allow the voters to lower the vote approval threshold to 55 percent for local general obligation bonds, sales taxes or parcel taxes that invest in affordable housing and key infrastructure.

The proposal also includes requiring cities to take some immediate actions designed to help spur housing production. In order to ensure cities retain flexibility to best meet their local needs and conditions, they would be able to choose from a suite of actions that include:

- Adopt an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) ordinance
- Streamline housing approval processes
- Establish a Workforce Housing Opportunity Zone (WHOZ) or a Housing Sustainability District
- Develop objective design review standards
- Reduce development fees
- Adopt an inclusionary housing ordinance
- Establish a local housing trust
- Restrict demolition of existing housing stock
- Allow up to fourplexes in single-family zones
- Increase allowable heights and densities
- Adopt transit-oriented development (TOD) plans
- Reduce parking requirements
- Adopt tenant protections
- Establish an Enhanced Infrastructure Financing District (EIFD) or a similar financing tool

The League's board also underscored the numerous barriers to housing production well beyond the control of local governments that have significant impacts on what types of, and how many, housing units are built. Construction costs, new building codes, California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) costs and delays, and financing are all potential barriers that need to be reduced to help accelerate housing construction.

Longer-term actions

With the most recent Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) and associated Housing Element update process underway, all cities and counties must update housing planning documents to include new housing unit allocations by early 2024.

To accommodate higher RHNA allocations and align local planning documents with state priority development areas, the League supports requiring cities to prioritize housing density and housing site identification near key transit infrastructure, downtown areas, and commercial corridors. The League also supports cities needing to accommodate as much of their housing unit allocation in

these areas before other locations are considered.

“We believe that the League’s bold housing production proposal presents a real opportunity to forge a consensus solution that will accelerate housing production and, at the same time, allow cities to develop locally driven plans for those homes,” said League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman. “We look forward to continuing to partner with the Governor, Legislature, and other stakeholders on finding solutions to the housing crisis that are built on local civic engagement and community input, while simultaneously working to meet the state’s housing needs.”

The League has shared the housing production proposal with the Governor’s office and legislative leaders and looks forward to building a consensus solution that will effectively address the housing crisis. The League strongly believes this housing production proposal backed by city leaders from across the state can be a vehicle that all parties can support to produce more housing.

The League will be hosting a webinar for members Thursday, March 4, 2020 to review the details of the proposal, and share how city leaders can engage and support the League’s advocacy efforts. A fact sheet is also available to assist in outreach and communications with legislators.

This proposal, as well as the League’s other strategic priorities, will be key topics during the League’s Legislative Action Day, April 22, 2020. The League urges all city officials to register at no charge for this opportunity to let local voices be heard on this very important issue to our cities and all those we serve.

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
